#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the farms on the Ammonoosuc River, below the village, from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town, for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1942, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the Town will take about repairing or renewing the floor of the River Street Bridge, so-called, in Littleton Village.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$490.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being one 1/100th of one per cent of the town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE  $7\frac{1}{2}$ . To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from near Arsene Larrivee's to the Sand Road so-called, leading from Pattenville to Patridge Lake.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. ARTICLE 9. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING STATE TAX COMMISSION

Concord, New Hampshire

January 26, 1942

Board of Selectmen Littleton, N. H.

#### Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote taken at your annual meeting in March, 1941, an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton and the Littleton Village District has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission, a report of which is submitted herewith. This audit covers the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the period from February 1 to December 8, 1941. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Clerk of the Municipal Court, Overseer of the Poor, Road Agents, Public Library Treasurer, Treasurer of Park Commission and Treasurer of the Littleton Village District.

#### Finances

In order to present a comprehensive picture of the financial condition of the town during the last ten years and the changes which have occurred in this period, certain statements have been prepared and will be referred to in the comments which follow.

#### Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A)

It will be noted that the Net Debt of the town, as of January 31, 1932, amounted to \$84,630.00. It reached its highest point during the last decade on January 31, 1935, when it

rose to \$182,982.00. Since that time a decrease has taken place each year resulting in a Net Debt of \$96,778.38, on January 31, 1941.

The assessed valuation amounted to \$5,059,709 in 1931. In 1939 it had dropped to \$4,794,652. During the last two years an increase has been noted, the 1941 valuation of taxable property being \$4,890,575.

The total tax levy of the town, school and village district, in 1931 amounted to approximately \$184,000. The average local tax rate in that year was \$3.53 per hundred as compared to the average state tax rate of \$2.90. In 1937 the tax levy was just under \$200,000, the average local rate \$3.96 and the average state rate \$3.41. In 1941 the tax levy had decreased to approximately \$159,000, while the average local rate of \$3.15 was lower than the state average of \$3.35.

The substantial amounts turned over by the Water and Electric Light Department to the general funds of the town during recent years have contributed materially to the reduction of the tax rate.

A more detailed statement of comparative property valuations over the ten year period will be found in Schedule A-1.

## Revised Balance Sheet as of January 31, 1941: (Schedule B)

A revised balance sheet as of January 31, 1941, has been prepared and appears as Schedule B. The following changes were made in the original balance sheet filed with this office, a copy of which appears in the printed report of the town for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, pages 12 and 13:

Assets increased by \$14,364.16. This represented the amount of cash in hands of Collector, account of 1940 taxes, as of January 31, 1941. (See printed report, as of 1/31/1941, page 36)

Liabilities increased by \$1,500.00. This resulted from correction in amount of appropriation balance due school district. Amount originally reported, \$21,200.00, should have been \$22,700.00. (See Schedule B-1 for explanation)

Net Debt, as reported, \$109,642.44. Net Debt, as corrected, \$ 96,778.28.

## Statement of School District Appropriations: (Schedule B-1)

An analysis of the School District appropriation account is made in this schedule. It will be noted that at the close of the town fiscal year, January 31, 1934, the amount reported as due the school district was \$21,800.00. The actual amount due was \$22,800.00. The same difference appeared at the close of the following year, and in the year ended January 31, 1936, the difference increased to \$1,500.00. The same difference appeared as of January 31, 1941, and has been adjusted in the revised balance sheet.

#### Bonded Debt and Debt Limit: (Schedule C)

The bonded debt of the town, village district and school district, as compared to the legal debt limit of each respective unit is indicated in this Schedule. The legal debt limit of the town is 3% of the assessed valuation, with water bonds excluded from the general indebtedness. The legal debt limit of the village district is 1% of the assessed valuation and the school district limit is 2%. The margin within the legal debt limit, or borrowing capacity, of each unit on January 31, 1941, was therefore as follows:

## Bonded Debt and Annual Maturities: (Schedules D, D-1 and D-2)

Detailed statements of the bonded debt of the town, water and light department and village district, are included in Schedules D, D-1, and D-2, respectively. Annual maturities of principal as well as interest requirements are indicated therein. Revenues, Appropriations and Expenditures—1940: (Schedules E and F)

An analysis of appropriations and expenditures and estimated and actual revenues for the year 1940 is made in these schedules. A net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,598.80, plus a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$141.63, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,740.43 in that year.

