To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under the Laws of 1933, Chapter 99.
- 4. To see if the town will apply for State Aid on Kensington road, and raise and appropriate One Thousand and Thirty-eight dollars (\$1038.00) for same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to apply tarvia to the roads treated last year, and apply tarvia to other roads in condition to receive it, and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to close the clam flats to the digging of clams for the period of one year.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to lay a new floor in the town hall and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before July 1, 1934.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

We submit the following report for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1934, and list a few causes of the over-drafts.

The special election in June 1933 on the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment for which there was no appropriation was the cause of the overdraft in election expenses.

A law suit being entered against the town by John E. Knowles, and retaining counsel for same was the cause of the overdraft on town officers' expenses.

The overdraft on snow appropriation was caused by the late snow storm in April 1933, and also by repairs on the tractor which were necessary after seven years in use.

The overdraft on town officers' salaries was caused in part by Re-employment and Welfare work for which many trips to Portsmouth had to be made.

Coffin's Mill Bridge has been made safe by building a cement curb on each side, and a new rail on each side with posts that are not over eight feet apart, and a three by eight bottom rail, and a two by six top rail.

With the special appropriation for tarvia we treated a little more than four thousand feet of road. We feel that this money was well spent, and would recommend an appropriation of \$1,000.00 this year that the work already done can be given another coat and some new work done.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS' REPORT

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

I, herewith, submit to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

During the early Autumn of the current year teachers' meetings were held in all towns of the Union to formulate a plan of survey and procedure which would continue for a number of years. By this plan one subject will be surveyed each year to determine our strengths, in order that we may not lose ground, and also to determine those points where gains should be made. As a result of these meetings the work of the school was laid out in five different fields, each field assigned to a definite year for special investigation and endeavor. By vote of all teachers the special field this year is English. To ascertain our present position several tests were given in all schools. By using the results thus obtained we are enabled at once to enter a definite line of advancement. We believe, as a result of this procedure, both the path which we should follow and the ends to be reached will be made more definite.

The statistical report following shows the data on school attendance. The percentage is 93.89. This is the lowest attendance record since 1929. The prevailing illness of last January was in great part responsible for this. We are attempting this year to improve the record here shown.

The pupil enrollment has steadily increased in Hampton Falls as is shown by the enclosed schedule. In

spite of this enlarged enrollment the schools have operated on a reduced budget, made possible by the strict economy of the school board and by school money saved during preceding years. As one means of reducing the budget the services of a music supervisor were dispensed with. This may be doubtful economy. I believe a supervisor does a real service to our pupils.

Our school building is now a comfortable and a pleasant place in which to work. The installing of double windows on the cold side has added materially to the ease of heating the building.

THE SCHOOLS AND THE DEPRESSION

During times of business depression an increasing burden is placed upon the schools, not only to see that the school dollar is economically spent but that the welfare of the children is carefully guarded. The national emergency relief has helped the schools in this latter obligation. Every child in attendance at Hampton Falls schools who is underweight, to any appreciable extent, has been furnished one-half pint of milk daily since the first of November. It is expected that this distribution will continue through the present school year. Seventeen children in Hampton Falls have received this service. As a result we find these children, practically without exception, gaining in weight and in vitality.

An extention of this service is the distribution of Cod Liver Oil to pupils in need of it. Funds are now allotted from the Federal Relief Administration for the furnishing of free school lunches to the pupils whose parents are out of work and therefore cannot really afford suitable lunches for their children. The number of such children is fortunately small in Hampton Falls.

These new activities have placed an added responsibility upon the work of the school nurse. The deciding factor in all cases is the physical welfare of the child. The nurses have willingly given extra time and acquired increased expense to see that all children secure the benefits to which they are entitled.

I wish to express to you my appreciation of kindly advice and help received from you as a board. My contacts with pupils, teachers and citizens have been uniformly pleasant.
