WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Freedom, N. H., in the County of Carroll, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand and three hundred and fifty dollars to defray town charges consisting of town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses election and registration, town hall expenses and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars for heating expenses of the town hall and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred dollars for the use of hydrants and appropriate money for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five dollars for street lights and appropriate money for the same.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars for cutting bushes and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fourteen hundred dollars for general expenses of highway department and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and four dollars for Public Library and appropriate money for the same.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum eight hundred dollars for sanding winter roads and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars for plowing winter roads and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred and fifty-six dollars and eighty-six cents for class five roads and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars for putting up snow fence and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars for bridges and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars for town needy and appropriate money for the same.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of seven hundred dollars for insurance and appropriate money for the same.

- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two thousand dollars for old age assistance and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars to help defray the expenses of Old Home Week Celebration for August, 1958 and appropriate money for the same.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars for summer highways and appropriate money for the same.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred dollars for fire department, three hundred dollars for maintenance, and three hundred dollars for new hose.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred dollars to patch West Ossipee road and appropriate money for the same.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars for maintaining the town dump and appropriate money for the same.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to use the revenue from 1957 Severance Tax to cover any overages.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.
- 25. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ninety dollars and sixty-one cents, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town: to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages

and resources for the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

- 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars for Social Security and appropriate money for the same.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred and seventy-five dollars for interest on long term notes and short term notes and appropriate money for the same.
- 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two thousand dollars to be applied on the long term note taken out for the Effingham Falls Bridge and appropriate money for the same.
- 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE: Since this copy of the Town Warrant is required by the printer at an earlier date than the legal Town Warrant posting date, it is not necessarily complete, and therefore, the Posted Warrant may contain additional articles which are not included in this publication.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in or near woodland. Official figures show that more than 98% of all forest fires results from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects are far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forest, the protection forest provides for game, and the supply of ground water. They upset the local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Your local warden and his deputies are doing an excellent job in trying to prevent this shameful waste, but they must have the cooperation of the public and this means YOU. Remember there are laws that cover the making of a camp fire, also the burning of rubbish or debris, and also the burning of brush whether this is on your land or land of other people, and to disobey these laws can cost you a great deal of money. So please see your local warden and he will tell you how to burn the rubbish, also when you can burn it, and also issue you a permit to do so if conditions are right.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we will call "I don't care." He is the person that builds a fire anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush, or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He also is very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called "I don't know any better" and the best way to describe him is he is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their care-

lessness can be the cause of our valuable woodland being destroyed by fire. Even your homes can be burned by their carelessness.

It is up to you and you to report these two characters to your local forest warden whenever you see them operating. Remember it is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Freedom qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March 1958, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue

and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for additional insurance on the school building and contents.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for educational purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or Federal Government or any department or agency thereof, or any other sources.
- 11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$90.00 to be used, in conjunction with funds to be raised and appropriated by other school districts in Supervisory Union No. 36, for the purpose of conducting a study of the feasibility of the formation and operation of a cooperative school district by not less than five of the seven districts involved, namely, Brookfield, Effingham, Freedom, Madison, Ossipee, Tamworth, and Wakefield. The above sum is based on \$3.00 per pupil, grades seven to twelve inclusive, according to the average daily membership of these grades for 1956-57. The use of this appropriation is contingent upon appropriations made on a similar basis by not less than five of the seven districts named above.
- 12. To elect three members of the cooperative school study committee to act in conjunction with the school board members.
- 13. To see if the school district will vote to hereafter use a check-list for the election of its officers, will adopt as its school check-list the Town check-list, beginning with the 1959 annual district meeting, and as provided in RSA 197: 12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, chapter 57.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Freedom:

During the school year 1956-57 the teachers in the Freedom School were Mrs. Ethel Ramsdell, grades 1 to 4, and Mr. F. Edward Hooper, grades 5 to 8. At the end of the year Mr. Hooper resigned and was succeeded by Mrs. Esther M. Walker. Mrs. Walker is a graduate of Boston University. We are fortunate to have teachers who are devoted to the interest and welfare of the pupils.

Last year a total of 53 pupils were enrolled with an average membership of 48.8. For the current year there is an enrollment of 43 pupils.

Enrollment in high schools was as follows:

The average current cost per high school pupil was \$384.02. A report from the State Department of Education shows that the average cost per high school pupil in the State of New Hampshire for 1957-58 is estimated to be \$410.00.

During the current year high school pupils from Freedom are enrolled as follows:

High School enrollment for the year 1958-59 will approximate 23 pupils.