#### Accounts of Selectmen and Treasurer

Vouchers issued by the selectmen during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the period from February 1 to December 8, 1941, were examined as were also the supporting invoices and highway department payrolls. The receipts of the treasurer were checked by source insofar as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. The treasurer's cash book balance as of December 8, 1941, amounted to \$62,826.94. The reconciled bank balance was in agreement with this amount. (Schedule G).

#### Taxes

The tax warrant of Collector Simons for the levy of 1941 was audited and balanced as indicated by Schedule I. The tax warrants of Collector Bass for the levies of 1940 and 1939, as well as the tax sale accounts for the same years were likewise audited. Summaries of these accounts appear in Schedules J, K, L and M, respectively. A complete list of all unredeemed taxes of record as of December 10, 1941, is included in Schedule N. Verification notices were sent to all taxpayers whose names appear on this list.

#### **Town Clerk**

The accounts of the Town Clerk, including the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses, were examined for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941, and the current fiscal year to date of audit. All funds received by the Clerk were accounted for either through remittances to the Treasurer or cash on hand on date of audit. (Schedules O and P).

#### **Trust Funds**

The savings bank books representing the invested principal and unexpended income of the various trust funds were examined. All funds, as indicated in the trust fund record book, were accounted for. Expenditures made by the trustees from trust fund income were properly supported by vouchers. (Schedule Q).

#### **Municipal Court**

An examination was made of the records of the clerk of the municipal court for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941 and the period from February 1 to December 10, 1941. Receipts and disbursements were checked and the balance on hand verified. (Schedules R and S).

#### Overseer of the Poor

The accounts of the overseer of the poor were audited. This consisted of an examination of the checks issued by the overseer together with the supporting invoices. Payments made by the town to the overseer on the appropriation account, as recorded in the Selectmen's books, were in agreement with the corresponding receipt's items in the overseer's cash book. Reimbursements from the County on account of expenditures for County poor cases were likewise checked. The overseer's cash book balance and reconciled bank balance, as of the date of audit, were in agreement. (Schedule T).

#### **Other Accounts**

The accounts of the Road Agents, Treasurer of the Public Library and Treasurer of the Park Commission were audited and summarized statements of these accounts are included in Schedules U to Y, inclusive.

#### **Town Officers' Bonds**

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be satisfactory in form and amount. These are listed in Schedule Z.

#### Littleton Village District

Vouchers of the Littleton Village District were examined together with the supporting invoices and payrolls. Checks issued by the Treasurer were compared with the corresponding vouchers. A summary of the receipts and expenditures of the treasurer for the period from February 1, 1941 to December 3, 1941, with the reconciliation of the cash balance, is included in Schedule AA. Schedule BB summarizes the treasurer's accounts for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1941.

#### **General Comments**

The accounts and records of all town officials were found to be in good condition and the accounting procedure generally in accordance with the standard system prescribed by the tax commission. No irregularities or shortages were discovered. Minor changes in accounting practices were discussed with the town officers during the course of the audit and suggestions and recommendations made in connection therewith.

It is suggested that the recording of receipts in the selectmen's accounts would provide the means whereby the amount of the actual cash balance of the town might be determined at all times. This balance is not readily obtainable under the present system whereby the treasurer records expenditures after the checks are paid by the bank. Detailed reports of receipts made by the treasurer to the selectmen on a weekly basis would provide the necessary information to carry out this procedure.

