"Joe" had served the Town of Hudson faithfully and well as its' Road Agent for the past fifteen years and many of our fine highways are a memorial to his memory.

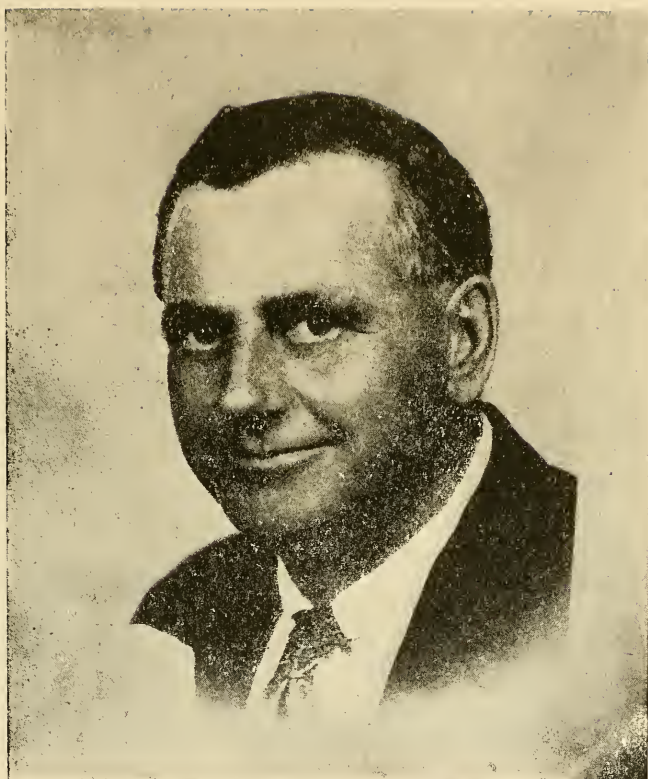
He was also a valued member of the Hudson Fire Department since 1907, serving as Assistant Chief and State Fire Warden for the past several years.

Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hudson in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School in said Hudson on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing for which purpose the polls will be open from 10 A. M. until 6 P. M. unless a later closing hour is voted by the Town.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept numerous bequests as Trust Funds, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the various cemetery lots.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pledge the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Hayward Place and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Joseph Marshall and others.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$229.98 (1/100th of one per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1946 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two (2) new 5 ton trucks for the Highway Department and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 annually on serial notes for 4 years and withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund, the amount therein held for that purpose, namely \$5,000.00, upon recommendation of the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of trading in the present Police Cruiser, this practice to be continued yearly as an economy measure in the matter of repairs, tires, etc., upon recommendation of the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of tarring the Barrett's Hill Road, so called from Glover's Corner to the Talbot Farm upon petition of Sylvia H. Flemming and others.

10. To see if the Town will vote to revise its' agreement with the employees of the Highway Department, whereby said employees shall receive the present rate per hour, based on a forty-eight hour week, except that in the future, a work week shall consist of forty hours, and time and one half shall be paid for all hours worked above the basic period, this in lieu of the agreement made at the last town meeting which reads as follows: "Beginning May 1st, said employees shall be granted Saturday as a day off with pay, this to continue in effect until Nov. 1st, when thereafter Saturday afternoon shall constitute a half day off with pay", upon petition of Harry D. Sanders and others.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used toward the eradication of poison ivy on public grounds and road sides upon request of the Hillsborough County Farm Bureau.

12. To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewer from the corner of Leslie Street and Derry Road to a point at the junction of Derry Road and Cummings Street and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Leonard R. Smith and others.

13. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Melendy Road near the residence of Ernest Lavallee and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Harold Holt and others.

14. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of the Supervisors of the Check Lists in the amount of \$25.00

annually and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Mabel Burnham and others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Nottingham Street, near the residence of Frank A. Nutting and Thomas Landry and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Frank A. Nutting and others.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept Clement Street, so called dedicated to public use on a plan of land dated May, 1925 and recorded at the office of the Registry of Deeds.

17. If the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to repair and improve same upon petition of David Light and others.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept Charles Street, so called, dedicated to public use on a plan of land dated May, 1925 and recorded at the office of the Registry of Deeds.

