TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to bring in your ballot for the following town officers:

Town Clerk for one year, one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer for one year, Tax Collector for one year, Highway Agent for one year, one Water Commissioner for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for one year, one Library Trustee for two years, and one Library Trustee for three years, two Auditors for one year, three Fire Wards for one year, also to bring in your ballots for the election of Delegates-at-large, Alternate Delegates-at-large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating there-

to.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of

taxes, or take any action thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to explore and survey the Hodgman lot owned by the Town by virtue of a tax Collector's deed, raise and appropriate a sum of money for that

purpose, or take any action thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,300 to improve and remodel the Fire House.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1520 for the purchase and installation of 2-way radios for Civilian Defense, this being our half the cost, in conjunction with the Federal Civil Defense program, or take any action thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will accept a piece of land from H. Rousseau 50 feet wide and approximately 1400 feet northerly, to the wall, for the purpose of building a new road leading from the road to Rousseau's house starting at houses of Martin

and Bedard or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase new curtain for the stage in the auditorium, and shades for the windows, payment for same to be taken from accumulated interest from M. M. Marsh Trust Fund.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to improve the common where the World War I

Honor Roll now stands.

Article 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to select a site for a Town Dump and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray any expense incurred in developing

same, or take any action thereon.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tract of land between the east line of the new part of the Pleasant Street Cemetery and the new Route 31, formerly owned by Mrs. Anne E. Lee, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or take any action thereon.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to clear the remainder of the land in the new part of the Pleasant Street Cemetery, or take any action

thereon.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to paint the Library and the Ladies'

Room and Men's Room, or take any action thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept a piece of land from Gurvin Work, 40 feet wide and approximately 500 feet long, for highway use extending southerly from Kimball Heights Road, at land of Vaillancourt and Pouliot to wall at land of Ernest Bernier, or take any action thereon.

At 4:30 P. M., it was voted to close the polls at 6:00 P. M.

At 8:00 P. M. the Meeting was again called to order by the Moderator and the articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. For Town Officers chosen, see pages 3 and 4 of this report.

Article 2. See Selectmen's report for Appropriations made.

Article 3. Voted to accept reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and Officers heretofore chosen as printed in the Town Report.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 5. Voted not to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made.

Article 6. Voted not to print the Invoice and Taxes for the year 1955.

Article 7. Voted not to change the fire warning signal system.

Article 8. Voted \$1100 to paint Selectmen's Room, Post Office and to install new doors on the Town Hall.

Article 9. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to make application to the Administrator of the Housing and Home Finance Agency for a survey for a complete Sewer System in Greenville.

Article 10. Voted to purchase the barn and four stall garage on River Street for \$5,000.00. \$500.00 payable in 1955 and \$500.00 each year thereafter until paid in full.

Article 11. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$21,000.00 for the Water System, payable \$3,000.00 per year plus interest.

Voted to adjourn at 9:20 p. m.

I further guarantee to pay in ratio with other users of the water a proportionate amount of the cost of laying of the water mains which by this agreement is fixed at \$ quarterly over a period not to exceed fifteen years, or for such shorter period as may be determined by the Supervisory Board of the Greenville Water Department, this amount to be assessed against my property as a guarantee tax or investment charge and collectible in full as against me or the property even in the event I later fail to connect my premises with the water mains. It is understood and agreed, however, that this agreement shall not become in force and effect unless and until sufficient other users sign similar agreements to warrant the laying of the water mains, and the supply of water actually made available to me.

It is understood and agreed that I shall be credited as against this investment charge any amount paid as regular or current water or meter rates for the water used during the period of this agreement.

It is believed they serve a good purpose in reminding local citizens of the danger from such fires and how they can help prevent them. BE A GOOD CITIZEN—COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the State of New Hampshire in 1955—235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 1621 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 8 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things—while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them? The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to

bring this about?

REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.

2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.

3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Greenville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March 1956, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for the purpose of painting the exterior of the Greenville Public School or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding one dollar per week per child in attendance at public high schools other than Appleton Academy for the purpose of providing transportation to such high schools, the school board to incorporate such sum in their budget until such time as the action is rescinded by the district or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the purpose of making retroactive payments for transportation to parents whose children presently attend and have attended high schools other than Appleton Academy since September 1949, such amount to be reimbursed at the rate of one dollar per pupil, per week, or take any action relating thereto.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my ninth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

One replacement was made in our teaching staff this fall. Mr. Dana Moore left to teach in Keene, N. H. Mr. Elliott Barron, former teacher of grades 3, 4 and 5, was assigned grades 6, 7 and 8. Mrs. Lillian Maynard, graduate of the University of New Hampshire was employed to teach grades 3, 4 and 5. Mrs. Edna LaPierre continued as the primary teacher, teaching grades 1 and 2. The services of Miss Elsie Wheeler were retained to teach and supervise the music program; Miss Sybil Beatham continued her services as School Nurse and Mr. Eddie

Hamilton is conducting the instrumental program.

