

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PETER-BOROUGH, IN THE COUNTY OF HILLSBOROUGH, IN SAID STATE QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, (Polls close at 1 P.M. unless otherwise voted) to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and for the Election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions, also to vote to see if beano shall be legalized in said Town.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, Expenses and Election and Registration, Municipal Court, Town House, Police Department, Fire Department, Civilian Defense, Tree Spraying, Dutch Elm Disease, Health Department, Town Dump, Vitals, for laying out and repairing of the Highways, Street Lighting, Old Age Assistance and Town Poor, Memorial Day, Adams Playground and Pool, Putnam Park, Cemetery, Town Library, Town Water Charge, Monadnock Region, Town Planning Board, and for any other charge arising within the Town.

Article 3. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying the Town Debt and Interest.

Article 4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts to the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or individuals.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to place in a Capital Reserve Fund for the future purchase of equipment for the Highway Department, the Police Department, and the Fire Department as recommended by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Ninety Dollars and Ninety Two Cents, (\$1,090.92), provided the State gives Seven Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Two Dollars and Seventy Seven Cents (\$7,272.77) for the construction of Class IV and V Highways.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to further improve the Skating Rink area this year, and raise and appropriate a sum of money from the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to install the following Street Lights:

- A. Two 20,000 Mercury street lights: Corner of Pine Street and Wilton Road, and corner of 101 By-Pass and Upper Union Street.
- B. Two 20,000 Fluorescent street lights; Intersection of Grove Street and Route 101 By-Pass.
- C. One 1,000 lumen light: Junction of Mercer Avenue and N. H. Route 101 By-Pass.
- D. One 1,000 lumen street light: Near the residence of Kimble Davis.

and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of the Highway Agent, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to take the balance of the money from the "Union Street Sidewalk" Capital Reserve Fund, and place it in the Sidewalk Repair Account.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to be used in co-operation with the State and Federal Funds, for the control of White Pine Blister within the confines of the Town.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Twenty Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of paying a note that was borrowed to complete the purchase of a new American La France Fire Truck, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the so-called Cutler Lot on Vine Street, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a simplified Zoning Ordinance as prepared by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift by Deed that plot of land known as Nubanusit Terrace, south of the Post Office Building, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an official Town Map and amendments thereto as prepared by the Planning Board, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to eliminate the dangerous curve on Sand Hill Road from a point nearly opposite the property of Arthur J. Morin in an easterly direction beyond the residence of Paul C. Cummings, Jr., or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand, Seven Hundred and Seventeen Dollars and Sixty Cents (\$9,717.60) to complete the payments to the State of N. H. for the Town's share of the cost of the new bridge over the Contoocook River at Bridge Street, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a new Dump Truck and Snow Plow, dispose of the old Truck and Plow and pay for the same with money from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Board of Adjustment consisting of Five Members. One member to be appointed for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years and one for five years, and thereafter appointing authority shall appoint one member for a term of five years, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to replace the Stage Backdrops and thirteen window curtains in this Hall, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to acquire and construct a public highway through and around a certain portion of the so-called Robbins development, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will re-appropriate the unexpended balances remaining in the four special road appropriations for 1959, in order to complete the draining, graveling and oiling of these projects in 1960, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to place in the Capital Reserve Fund to defray any legal expenses of the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase or construct additional storage space for the Highway Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow in anticipation of collection of taxes for the current Municipal Year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current Municipal Year from taxes collected during the current Municipal Year.

Article 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

Your budget committee went to work right after town meeting last year and had its first meeting in April with a discussion of the proposed Depot parking lot where the railway station now stands. Two more meetings were held with the Parking Lot Committee, Selectmen, and others. The A. & P. has, of course, since purchased the property, and we trust will soon be building a new supermarket.

We met in September again and various members were assigned to meet with the School Board, Selectmen, Fire and Police Departments in an effort to keep us all well informed on developments that might affect the town financially. As a result, we feel that, although the Town Budget reflects a small increase, practically all of which is in the Highway Department, on the whole it has been held in line, and we should hold the present tax rate or come very close to it. The articles of special interest to the Budget Committee and their comments follow:

Art. 2—Your Budget Committee has gone over all the items in the town budget and feel that we concur in all respects and note that the Selectmen have held all expenses down, with the exception of the Highway Department. We have eight miles of new road to care for, and increased labor costs must be recognized. All the money appropriated last year was not spent and will of course help this year to keep our taxes down. There was considerable discussion about maintenance costs of the Playground, Pool and Putnam Park, and the Budget Committee feels this cost should all be placed under one department. There is an increase in the appropriation for the Police Department, that we feel is well deserved.