It has been the practice in Littleton for Tax Collectors to waive all interest charges on delinquent taxes, both the 10% charge from December 1 to the date of tax sale and the 12% charge on redemptions made subsequent to the sale. The collection of interest on delinquent taxes is not optional but mandatory under the provisions of Chap. 64, Sec. 11, of the N. H. Public Laws. The Selectmen may abate interest charges in cases where there are specific reasons for doing so, but the practice of waiving all interest charges is not in conformity with the law and should be discontinued. The incentive to a taxpayer to pay taxes when due is removed when he knows that he can pay them a year later without being penalized.

After consultation with the selectmen and officials of the water and electric light department it was decided not to make an audit of the accounts of the department at this time. Inasmuch as an accountant had already been engaged to make the audit of the water and electric light department accounts at the close of their fiscal year and prepare the annual report for the Public Service Commission, it was felt that the duplication of this work and the extra expense involved was unnecessary and unwarranted.

For their cooperation and the time given us during the progress of the audit we extend our thanks to all town officers of Littleton.

#### **Report of Board of Education**

#### To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1940 to June 30, 1941, with an itemized statement of expenditures for that year; the budget for the present school year and for the next year; statement of estimated receipts for these two years; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and by the headmaster of the high school.

The estimated deficit next June 30 is \$718.00. The budget for next year is \$71,163.57. The sum of these amounts is \$71,906.00. The probable receipts from sources other than taxation are \$3,785.00. With some reimbursement from the town for additional expense in connection with the defense program an appropriation of \$67,000 should be adequate. We recommend that the district raise that amount.

## Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to your schools:

The enrollment of pupils this year is about the same as last year. The enrollment to date is 732, including the 32 pupils in the kindergarten. Last year the total enrollment was 699. The high school enrollment this year is 281, with 267 pupils now in attendance. The enrollment by grades follows:

The high school membership last year and this has taxed the capacity of the building. All of the rooms are in use practically all of the school day. The home economics and woodworking rooms are overcrowded. The war program has not yet affected the high school attendance. As was stated in last year's report the school population will remain about the same as long as the total population of the town remains the same.

Health work has been carried on as in former years. The report of the medical examiner and school nurse for the school year closing in June showed the following: Number of pupils examined 607, number of pupils underweight 183, defective vision 72, defective hearing 32, defective teeth 118, diseased tonsils 9, asthma 2, cardiac disease 7, pulmonary disease 8. Corrections made from January to June included dental care 165 by parents and 39 by clinic, vision 42 by parents and 17 by clinic.

The audiometer furnished by the State Board of Education was used in testing the hearing of pupils. Of the 32 cases of defective hearing 19 received some treatment. The tuberculin test, Patch Method, was given to 111 pupils.

During July 8 tonsil operations were performed at a tonsil clinic. Hot lunches were served to some pupils in high school and Kilburn buildings. About 90 half pints of milk were taken daily during the winter months by the pupils of the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings.

This year the medical examination was delayed somewhat by the illness of Dr. Page. All of the pupils have now been examined. The members of the athletic teams have received special examinations. Milk and hot lunches are being distributed as in previous years.

The Littleton school system has a kindergarten this year for the first time. Thirty-two pupils have been enrolled. The average membership has been twenty-seven and the average attendance twenty-three. One room in the Apthorp building was equipped for this school. Parents living some distance from the Apthorp school have provided transportation for their children at their own expense. Miss Bevalie M. Chase, a graduate of the Perry Kindergarten School in Boston, Mass., was secured as teacher. Miss Chase has done excellent work. The school has been organized in two groups, one group meeting in the forenoon and one in the afternoon. For a few special occasions the groups have met with the other schools. The kindergarten Rhythm band made quite a hit at the American Education Week program. Some of the most noticeable values of kindergarten training are cooperation in play and work, recognition of the rights of others, courtesy, habits of health, safety, and self-control. The children learn songs, poems, games, and have some training in the elements of art, handwriting, and picture stories. The kindergarten adds one year to the child's school life. It is a good preparatory field for the first grade work.

