TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years. Also one Trustee of Trust Funds for two years.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

- 8. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by tax deed.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class Five roads, and how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the care of Orford Common, so called.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (50) dollars for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to build a new bridge over the Jacobs Brook on the road leading to the Peter Miller residence, and how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a Town Forest, and how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for that purpose.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Archer Town road to the Greene place, so called.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the B. H. Niles place, so called, to the Hackett place, so called.
- 20. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Orford:

The second report of the present Superintendent of Schools is herewith submitted and made a part of the report of the School Board of the School District of Orford. It is but one of the many such reports which have been presented to the district for the past several years.

Purpose. This report will place before you the usual statistical and financial records. It will review somewhat the work of the schools as a whole. It will place before you some of the more pressing needs of the schools. It will also suggest ways in which changes may be made at the least cost to the district. Additional statements will be made regarding the work of the schools as related to the larger social and civic responsibilities of the citizens of such communities as Orford.

General. The educational program of the schools has been carried on in about the usual manner. Some changes were made in the teaching staff, due to resignations. The newer teachers are carrying on with reasonable satisfaction. The State Program of Studies is being utilized for the guidance of the teachers. The several subjects, including fundamentals, are receiving such attention as can be given in mixed schools, or schools where several grades must be taught by one teacher. Several minor repairs have been made and others are waiting for such time as it will be possible to provide for them through a limited budget.

Democracy. Continuous effort has been directed toward aiding the young people in the appreciation of the democratic ideals. The American way of life is more truly recognized in our smaller communities than in our larger cities. If we are to make our educational program count more for the development of genuine American citizenship, it becomes increasingly important for beginnings to be made in such schools as ours. It is

therefore desirable that citizens, parents, and pupils become aware of these larger objectives, even though it is necessary to make sure that the boys and girls acquire a reasonable degree of efficiency in the skills and knowledges necessary for life's occupations. If our democratic form of government is to be continued, it is more than ever necessary that our communities both large and small give increasing and continuous support to the educational advancement of the young people. It is only through an educated citizenry that the large movements of society which have to do with governments can be understood, appreciated, or directed.

Equipment. Through the leadership of the director of agriculture in our school, much needed and valuable equipment has been added to the school plant by the boys themselves. The activities of this group, as you know, have included the poultry project, which has in turn made possible the purchase of a large-sized electrical incubator, and later a complete unit for the housing of poultry which will serve for a long period of years as a source of instruction to the boys in attendance upon the school. Such activities as these cannot be expected to provide all of the essentials for successful work in the other classrooms. While a limited number of school seats and desks were provided when the building was erected, and while these have been supplemented more recently, there still remains a need for additional solid chairs for the work of the classroom. No provision has been made for the necessary adjuncts to a teaching situation; that is to say, there are in the high school part of the building but three teachers' desks. There should be several others provided at the earliest possible opportunity so that the teachers themselves may have conveniences for storing their instructional material at the school, making it available to them when it is needed. It may take time to have such acquisitions but they are pointed out at this time so that no one will fail to understand reasons for purchases when these can be made.

The Budget. The budget estimate of last year was perhaps too optimistic. This was due to the belief that the enrollment in the high school would be somewhat increased. Such has not been the case; hence, it becomes necessary to have an article in this year's war-

rant to appropriate a sufficient sum of money to make it possible for the school district to close its year without a deficit. This sum required is a legal requirement under the statute, for the amount of money allotted for the high school was insufficient to meet the needs. By law every community is obligated to provide high school education for every pupil desiring it. It means also that the budget for the year 1940-1941 will require a somewhat larger amount to be raised by taxation than for the year 1939-1940. But the willingness of the citizens of Orford and their attitude toward the whole educational program is such that it is believed that there will be a willing response to meet this need. Should it happen that the State Aid be slightly increased, it will make possible a corresponding reduction in the amount to be raised.

High School. It can be said without reasonable contradiction that the work in the high school is going forward this year with a greater degree of success than has often been the case. The educational work of the school, as well as the behavior of the pupils, is more in keeping with that of similar schools in other communities. Several of the pupils who have graduated from this school have gone to higher institutions and are carrying their work with credit to this institution. This fact should be of encouragement to the parents who contemplate sending their pupils to the Orford High School in that it make available at a conveniently located school such instruction as not only helps boys and girls to carry on more effectively if they proceed no further than this school, but also enables those others who wish and can afford further education to secure their high school work without loss of time or effort and expense in obtaining it.

Some high schools situated as the one at Orford are so organized as to offer six years of training; that is to say, the high school cares for all pupils from the seventh through the twelfth grade. This makes it possible to have a teaching staff which is able to organize its work as to make one teacher responsible for a given subject, like English or mathematics, or sciences; carrying these subjects through all of the six grades. This is a plan which Orford might well consider, as in the end it might

result in two things;—First, as indicated above, a little more specialized and concentrated teaching staff in given fields; and second, it might insure a sufficient number of pupils in the Orford High School to make it unnecessary to appropriate additional amounts for the operation of that school. Wehther or not such a plan can be put into operation in the near future will depend upon the attitude of the citizens, as well as upon the possibilities of providing some few additional facilities as indicated in the previous part of this report. No additional building will be required and no extension of the school plant, but rather a better utilization of what is now available and the provision for additional equipment, such as desks, chairs, and the like.

Another improvement which the high school boys have assisted in making in the building has been a cleaning up and regrading of the basement area beneath the older part of the building. A study of this situation reveals that it might be possible in this area to provide for play space for the boys and girls during the noon hour. As the plan now is only the regular classrooms are available for that purpose.

The basement room could be made by excavation and removing the sand which now forms the floor of the basement and providing a concrete floor, which would make possible the playing of simple games and add greatly to the comfort of the boys and girls, as well as provide them with an outlet for surplus energy which sometimes carries over into misbehavior and results in necessary disciplinary action. A well-rounded education for living in a democracy requires that young people shall not only study together and work together, but that they shall play together. This means that they become more self-controlled and better able to meet the exigencies of life, whatever they may be, than if their activities are limited to classrooms only.

This report would be incomplete without due acknowledgment to many agencies which have helped the boys and girls of Orford to profit by their educational environment. A particular word of appreciation should be extended to Mr. Mann, who has made available for parking certain areas on his property and has made available for the school certain building facilities for the

agricultural group at so small a cost. Due appreciation is extended by pupils and teachers alike to the School Board and citizens for their continued interest and helpfulness. It is believed that such attitudes will in the end make possible many improvements and help much to improve the educationa advantages for our young people.
