TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Lempster on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To bring in your votes for Delegates at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention of the various Political Parties to be held to nominate Party Candidates for the President and Vice President of the United States.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for interest on debt.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to keep the Common mowed around the Soldiers' Monument at Lempster Street.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$324.00 for State Aid Construction.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$7.50 for Town Road Aid and the State will contribute \$943.95.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise the property for taxation.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to reinsure the Town Hall and Union Hall.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to limit the Road Agents to the appropriations.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to elect one Road Agent instead of three, to take effect in 1945.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum per hour the Town will vote to pay for labor on the highway.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to receive sealed bids for mowing Town roads, a separate bid to be sent for each District.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to employ a Town Counsel when needed.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to buy additional snow fence and raise money therefor.

ARTICLE 20. To see what the Town will vote to do about the fence on the west side of the Cemetery from the Town Hall to the south west corner and raise money therefor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one hundredth of one percent of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1943 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

ARTICLE 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Company.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. ARTICLE 25. To see what action the Town will vote to take concerning the present Australian Ballot System for the election of Town Officers.

ARTICLE 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- Ballover Land. 55 acres bordering on the west side of the Dartmouth College Highway from East Lempster to Newport.
 This land is part of the Dexter Hosley Farm. Quite a lot of wood and lumber on it.
- 2. Charles Lovell Land on Lempster Mountain. This is bounded on the east by Washington Town Line, on the north and south by the highway from East Lempster to Washington; said to contain 5 acres.

- 10. Haverhill Trust Co. This land is known as the Bank land. Contains 90 acres more or less, and is situated on Lempster Mountain, on the north side of the highway from East Lempster to Washington.

- 11. Daniel Paul Estate. Part of the Blanchard place. A lot of growing pine on the lot, contains 75 acres and is south of the highway from Lempster to Unity.
- 12. Daniel Paul Estate. Part of the Carr place, so called, and adjoins the Blanchard place on the west, and the highway from Lempster to Newport on the east, and contains 100 acres. FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

We were fortunate not to have any fires last year and hope the coming year will have as good a record.

The situation in fire hazards is just as serious as in past years and we ask the whole hearted and patriotic cooperation this year.

As has been stated in previous years, suspicious circumstance connected with every fire should be made known to the proper authorities.

The shortage of manpower is more critical than last year and as the year goes by the situation will become more acute.

With the shortage of help it will be more necessary for everyone to comply with regulations which have been set up to govern the use of fire in our woodlands.

These are briefly as follows:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden to burn brush or other debris in or near woodlands, or where fire may be communicated to such lands, once the snow has left the ground. Violation of this requirement makes the responsible party liable
- a. To a fine not to exceed \$500.00 or imprisonment of not more than one year or both.
- b. To the town for expense incurred by the warden in attending or extinguishing such fire.
- c. For damage to abutting owners if fire runs upon abutted property.
- 2. DON'T drop, or throw from any vehicle while same is upon a public highway or private way and

DON'T drop, throw or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any substance to cause a fire. Violation of the prohibitions penalizes whoever is found guilty with a fine of not more than \$25.00.

3. DON'T fail to properly notify your local warden of any fires you see.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Lempster:

I herewith submit my annual report for the twelfth year as your Superintendent of Schools.

This year when it seemed almost impossible to find teachers for rural schools, we were fortunate to hold the services of two able experienced teachers, Mrs. Viola Horton and Mrs. Doris Abbott. With good children and good teachers in our schools we should be happy, and we will be very lucky if we can hold them where they are until the war is over.

The teacher situation is really quite serious. While wages have been raised they do not meet the increases in taxes and the increases in the costs of living. It is right that everyone should carry a part of the hardships of these times, but it is well to consider the difficulties of finding new teachers. There are teachers who will accept single grade positions of not more than twenty pupils near a railroad station, at high salaries, but teachers who really love to teach and are willing to work in the rural schools as their part to help in these troubled days are hard to find.

It is generally thought that the State pays the expenses of the elementary schools over and above five mills on the equalization valuation of the District. That was the intention of the law, but during the last few years it does not work out just that way. The State pays none of the costs for educating the high school pupils. She will not pay any of the costs of the elementary education that she has not approved, and since the legislature has cut the appropriations on schools so small, the approvals have been cut on things really needed in the schools of today. The State approved only \$5.00 per school for lights, and has no funds for any emergencies such as the transporta-

tion of new pupils or the opening of a new school in the middle of the year.

It would be a great help to equalize the cost of education in this state if a law was passed providing up to \$1,500.00 for each district to help maintain high schools or to pay tuitions and other expenses of high school pupils.

The increases in our budget are in the costs of supplies, wood, high school tuitions, and the salaries of teachers and janitors.

I wish to thank the teachers, members of the Lempster School Board, the children, and the citizens for their patience during this year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Lempster Schools, 1943 to 1944

The results of the annual school dental clinic held May 3 and 4, 1943 may be stated briefly as better health; better attendance; better school work, an aroused interest by the child and the parent in the value of preventive and corrective dentistry. Twenty-seven pupils were treated by Dr. Irving Crandall of Claremont. The clinic was made possible by the Mother's Club and the cooperation of the parents.

October 25, the schools were used for the purpose of inoculating against diphtheria children of school as well as those of pre school age. Dr. Thorpe of Newport gave the preventive treatment.

In May, a Western Electric Audometer, loaned by the State Board of Education, was used to check pupils' hearing scientifically.