All other financial articles in the warrant have the approval of the Budget Committee. There are one or two that we have not gone into because we did not have all the facts.

The Budget Committee has gone over the School budget with the School Board and the Superintendent of Schools and we feel the school budget has been held in line as much as possible. There is a small increase in the budget due to an additional teacher, a necessary addition, and annual raises, which are normal. The School Board after several meetings reduced the original budget by approximately \$3,000. This small increase in the budget, with an additional enrollment of approximately 50 students, the Budget Committee feels is reasonable.

The School Board has several special articles which came under discussion. The Budget Committee felt that it did not want to approve the purchase of bleachers for the gymnasium in the first article. We did not feel the need was there and feel it does not affect the level of education one way or another.

The School Board is also again asking for a folding gate to close off the hallway, and we feel that can be postponed for at least another year. All other articles are approved as desirable and beneficial.

The Budget Committee again wants to thank the Selectmen, the School Board and all other parties for the courtesy and cooperation given us during our studies.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT FOR THE PETERBOROUGH TOWN LIBRARY

To the Trustees of the Peterborough Town Library:

It is a pleasure to present this encouraging progress report concerning the Peterborough Town Library for the year 1959. We assure you the report not only pertains to the mechanical process of stamping books out and checking volumes in, but also it will touch upon a few new and experimental projects

which we have attempted this year.

For the first time in the history of the library, Mr. Charles Maurer piloted his State Bookmobile to Peterborough and deposited approximately 100 books for the additional pleasure and profit of the Peterborough patrons. This collection is changed four or five times during the year. The book selection is good; the service which he extends is excellent, and everyone seems pleased with the arrangement. These additional volumes doubtlessly assisted our circulation count which was 43,186, a

record-breaking high.

During the summer months Mrs. Elizabeth Yates McGreal kindly conducted a Children's Hour at the library once a week. Approximately 130 children attended. Many were from Peterborough; and there were visiting children from Cambridge, Massachusetts; Rochester, New York; and Memphis, Tennessee. With the assistance of Miss Judy Bonnell of Bennington, Mrs. McGreal alternated reading stories aloud and telling them. The stories were old fairy tales and present-day children's books. Occasionally they told some New Hampshire folk lore. The youngsters gave delightful attention; and even though some of the days were very, very hot, the Library Hall was always cool and pleasant. During the last ten minutes of the hour several of the children told their own stories. They seemed to increase in ability as the weeks went on. Mrs. McGreal hopes the result of this first experiment will mean more children reading more books and treating them with respect and the Library with grateful consideration. Our hope is that Mrs. McGreal will find the time to return to us next summer.

This has also been the first year that the members of the Peterborough Historical Society have voted to share with us the income from the Farwell Fund for the purchase of books of an historical nature. The Farwell Fund was left to the Peterborough Historical Society in 1928 for the purchase of materials for the Society's library. It was felt by the Executive Committee of the Society that the benefits would be greater if further

purchases made available by this Fund were turned over to the Town Library. For this gift and the confidence which the Society has in the library we are indeed grateful.

The ladies of the Cheney-Armstrong Unit No. 5, American Legion Auxiliary, have continued their time-honored custom of placing one volume each month upon the shelves of the library. Miss Esther Jackson, Miss Penelope Noyes, Reverend David Parke, Mrs. Louise Brown have also provided us with valuable volumes. Our largest inheritance came from the late Professor Arthur L. Townsend of Dublin, N. H., and Belmont, Mass. His complete library of almost 1,000 books was left to the Peterborough Town Library. Through gifts and fines we were also able to purchase the 1959 Encyclopedia Americana, listed at \$299.50.

During the month of January, 1960, Mrs. A. Erland Goyette resigned as a trustee of the library in order to devote more of her time to the Peterborough Planning Board. Mrs. Goyette has served as a trustee 23 years, and has contributed much to the improvement of the library. Mrs. Maurice M. Blodgett has been appointed by the selectmen to fill the vacancy.

As a Memorial Day remembrance the trustees and librarian placed floral tributes upon the grave of Mr. Eben W. Jones, a former selectman and trustee of the library for 50 years. We hope this gesture will become a custom as the years go on; incidentally, this gesture was instigated by Mrs. Vernon Harris. Funds provided by Mr. Jones' will erected and maintain the Eben Jones' Wing of the library.

