TOWN WARRANT

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hooksett in the Ccunty of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hooksett on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon; action upon the following subjects will be at eleven of the clock in the forenoon; polls will close at 6:30 P. M.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of two per cent (2%) on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of July; and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get tax rate from State Tax Commission as of July first.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds, not before accepted.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of 1948 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.
- 6. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Agents, Auditors and Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Budget Committee.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget in whole or in part.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty (\$150.00) dollars to be used by the Merrill-Follansbee Post No. 37, American Legion of Hooksett, for Memorial Day and Armistice Day ceremonies, as petitioned for by Walter Murray and twelve (12) others.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars for the purpose of purchasing a bronze plaque for honoring the men and women who served as occupation troops in the Europe and Pacific Area, during the period of Sept. 2, 1945 and the duration of Selective Service Draft, as of March 31, 1947, as recommended and approved by the General Committee of World War II Memorial, and to be under their supervision, as petitioned for by Walter L. Murray and twelve (12) others.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred (\$400.00) dollars to provide for white pine blister rust control, in cooperation with the Forestry Department.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred (\$400.00) dollars to replace the portable fire pump and other much needed equipment for Fire Department No. 1, as petitioned for by Gerard Lambert and fifty-two (52) others.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the pay of the Police Department to the level of the Fire Department, or seventy-five cents (75c) per hour, as petitioned for by Lindsay H. Rice and the Selectmen.
- 15. Elections, Town and Ward. The Act authorizing the election of delegates to the Constitutional Convention provides that an article therefor shall be inserted in the warrant for the town or special meeting. The primary for the election of delegates to the

national conventions is to be held on the same day, notice of which is given by the town or ward clerk. The hours during which the polls must be kept open are controlled by R. L., Chap. 34, Sects. 36 and 36-A as amended. In towns of less than 700 inhabitants the polls must be open not less than five consecutive hours and in all other towns, the polls must be open not later than ten o'clock in the forenoon and close not earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon. In cities the polls must be open not less than four hours and may be opened not earlier than six o'clock in the forenoon nor later than eight o'clock in the afternoon, as the city council may determine. In view of these provisions the polls for the presidential primary and for the election of delegates might advantageously be opened and closed at the same hour.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred thirty-seven dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$537.38), the State to furnish two thousand one hundred forty-nine dollars and fifty-one cents (\$2,149.51), the same to be expended under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road Assistance, or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand five hundred (\$12,500.00) dollars for the purchase of a motor grader fully equipped. The cost to be amortized over a five (5) year period, as petitioned for by Roger Lafond and fifteen (15) others.
- 18. To see if the Town will pay five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for a right of way extending from Alice Avenue and running north for about three hundred (300) yards, as petitioned for by Leroy B. Avery.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred (\$700.00) dollars to install sandtraps in the sewer system on Main Street in Hooksett Village, as petitioned for by the Selectmen.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept, and raise and appropriate sufficient money to maintain the "Quimby Road" so called, in passable condition, as petitioned for by Adelard Gilbert and ten (10) others.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain a road extending in a southerly direction from Martin's Ferry Road to the property of J. Allen Larrow, as petitioned for by J. Allen Larrow and two (2) others.
- 22. To see if the Town will accept and maintain a tract of land forty (40) feet wide and approximately three hundred (300) feet long, to be used as a road extending from Hale Avenue running north towards Alice Avenue, said land to be donated by E. Lebonville as petitioned for by Ernest Lebonville and the Selectmen.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain a road leading to the residence of Arthur Balatsas, from the Goffstown Road as petitioned for by Roger Lafond and fifteen (15) others.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen hundred (\$1400.00) dollars to widen and surface treat with asphalt the Goffstown Road from the junction of Manchester Road to the residence of Roger Lafond, a distance of twenty-seven hundred (2700) feet, as petitioned for by Effie L. Poor and twenty-six (26) others.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars being the amount estimated by the Road Agent as necessary, to complete the grade and cover with permanent asphalt tar, the road known as Leonard Avenue, as petitioned for by J. Emile Houle and ten (10) others.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred (\$300.00) dollars to remove the so-called "Hazard Spot" on Hackett Hill, sometime this summer; to avoid some serious collision at this particular location as petitioned for by Rene H. Dufort and fourteen (14) others.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars to purchase a power lawn mower as petitioned for by Fayette C. Blair and eleven (11) others. This is to be put with the unexpended one hundred (\$100.00) dollars appropriated last year.