19. If the Town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars, (\$100.00) to repair and improve same upon petition of Charles Lefebvre and others.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sign Federal Works Agency BCF Form 3, "Application for Advance for Plan Preparation for Non-Federal Public Works" requesting Government appropriation to cover engineering services for planning sewerage system, at no expense to the Town of Hudson if not used within four years, upon petition of the Planning Board.

21. To see if the Town will authorize the taking of land, by purchase or by right of Eminent Domain, within three hundred feet of Hudson Bridge (Taylor's Falls Bridge) for the regulation of traffic or other public purpose, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for such purpose upon petition of the Planning Board.

22. To see if the Town will vote to establish the office of "Town Engineer" whose duty will be to establish all grades for

highways, land developments, sewerage, or grades for any project which affects the public interest, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars as a yearly salary for such office which shall be by appointment by the Board of Selectmen, upon petition of the Planning Board.

23. To see if the Town will install three hydrants on Greeley Street and raise and appropriate money for the same, upon petition of Clayton E. Smith and others.

24. To see if the town will vote to accept Roosevelt Ave., so called from the Lowell Road to the easterly side of D St Extension on Plan of land known as Warrentville, said Plan having been approved by the Planning Board subject to proper grades, Town Zoning Ord. Par. 4, Sec. B said approval being dated Feb. 7, 1947, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the improvement of said Roosevelt Ave., so called, upon petition of Helen J. Warren and others.

25. To see if the town will vote to accept D St. Extension, so called from Roosevelt Ave., so called, southerly to D St., on Plan of Brookside as shown on Plan of Land known as Warrentville, said plan having been approved by the Planning Board subject to proper street grades, Town Zoning Ordinance, Par. 4, Sec. B, said approval being dated Feb. 7, 1947, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the improvement of said D St., Extension, so called, upon petition of Helen J. Warren and others.

26. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same, upon request of the State Tax Commission.

27. To see if the town will vote to install a street light at the corner of Bungalow Ave., so called, and Riverside Avenue and raise and appropriate money for the same upon petition of Stacia Galecki and others.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Hudson which was made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission in accordance with the vote of the town. This audit covered the period from August 20th, 1945 to August 3rd, 1946.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

**Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1944—
December 31, 1945:**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1944 and December 31, 1945, as indicated therein the Net Surplus decreased by \$5, 848.86 during the year.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—

Estimated and Actual Revenues:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, as indicated by the budget summary a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$706.14, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,087.72, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,793.86.

Reconciliation of Change in Surplus:

A decrease in Surplus of \$5,858.86 took place during the year. This change in financial condition was brought about as follows:

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by

source, insofar as possible, and totals of receipts and expenditures verified.

TAX ACCOUNTS

The tax warrants of Collector Baker for the levies of 1945, 1944, 1943 and 1942, were audited.

Examination was also made of the tax sale accounts. Summary statements showing the activity in the tax sale accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, and the period from January 1 to August 3, 1946.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts of Town Clerk John E. Baker were examined and audited. All funds received by the Town Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer or cash on hand.

TRUST FUNDS

Securities representing the invested principal and bank books representing the principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined.

SURETY BONDS

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be satisfactory as to form and amount. A list of officials required by law to furnish surety bonds, the surety companies and amounts of bonds for the current year.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials which were examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential

features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits and Schedules is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Hudson for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Planning Board

Report of the Hudson Planning Board

Your Planing Board submits the following as its' annual report for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946.

Beginning in March of 1946, the Planning Board organized for the year and began a study of the many and various problems of the town and accordingly set up various committees to make reports to the Board at various times on their findings.

Of the several projects now under study, the one outstanding for its far reaching benefits and value to the town, is that of a survey and engineered plan for the future construction of a sanitary sewer for the town. The Federal Government at present have set aside funds which may be obtained by municipalities for certain specific purposes, these funds are given to cover the cost of engineering sewers which the Federal Government approves upon proper application and one which no repayments are to be made if construction on such projects does not begin within a period of four years. This is to encourage delayed construction projects which will be undertaken at a time if and when unemployment becomes a major problem.