The trustees and librarian arranged a series of art classes for boys and girls to be held Saturdays at the Peterborough Library Hall. Miss Janet Appleton of Dublin, an extremely competent teacher, instructed groups in watercolor painting and in a variety of creative media. Miss Appleton has taught art classes in public and private schools in Springfield, Mass., and for the past six years has been Curator of Children's work at the George Walter Vincent Smith Art Museum in Springfield, teaching many classes of all ages. As these classes were not too well at-

tended at the library, it is rather doubtful if they will continue

into 1960.

The adult reading room has been enriched with colorful oil paintings lent by Mr. Sidney Willis of Bennington, one of America's younger artists, concentrating upon pure representational painting. Miss Mildred Howells, daughter of William D. Howells has also helped to complete the reading room with the gift of her father's desk and chair. He used the desk and chair in his office when he was assistant editor of the Atlantic Monthly in 1866, and editor in chief in 1872. Mr. Howells will long be remembered as a leader of the realistic school of writing, as his novels usually portrayed the average everyday American life of average American people.

To complete the furnishing of the Peterborough Library Hall, we have purchased 50 folding chairs, an impressive directors' table, and 8 Chippendale directors' chairs for the Trustees' Room. We have also installed folding doors to separate the

kitchen from the hall proper.

Rules and regulations pertaining to the use of the Hall have been formulated by the trustees of the library, and will be included with this report for the convenience of the public. All requests for the use of the Hall will be made through the Librarian's Office.

According to the trustees, the Peterborough Library Hall was erected and furnished in order to enlarge the cultural and literary activities of the Peterborough Town Library. The facilities of the Hall are to be used for the following purposes: Reading groups, Story hours, Educational movies or slides, Lectures of an educational nature, Fine Art exhibits and discussions, Music appreciation, Discussion groups, Creative craft exhibits and discussions, Special committee meetings for the town or for groups, but **not** regular meetings of either.

Meetings of any other nature than the above may be held

with the consent of the Library Trustees.

All groups must be supervised. No admission fees are to be charged. Light refreshments may be served. Each group is to supervise its own clean-up project. A tariff of \$5.00 will be charged to cover lights, heat for any meeting that extends

beyond 8:00 P. M., or commences after 8:00 P. M.

Library hours: Monday, 12 to 8; Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, 2 to 8. For the convenience of our patrons, books may be renewed via telephone. Patrons may withdraw as many books within reason as they would like, and the reading public and visitors are encouraged to take advantage of the various cultural and literary facilities of the library.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple—

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
 - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
 - 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home—Use your town dump and save your-self much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

REPORT OF ADAMS PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE

The Peterborough Playground is now operating on practically a year-round basis, including, in addition to the summer activities at the pool and playground, a winter program of skating under the the supervision of the Playground Committee.

During the summer vacation months, the pool and play-ground areas were open for a period of nine weeks under very capable supervision. Mr. Robert Murray, of Keene Teachers College, managed the summer program and was ably assisted at the pool by Miss Sarah Bays, Miss Mary O'Connor and Miss Jane Stewart. Miss Carol Brassard, in addition to the teaching of handicrafts to the younger children, furnished instruction in tennis, elementary and advanced games and camping. Mr. Clayton Dow carried on a program of playground activities for the older boys and assisted Mr. Harold Haywood, who was in charge of maintenance.

The summer program continued its popular appeal to the youngsters of the community providing swimming and craft instruction five mornings per week, with games and free swimming for all during the afternoons and Saturdays.

The completion of the tennis courts greatly augmented the summer program and their hard surfaces have provided a safe and extended skating area for our young people. Mr. Richard Trufant is supervising the skating area during the current season.

Capital improvements made during the year include the backstops for the tennis courts, new paint on the pool and bathhouse, flood lights for the skating area, and a new power mower.

Anticipated major capital expenditures during the coming year include new caulking for the sidewalls of the pool, new filter charges for the filtering system, and the reshingling of the bathhouse.

It is the feeling of the committee members that an excellent program has been carried on during the past year and they wish to extend their thanks to the Staff, the Town Officers and to the citizens of Peterborough, all of whom assisted them in making it possible.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

We regret that through resignation, we have lost three outstanding members of our Board, Karl B. Musser, Ernest G. Piggott and Forrest C. Mercer. They have given the Town many hours of service on the many problems that have come before our Board.

We welcome the newly appointed members to our Board, Kenneth A. Brighton, Paul C. Cummings, Jr. and Clyde H. Hopkins, and we know they will give all the time and energy necessary to the work of the Planning Board.

The Planning Board has been charged with the duty of making recommendations for the improvement, construction and reconstruction of our streets and roads.