Last year the school district appropriated the sum of \$1,200.00 for the operation of the kindergarten. The total cost has been kept within that amount. Its estimated cost for next year is \$1,000.00, with no transportation expense. Provision for its continuance has not been made in the budget submitted. Citizens should visit the kindergarten and see the community's youngest school pupils at work.

During the past year several changes have occurred in the teaching staff. In March Miss Agnes I. Corfield succeeded Miss Clark as music supervisor. Miss Corfield has a bachelor's degree from the New England Conservatory of Music, and a master's degree from New York University. She had five years of teaching experience in the state of New York before coming to Littleton.

At the beginning of the spring term last year Miss Avis M. Cox succeeded Miss Morgan as teacher of English in the senior high school. Miss Cox, a graduate of Colby College, with summer school training at the University of New Hampshire, came to Littleton after several years of experience in the high school at Meredith, N. H. At the close of last school year Miss Heald, who had taught Latin and French in the high school for several years, resigned to accept a position in Springfield, Vt. Miss Doris P. Barrett, a graduate of the University of Vermont, with a master's degree from McGill University, and with several years of experience in Underhill and Northfield, Vt., was selected for this department.

Mr. Walter F. Barry with a bachelor's degree from Boston College and a master's degree from Boston University, and with successful substitute teaching experience in Somerville, Mass., was elected to succeed Mr. Estabrook in the science department in the high school.

During the summer Miss Frances Ann Johnson who had taught very successfully for several years in the Kilburn building requested a year's leave of absence to devote her entire time to writing. The leave was granted and Mrs. Edith Burnham was recalled to service.

All of these new teachers are doing good work. You have at present a group of teachers well trained, professionally alert, and efficient in their work. The school morale in all of the buildings is excellent. The pupils are interested and cooperative. Disciplinary problems are rare.

Attendance records testify to the effort of pupils and parents for good schools. The public programs in music and dramatics have been good. The athletic teams have been well trained and have displayed good sportsmanship. The principles of health, of safety, and of good citizenship have been well taught.

In the present war emergency the teachers are doing their part enthusiastically. Headmaster Nelson, for years active in the work of the American Legion, has spent many hours outside of school this fall and winter in defense work. He took the air raid wardens' course of study in Concord; was appointed assistant chief air raid warden for Littleton; with Dr. Miles, the chief air raid warden, organized the air raid wardens' course here and planned the instruction for same; and has assisted in organizing the first aid courses. His school is well organized for air raid protection. His influence for effective defense planning throughout the area has been positive.

Besides Mr. Nelson, nineteen teachers were students in the air raid wardens' course. Many of them were also members of the first aid classes. Air raid drills have been practiced in the different buildings. Shutters have been placed on the basement windows in the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings to make them good air raid shelters. Other safety precautions have been taken.

The home economics department has been active in the work of the Red Cross. The girls under the direction of Mrs. Hogan and Miss Corea have been doing much knitting and sewing. A junior Red Cross organization has been formed with Miss Corey as leader and with the assistance of teachers from all of the buildings. Nearly all pupils are members. A large number of them are engaged in knitting projects suited to their age and ability.

First aid instruction is to be offered to pupils in the senior and junior classes in high school as soon as instructors for same can be provided. The woodworking classes under the direction of Mr. Welch have been enlisted for extra duty. They are making night sticks for the auxiliary police and packing boxes for the Red Cross. They will soon begin a project in making model airplanes under the direction of the State Board of Education, the U. S. Bureau of Education, and the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics. Completed models complying in all respects with the specifications will be used by the army and navy, and in connection with training "spotters" for civilian defense. The commercial classes have done a great amount of typing and mimeographing for the different agencies at work for community defense.

