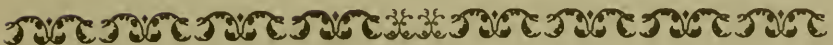

## TOWN WARRANT

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket  
in the (L. S.) county of Rockingham in said State,  
qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in  
said Town on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March,  
next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon  
the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for  
the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be neces-  
sary to defray town charges for the ensuing year  
and make appropriations of the same. That is to  
say; to raise such sums of money as may be neces-  
sary for General Government, including town offi-  
cers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and  
registration and town hall; for the protection of per-  
sons and property including the police department;  
for Health and Sanitation, including the health de-  
partment, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance;  
for Highways and Bridges, including state aid main-  
tenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general ex-  
penses of the department; for Education, including  
the public library; for Charities, including the  
town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the  
decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, in-  
cluding band concerts; for Public Service Enter-  
prise, for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Con-  
struction and Improvements, including state aid and  
town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to

other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said Town.

3. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all taxes except poll taxes, paid on or before August 1st, 1946.

5. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

6. To see if the town will vote to extend the State road, on the Epping Road beginning at the residence of Richard Hilton, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for same. (Petition).

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to build a town garage in rear of Town Hall, this garage to house all highway equipment and police car. Additional land needed for this building to be donated by the Newmarket Industrial Association.

8. To see if the town will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27 A of the revised laws as inserted by chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

9. If the town votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and

eighty-four dollars, (384.00), for the purpose of providing funds for the town's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.

**STATE AUDIT REPORT**

DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING  
STATE TAX COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Newmarket which was made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission in accordance with the vote of the town. This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, and the period from January 1st to September 30th, 1945. The report is made in two sections accordingly and includes Exhibits and Schedules as hereafter listed.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clark, Road Agents, Trustees of Trust Funds, Water Works and Sewer Department.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

Revised Balance Sheet—December 31, 1944:

(Exhibit I)

Changes made in the balance sheet of December 31, 1944, as originally made out, are reflected in the revised balance sheet presented in Exhibit I.

Decrease of Net Debt:

The Net Debt was reduced by \$2,822.50 during the year, from \$10,560.32 on January 31, 1944, to \$7,-

737.82 as of December 31, 1944. This decrease in Net Debt resulted from (1) the retirement of bonds, (2) an excess in the amount of 1944 taxes committed to the collector over the amount indicated in the budget and tax rate calculation, and (3) other minor items. These gains were partially offset by the net budget deficit. The change in the financial condition of the town during the year may therefore be summarized as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations & Expenditures—Estimated & Actual Revenues:  
(Exhibits II & III)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, are presented in Exhibits II and III. As indicated by the budget summary,

a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,270.63, less an excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$705.91, resulted in a net budget deficit amounting to \$564.72.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of September 30, 1945, is indicated in Schedule F.

### TAX ACCOUNTS

The tax warrants of the Collector for the levies of 1945, 1944, 1943 and 1942 were audited. Summarized statements of these accounts as of December 31, 1944 and September 30, 1945, are presented in Schedules A, A-1, A-2, A-4, and G, G-1, G-2 and G-3.

Examination was also made of the tax sale accounts. Summary statements showing the activity in the tax sale accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1944, and the period from January 1 to September 30, 1945, are presented in Schedules A-3 and G-4, respectively.

### TOWN CLERK

The accounts of the Town Clerk were examined and audited. Summaries of these accounts appear in Schedules B and H.

### WATER WORKS & SEWER DEPARTMENT

The records of the Water and Sewer Departments were examined. Summarized statements of receipts and expenditures are included in Schedules C, D, I and J.

### TRUST FUNDS

Securities representing the invested principal and bank books representing the principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined. A summary statement of trust fund principal and income is included in Schedule E.

### TOWN OFFICERS' SURETY BONDS

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be satisfactory as to form and amount. A list of officials required by law to furnish surety bonds, the surety companies and amounts of bonds for the current year are included in Schedule K.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

Orders as checks:

In the majority of towns throughout the state the selectmen's orders are used as checks. The name of the depository bank is printed on the order and all orders are signed by the selectmen and countersigned by the treasurer before they are sent out. This procedure is preferred to the practice of having the treasurer issue separate checks for two reasons:

(1) Time and effort are saved by eliminating the issuing of checks in addition to the orders.

