TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jaffrey, in the County of Cheshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall, on School St. in East Jaffrey Village, in said Town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, (polls to remain open until six o'clock in the afternoon) to act on the following subjects:

1. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates and Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican Parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

2. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years and all other necessary Town Officers.

3. To hear all reports, except that of the Budget Committee, and act thereon.

4. To hear the reports of the Budget Committee, and to raise such sums of money as may be required for the support of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, fire department, Memorial Day, street lights, and all other Town Charges.

5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,680.00 for improvement of trunk line and State Aid roads in the compact area of the Town, providing the State will raise a like amount.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$955.90 for Town Road Aid upon condition that the State will contribute the sum of \$6,372.64.

8. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Treasurer of the Trustees of Trust Funds to \$200.00 per year or act in any way relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer from its unencumbered surplus, any sum of money to the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to be used in co-operation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$487.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, the sum of \$200.00, this amount being the Town's proportionate share of said Hospital's deficit for the year 1951.

13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to construct a sewer on Squantum Rd., beginning at the end of the present sewer and extending toward Squantum a distance of approximately 1,000 ft. to also extend about 100 ft. in opposite direction to include property of Joseph Charlonne, as proposed by Morton Robare and others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the motion adopted at adjourned Town meeting of May 17th, 1949, to accept Article 8 sewer assessments, and adopt in its place the following:

A. That the cost of sewer, including the installation thereof and including the cost and installation of the tank if any shall be paid by the Town until such a time that the Sewer System becomes self supporting.

B. That sewer fees shall be:

Entrance fees, \$25.00 for dwelling houses, other buildings rated by Selectmen.

Rental charge per annum:

One family	\$5 00
Two family	9 00
Three apartment	12 00
Four apartment	15 00
Over four apartments \$2.00	2 00
Garage and gas station	10 00
Restaurants	10 00
Hotels per room each	1 50
Rooming houses over 7 rooms each	1 50

Factories, stores and office buildings adjustments made by Selectmen.

C. The funds received from the collections of sewer rentals shall be kept as a separate and distinct fund and shall be known as the Sewer Fund, any surplus in such Fund may be used for enlargement or replacement of the sewerage system and for the extension of sewerage systems to serve unsewered areas, but shall not be used for any purpose other than those stated above.

D. Allowance shall be made for those who have in the past paid sewer construction assessments, such allowances shall be in the form of credit applied to their future sewer rents.

E. The Highway Agent shall have charge of sewer construction and maintenance under the direction of the Selectmen.

As petitioned for by Merton Robare and others.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 to construct a sewer on Main St. beginning at the end of the present sewer near the residence of Merrill G. Symonds and extending westerly a distance of about 1,300 ft. to a point about opposite the residence of Philip F. Gross or take any action relating thereto.

17. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws, relating to games of Beano be accepted in this town.

McInnes, Lewis S. Record, Jr.; Budget Committee, three years, Carl C. Spofford. It was voted that all remaining town officers be appointed by the Selectmen.

Art. 4. Borrowing Money. It was voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 5. Highland Avenue Lights. It was voted to instruct the Selectmen to install two new street lights on Highland Avenue, and to appropriate \$47.00 to pay for electric service for the same.

Art. 6. Town Road Aid. It was voted that the sum of \$956.04 already raised and appropriated under Article 2 be used for Town Road Aid on condition that the State allot \$6,373.63 for Class V highways.

Art. 7. Monadnock Region Association. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$454.00 to the Monadnock Region Association.

Art. 8. Humiston Park Addition. It was voted to accept a tract adjoining Humiston Park as an addition thereto.

Art. 9. Humiston Park Fence. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for a fence to divide the ball park area from the playground area.

Art. 10. Town Hall Capital Reserve. A motion to transfer \$5,000.00 from unencumbered surplus to Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund was lost.

Art. 11. Purchase of Snow-Loader. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$4,100.00 for the purchase of a snow-loader.