Public schools must operate more effectively than ever before. To them teachers must give the greatest effort. To properly evaluate the agencies working for public safety, to exemplify true patriotism, to participate in the various defense activities, and to exercise constructive leadership of pupils challenge the wisdom of all teachers. Your suggestions for the right degree of participation in the community activities for defense by the schools will be appreciated by teachers and superintendent. These activities must have some beneficial results. Pupils are learning to do for others and are realizing somewhat the privileges of living in a democratic society. They are learning to give up some of the pleasures and luxuries which they have formerly enjoyed. They are discovering a real joy in this giving and doing. Parents are doubtless discovering more maturity and more thoughtfulness in their children than they believed to be there. Citizens, previously not in close touch with the schools, are getting a more accurate knowledge and keener appreciation of the efforts and of the actual accomplishment of the schools. They are learning more of the serious purpose of young people and of the fundamental desire to work and to be of service.

You have contributed the use of the high school building for the courses of instruction offered in the community. You have spent some money to protect the pupils in the elementary buildings. In case of emergency the elementary buildings might serve as air raid shelters for those immediate sections of the community. The expense to date has not been great. You may have to expend more during the next year if the war hazard increases.

In planning for next year several new courses should be considered for the high school program of studies. The present defense and war efforts have emphasized the importance of a knowledge of first aid. Instruction in first aid should be included in our regular program—Safety, Health, and First Aid might comprise a course of instruction for at least a half year's credit. Other subjects that should be considered for credit in the program are guidance, consumer buying, music appreciation, welding, general shop mechanics. Some attention is being given to consumer buying at present in the courses in civics, economics, and in home economics. If the demand for welders is continued, and if shop space can be provided, a course in welding would seem to be of the greatest practical value. Suggestions have been made that some instruction in this subject be given this year. Space and equipment must be provided, however, before work can be begun.

The largest item of expense for the school buildings this year has been the installation of a boiler and improvement of the heating system in the Apthorp building. A new fence was built on two sides of the Apthorp grounds, a new steel flag pole was erected, and some other improvements to the grounds and playground equipment made. Lights and window shades were installed in the room used by the kindergarten. This room and one of the others were painted. At the high school building a new tile floor was laid in the home economics room and a new electric stove was purchased. Two cars of cinders were placed on the grounds at the high and Kilburn buildings in an effort for improvement. The usual minor repairs were made in these buildings.

Unless the emergency demands unusual expenditures for repairs next summer, I recommend that the classrooms and corridors in the high school building be painted. This was done eight years ago, part of it as a CWA project. If all of the classrooms and corridors on both floors are painted the cost will be a large share of the budget item for repairs. If this is done only necessary minor repairs in addition should be made.

At the close of the last school year in June, the actual net deficit was \$95.06. The treasurer had borrowed \$2,200.00 from the appropriation for the present year and had a balance of \$388.82 and amounts due the district of \$1,716.12. The

school district bonds now outstanding amount to \$32,000.00. In four years the high school building will be paid for.

The budget presented for next year is slightly larger than that of any for several years. It has provided for small increases in salaries and services and in instructional materials. Reasonable adjustment should be made for these essentials. The budget totals \$71,163.00. Estimated receipts from sources other than taxation total \$3,785.00. The difference is \$67,378.00. To this should be added the estimated deficit at the close of this school year in figuring the appropriation to request from the school district. The efforts for defense have made necessary revision of the budget for the present year. You will have spent by the close of the year approximately \$400.00 additional for heat and lights in the high school building, and \$200.00 for alterations in the elementary buildings and for miscellaneous items. The total expenditures minus your known receipts will leave an estimated deficit of \$718.00. Adding this to your budget for next year the total is \$71,906.00. If money from the special town appropriation for defense is available to care for your added expense this year and next, a school district appropriation of \$67,000.00 will probably be adequate.

The financial records of the school board and of the school district treasurer have been examined by the elected auditor and by the accountants of the State Tax Commission and have been found correct.

I sincerely appreciate your helpful cooperation in the study of all school problems.

## Headmaster's Report

#### To the Superintendent of Schools:

Schools, too, live in a war economy! Because this is true it seems of utmost importance that our schools realize this early, and readjust if necessary their objectives and their philosophy to meet total war duties and obligations. On the one hand we must profit by the lessons which British experience of the last two years would teach—that schools must be kept open and that the normal educational facilities must be expanded. On the other hand total war demands supplementary emergency training, which means rigid economies, curtailment of privileges, and self sacrifice in both time and service. It is in an atmosphere dominated by these thoughts that I submit, this, my fourth annual report.