(2) Inasmuch as the selectmen's orders and the treasurer's checks are one and the same, they will always be identical as to number, name of payee and amount.

The adoption of this method is recommended.

## TAX COLLECTOR'S RECORDS

When the town is the purchaser at a tax sale, the usual procedure is as follows:

A town order-check is issued to the tax collector for the total amount of taxes bought by the town, plus interest at 8 per cent from December 1st to date of sale.

The collector should then credit each individual account in the warrant book which is included in the sale for the amount of tax and the amount of interest. The check should then be endorsed payable to the treasurer and the report accompanying this remittance should indicate the proper amount of taxes and interest as well as the year of levy to which it applies. In other words the accounting procedure is exactly the same as it would be in case the taxpayers themselves had paid the taxes and interest. These accounts are therefore closed insofar as the warrant book is concerned.

A second check is then issued to the collector for the total amount of the costs and fees incident to advertising and selling the property to which the collector is entitled as provided by law. This check is retained by the collector. It should include the amount of fees which the collector is required by law to send to the register of deeds.

The collector should then make a record of each individual tax sold in the "record of tax sale's book," indicating therein the name of the taxpayer, description of property, amount of original tax, interest to date of sale, costs and fees incident to advertising and sale, and total amount for which tax was sold. Subsequently all redemptions from sales should be credited to the proper individual ac-

counts. Likewise remittances to the treasurer on account of redemptions should be earmarked as such, with the name of the taxpayer, the year of levy on account of which the tax was sold, the amount of sale and the interest collected after sale, indicated. Thus a report to the treasurer on account of a redemption would be as follows:

#### WATER DEPARTMENT

It is recommended that all bills and invoices be attached to the orders which are retained by the water commissioners. The treasurer's cancelled checks constitute proper receipts and it is therefore unnecessary to have the bills and invoices receipted.

#### CONCLUSION

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits and Schedules is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Newmarket for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## NEWMARKET HIGH SCHOOL

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### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1946

To The School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

I herewith present my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools. As we work for the continued improvement of our schools, we have an opportunity for a much more optimistic outlook than we have had for several years due to war time conditions. Although those conditions are in many respects still with us, people feel much decrease in the mental strain since the fighting ceased. There has been little actual let-up to date on the teacher situation, acquisition of books and supplies and other material things.

The present world and national situation from an educational sense involves an attempt at the creation of an "Educational and Cultural Organization of the United Nations." The present conference convened November 1, 1945 in London to "Formulate the final constitution of the proposed Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

In our own country probably no subject stirs as much emotion as Peacetime Compulsory Military Training; the discussion (Mentioned in the superintendent's report last year) continues to be an important subject in Congress. One of the strong arguments in favor of Peacetime Compulsory Military Training is the prevention and improvement of

physical defects in our young people. Many of those who are opposed to this national legislation feel that more public money should be spent locally to prevent and remedy physical defects during the earlier years of a child's life and thereby eliminate the necessity of greater expense at a more advanced age.

A trend in educational objectives throughout the country today is definitely toward more vocational offerings in high schools—with no lessening of the importance of cultural subjects. It would seem that the programs of studies in our high schools should include one or more vocational courses for boys to compare with home economics and commercial so commonly offered for girls. A course in agriculture or mechanic-arts might cause the percentage of drop-outs between grades eight and twelve to become considerably lower. To substantiate an opinion that school units should increase in size and in curriculum offerings, I quote Dr. John Studebaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education, who has recently said, "In many communities, and particularly in rural communities, the curriculum of the schools has changed but little with the years, remaining bookish, abstract, with little immediate relationship to youth's need to develop technical and vocational competence for today's complicated and specialized occupational world." Calling attention to the fact that the majority of the 26,000 high schools in the United States had fewer than one hundred students each, Dr. Studebaker recommended that further steps be taken to modernize our "archaic organization of school districts and school support. As matters stand today,

further progress in developing the productive skills of the great rank and file of our youth waits upon improvements in school organization."

To more precisely present the present situation in which the schools throughout the nation find themselves, I will quote from an address presented recently by E. N. Scheiberling, National Commander, American Legion. "Education in America is one of the most critical casualties of the war.—Two hundred thousand teachers have left the classrooms since Pearl Harbor. Thousands have entered the armed services.