- 28. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the plowing of private driveways and the amount to be charged for said private driveways.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one hundred seventy-five (\$175.00) dollars for the purchase of an adding machine for use of the Town Treasurer, as petitioned for by the Selectmen.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for necessary work to be done at Martin's Cemetery, such as cutting roads through unsold lots, repairing present roads, repairing fences, clearing unsold lots, and any other necessary work that may be done under the above appropriation, as petitioned for by William S. Smith and seventeen (17) others.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest

of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available

man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both

damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them, Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hooksett:

In accordance with the rules of the School Board and the laws of the State of New Hampshire, I am pleased to submit my first annual report as superintendent of schools for the Town of Hooksett.

Since my election, my time has been spent chiefly in studying the problems of the entire union, watching the schools in action, becoming acquainted with all teachers, attending meetings of the school board, both regular and special, checking equipment, books, and supplies, trying to discover the strong and weak points of the system so that a thorough understanding of the needs of the youth of all districts may be emphasized, and gathering data which will be necessary for future reference.

It is, then, fairly obvious that any recommendations made at this time would be somewhat hurried and more or less superficial. Therefore, during the coming year recommendations will be made after careful consideration and study of the available material and the educational welfare of the children of the town.

Appreciation to the School Board

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board as a whole and individually for the confidence shown in me since July, 1947 and the patience and courteous consideration of my suggestions during that period of time. I shall try to merit your continued confidence and shall perform my duties as educational advisor on school problems as well as executive officer to the best of my ability.

Appreciations

The Commissioner of Education, Dr. Edgar Fuller, and his staff, for the encouragement and help always extended to the superintendents of the state.

The Selectmen of the town for their cooperation with the School Board in its attempt to make the schools of

the town adequate for the youth.

Mr. George H. Harmon for his help in showing me the accepted procedure in connection with the duties of the superintendent of schools and his untiring energy in my behalf to make the advent of a new man in the work of the schools in the district easier and inviting.

Principals, teachers, and janitors for their loyalty to the schools and the citizens of the town in the varied and extended services in meeting all emergencies.

Mr. Lindsey Rice in his untiring efforts to perform his duties to the schools of the town as attendance officer.

Miss Adonia A. Douillette, the School Nurse, for her unselfish work in the interests of the boys and girls under her jurisdiction.

Mrs. Grace L. Burbank for her efforts in listing all

the youngsters of the town as school enumerator.

Accomplishments

Since taking office as head of the Hooksett schools, I have been impressed by the seriousness and desirability of the School Board to develop and complete the projects necessary and within the limits of the budget. The cooperation of its members in all emergencies as well as regular routine matters has been frank, earnest, and constructive.

I am thoroughly convinced that the board as well as the public want the best schools possible. In keeping with this desire I am bringing to your attention the following items as commendable accomplishments:

School Lunches

The continuation of the school lunches has proved advisable and worthwhile and the board has taken steps to enlarge and develop the situation at the Martin's Corner School. It is my opinion that the time is coming when all pupils in the district will be given a hot lunch in the middle of the day at the expense of the taxpayer and under the supervision of trained dieticians. Health is the primary factor in education and well-balanced meals together with proper supervision will undoubtedly increase the learning capacity and interest of the child. The board is to be commended for its stand in this important phase of education.

Repairs and Replacements

The board has made considerable repairs to the buildings at the Lincoln Park School and Martin's. A new heating unit is in the process of being installed at the Lincoln Park School and the foundation at the school at Martin's. All schools have been pianted and minor repairs have been made at the Village School. Through the generosity of the citizens of the town, the increased amount received from state aid has made it possible to make the improvements which should have been made during the war years.

Playgrounds

Probably one of the greatest improvements during the summer and fall was the leveling off of the playgrounds in all the schools. This credit should be given to the constructive efforts of the members of the board who in turn have spent considerable time and effort to make the physical surroundings of the schools attractive and pleasant for both children and teachers.

Tests and Testing

The item of testing is an important link in the development of modern youth and although much time

and energy must be spent to administer the program, the results have proved very desirable. It has been the custom in the past to test the boys and girls at the close of the school year to determine in part whether or not the youngster should be promoted to the next grade or graduated. This year the tests were administered in the fall. After correcting and tabulating, teachers were able to concentrate upon the weaknesses of their pupils and have the remainder of the school year to work out individual problems. This innovation is a challenge to the good teacher and a decided aid to the educational growth of the pupil. The cooperation of the teachers was excellent even though it meant extra work in the correction of the tests.

