

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Mason:

I submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

School Organization

The changes at the Centre School since my last annual report are as follows: Mrs. Heald was released in March and we were obliged to employ a cadet teacher from Keene Normal School to finish out the year. This fall we secured a graduate of the Normal School, Miss Edith Forsyth, with special preparation for teaching upper grades or Junior High School. In the primary room Miss Nichols declined re-election after two years' service and Mrs. Laura Leonard, a teacher of considerable experience, has replaced her. Under these teachers the school this year is in very good condition and pupils are making good progress. The enrollment is smaller, with twenty-one pupils in the grammar room and fourteen in the primary room. At the Number Six School Miss Howe is teaching her second year and is giving increasingly efficient service even though she is handling seventh and eighth grades in addition to the first six. The enrollment there is twenty-three, the same as last year.

The attendance for 1924-25 was considerably better at the Centre School, increasing from 92% to 96%, while the attendance at Number Six was practically the same, 94.4% and 94.6%. The average for all schools was about 1.5% higher than the state average for 1924-25, and the per cent. of tardinesses was much lower than the state average.

We found it necessary this year to keep the seventh and eighth grade pupils at Number Six instead of transporting them to the Centre because the expense would have to be borne entirely by the town. State Aid is not available for this because such a plan would not be feasible throughout the state.

SUPERVISION

The statistical report following shows sixty-four supervisory visits during the school year, an increase of ten over the preceding year. I am trying to give an increasing proportion of my time to visiting the teachers at work and less to office work.

Standard tests have been continued and have been used as a basis for suggesting to the teachers ways of improving their teaching along certain lines. The tests are repeated at intervals of eight or ten weeks so that the progress may be noted and further suggestions given.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

Regular medical inspection was made in November by Dr. Pease and he reports the following results:

We have no record of the number-of treatments during the year because there is no adequate means of following up the reports to the parents, to secure treatment or to know what treatments are given.

FINANCES

The Budget for 1926-27 calls for \$225.00 more than a year ago, due to the increase in high school tuition rates. The legislature of 1925 amended the law making it permissible for a high school to charge up to the average per capita cost in that school, but not above the average per capita cost of all the high schools in the state, for the preceding year. The average cost in the state last year was

\$97.65, so that Appleton Academy has given notice that the tuition rate for next year will be \$95.00 instead of \$70.00. This item is a statutory obligation.

Recommendations

Another change in the law makes it necessary for school districts sending pupils to high schools out of the state to authorize their school boards to make contracts with such high schools, and makes it necessary that a special article for this be placed in the school warrant every year. Unless this is voted at the District Meeting the school board cannot legally pay for tuition in the high schools of Ashby and Townsend in the future.

I know of no extraordinary repairs that will be needed next summer as the buildings are in very good shape and meet ordinary requirements very well. It might be well to provide for better blackboards in one of the rooms because the blackened wallboard now in use is not very satisfactory and will not be durable. I think the allowance for repairs in the budget will cover the cost of equipping one room with durable blackboards.

The usual statistical tables follow this report. Again I wish to express appreciation of the loyalty and support of the teachers, school board, and citizens.