Art. 12. Flag Pole. It was voted to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the purchase and erection of a flag pole on the Common at East Jaffrey.

Art. 13. It was voted to accept \$350.00 from F. Alexander Magoun and Theodore R. Magoun, to be kept in trust and the income to be used for the upkeep of the Cutter Cemetery with especial attention to the Magoun Lot.

Art. 14. Tax Title Lands. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of tax title lands.

Art. 15. Elliot Community Hospital. A motion to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene was defeated on account of questionable legality.

Art. 16. Planning Board. A motion to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the use of the Planning Board was lost.

The vote on the question of allowing games of Beano was 342, "Yes"; 148, "No."

The meeting adjourned at 8.15 P. M.

B. Administrative Policy

During the school year 1950-51 the school lunch program continually ran behind financially. One of the chief reasons for this was the tapering off of Federal aid. On January 1, 1951 the reimbursement rate dropped from nine cents to seven cents per meal, and on March 1 it dropped further to five cents a meal. The second reason was the number of lunches served free to those pupils unable to pay. Over and above the budget item of \$500 for the school lunch program and the approximately \$600 to \$700 in such miscellaneous items as gas, napkins, drinking straws, and sanitizing agent, the program ran in the red exactly \$670. In a determined effort to put the program on a self-paying basis for the school year 1951-52 the following steps were taken:

1. A director was elected to have full charge of planning menus, purchasing food, cooking and serving meals, and keeping financial records. This plan concentrated all responsibility in one person. Mrs. Doris Gill was appointed for this position.

2. The policy was established to furnish no free meals. This policy appears to be harsh, but it seems the only thing to do under the circumstances.

As of January 31, 1952 the program has paid its own way since September including ALL charges that can fairly be attributed to it.

Program and Methods

Although the reading system in use in the Jaffrey schools during the past five years is generally recognized as the most successful of any in the country, the publishers carefully revised and improved the 1951 edition of the first-grade material. This new edition is being used this year as the basic system in the first grade, and the old edition is being used as supplementary material.

In order to adapt a local program in the social studies to the new program recommended by the State Office of Education, after several years of co-operative work by the leading social studies teachers in the State, a new series of textbooks is now in use.

For the past few years the transition from the grade school to Con-ant has seemed to be too abrupt for many of the pupils. This year the organization of the school has been adjusted to make this change easier. Instead of having the seventh grade go directly into the full departmental organization with a different teacher for each subject, this year they have two major subjects with one teacher, and the other two major subjects with another teacher, one of these teachers serving as the home-room teacher for one section, and the other teacher for the other section. This plan seems to enable these pupils to adjust themselves better to the change from one school to the other, and to build up stronger, more efficient work habits with less development of feelings of insecurity.

The need of many of the high school students for more effective guidance has been keenly felt for some time. Considerable progress is being made this year in this area. The program is being developed under the guidance and direction of Mr. Herrick to provide accurate information to teachers regarding the potentialities and interests of pupils, and to furnish to those pupils more information regarding the opportunities for further training or employment after leaving school.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

The most important improvement to the school plant during the past year is the replacement of the stokers at the Grade School with oil burners. When the installation has been fully completed, conditions should be much improved from the point of view of the health and comfort of teachers and pupils, and a considerable saving in fuel can be expected.

There has long been recognized the need at the High School for general cleaning and painting of walls and ceilings, refinishing of floors, and replacement of worn-out and stained shades. The budget for next year is planned to take care of these items.

The Clerk cast one ballot for Phyllis Walkonen and she was declared elected and took oath of office in open meeting.

Article 3. George Austermann moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Evelyn H. Ruffle for a member of the School Board for three years. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The Moderator cast one ballot for Evelyn H. Ruffle and she was declared elected and took oath of office in open meeting.

Article 4. Ferdinand Gordon moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Lawrence W. Brown for treasurer for the ensuing year. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The Clerk cast one ballot for Lawrence W. Brown for treasurer for the ensuing year and he was declared elected.