The rising cost of living has caused thousands to accept higher wages of war industry! Although the schools within N. H. Supervisory Union No. 14 may not have been effected as much as some in more industrial areas, we have certainly felt the impact. No organization could more constructively declare itself than did the Legion when the national Commander recently said, "We have rededicated ourselves to service of education. We will fight to attract teachers to the classrooms with adequate salaries. We will fight to strengthen the curricular of our schools, and marching shoulder to shoulder with constructive programs of the National Education Association and all other forces of education we shall succeed in this great responsibility."

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### NEWMARKET TEACHERS

During the past year there has been an unusually large number of teachers resign to accept more

remunerative positions elsewhere. In the primary school Miss Jennie Young, teacher of the third grade retired after having served diligently in Newmarket for a period of years. From the fourth grade room Miss Irene Morin resigned to enter insurance work in May after having taught for nearly two years. Mrs. Thomas Rooney substituted for the remainder of the year in that grade and Miss Beatrice Brown of Goffstown and Keene Teachers' College was selected to teach the fourth grade for 1945-1946. Miss Eva Sanborn who had taught Grade 5 for the last two years accepted a position in Newport, N. H. and was replaced by Mrs. Beatrice George of Newmarket. Mrs. George had had several years of successful experience in Newmarket and Barrington. Miss Mary Louise Lanoix, teacher of the 6th grade for the past two years resigned that position in June 1945 to take up graduate study at Boston University. Mr. Gordon Willoughby of Manchester served as a substitute teacher of Grade 6 for the fall months and in December, Mrs. Ellen Akers was engaged to complete the year in that grade. Mrs. Akers had had about twelve years of teaching experience in Maine and during the war years had served in a supervising capacity in defense work.

At the High School, Mr. Andrew J. Crooker Jr. was selected in February 1945, to succeed Mr. Austin J. McCaffrey who so satisfactorily served as Headmaster for 5 years, and who was released to accept professional promotion, becoming the acting Superintendent of schools in the Colebrook, N. H. area for the remainder of last school year. Last spring, Mr. McCaffrey was elected Superintendent of Schools in Supervisory Union No. 58 including

the towns of Stratford, Errol, Northumberland, Stark and Wentworth's Location. Mr. Crooker came to Newmarket from Laconia High School where he had taught for 4½ years. His previous experience had been at Pinkerton Academy in Derry, N. H. and Orford, N. H. High School. Lt. John Stowe, a graduate of Bowdoin College and recently discharged from the U S. Navy was elected to teach mathematics and science, replacing Mr. Victor Smith who is now teaching at the Rochester High School. Mr. Walter Foster, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire in 1933 who coached the high school basketball and baseball teams during the past season was engaged to replace Miss Helen Higgins as teacher of social studies and to coach boys athletics. Miss Yvette Harrington who resigned as teacher of Home Economics who is now doing work in dietitics at Yale University was replaced by Miss Hester Bickford of Epsom and a graduate of the University of New Hampshire. Miss Margaret Riley of Lowell and Emmanuel College was engaged to replace Miss Dorothy Droney as teacher of English and Foreign Languages. Miss Riley has had two years of successful experience at Farmington, N. H. High School. Miss Ethel Lovely who resigned as supervisor of Music to accept a similar position at Medfield, Mass. was replaced by Miss Barbara McDevitt of Arlington, Mass. and Lowell Teachers' College, Class of 1945. Miss McDevitt also teaches seventh and eighth grade English.

We have been fortunate during the past year to be able to call on such capable substitute teach-

ers as Mrs. Mildred Rooney, Mrs. Leona Foster and Mrs. Jeannette Crooker.

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## BUILDINGS

During the past year several improvements and needed repairs have been made. The School Board has had pyrofax gas installations in the science laboratory so that experiments can now be conducted much more advantageously than had been possible for many years by the use of alcohol burners. The laboratory tables have been rebuilt into a long table with a sink down the center. This has done away with the frequent expense of repairing old or installing new sink traps in the several units as had been the case. The seventh and eighth grade rooms were repainted during the past summer, new cupboards have been built into the auditorium for music books and equipment and a new door was provided on the closet where athletic equipment can be safely stored. The small windows in the auditorium have been hinged to allow for better ventilation in that room.

