TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March 1932, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the Selectmen, Auditors and other town officers.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose two members of the Board of Library Trustees one for three years, and one for one year.
- Article 5. To choose five members of the Budget Committee for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for the support of the poor, for maintenance of the fire department, for lighting the streets and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100.00) for state aid maintenance, and eleven hundred (\$1,100.00) dollars for trunk line maintenance.
- Article 9. To see if the town will apply for state aid construction or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) for calcium chloride for Plain Road and Chesterfield Road.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to oil Snow Ave., and the road leading from River street to Prospect street.
- Article 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to a water system for fire purposes on the Graney Brook, so-called, and to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for same, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200,00) to put in about 1,550 feet of fire pipe and hydrants from Edgar Burroughs on High street up the hill over Highland Ave. to George Paquin place, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) to repair driveways and entrances to Pine Grove Cemetery, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to widen and improve the highway leading from Northfield Road to Winchester town line near the George Barber farm, and raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for same.

A comparison with the record opened five years ago shows the enrollment of the upper four classes to be approximately one hundred per cent greater, as fifty-four pupils were enrolled in September of the year 1926, of which forty-seven were still members in June of 1927. The significant part of this comparison is that the same number of teachers is today serving twice the number of pupils which were served five years ago. This means a great reduction in per pupil cost to the town of Hinsdale.

It is interesting to note that the present senior class of 1932 contains twenty-eight of its original thirty-two members as freshmen.

It is gratifying to see that the scholastic achievement of our graduates in institutions of higher education has held again first place in the state of New Hampshire, compared with other schools of the same size within the state.

The efficiency of our school nurse and doctor has made possible a very good record in attendance.

Within the school the changing of so few of our teachers has been of very material assistance to the efficiency of the school. Our increased enrollment has multiplied the difficulties of the pupils during study periods as, with a full main room, with a class being held therein it is very difficult for the individual to concentrate. We certainly do need a study room.

Through the efficiency of our manual training department, many repairs and improvements have been made about the building.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Board of Education, the Superintendent, the faculty, the parents, and the pupils themselves, for the cooperation and assistance given this past year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hinsdale:

I have the honor to submit, herewith, my seventh annual report.

Buildings and Grounds. During the summer, the usual minor repairs, consisting of painting and cleaning, were made in all of the buildings. At the high school an additional door was cut from the main room into the Domestic Arts room, which greatly facilitates the passing of classes and relieves somewhat the traffic jams. A chemistry hood was built in the laboratory which greatly reduces the unpleasant odors from gases and chemicals. New movable seats were placed in the sixth grade room and twenty-eight new seats placed for the use of high school students.

At the Monument School, the old unsanitary privies were torn out and new and properly located chemical toilets were installed. Probably the same thing ought to be done at the Plains School in the near future.

The two central buildings will need painting soon. The . Bridge Street building is in the worst condition and should be painted as soon as the District feels able to provide the money.

Teachers and Pupils. Relatively few changes were necessary this year in the staff. At the High School, Miss Helen Hawley who had served us so efficiently for two years as head of the Commercial Department resigned to accept a position in her home city. The Board elected Miss Katherine Flynn of Worcester, Massachusetts, a graduate of Salem Normal, 1931, to fill the vacaney. Miss Aldythe Taylor of Westminster, Vermont, a graduate of Plymouth Normal, 1931, was elected to succeed Miss Piper at the Plains School. Miss Ruth Martin,

Supervisor of Art, resigned to accept a position in Claremont and Miss Stella Tosi of Rutland, Vermont, a graduate of Keene Normal, 1930, in the three-year Art Supervisory course, was elected Art Supervisor.

It is interesting to note the great increase in high school enrollment in the past few years. The table below gives the figures:

1925-26	48

This shows an increase for the period of 125%.

It is gratifying also to note the high standing of our high school among the high schools of the state. The 1930-31 Secondary School Report (page 22) prepared by the State Board of Education shows that for a period of five years Hinsdale High Schools had led the last of thirty-three high schools in its class. This, of course, means that the elementary schools are of the same high standard for the elementary schools furnish the foundation upon which the high school builds.

The cost of education in Hinsdale compared with the other school districts in the state is also significant. In 1930-31 the median per pupil cost for elementary instruction in 240 school districts was \$83.67. This means that 120 school districts spent more than \$83.67 and 120 spent less. For the same year the per pupil cost in Hinsdale was \$61.85, \$21.82 less than the median for the state. The average cost of high school instrution in the state in 1930-31 was \$98.93. In Hinsdale the per pupil cost was \$79.30 or \$19.63 less than the average.

In this connection, I desire to keep before the citizens the great need for a vocational course for boys in our High School. The need is still very urgent and should be considered very earefully as soon as the economic erisis is over.

Again I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, to the teachers and pupils, and to the parents and patrons of the schools for their loyalty and co-operation, and trust that the same cordiality and harmony may continue throughout this critical period which confronts us. LET'S KEEP OUR CHILDREN FIRST.