Marking System and Report Cards

Evaluation of the work in the school for the boys and girls is a subjective matter at best and considerable time is spent each marking period in order that a fair and accurate report may be made to the parents in terms of classroom activities. Since the colleges and the State Department require periodic reports of the progress of the child on a percentage basis, New Hampshire must continue to conform. However, it has always been the intention of the administration under present conditions to make such a report as brief as possible yet to inform the parent of the child's progress in the simplest denominations. It is my opinion that the new system has met with widespread approval in the town.

Standardization of Permanent Records

The records of the schools have been standardized to meet progress of the schools of the state and nation. Pictures have been taken of every child and placed in his record. It has been an administrative procedure and the results should prove worthwhile to future administrators, teachers, parents, and children.

Teachers

A new teacher was added to the staff at the Lincoln Park school to relieve the pressure placed upon the teaching time given to individual pupils. Mrs. Celestia M. Gray was elected in Grades 3, 4, and 5. This move has proved a decided asset to the entire school since relief as well as the personality of the teacher has done much to raise the standard of the school and improve its morale.

A part-time teacher in the person of Mrs. Ruth Gorrell was elected to aid Mrs. O'Brien in Grades 1-4 at the Martin's Corner School. Mrs. Gorrell and Mrs. O'Brien have worked out the situation whereby more individual attention is given to the youngsters in the form of drill. It has proved worthwhile and necessary.

Textbooks, Supplies, and Equipment

Many textbooks and equipment have been brought up to date. Supplementary readers, arithmetics, geographies, and many other items of equipment and supplies including modern maps, ditto machines, and textbooks, have been purchased.

Recommendations

In view of the fact that the School Board has been very active in the matter of school improvements to the buildings and grounds together with the replacement of needed supplies and equipment, it would seem logical to withhold recommendations at this time until present plans have been completed.

However, there are one or two items that seem to me to be necessary, emphasized, and pointed out for

your consideration.

Supplies, Equipment, and Textbooks

Your immediate and urgent attention is called to the fact that these items have been advanced in price from 10 to 40 percent since October, 1946 and the supply houses have informed all superintendents that a further increase can be expected by March first. The cost of education especially in these items has increased along with the cost of living and some provision must be taken to meet this critical situation in the 1948-49 budget.

Teachers

Hooksett is fortunate in retaining the services of its teachers and with one or two exceptions, the teaching procedure is of high caliber and the Board should be commended for the efficiency of purpose and educa-

tional interest of the staff.

However, regardless of the efficiency of any instructor and the commendable procedures used in the classroom, the final analysis comes in the fact that the citizens of the town and the School Board appreciate it through increased salaries. Graduates from the colleges of the state and nation are placing the minimum at \$2,000. Favorable reaction developed from the fact that the Hooksett Board gave its teachers a bonus even before the ruling of the State Board of Education which established a minimum salary for the past year. I have brought this matter to your attention for serious study and consideration before the school meeting in March.

School Lunches

Many youngsters avail themselves of the hot lunches served in connection with the school. Many go home to lunch. The time is coming when each child in the school will be allowed to receive a hot lunch at the taxpayer's expense. This means that the lunch program will come entirely under the supervision of the school as a part of the educational growth of the child including the meal, the manner in which the meal is served, and the behavior during the time taken to eat. The purpose in calling this matter to your attention is to inform you that even at the present time there are some schools which have already arranged to raise and appropriate a moderate sum for this phase of education. At least it merits your consideration.

Health Supervision

Since this is the proper time to place before the board certain recommendations, it seems to me that a few words should be spoken in behalf of the School Nurse. Your nurse, Miss Adonia A. Douillette, receives \$2,400.00 from five districts distributed as follows: Allenstown, \$553.46; Bow, \$301.89; Epsom, \$188.68;

Hooksett, \$528.30; and Pembroke, \$827.67. Her salary is based on the number of pupils in each district for the previous year. This means that her salary includes her traveling expenses from her home in Suncook to the various schools in the above districts. It is my opinion that the time has come to realize the great part the school nurse plays in the school system and the personal interest she takes in each and every child.

High School and Academy Tuition

Just a word concerning tuitions. Since the state average was increased from \$123.79 to \$138.89 during the past year, the item of tuitions has become one of the major parts of the budget requiring better than 30 percent of the total support of the schools. Without doubt this rate will be increased for another year. Therefore, provision is strongly urged in considering the budget for 1948-49.

Again, may I thank the members of the School Board for the assistance and advice so generously given in behalf of the schools and personnel including the children, teachers, and superintendent.