In the Stone School, new lights with chain fixtures and twelve-inch globes have replaced the antiquated open bulb fixtures and additional lighting has been provided in the basement of the Primary School.

## NEEDS

The roof on the high school building should be recovered,—the cost has been estimated at \$1750 and would be guaranteed for twenty years. The present covering with some repairs in the past, has served the building since it was built in 1924. The remainder

of the interior of the high school should be painted as soon as finances will permit. Both of the other schools should be repainted inside, new front doors are needed on the Primary School and when possible, more modern school desks and chairs should be provided. Toilet facilities should be improved in both elementary school buildings.

The enrollment in the elementary grades has remained about the same during the past year but some decrease, largely because of lack of interest and improved opportunity to earn good wages has occurred in the high school.

Spanish and manual training were discontinued during the present year because of difficulty in securing teachers for these subjects. By discontinuing of manual training, more instruction in geography and health has been made possible.

The Newmarket Parent-Teacher Association has continued to show its interest in the School children by having sponsored with the cooperation of Miss McDevitt, Supervisor of Music and the several teachers, a Thanksgiving Program by Grade 5 and 6 at the Stone School in November and a Christmas Program by the four primary grades at the Primary School in December.

Outstanding public performances by the high school during the present year has consisted of the senior play, so excellently presented in November and the basketball schedule now underway. In the elementary school, we are stressing phonetics and penmanship as means of improving the other basic subjects.

Plans have been made for administering the usual Standard Achievement tests for the purpose of diagnosing individual pupil weaknesses and determining



grade placements more carefully.

Pupils appear generally to be working up to their capacity and the general attitude and deportment of pupils is improving.

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### WAR SAVINGS

A recent bulletin from the U. S. Treasury Department informs us that, "In 1941 only two and one-half million pupils in 8400 schools were saving through a regular school or class room savings plan. In 1945 more than twenty-five million pupils in more than 200,000 schools were saving regularly and had made a two billion dollar contribution to the nations' war financing needs. "These foregoing facts indicate that the school children in our area have continued to take an active part in this worthy enterprise and as a by-product of their effort to help win the war, they have learned how to save and how they as citizens may contribute to the economic well-being of their country.

The following article appears in a recent issue\* of the Nations Schools Magazine:

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“YEARS BEFORE SIX”

Children grow before they are 6, perhaps even faster than they do after 6, according to the Educational Policies Commissioner of the N. E. A., which has completed a policy statement on “Extending School Services Downward.” The war has shown, more than peacetime experience has ever demonstrated, that children profit from prekindergarten education. The foundations for health, emotional and social development are laid during these early years.

Some children have home advantages which give them a fair start in life. Others do not. It is the responsibility of the nursery school and the kindergarten, supported as public schools for all the children of all the people, to minister to the needs of this latter group.

In conclusion, you are referred to the following reports of the School Nurse, Miss Myrtle Fletcher, and the report of Mr. Crooker, Headmaster of the High School.

Again, I wish to thank all of those connected with and interested in the work of the school for their continued cooperation.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

I came here on November 15, 1945 to act as school nurse for Newmarket and six surrounding towns. It is difficult to start health work so late in the school year for the best results are obtained from physical examinations given through September and October. The nurse is then able to follow up the cases and to organize the needed clinics.

Parents are notified of health defects in their children, and then it is up to the parents to cooperate in correcting them. The nurse cannot visit every home but she does plan to consult the parents of children who have serious or neglected defects.

I shall be glad to call at any home or to have any parent come to the Primary school office with problems concerning pre-school or school children.

I have examined pupils in the Primary schools and the Fifth and Sixth grades only to this date.

There seems to be a great need for a dental clinic in Newmarket. A town the size of this one should have a Dental Clinic. There is also a need for a hot drink or a hot dish to be served the several children who travel to school by bus and carry a cold lunch.

The state is conducting a Diphtheria Toxoid Clinic for pre-school children and children through the sixth grade in Newmarket.

I find the general health and conditions in the Newmarket schools very good at present.

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REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE  
HIGH SCHOOL

January 15, 1946.

The ending of the war lessened to some extent the pressure upon the high school and allowed teachers and pupils to revert the emphasis of their work to more traditional activities. Pupils are prepared for adult life through democratic participation in school activities. Thus, they share in the planning and assume the responsibility of success or failure of their activities.