During the year consultations were had and a preliminary survey made of the town to obtain an estimate of the size of the problem and the extent to which such a problem could go. A full explanation of all of the phases of the undertaking were fully discussed and the responsibilities of the town carefully considered. The town in the not too far distant future will need a new sanitary sewerage system which will be independent of the surface drainage and fall in line with the antipollution plans which are fast developing in the State and Nation. The present sewerage system would be left intact and used for surface drainage only, thus eliminating the many disagreeable situations which are now experienced with the combination system.

There is an article in the town warrant asking that the voters of the town authorize the Selectmen to sign the appli-

cation applying for the money to cover such a project. It is felt by the Planning Board that this should pass because of what it means to the town.

Several plans of land subdivision developments have been acted upon by the board, together with other problems of the day which have a heavy bearing on the future welfare of the taxpayers of the community.

One other article included in the town warrant sponsored by the Planning Board calls for the future purchase of properties located near the Taylor Falls Bridge. An explanation for this in brief is to work toward a more sightly entrance to the town as well as to relieve a traffic problem which is so apparent to motorists travelling to or from the bridge. This also warrants your cooperation.

In order to clarify certain duties of the Planning Board with respect to the approval of newly planned developments as well as to work toward a future plan for the town as a whole it is the opinion of the board that an office of "Town Engineer" be established, said office to be by appointment by the Selectmen. The qualifications of the applicant should be that he be a professional civil engineer. This would require that road grades could be established and records kept in order that new streets before their acceptance by the town should be in line and no large expenditures needed for their completion after acceptance. This would not be full time work and therefore would not require a large salary to begin with. May we have full consideration on this article as it appears in the town warrant.

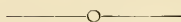

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hudson qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Junior High School in said district on the 11th day of March 1947, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-seven hundred dollars (\$2700) as a deficiency appropriation for the school year 1946-47 in order to cover a raise in the teachers' salaries.
10. To see what action the district will take in regard to continuing to improve the grounds around the Junior High School building and raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for same.

11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred and forty-five dollars (\$1545) to insulate the Hudson Center School and to complete the insulation of the Webster School, if and when the legislature enacts the "State Aid in Education" bill.

12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand seven hundred and one dollars (\$2701) for the purpose of installing an acoustical ceiling in the auditorium at the Junior High School, if and when the legislature enacts the "State Aid in Education" bill.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the Junior High School Principal

Hudson, New Hampshire

February 1, 1947

To the Superintendent, School Board, and Citizens of Hudson,
N. H.:

I submit herewith, a report of the activities and accomplishments at the Hudson Junior High School, as well as some pertinent suggestions for future consideration.

A most challenging requirement of modern educational policy is the one that insists upon the affording of such instruction to our youth as will meet the needs of each individual. The school staff and principal can best render this service only when they have been conversant with the child, the parents and those vitally interested in the child. We of the Junior High school staff cordially invite you to visit us and see what we are attempting to do. Come to your school and become better acquainted with us. We wish to help by having a better understanding of our mutual home-school problems. Those who have visited us thus far this year have been of great assistance to the school in this respect.

In accordance with the present trend, we have discontinued the Opportunity Room this year, having placed all pupils who would have been enrolled there into regular classes. This change has enabled us to inaugurate a remedial program, particularly in the fundamentals, for all pupils who, from time to time, show a need for this kind of individual help. These classes are in addition to the program pursued regularly.

Our moving picture projector is a valuable asset in the realization of worthwhile Guidance Programs. Educational films are shown weekly to the student body, and the projector has been used frequently to supplement study in the Home Economics and Science departments.

Several changes have been made on our teaching staff this year. Mr. Charles Stephens, a graduate from Fitchburg Teachers' College succeeds Mr. Bertrand Tardif as teacher of

Manual Arts. Mrs. Dorothy Robinson, a teacher with a number of years of experience, and a graduate of Keene Teachers' College, replaces Miss Anna O'Connor. Mrs. Robinson is teaching Social Studies. Mrs. Dorothy Linton, a graduate from New Hampshire University Graduate School of Education, has charge of the department of Home Economics. Mrs. Linton has had nine years of previous experience in high school teaching. Mr. Wilfred Michaud, a graduate from Providence College makes provision for a much needed additional teacher on our staff. Mr. Michaud is teaching English and Social Studies, and is director of Physical Education.

Mrs. Mary Hunnewell and Mrs. Laura Miller are affording us able service as Supervisors of the hot lunch program. Limited facilities for preparing and serving meals have made it necessary for us to limit the number of pupils that may remain and enjoy this service.