It was impossible for the Highway Department to complete their road program in 1959. We recommend the completion of Webb Road, Maple Hill Acres, Vine Street and Lobacki's Drive this summer from money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Class V Highway, Sand Hill Road was not completed. We recommend its completion, including making a more gradual curve from nearly opposite the properties of Arthur J. Morin and Paul C. Cummings, Jr.

The accelerated program of the Class V highway is now completed; we recommend continuation of Class V Program for 1960-1961.

A report made by Camp, Dresser & McKee on the Water Pollution of our rivers and streams is now in the hands of the Selectmen. We believe, when this report is made public, it will be the duty of the Planning Board to assist in every way possible to bring forth a plan that the Town would be able to accept.

At the Annual Meeting of 1958, land subdivision authority was granted to the Planning Board. After a Public Hearing, the land subdivision regulations were adopted June 27, 1958. The first land subdivision project to be approved was that of Edward Lobacki. The project was approved as to the size of the lots. We congratulate Edward Lobacki for his excellent cooperation. There are several more land subdivision projects under consideration at the present time and approval is expected this year.

Much pressure was brought upon your Planning Board to present some form of a simplified zoning ordinance at this Annual Town Meeting. We undertook a sampling of public opinion by the use of a post card poll. 1040 post cards were printed, 984 were mailed out and 491 were returned. These

cards were mailed to registered voters. The last official check list count was 1609. We received 491 cards, totaling 890 voting. 506 voted yes and 384 voted no, making a majority of 122 in favor. The Planning Board has made a study and believe we have a simplified zoning ordinance. We proposed 3 hearings, February 9, February 16, and March 8, 1960. The final hearing will be conducted at Town Meeting. It is expected that the vote on the Ordinance will come around 3:00 P. M. A yes and no vote will be requested.

1959 REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

This year's report is one of continuing progress within the limits of the funds available annually for this work from the Albert W. Noone Trust Fund.

Following, in part, the plans formulated by G. Leslie Lynch, a professional planner on the staff of the National Recreation Association, the multi-purpose area, which in the winter serves as a skating rink was measured and laid out for two tennis courts. Nets were installed for both courts and wire backstops were constructed at each end of the area, the latter item being installed by the Gate City Fence Co. of Nashua, N. H. The tennis courts proved very popular last summer and received a good deal of use from both children and adults.

Projects under consideration for this coming year include completing the construction of wire fencing on the sides of the present area, additional landscaping, building a warming hut for the skating area and improving the present parking area.

REPORT ON SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

In compliance with the terms of our agreement with the Town of Peterborough, dated September 30, 1958, we have made an engineering investigation and have developed an overall plan for a sanitary sewerage and sewage-disposal system for the populated areas of Peterborough.

The results of our studies of an overall plan and recommended methods of financing the proposed system are described in detail in our report and are summarized below:

Summary

The current population of the Town of Peterborough is approximately 2700, and the population of the Town in the year 2000 may be expected to be about 4000. Of this future population of 4000, we estimate about 3300 persons will be living in areas served by the present water supply system and tributary to the proposed sewerage system. The remaining future population of about 700 may be expected to include summer residents and other persons living beyond the limits of the proposed sewerage system in areas where waste disposal can be handled on an individual basis.

We therefore propose a sewerage and sewage-disposal system of capacity to serve about 3300 persons (and industrial wastes) and to be adequate until about the year 2000. This proposed system will drain entirely by gravity to the treatment works site, where it will be necessary to pump the sewage into the treatment works.

There are presently three existing sewers in Peterborough. Two of these sewers serve the business district and discharge into the Contoocook River. The third is on Elm Street and enters Nubanusit Brook. Many other houses and industries along the banks of Nubanusit Brook and the Contoocook River individually discharge sewage directly into these streams. It is estimated that the sewage from about 1000 people is discharged directly into Nubanusit Brook and the Contoocook River in Peterborough.

We have studied alternate schemes of sewage treatment and alternate sites for the treatment works as described in detail in the body of the report. We recommend the construction of sewage stabilization ponds at a location along the Contoocook River north of North Village with an initial area of 22 acres and future expansion to a total of 38 acres. The location recommended for the treatment works is remote from the center of town and results in a larger area being served than would be possible at the alternate locations studied. Sewage stabilization ponds are shallow ponds (3 to 5 feet in depth) in which the sewage is "stabilized" by the action of micro-organisms growing in the

ponds. Such ponds provide a high degree of sewage treatment and are simple to operate and maintain because mechanical equipment is held to a minimum. The comparatively long intercepting sewer required to reach the site of the proposed sewage stabilization ponds results in an initial construction cost that is somewhat higher than the other alternate schemes studied. However, the ultimate cost of the recommended sewage stabilization pond scheme is the most economical and serves the largest area by gravity.