#### REGISTRATION

Although there has been a trend throughout our country towards a decreased registration in secondary schools, Littleton High School has not been affected by it as the following summary indicates.

In reading these figures it should be kept in mind that last year our school had the highest total registration in its history. With the current school year but half completed our total registration comes within nine of this record, and bids fair to exceed it before the close of the year in June.

#### THE CURRICULUM AND TIME-TABLE

There has been no major change in the curriculum or timetable from that of last year, yet once again I wish to emphasize the importance of careful and wise consideration by pupils in choosing their courses. A relatively small percentage of failures at the end of the current half year would indicate that there had been a real effort to do this.

#### THE TEACHING STAFF

In a time of almost unequaled teacher replacements, our school has been more fortunate than the average. Not a single replacement has occurred during the first half of the current year, and but two changes were made at the beginning of the year when Miss Doris Barrett replaced Miss Alice Heald as instructor of modern languages, and Mr. Walter Barry replaced Mr. William Estabrook as instructor in science.

Several times this year I have had occasion to remark concerning the high degree of efficiency and devotion to duty of our teaching staff as a whole, and I wish to take this opportunity to repeat this assertion and to place it on record.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

In my previous reports the importance of a high grade of scholarship consistent with a pupil's ability has been pointed out. Likewise expanded to some detail has been the need of daily home study by all pupils, and the necessity of obtaining a certificate grade by all college bound pupils. In a war economy these essentials are even more vital and important.

#### SCHOOL APPROVAL

As in the past our school has full approval by our State Department of Education, as well as the college certificate privilege of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board.

#### ATTENDANCE

Regular and prompt attendance is an absolute necessity for effective school work. That there is a realization of this and an earnest effort to meet it is shown by the following statistics for last year. These are taken from the 1940-1941 Statistical Report of the State Department of Education.

Our junior high school was placed upon the "Commendable List" for attendance, and both our senior and junior high schools on a similar list for lack of tardiness. Last year was the third consecutive year that we have been on the latter honor roll.

### **EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES**

Athletics. To seek and maintain physical fitness is the duty of every individual in these times. School athletics is an important means to this end. Not only does it seem advisable that school athletics be intensified, but even more important, the program should be expanded to include all pupils. As a small contribution towards the latter objective an effort has been made this year to extend girls' basketball facilities to a larger group of girls, by eliminating some of the more strenuous features of interscholastic competition. To accomplish this several long basketball trips have been eliminated, and in their place afternoon practice games with near-by schools have been substituted. This has necessitated the withdrawal of our girls' team from league competition although we have played on our home floor all of the teams of the league. In terms of games our girls' schedule, including the four practice games, does not vary much from last year's as seen in the following comparison:

The current year's boys' basketball schedule also includes four afternoon practice games with a total of eighteen games, two more than last year's schedule. Ten of the eighteen games are league games.

This year's football schedule included six games which was a one game increase over that of last year. Present plans are to increase it to seven games in next fall's schedule.

Due to lack of snow several winter sports' meets have had to be cancelled, a necessary but unfortunate situation, as winter sports hold an important place in our school's athletic program.

Our baseball schedule and weekly game periods for the junior high pupils remain similar to that of previous years. Due to teaching schedule demands, Miss Tewksbury is unable to take either of the junior high school weekly game periods for girls as she has in previous years, and Mr. Sommers is able to take but one of the two scheduled for boys. Taking the place of these two instructors, however, are Miss Corey and Miss Corea for the girls, and Arthur Lemire, a member of the senior class, for the boys.

The business and financial program of our athletic association progresses in a successful manner. Through the efforts of two efficient committees and the loyal support of business men in purchasing season tickets, the yearly budget of over \$500.00 was quickly raised.