The instrumental music program started late this year because of the illness of Mr. Hamilton. Last year, I mentioned in my report that this program should be given serious consideration by the voters. At the present time the parents of those children who are participating in this program are paying 75¢ per lesson. This should be a permanent part of our regular educational program and the expense of same should be provided for by the district. As was suggested last year, the cost would be approximately \$200 depending upon the number enrolling. This amount could be voted into the budget at the district meeting. The desire for such a program should come from the parents.

The emphasis this year throughout Supervisory Union No. 63 has been in the area of arithmetic fundamentals and the development of good reading habits. Mrs. Russell Kimball, Greenville Librarian, is to be commended for the excellent cooperation she has extended to the teachers and pupils in making available to

them appropriate reading materials.

Proper consideration is being given to those activities that promote the social and physical development of the child. This is being done through such activities as dramatics, musical presentations, social dancing, and physical education activities.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The exterior of the building is badly in need of paint. It has been several years since this has been done. Consequently,

Article 9 is requesting the sum of \$650 to do this.

For several years, the right entrance door has been giving a great deal of trouble. It has been repaired so often that there is little left to repair. The weather on that side of the building has been such that the door, as well as the stairs, have deteriorated

to a large degree. Thus the School Board is incorporating an item of \$230 in the budget to purchase a new door and to construct a small porch roof over the platform leading to the building. Eventually a similar project will have to be carried on, on the other side of the building.

The front gable on the roof was reshingled this past year and new valleys were installed. Several years ago we re-shingled two sides of the roof. In the near future it is going to be necessary to re-shingle the front portion, exclusive of the gables.

A sum of money, amounting to \$450 has been incorporated in the budget, for the purpose of purchasing new movable desk and chair units for the intermediate room, replacing the old, inadequate fixed furniture. A modern educational program requires larger book boxes, working surfaces, and mobility in the desk unit. We started several years ago on a program of eliminating one classroom of fixed furniture when we provided movable units for the upper grade room. Last year we introduced the movable desk and chair units into the primary room.

TRANSPORTATION PROBLEM

As the number of pupils for whom we are responsible to transport increases, the problem of transporting them increases. We are presently carrying 43 pupils to Appleton Academy and the capacity of the present bus is 43. Next year we anticipate at least 7 more pupils will attend Appleton Academy, after taking into consideration those who will be graduating, making

a total of approximately 50 pupils to be transported.

A new route is developing in the area of Adams Hill. It is estimated that five children will be coming in from this area. If one bus was to do the whole route, it would mean that some children would be picked up in the morning shortly after seven o'clock and would return at approximately 4:45 P. M. Thus it appears that two routes will have to be set up, one of which might take the Adams Hill area and the overflow to Appleton Academy; the other to operate the regular route as it presently exists. If a larger bus should be utilized to accommodate all of the Academy pupils, two routes would still be necessary. Consequently, the School Board is requesting an additional \$1000 to provide the necessary transportation.

Article 10 and 11 refer to a bus situation that has developed as the result of action taken at a school district meeting held March 11, 1941. At that time, the following article appeared in the warrant, "To see if the district will vote to provide free transportation of High School pupils to Appleton Academy, and allow for pupils attending High School elsewhere, an amount not exceeding one dollar per week per pupil, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto." The action take on this article was as follows: "It was voted that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$900 in

addition to Article 8, to provide for free transportation to Appleton Academy pupils, and allow for pupils attending high school elsewhere an amount not exceeding \$1.00 per week per pupil." From September 1941 through June 1946, Greenville had tuition pupils attending Appleton Academy, Milford High School, Peterborough High School and Townsend High School. Those attending Appleton Academy were included under a general contract which provided for elementary as well as secondary school pupils. Special amounts of money were incorporated in the budget each year to take care of those who attended High School elsewhere. These amounts ranged from \$200 to \$900

depending upon the number anticipated.

From September 1946 to June 1949, all high school pupils attended the Academy and all transportation was provided under a general contract for both elementary and secondary pupils. In September 1949, one pupil attended Milford High School and no money was provided at the previous March meeting for this. In 1953-54, one pupil attended Peterborough and one Wilton High Schools. In 1954-55, two attended Peterborough. In each of these years no money was appropriated for this extra transportation. This fall, a bill was presented to the School Board covering transportation costs for 1953-54, 1954-55 and 1955-56. This is the first time that a formal request has been made of the School Board to take action on this matter.