The initial construction program recommended is designed to collect the sanitary sewage presently being discharged into the Contoocook River and Nubanusit Brook and conduct it to the treatment works for disposal. The proposed initial construction program is shown by heavy solid lines on the appended map, and the estimated construction cost is \$1,109,580. Operation and maintenance costs are estimated at \$10,000 yearly.

It is recognized that the start of construction of the proposed initial program may depend to some extent on the time of classification of the receiving waters by the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission and the Legislature. However, considering the present availability of federal funds, which may not be available in the future and the fact that construction costs have been increasing at an average rate of about 5% per year, we recommend that the Town give consideration to starting this project in the relatively near future. In any event, we recommend that the proposed sewage treatment works site be acquired promptly to insure its availability.

We wish to acknowledge with thanks the cooperation and assistance of the Board of Selectmen; the Town Bookkeeper, Mrs. Florence E. Connell; and the General Manager of the Noone Division of F. C. Huyck & Sons Mills, Mr. Marshall P. Wilder. We also acknowledge with appreciation the advice and assistance of the New Hampshire Water Polution Commission, and are grateful for the cooperation given us by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

Camp, Dresser & McKee By Joseph C. Lawler The Board of Selectmen wish to acknowledge with appreciation the above "Report on Sewerage and Sewage Disposal" prepared for the Town by Camp, Dresser & McKee, Consulting Engineers of Boston, Massachusetts.

The best guess as to when the Contoocook River will be classified is reported to be five years. Your Board of Selectmen are going to recommend to the Town that we start building up a Reserve Fund, starting in 1961, to help finance the Town's share of the initial cost of trunk lines and a lagoon to get the sewerage out of the rivers.

D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK

Record of the Proceedings:

At a meeting of the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Peterborough qualified to vote in District affairs, holden at the Town House in said District on Tuesday the 10th day of March, 1959, at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon.

The Moderator, Maurice M. Blodgett, presided and called the meeting to order, and proceeded with the business as follows: After the reading of the Warrant, a motion was presented by Mrs. Everett Clement that the polls of the Peterborough School District close at 1:00 P. M., and the District take up articles 5 through 16 at the business meeting scheduled for 7:00 o'clock in the evening.

At seven o'clock, the Moderator called the meeting to order, and under Article 5, the following motion, presented by the School Board, was passed without any discussion.

Moved: That the salaries of the District Officers for the ensuing year be as follows: each school board member \$50.00, the treasurer \$75.00, clerk \$10.00, Moderator \$10.00, each ballot clerk \$5.00.

Article 6: Motion was made and passed that the reports be accepted as printed, and placed on file with the Clerk. The following motions were presented by the School Board under Article 7, and passed without discussion:

Moved: That the Central School Building Committee be continued.

Moved: That the District petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

Under Article 8: the following motion was presented by the

School Board: moved that the school district raise and appropriate \$315,186.00 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. Mr. Robert Stewart, Chairman of the School Board, explained the various items in the budget, showing the reasons for increase in the amounts over last year's budget. No discussion and the motion passed.

Under Article 9, the following motion was presented by the School Board: I move that the district receive the sum of \$1,360.00 from the Nichols Fund and such amount be appropriated for current expenses of the school year 1958-59. Mrs. Margaret Clement of the School Board explained that this amount was included in last year's budget, but because it was not included in the Warrant of last year, it could not be obtained, and this article was to make the amount available for current expenses. Motion passed.

Under Article 10, the following motion was presented by the School Board: I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,095.00 as a deficiency appropriation to be made available for current expenses prior to June 30, 1959. Mrs. Clement explained that this Article was necessary to balance the budget because expected Tuition Funds had not materialized and the motion passed.

Article 11, by the School Board: I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to erect a fence on the north side of the school ball field. After Mr. Kenneth Whiton explained the need of the fence, the motion passed without discussion.

Under Article 12, the following motion was presented by the School Board: I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for summer maintenance of the school ball field. Mr. Whiton explained that the ball field was in need of repairs and to protect the investment made by the Town, these repairs should be made. Motion passed.

Under Article 13, the following motion presented by the School Board was passed without discussion: I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purchase and installation of an extension of the culvert at the Consolidated School.

Under Article 14, the School Board presented the following motion: I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum

of \$200.00 for supervision of the gymnasium facilities for local youth groups at out-of-school hours. After Mrs. Clement explained that there were many requests for use of the gym at out-of-school hours, supervision was necessary. The motion passed.