The extra-curricular life of the school reflects the success of the plan. Our 1945 Yearbook received third honors in the Columbia Press Yearbook Contest. The orchestra and Glee Club received many commendations for their performance at commencement. The Glee Club has entertained several of our local organizations this fall. Baseball has been revived and added to our sports program. Our record of games won and lost is fine and our high type sportsmanship is always in evidence. The fine work of the Service Club and the Student Council must be mentioned as well as the formation of the Science and Dramatics Clubs.

The Senior home economics class assumed the sponsorship of the noon lunch program. The responsibility of planning the menus, preparing and serving the food is theirs. The class deserves commendation for their fine work.

A classroom and an auditorium screen has been purchased which allows greater utilization of our

projector. The benches in the chemistry laboratory have been rebuilt and equipped with running water and gas. The auditorium can be better ventilated since it is now possible to open the lower windows. Three rooms and a corridor were painted as part of a long range refinishing program. During the spring months the boys assisted in landscaping our pine grove. This work has greatly improved the appearance of our grounds.

Spanish for grades IX-X and woodworking for grade 7 and 8 were dropped because of inability to secure teachers. We continued to offer French and Latin. A program of health, fundamentals and general activities was substituted for the shop. An activity period was arranged for grades 7 and 8. A program of music, dramatics and physical education has been planned for these periods. Several of our classes have utilized field trips to great advantage.

Subscriptions to several magazines and a newspaper were purchased to assist pupils in their understanding of current happenings. New grammar texts have been purchased for the English classes.

Our school attendance maintained its usual high percentage. This is a record to be maintained for only through good attendance can we take fullest advantage of our high school program.

The boys of the class of 1945 are all in the armed services, and three of the girls are in college. The rest are employed.

The high school invites parents to visit school and see it in operation. The mutual understanding between parent and teacher make a firmer basis on which to assist your child to secure an education.

## REPORT OF TEACHER OF HOME ECONOMICS

Soon after school opened in the fall, the Home Economics Department of Newmarket High School had an exhibit at Deerfield Fair. The Seventh Grade exhibited some of the simple stitches used in hand sewing, while the Eighth Grade exhibited jelly made at the beginning of the term. Grades Nine and Ten also exhibited articles of sewing and a Food Chart made in school. The "Home" class exhibited their notebooks on the building and planning of a home.

The Exhibits were awarded several blue ribbons and the girls received several cash prizes.

The girls who are taking Home Economics are learning the fundamentals of homemaking. These include sewing and dressmaking, food preparation and menu planning for Grades VII and VIII, also IX and X.

Grades XI and XII, as members of the Home Economics Club, are taking charge of the school lunches. They plan the menus, work out the market orders, keep the accounts, prepare the lunches, and serve them at cost.

In the "Home" class they have watched with interest the building of a house next door to the school from the time it was begun to the time it was ready for occupancy. They have kept close watch of the various stages in its progress from merely a cellar hole to a completed house.

When these girls graduate from High School it is hoped they will feel confident and capable of becoming competent home-makers.

## COMMERCIAL

The Commercial Department was fortunate in obtaining a new Standard Duplicating Machine this year. This is used for duplication of all school work needed by teachers. We have also helped out in making forms for the Fire Department, American Legion Post and P. T. A.

Because of the war, we have had to do the best we could with our old typewriters, which are very well kept up. However, nine new typewriters are expected to be added to our department soon.

The Office Practice class again visited the John Hancock Insurance Company in Boston, giving the students an opportunity to see a large modern office in operation.

In February we attended Court at the Dover Court House. This resulted in a better understanding of law as well as the work required of a court stenographer.

Our students again participated in National and International Contests in Bookkeeping, Typewriting and Shorthand. Through these contests, Newmarket gained recognition with many students winning cash prizes for exceptional work submitted while others were awarded certificates for their achievement. One of our bookkeeping students was awarded first prize in a bookkeeping contest held in December. Thirty-six hundred other students from various states participated in that particular contest. As can easily be seen Newmarket High was not on the bottom.

The Commercial Department plays a most important part in the life of the school and community. With the continuous addition of new equipment, we should

reach a higher and more efficient goal in years to come.