Article 5. Homer J. Forcier moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$210 as salaries of the district officers:

Robert Lewis reported on the building committee stating that in the light of the many uncertainties existing at the present time and the immediate lack of extreme urgency for added space the committee should be continued and held in readiness to take advantage of any opportunities that might arise. George Austermann moved the report be accepted and the committee be continued. Motion seconded and carried.

Robert Lewis offered his resignation as a member and Chairman of the Jaffrey School Building Committee since he felt as a school principal he could render greater service to all committees appointed to study school problems.

Hubert O'Neil made the motion the District accept with regret Mr. Lewis's resignation. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 7. Ferdinand Gordon moved the auditors chosen at Town Meeting as town auditors be school auditors. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 8. Ernest J. Pratt moved the district raise and appropriate \$133,660 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and that the district authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the

appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 9. Ferdinand Gordon moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 for the purchase and installation of oil burners at the Grade school. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 10. Ernest J. Pratt moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$443 for the purchase of new equipment. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 11. Capital reserve fund—Edward Fay moved we pass over this article. Motion seconded and carried.

Article 12. Cost of living raise—George Austermann moved we pass over this article. Motion lost. Philip Darling moved the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,800 in addition of the original appropriation for 1950-51, to be available to the school district prior to July 1, 1951 in order that the school board may pay to each teacher and school nurse, as petitioned, an additional salary of \$300 for the school year 1950-51. Motion seconded. Ferdinand Gordon moved we vote by balloting. Motion seconded and carried. Paul Kidder offered an amendment to strike out \$7,800 and insert \$3,900. Motion seconded and lost. Edward Fay moved we amend motion to \$2,600, or \$100 for each teacher. Motion seconded and lost. Francis Devlin moved we proceed with the original question. Motion seconded and carried.

The Moderator appointed James Fitzgerald, Rufus Fenerty III, Robert Bunce and Norman Eaves as tellers, the vote was as follows:

For salary adjustment	102

Article 13. Philip Darling moved that the district set up a Cooperative School Study Committee, consisting of the school board and three other members, appointed by the Moderator, that the committee be instructed to work with committees from other school districts in the development of plans for a workable Monadnock Region Cooperative School system, and that the district raise and appropriate \$1,300 for necessary expenses in connection therewith. Robert Lewis explained the tentative plan. After considerable discussion, the motion was seconded and finally carried.

Elizabeth Sawyer offered the following resolution: that the school district assembled advise the school board that it is the consensus of opinion that the Lord's Prayer and Flag Salute should be said in every home room at the opening of school each morning and that the school-board be asked to so instruct its teachers. Resolution seconded and carried.

Meeting adjourned at 10:40 P. M.

It is interesting to observe how Jaffrey enrollments are increasing: 523 in 1947-48; 535 in 1948-49; 553 in 1949-50; 576 in 1950-51. This growth of fifty-three in four years has given rise to many problems.

In the last five years the number transported has increased from 159 to 268, an increase of 68.55%, whereas the cost has risen from \$5,418 to \$9,143, or 68.75%. It is gratifying to realize that the increase in cost is not due entirely to inflation.

PART VII. SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Jaffrey qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Union Hall in said district on the 10th day of March, 1952 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose two members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose one member of the School Board for the ensuing year.
5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
8. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,275 for the purchase of new equipment.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000, as a Capital Reserve Fund for construction, reconstruction or acquisition of school buildings, said funds to be placed in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds and reserved for the construction reconstruction or acquisition of school buildings in accordance with the laws of 1943 Chapter 160 as amended by the laws of 1945, Chapter 35, and laws of 1947, Chapter 8.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of improving the Grade School playground.

13. To see if the district will vote to decrease the membership of the school board to three. (By petition)

14. To see if the district will vote to elect one member of the school board each year to fill vacancies so that the board will decrease by one each year until it shall be composed of only three members, or take any other action relating thereto.