Under Article 15, the following motion presented by the Board was passed, this motion to coincide with action taken by the Town at their meeting on widening and extending Vine St.:

Moved: that the School Board convey to the Town of Peterborough those portions of the Central School lot on Vine Street bounded and described as follows:

- 1. That portion situate north of a line drawn parallel to and 22 feet south of the north boundary thereof.
- 2. That portion situate east of a line drawn parallel to and 25 feet west of the east boundary thereof.
- 3. That portion situate south of a line drawn parallel to and 40 feet north of the south boundary thereof.
- 4. That portion situate west of a line drawn parallel to and 40 feet east of the west boundary thereof.
- 5. Such additional land at the southeastern and southwestern corners of the land remaining after conveyance of the portions above described as is situate south of the locus of a circle with a radius of 20 feet drawn from the intersection of lines parallel to and 20 feet from the eastern and southern, and the western and southern lines of the lot.

Mrs. Eckfeldt spoke about protection for children when the new road was made and hoped that necessary signs, etc. would be provided.

The following motion was presented by the School Board under Article 16: I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district such sums of monies as may be made available under the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 83-864 (for purposes outlined under Titles III, V, and VIII thereof), and that the district appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for said purpose(s), \$1,000.00 of which amount shall be raised as an assessment by the Town, and a like amount to be received from federal sources.

Mr. Stewart introduced the new Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Lewis F. Foote, and he explained the purpose of the motion, and without any further discussion, the motion was passed.

After a motion by Mr. Keenan, a rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Robert Stewart for his period of outstanding service as a member of our School Board.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Peterborough qualified to vote in the district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the 8th day of March, 1960, at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as a deficiency appropriation to be made available prior to June 30, 1960, such deficiency arising from loss of anticipated income for the school year 1959-60.

- 10. To see what sum the district will raise and appropriate for the purposes outlined under Titles III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864, and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the district, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.
- 11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of bleacher units for the auditorium-gymnasium.
- 12. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the installation of a gymdivider in the gymnasium.
- 13. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the installation of a folding gate at the entrance to the corridor of the elementary wing.

School opened in September, 1959, with the following new staff members: Mrs. Nancy T. Burbank, Grade 2: Charles H. Coe, Social Studies and General Business; Charles E. Ferguson, Guidance Counselor; Francis C. Gingras, Math. & Science, Grade 8: Miss Donna McKee, Girls' Physical Education; Robert C. McQuillen, Shop, Grade 7-12 and General Science; Mrs. Dorothea M. Somero, Grade 1; Mrs. Norma W. Verhey, Grade 5; and Mr. William Yeo, Biology. Mr. Sherburne Buckler replaced Mr. Lester Aldrich as principal of Grades 1-12.

B. School Program

1. Report of the Elementary School Principal

This fall we were very happy to welcome to our staff three new teachers. Mrs. Nancy Burbank, from Ayer, Massachusetts, is teaching one division of our second grade. Mrs. Norma Verhey has taken over one section of grade five. She has taught most recently at the Wheelock School, a training school for Keene Teachers' College. Our third new member, Mrs. Dorothea Somero, is teaching our new division of first grade. Mrs. Somero taught in New Ipswich fifteen years before coming to our school.

The increased enrollment and the need for smaller classes in the first grade caused your school board to employ an additional teacher and to completely equip a third first-grade room. Three divisions have made it possible to provide the first grade students with more individual instruction and, therefore, the children should have a better foundation in the early years of their school careers Just as in the building of a house, the foundation must be laid well if the structure is to remain firm

There has been concern and study this year about the possibility of having an "ungraded primary unit" in our school. This means children would be grouped according to their ability to read in grades two and three and each child would progress at his own rate of speed. No definite decision has been made but parents will be kept informed if the plan is adopted. This type of program has proven successful in other communities because it tends to meet the needs of larger groups of children.

A year ago the voters appropriated funds to match federal appropriation for school science programs. Our funds have been used to purchase new apparatus and equipment which is aimed to keep our children abreast of the times and should do much to strengthen our science curriculum. The federal aid program enables us to purchase materials and equipment that could not otherwise be obtained in science, mathematics, and foreign languages.

Your elementary teachers have spent many hours at weekly meetings developing a teacher's guide and handbook which will give greater unity to our language arts program. This guide will be of great help to the present teaching staff and particularly to new teachers as they enter our system.

Mrs. Winnifred Seaver, of the high school staff, is again teaching oral French to some of our elementary students. The class is voluntary and meets three afternoons a week at the close of school. We believe that such a program has merit, but we hesitate to recommend its expansion until a second language teacher is available.

During the year we have arranged a few extra outside activities for the students including assemblies, basketball games, and a winter carnival. Plans are in the making for an elementary spring musical.