The school health services were effectively provided through the work of Mrs. Rebecca Sanborn, R. N. Mrs. Sanborn is employed by a School Nurse Union consisting of Effingham, Freedom, Madison, and Wakefield. Mrs. Sanborn continues in the position during the current year. Physical examinations are conducted by a physician with Mrs. Sanborn's assistance.

During the past summer two new toilet rooms were constructed with flush toilets, lavatories, and a heating conduct from the furnace to each room. This is a great improvement of the sanitary facilities.

The school boards of this supervisory union recently have begun a study of the feasibility of a cooperative school to serve the majority of the districts of the union. This study was undertaken in view of the expected marked increase in high school enrollment and the possibility that the high schools now attended by our pupils will not be able to accommodate them in the not too distant future. Such a cooperative school may well offer important educational advantages to the children of this area, as well as financial advantage to the tax payers. Reports will be made to citizens as the study progresses.

The cooperation of the school board, teachers, and citizens is gratefully acknowledged.

PROPOSED COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DIST STUDY

At a meeting of the school boards of Supervisory Union No. 36 in November, 1957 a discussion of the impending increase in the number of high school pupils in these districts, and a reported proportionate increase in the high school districts now attended by our pupils, led the board members to decide that a serious study of a cooperative school district for this area is very urgent. All the high school pupils of this area are transported to schools outside these districts. Our school boards have no control over these high schools. If it becomes necessary to provide high school facilities for our pupils it is imperative that the study begin now in order to provide the essential building, equipment, and staff by September 1961.

Because there will be expenses necessary in making the study and reporting the findings to the citizens of the districts each board has been requested to insert an article in the warrant providing an appropriation of \$3.00 per pupil based on the average daily membership of grades 7 through 12 for the year 1956-57.

What is a cooperative school district? A cooperative school district is formed from two or more existing school districts by vote of the people. It is an entirely new school district in which the former individual district boundaries no longer exist. It has all the authority and powers of a single district. Its affairs are administered by a school board made up of at least one representative from each of the pre-existing districts who are elected by the people. It brings together the resources of the member districts to provide the desired educational facilities for the pupils of the area. It makes possible the provision of educational opportunities at the high school level by a school of sufficient size (not less than 300 pupils) to offer a wide variety

of instructional services efficiently and economically. It will provide security of educational facilities that are not guaranteed to tuition pupils. Effectively organized it will provide for the educational needs of the pupils of this area.

It is the intention of the school boards to make the study in terms of a six-year high school, grades 7 through 12. The inclusion of grades seven and eight will serve two purposes. The pupils will have the facilities necessary for instruction in science, shop, home-making, physical education, guidance, music, and art that, in most of our schools, do not exist or at best in a few only inadequately. By moving the 7th and 8th grades out of our present buildings it will make unnecessary the construction of additional classrooms and other facilities in Madison, Ossipee, Tamworth, and Wakefield in the predictable future. Enrollment in grades 7 to 12 in the seven districts involved will be about 450 in 1960 and over 500 in 1962.

Under the cooperative plan school transportation for both elementary and high school pupils may be coordinated and operated more efficiently. A centrally located high school will shorten most of the bus routes materially which should decrease this part of the school budget.

Under the present state school building aid law a cooperative school district of two former districts is entitled to 40% reimbursement of building costs. The reimbursement increases 5% for each additional district to a maximum of 55%. A cooperative district of five old districts will be entitled to the maximuum 55% aid.

The cooperative school district serves to attract and hold good teachers by providing better teaching conditions, better instructional facilities, better professional relationship, better professional consultant services in the fields of guidance, music, and art, and a better professional spirit through belonging to a large instructional unit.

This proposed study must cover many aspects of the problem including:

- 1. A study of the school population of the area.
- 2. A study of the educational needs of the youth of the area and the school program that will provide for these needs.
 - 3. A study of transportation needs and the costs.
 - 4. A study of building needs and the costs.
- 5. A financial study including capital costs, current operation costs, bond issues, state aid available, apportionment of costs and affects upon the tax rates of the districts involved.

It is proposed that the results of this study will be published and distributed to the voters of these districts prior to the annual district meeting of 1959.

We feel that this study project is immediately necessary to make certain the security of educational opportunities at the high school level, to provide better instruction for the 7th and 8th grade pupils, to relieve several districts of impending building problems, and to improve our entire educational system. It is our earnest hope that this study will receive your support.

The districts concerned in this study are Brookfield, Effingham, Freedom, Madison, Ossipee, Tamworth, and Wakefield.