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The annual Stunt Night held last April added a net profit of over \$175.00 to the association's funds.

NON-ATHLETIC AND MISCELLANEOUS ACTIVITIES

These organizations are the same, and their respective activities are similar to those recorded in last year's report, with the exceptions noted below:

- 1. The resumption of choral and glee club work under the direction of Miss Corfield.
- 2. The organization of a debating club under the direction of Mr. Barry.
- 3. The presentation of three special assembly programs during the last semester of the present year; these programs to be given and directed entirely by pupils.
- 4. The omission this year of the short course in "Safety and the Automobile" as our permanent plans call for its presentation in alternate years.

### NYA PROGRAM

The budget allotted to our school for the current year is \$582.00. This is an increase of \$114.00 over that of last year. Seventeen pupils have qualified for this work with four applications under consideration at the time of this report. Those working under this program receive monthly checks in payment for work done on approved school projects. The maximum monthly pay cannot exceed \$6.00 per pupil.

### AWARDS

It is with grateful appreciation that we again announce the privilege we have of awarding the following honors:

- 1. The George H. Tilton awards, fourteen in number.
- 2. The American Legion medal.
- 3. The American Legion Auxiliary award.
- 4. The Scholarship Key for excellence in commercial subjects.
- 5. The participation in the Good Citizenship Pilgrimage.

The first four honors, together with National Honor Society membership cards, were awarded during commencement week.

The Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, conducted in February of each year, was made possible for our school through the courtesy of the Gunthwaite Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE IN LITTLETON HIGH SCHOOL

### (As reported to a meeting of the North Country Headmasters' Association, February 9, 1942.)

Following is a summary of National Defense activities as carried on by the pupils and teachers of Littleton High School.

1. The school is organized and drilled for possible air raids. One teacher is chief air raid warden with the other teachers as wardens. Fourteen special squads of pupils have been trained for special duty: 6 squads to handle fire hose, 5 squads to man the fire extinguishers, 2 squads to handle incendiary bombs, and 1 squad for messenger service.

2. One class is buying defense stamps to redeem later for a defense bond to be given as a gift to some worthy cause to be determined later.

3. A committee from the local chapter of the National Honor Society is drawing up a school-wide plan for pupil purchase of defense stamps.

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4. The home economics classes are working daily for the Red Cross and have completed several extensive projects in sewing, knitting, cutting, and folding of bandages.

5. A Junior Red Cross chapter has been organized under the leadership of high school teachers. It has a membership of 767 pupils, and is holding classes in knitting outside of school hours. These classes include both boys and girls from all grades of both the elementary and high schools. A national quota has been assigned and sewing projects will begin in the near future.

6. The manual training department is working on the following projects, several of which are nearing completion:

a. Packing cases for the Red Cross.

b. Splints for the Air Raid Warden posts.

c. Night sticks for the Auxiliary Police Department.

d. Airplane models for the U. S. Government.

The teaching staff of Littleton High School consists of 13 full time teachers. A summary of their activities outside of school hours is as follows:

a. 10 have taken the prescribed 15 hour Air Raid Warden's course.

b. 11 have taken the 10 hour Air Raid Warden's Red Cross First Aid Course. Two of these are continuing the First Aid Course to 20 hours.

c. 4 have been assigned to districts as air raid wardens.

d. 2 more have been appointed senior wardens. 2 more have been appointed assistants of the senior wardens.

e. 1 has been appointed deputy chief warden.

f. 2 hold air raid warden's instructor's certificates from the New Hampshire Defense Council.

g. 1 is chairman of the Junior Red Cross.

h. 1 is assistant to the chairman of the Junior Red Cross.

i. 1 will be chairman of the Canteen Corps when the organization is completed.

j. 2 were authorized canvassers for the January Red Cross drive.

k. 1 will assist with the Nutrition Courses as soon as these start.

l. 1 will take the course in "Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick."

m. 1 is Assistant Civilian Director of Observation Posts of District No. 8 as well as Chief Observer for the Manns Hill Post in Littleton.

n. 2 are observers in the Littleton posts.

o. 1 was director of the Littleton Air Raid Warden's School.

p. 6 are knitting for the Red Cross regularly outside of school hours.