Several parents have shown an interest in a public kindergarten in our school. It has been my feeling that this would be very beneficial and a big step forward in your educational system. At the present time some children are coming into school with a kindergarten background and others without. This creates a problem in that some children have a better start than others. I have checked with comparable school systems in New Hampshire and find that many have kindergartens. I mention this for your consideration and evaluation because at some time in the near future I feel you will want a public kindergarten in Peterborough.

In closing I would like to thank you, the people of Peterborough, for your support of the school during the past year. We hope you will visit your school.

2. Report of the High School Principal

It is an honor to submit to you my first annual report as principal of Peterborough Consolidated School. The short period of two months that I have been here limits the scope of my report, but I would like to delineate some of my impressions and to make a few suggestions.

One of my first impressions was of the justifiable pride and interest of the townspeople in their school and in their excellent faculty. Both the fine school plant and cooperative staff have made my duties most pleasant.

The duty of the secondary school is to provide experiences and sources of information that will lead to the fullest development of students as individuals, both in their adolescent years and in adult life. Before this can be accomplished, those in charge of the institution must determine as accurately as possible the present and possible future needs of students. It is our belief that we should provide an education for those who plan to enter business and industry after high school as well as prepare students for post-secondary education.

There is a need for improvement in two areas in our school: the commercial curriculum and the school library.

At the present time we offer Typing I, Shorthand I, Bookkeeping I and Office Practice for those interested in the Commercial

Course In order for a pupil to be well prepared for the business world or business college, a second year of typing and a second year of stenography should be available. It is the opinion of many people associated with business education, that a half year of Business Law and a half year of Selling should be a part of the Commercial Curriculum. A half-year course in Personal Typing should be available to all non-commercial students. This personal typing course should be presented during the second year of high school and would be a worthwhile addition to our elective courses. To offer the proper commercial program we would need to think of adding some additional teaching help in years to come as well as a relocation of the commercial department into a bigger area.

A need for improved library facilities has been noted in last year's report. I am particularly pleased that each student spends an average of one period a day in our school library and receives instruction in how to study. Our very capable English Department has launched a long range library program and has submitted a list of books that will add to the mental development of our students. The increase in the number of volumes in the school library should be a foremost goal.

The self-evaluation of the Curriculum and Educational Program of Peterborough Consolidated School will be finished this school year, and the Committee of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools will evaluate our School on November 1st, 2nd and 3rd in 1960. The New England Association is the accrediting agency in this area and its approval is necessary if our graduates are to enjoy privileges of entrance to member colleges. This evaluation also helps us to improve the educational offerings of our school.

In the spring of 1959 an accelerated program in Algebra I was started for our advanced eighth grade students. Shortly after the middle of this year, this same group will have finished Algebra I and will begin Algebra II. Beginning in September of this year many of our capable freshmen were allowed to elect Biology for the first time. Because of these advanced programs in mathematics and science, students will be able to work at their greatest academic capacity and do further advanced study in the above mentioned fields.

We are proud, at this time, to recognize those individuals who have been chosen for exceptional honors during this past year. The following members of the Class of 1959 were honored with substantial scholarships: Carol Moore, Cornell University, and Randall Lowe, University of Michigan. Richard Craig and William Buckler, both of the Class of 1960, were among one hundred scholars selected for the Advanced Study Program at the summer session of St. Paul's School in Concord. Both of these students completed an accelerated year's program in Concepts of Mathematics in six weeks.

A variety of co-curriculum activities has been made available to the students to provide a well-rounded program. Our Student Council is an active member of the Monadnock Student Council Association. This fall our Council was host to the student leaders and their advisors from surrounding communities. The sharing of mutual problems and experiences in solving them is a valued educational experience. Our Glee Club was again well represented in the All-State Chorus at Portsmouth last year. Our baseball and soccer teams were co-champions in the Monadnock League and our soccer team qualified for the N. H. I. A. A. State Tournament. Our Transcript news groups continue to supply the community with complete news reports of our school. They are to be congratulated for their regularity and thoroughness.

I wish to extend my thanks to the people of Peterborough for their warm welcome to the community and to everyone who has contributed to the progress of our school.

3. Report of the Supervisory Staff

As evidenced by the above reports of the school principals, your teaching staff has been conscientiously wrestling with such problems as the following quotation implies, "The nation's welfare," and, may I add, that of the pupils, "demands that all children develop their abilities to the fullest. The public schools are required, therefore, to educate children who present a wide range of intelligence, great differences in background, diverse interests and talents, and varying states of physical and mental health." This is the challenge facing not only your local staff, but teachers, school board members, and lay people all over the country.