The question arose as to whether or not the action taken by the voters in the meeting of March 11, 1941 was binding on the School District in 1955. To clarify the position of the School Board in this matter, an opinion from the Attorney General's Office was requested, through the Department of Education. Following is a quotation from a letter received by the Superintendent of Schools from the Commissioner of Education, "The school district does not have any obligation under the article passed in 1941, because no appropriations were made to cover such costs. In other words, if any transportation costs are to be paid, it would be necessary to provide for them in the school budget. As no provision was made in the budgets of these previous years, there is no provision for any such payment."

The question before the voters at this annual meeting is to determine whether or not they want to provide for high school transportation to public high schools other than Appleton Academy. If the district votes in the affirmative an appropriation of \$144 will be necessary.

The next question the district must decide is whether or not they wish to acknowledge any financial responsibility for transportation between 1949, and the current year. Article 11, carries an appropriation of \$350 for this purpose.

FINANCE

The School Board's Budget for 1956-57 calls for an appropriation of \$40,317.21, an increase of \$4798.09 over that of last year. The increase is reflected in the following areas; Tuitions \$3,505; Transportation \$1,000; Teachers' Salaries \$450; Repairs \$230; Fuel \$150; Miscellaneous items \$146.09. Major decreases in the budget are Debt and Interest \$606; Expenses

of Instruction \$77.

The tuition increase is reflected in the larger number of pupils attending high school and the increased cost of tuition. It is estimated that we will have approximately 53 attending Appleton Academy at a tuition cost of \$305 per pupil (this year it is \$280 per pupil) and four attending Peterborough High School at a tuition cost of \$325 per pupil. (This year it is \$315 per pupil).

CONCLUSION

I wish to express my appreciation to the Greenville School Board and the citizens of Greenville for the fine cooperation extended to me the past year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

I made fourteen visits to the Greenville Public School during the school year to examine the children and perform the functions of a School Nurse. The general health of the children was good but there were still a few persistent cases of pediculosis that required care. In the last semester chicken pox was present in the first grade and there were also two cases of scarlet fever during the year.

I assisted Dr. Harlan Karr when he examined the children and kept records for each child. Reports were sent to the par-

ents when a physical defect was found.

The vision of the children in the five grades was screened by means of the Snellon Chart and two children were found with defective vision. Two other children had glasses but still showed

loss of vision.

In conjunction with my duties as School Nurse I attended the workshop on vision conducted by the National Association for the Blind, and under the supervision of the N. H. Public Welfare Department, at Keene. There was also a workshop held by the N. H. Department of Education on School Health, and a special lecture and program was held at the School Nurse-Teachers' Meeting in Concord in April in which I participated.

I assisted in arranging for the participation of the children in

the first and second grades in the polio vaccine program sponsored by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis in May. This necessitated extra visits and the procurement of parental requests and transportation to Milford for the actual shots. The Greenville Parents Club ably assisted in this work.

It has been a busy year and there was great satisfaction when I weighed the children in June to find so many had gained both

in weight and height.

Defects found by Dr. Karr when he made his examination were:

Wax in ear 2
Defective teeth 21
Overweight 4
Enlarged tonsils 9

I made twelve visits to the Sacred Heart School during the year. The health of the children was generally good but there were cases of chicken pox, measles and a few persistent cases of pediculosis which were cleared by the end of the year.

Dr. H. E. Karr examined the children during the fall and I assisted him and kept a health record for each child. Notices

were sent home to the parents of the defects found.

Wax in ears 5
Ear infection 1
Defective teeth 47
Enlarged tonsils 5
Enlarged: Thyroid gland 1
Cervical gland 1
Heart Murmur 1
Overweight 3

I weighed and measured the children and most showed a satisfactory gain. By means of the Snellon Chart I tested the vision of the children and found five who showed a vision loss,

two of whom had glasses.

In March I did group hearing testing with the use of the group audiometer and if a child showed a hearing loss then re-tested with the single audiometer for rechecking. The group audiometer is not too effective among those in the first three grades because of the nature of the test. The single audiometer is much more desirable.

Much work and time was used in arranging to participate in the Salk Polio Vaccine Program. I assisted in making arrangements for the parental permission and the transportation of the children to Milford for the actual inoculation on May 25, 1955. I assisted at the clinic and the next day made post-clinic visits to ascertain if there were any reactions. There were none. Twenty-seven children received the shots.