Through the courtesy of the Board of Education the high school building with its facilities has been used for the Air Raid Warden's Course and for seven groups in Red Cross First Aid.

### RECOMMENDATION

I have the following recommendation to present for consideration. It results from our total war situation, and suggests the installation into our course of studies of several part time and part credit courses. These utility courses should aim to better prepare our young people for the increasing obligations and responsibilities of current living. First aid, thrift and guidance, to mention but three, are topics that almost overnight have taken on new and pertinent meanings. With the time economy of hour periods, and the possible combining of two or more of our present unit courses, I believe such changes would be practical and of genuine value.

### CONCLUSION

The real worth of an individual or a group of individuals is reflected in the manner in which they can meet emergencies. In our present crisis one cannot review the last few months' work of our staff of teachers without an admiration for their

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devotion to duty, and their untiring efforts to assist in every way possible. It has been an inspiration to have worked where the spirit of loyalty has been so real.

### To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian Is Herewith Submitted:

The Littleton Public Library, like many others in similar towns, notes a drop in circulation this year due without doubt to the war effort. More men have steady employment; women are knitting and sewing in the leisure time once used for reading. This assumption is borne out by the actual figures which show a decreased circulation of adult fiction. A slight increase in the percentage of non-fiction borrowed, especially the current history and the "how to do it" books, would seem to indicate stimulated interest in informational reading. In the last few months the library has added a large number of books of this type.

A special effort has been made to round out the library's collection of technical books and already a demand has been felt for those on general machine shop practice, welding and diesel engineering. More will be added if the need makes it practicable.

The circulation of the book collections lent direct to the classrooms at the Apthorp School amounted to 835. Besides providing recreational reading for the grades this service acts as a stimulus to the children, and many appear at the library to get more books for themselves. Instruction in the use of the library was given to the Freshmen by the librarian at the beginning of the school year.

We have borrowed extensively from the State Library when our library could not supply the needs of patrons. Littleton people took advantage of the phonograph record collection in Concord far more than ever before. In 1941, 181 records were borrowed as against 48 in 1940.

A successful Book Week idea was a picture drawing contest for the pupils of the fifth and sixth grades of all three schools. The best pictures illustrating a favorite book or story were shown at the library during the week and a prize of a book was given for the most outstanding. Many children and parents came to see the work. A story hour was arranged and new children's books displayed.

Several exhibits of interest were held. At the close of the art classes sponsored by St. Mary's School the work done during the winter was exhibited and much interest was shown by townspeople who examined it. National Music Week was marked by the Music Lovers' Club with a showing of books, pictures and scrapbooks relating to music and musicians. The most ambitious and best attended presentation was during Art Week. The show was arranged by Mrs. George Tilton, a library trustee, and included paintings, water colors, drawings, wood-carving and examples of other hand crafts done by people of Littleton and surrounding towns. Many came to view the display and to attend the tea served one afternoon.

An effective and inexpensive improvement of the library building was the cleaning and painting of the basement hall. For the reference room were purchased eight much needed new chairs, a dictionary stand, and a steel picture file. A new desk and chair for the librarian's office modernized and increased the library's working space. Although a three tier steel stack is greatly needed, two wooden book cases have been ordered as a temporary solution to the library's shelving problem. Eventually, if the Littleton library is to grow and become an important depository for this section of the state, increased and improved shelving will become absolutely necessary.

The librarian has conducted the Victory Book Campaign in Littleton. Many fine books have been received and will be sent to post libraries for the use of the men in service. Miss Agnes Buskirk of the New Hampshire Public Library Commission is using her quarters in the library basement as a sorting center for the books from surrounding towns.

The library received a number of gifts of books and money during the year. We appreciate the generosity and interest of the donors. May I take this opportunity to thank the Board of Trustees and the patrons of the library for their kindness and help during 1941.