We feel that progress has been made in our schools as manifested by the accelerated program in our junior and senior high school, whereby the pupils are provided an opportunity to move at a rate dictated by their individual abilities and interests.

Considerable attention is now being given to the problem of ability grouping at the elementary level. Obviously with only two teachers per grade, certain limitations are being experienced however, even with these limitations, we feel that grouping will make for more effective teaching.

During the past few months we have been experimenting with television in the fields of elementary science and social studies. To us, educational television is not an entertaining adjunct to learning. If and when offerings are available which definitely supplement the areas of instruction under considera-

tion, then television becomes a useful and desirable tool. It is within this framework that we subscribe to the use of T.V.

Much thought is being given by parents and teachers to a more effective program in the modern language field. Certain languages, in most cases French, are being made a definite part of many elementary school curricula.

Some school people envision numerous problems by introducing such instruction in the primary grades,—the amount of time per week, the absorbing of new pupils into the classes, the combining of these children with others at the high school level,—these questions and many more are confusing the issue. It is our thinking that certain goals need not be set and strictly adhered to, but that there should be sufficient flexibility to develop an interest in the child of a language other than his own, with the anticipation that such an interest in the oral language will motiviate his learning in the secondary school language program.

Our comments here may justly be challenged. We welcome the reactions of the parents and friends of our pupils in clearing our thinking and solving our mutual problems.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

A. Repairs

The custodial staff at the Peterborough Consolidated School had a busy summer. Not only was the customary cleaning and maintenance program carried through, but many other projects of significant proportions were also completed. To enumerate a few: transfer of radiators to cool areas, removal of office partition with the necessary transfer of equipment, removal of partition in home economics area and redecoration of the area, installation and relocation of doors, alterations in lunch area and installation of a walk-in refrigerator.

In order to secure more favorable rates and to meet the recommendations of several engineers representing the insurance companies, as well as the recommendations of the State Fire Marshal's Office, the custodians relocated extinguishers, insulated certain doors, and corrected other defects in our plant. In addition to the above, the school board authorized the construction of smoke doors at the south end of the first floor in the high school area, as well as the improvement of the wiring in the two school shops.

The board also authorized the extension of the public address system to the high school rooms. At the same time the wiring for the classroom bells was included into the new conduit

The custodians also shingled the east end of the old gymnasium, and the shop roof was also subject to minor repairs.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Peterborough School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1958 and June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$24,320.26 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C&D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$57.52, plus a revenue surplus of \$1,184.19, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$1,241.71.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

It is noted that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of the School District decreased from \$2,611.30 to \$1,931.56, as indicated herewith:

School Tax Account:

It is noted that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, the School District received from the Town the total amount of the 1958-59 school tax of \$220,376.94. In addition to this an advance payment on the 1959-60 school tax in the amount of \$1,095.00 was made by the Town to the District. This represented a deficiency appropriation of like amount which was made at the 1959 annual School District meeting on account of an anticipated revenue deficit.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

A. HEALTH

To the Inhabitants and Taxpayers of the Town of Peterborough:

Ten.....nine....eight.....two.....one. The "count down" for a rocket take-off has become part of the daily language of our rocket scientists and workers in the field of guided missiles. Why should this "count down" language become any more fixed as a part of our daily lives than the health habits we daily set for the children?

As with the rocket personnel, training must start at the beginning if they are to fully understand their purpose in the plan. So it is with adult health...it, too, must start at the beginning. No child is too young to start training in good health habits and examples. Health habits, as with many things, are learned, established, and passed on to others; thus it behooves us as parents and educators to create a lasting impression. The examples that we set, along with the knowledge that we give to the children of today will be passed on as today's children become tomorrow's adults and parents. Thus I strongly feel that we, as adults, have assumed a great role in life, one that is more far reaching than we realize. Our every move is imitated by some child and even one word, as advice or otherwise, causes great decisions for many children; so just think how our health habits are copied. It has occurred to me numerous times the many roles parents play during their lifetimes. Nutritionist, chef, doctor, nurse, psychologist, tailor, teacher, pal, referee, etc. etc. to mention a few. May I ask how many of us have had a formal education in all of these fields? Yet, as parents, we are expected to play all of these roles, and the way that these roles are played will help produce the health habits of the nation.

In practicing health education many methods are used and among them are the yearly screening tests. During the school year 1958-59 the following health services were conducted.

No matter which definition of Health you may choose it can very nicely be summed up by Jesse Williams' definition "the quality of life that renders the individual fit to live most and to serve best."

"Gold that buys health can never be ill spent."