The health of our boys and girls is of primary concern to all of us. I refer you to the report of Mrs. Helen House, our School Nurse, for further particulars concerning her active service.

There has been much evidence of interest this year in competitive sports, both interscholastic and intramural. We are fortunate in having such a fine gymnasium as a center for athletic activity. A new ceiling in the gymnasium, however, should in a short time pay for itself. Much heat is lost during the winter months that could otherwise be retained through this method of partial insulation. Such a ceiling would also improve the acoustics in this part of the building.

The average attendance for the first semester in the Junior High School is 95.19%. There are a few pupils who could help better our attendance record if they would only try. Such an endeavor on the part of these people would also enable our teachers to do even more effective work in the teaching of all our boys and girls. Make-up work, at its very best, is a highly unsatisfactory substitute for what should have been accomplished in regular classes. Pupils who remain away from school needlessly not only harm themselves, but also retard the general progress of their respective classes.

As principal of the Junior High School, I wish to close this report by expressing to the local citizens, Junior High School teachers and school officials, my appreciation for the splendid cooperation you have given me during this, my first year with you.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Hudson, New Hampshire
February 18, 1947

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Hudson:

I submit to you my first report as superintendent of your schools.

Increases in school population appear to be the trend. We have become aware of that fact. The rooms at the Webster School are fuller than they should be. An additional teacher will be needed for another year. Each of the grades at the Junior High School are in two divisions.

We have been very fortunate to have trained teachers so situated that they could stay with us in spite of the economic stress of the times. Many have such an overload of pupils as is certain to dull their enthusiasm and make their work less effective. The acceptance of responsibility for the training of children for useful and happy living is an outstandingly important service. The compensation for such service cannot continue to be so inadequate if we expect to retain the services of able teachers.

Our school lunch program has been successful within the limits of our capacity to meet the demand. Our limited space for cooking and serving makes it necessary to consider only those who live too far from school to conveniently go home for lunch.

A look at future needs indicates that we should begin to seriously consider a new elementary building. Facilities which are being thought of as necessary do not now exist. We do not now have an assembly room. There is no play area for bad weather use. We are severely limited for space to carry on the lunch program. Our class groups are larger than they should be for most favorable results.

I am grateful for the opportunity to work with a School Board which is ever anxious for the welfare of the children. I wish to thank the teachers for their most willing cooperation. To all who have contributed to the general welfare of the schools, thank you.

Materials and supplies continue to be scarce and the prices of those which are available are still very high, thus helping to keep up the high cost of operating your schools. We have tried to do only what was actually necessary in the way of repairs during these days of shortages and high prices, even though there are many things which could be done to improve the school buildings.

We would like to insulate the Hudson Center School and complete the insulation of the Webster School. The installation of an acoustical ceiling in the Auditorium of the Junior High School would fill a long felt need. This would improve both the acoustics and the heating of the Auditorium. We hope it will be possible to have an appropriation for both of these projects.

The re-roofing of both the Hudson Center School and the annex of the Webster School has been completed. We have not yet succeeded in obtaining any new radiators for the Webster School, but hope they will be available before the end of the present school year.

The School Board has suffered a great loss in the passing of our Highway Agent, Joseph A. Fuller. Practically all of the filling and grading at the Junior High School was done under his supervision. He took a great pride in trying to improve the surroundings of this building and was always willing, no matter how busy he was elsewhere, to take time to advise and cooperate with us to accomplish as much as possible with the modest sum appropriated each year for this purpose. He had also done other work for us at the Hudson Center and Webster Schools. We shall miss him.

In March of 1946 the Toxoid Clinic was completed, thus giving immunization against diphtheria to the great majority of the pupils in the lower grades.

Through the cooperation of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, and permission of parents, the Tuberculine Patch Test was given to pupils from first through the seventh grades. All pupils reacting to the test were X-rayed and examined either by their family physician, or Dr. Robert Kerr, T. B. specialist.

An audiometer test was given to pupils from the second grade through the ninth.

The general health of the children has been exceptionally good throughout the year, having few communicable diseases.

The splendid cooperation shown by parents and teachers is a factor in promoting the health program, and is sincerely
