To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pittsburg, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee, to set the date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a skating rink and raise money for same.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Town Water, and raise money for same.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$500 to repair the River Road bridge.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to repair the Town Library.
- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to tearing down and rebuilding the Town sheds and raise money for same.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to remodeling the Town Hall, to make it more suitable for School activities, and raise money for same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers, not listed under Article 13.
- 13. To bring your ballots for the election of one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Poor, one Library Trustee.

Polls shall be opened at 10 A. M. and not closed before 6 P. M.

To the Citizens of Pittsburg:

During the year 1957, four Salk Vaccine Clinics were held in Colebrook, sponsored by the N. H. State Department of Health, in cooperation with the local School Nurse, and the Supt. of Schools. 336 children from Pittsburg attended these clinics, 77 received first injections, 134 received second injections, and 125 received third injections. In June 1958 we will hold the last clinic in Colebrook, and I hope any who have not taken advantage of this opportunity to date, will do so at this time.

In the Spring of 1957, Triple Toxoid Clinics for the Immunization of Whooping Cough, Diptheria and Tetanus, were held, and the following number of children completed their series of 3 injections:

Preschool 7, School 6, and Boosters were given to 4 children. This report shows that no infants received injections at these clinics. In the Spring of 1958 we will again hold these clinics and I hope more people will attempt to take advantage of them.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Citizens of Pittsburg, and at this time I would like to thank them for their cooperation, and at any time I hope they will feel free to call on me if I can be of any service to them.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 15th day of March, 1958, at 10 o'clock in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with such other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District of Pittsburg.

Foreword

By the successful launching of satellites, Russia may well have done us a good turn, much as we hate to admit to her "beating us to the gun" in the accomplishment of this technological feat. The ensuing grave concern for our survival for very long, epitomized by the intensity of the current debate on the role of science in our national life, may prove to be most beneficial in spotlighting what are believed to be the shortcomings in our educational system. Certainly there has been a marked upsurge in the demands from both educators and laymen alike that more attention be given to the education of the gifted, and that the science program be intensified. Parallel to these demands, although perhaps not quite as insistent, has been the call for a redefinition of what the schools are expected to do, and to recognize the fact that they cannot be all things to all men.

It is noted, however, that in all that has been said and written on the urgent need for more attention to quality, more emphasis upon science, and for a more confined curriculum, in no instance has there been a suggestion that the educational system, which has brought America to where she is today, be abandoned. Criticism has not been of that long-standing dream of our society of universal education at least through high school. Rather it has had to do with the fulfilling of this commitment effectively. And as we begin to steady down a bit in our thinking and "once more get our feet on the ground" in making our judgments, we may find that we are not as badly off as during the past few months we may have been led to believe.

With a little time now taken out for meditation, it may be easier for us to see the position we hold in the overall educational achievements in this day and age. When this prime requisite is once known, it will be possible to proceed to the second step in the solution of our problem, the determination of goals. After

these are finally decided upon, the selection of the subject matter believed essential for their attainment, and the most effective way of teaching it, will logically follow. Where science takes us, how much the humanities try to control it, what is done with the talented, how successful we are in fostering in both parents and children a fuller appreciation of the values of intellectual endeavor, the extent to which pupils are made to work harder, the degree to which they work up to their capacities, provision for individual differences, establishment of definite objectives, subjects retained in the programs of studies to attain these objectives, depth we are willing to dig into these subjects, extent to which their content is brought to life, extra-curricular and extra-class activities we are induced to drop, and what is done to improve the status of teachers will all be decided upon from the standpoint of one or more of these categories. And the signs of the times are, if what is being done about defense is indicative of America's way of doing things, that what improvement is made in the overall educational program of our schools will be directly proportional to how much we really want and are willing to pay for it.

Teachers

The school district is extremely fortunate, with the teacher shortage continuing to become more serious each successive year, to have, with the exception of one, all teachers return to work with us. Miss Alice L. Pillsbury, the new teacher employed to fil the vacancy in Home Economics, completed her undergraduate work at Keene Teachers College last June.

In Grades 7-12 the teachers and the respective subjects taught are, Principal Dana C. Moore—Mathematics, Physics; Mrs. Helen Barclay—English, French; Miss Alice L. Pillsbury—Home Economics, General Science; Raymond C. Smith—Social Studies, Biology, Athletics; Raymond P. Stuart, Shop, Dramatics; Mrs. May F. Thibeault—English, Mathematics, Social Studies, typewriting. Teachers in the first six grades and respective grades taught are, Mrs. Doris G. Fissette 5-6, Mrs. Junie S. Aldrich 3-4, and Mrs. Eva S. Scott 1-2.

School Nurse—Health

With the administration of polio immunizations, complete physical examinations given every four years after entering school, the conducting of preschool and X-ray clinics, special attention and help given individual cases where needed, plus constant check-ups in height, weight, hearing and eyesight, and continuous supervision of the overall health of our pupils, the importance of all that is done by our school nurse in contributing to what is accomplished in our schools is readily seen.

The need for a dental clinic, however, is more urgent each successive year, and unless something can be done to provide this vitally important health service, it is feared that the lack of it will become increasingly evident as time goes on. It is believed, also, serious consideration should be given to the possibility of administering the customary immunizations against smallpox, tetanus, and diphtheria at the preschool clinics.

Enrollment and Attendance

For the fifth successive year the total enrollment is larger than it was the previous year. A comparison of the number of pupils enrolled in Grades 1-8 and 9-12 for this five year period, beginning with the current year, shows successive counts of 1-2 and 67, 91 and 61, 87 and 49, 97 and 40, 89 and 31. The number of high school tuition pupils from Clarksville has increased from 6 to 9 since last year, while the number of elementary school tuition pupils from there has decreased from 2 to 1. The average percentage of attendance for the past year was 95.36 in Grades 1-6; 96.94 in Grades 7-8; and 96.91 in Grades 9-12. The average number of tardinesses per pupil for the same groups was .00, .00, and .05 respectively. Both the excellent attendance record and the extremely small number of tardinesses for the entire school are commendable.

Notes on the Budget

The School Board's budget for 1958-59 is \$68,170.00 as compared to \$69,350.00 for the current

year. This amount is reduced by an estimated income from tuition of \$2400.00, which leaves a balance of \$65,770.00 to be raised by taxes by the town as compared to \$67,850.00 for the current year. Although the final payment on the principal of the bond issue will be paid this coming June, it will be noted that it has not been possible to increase the budget to any appreciable extent, as mounting operational costs largely replace this saving. Provision for salary advancements, employment of an additional teacher, higher transportation rates, the purchase of new equipment and the added expense of retirement and social security coverage, explain for the most part these increases.

Grounds—Building—Equipment

Outside of sanding and refinishing the tops of the pupils' desks, replacing the old concrete front walk with a new one of asphalt, and the re-facing of window ledges where most needed, comparatively little incidental repair and maintenance work has been necessary in the building and on the grounds during the past year. Much credit is due the janitor, teachers and pupils for the attractive overall appearance of both building and grounds.

Items of equipment added since a year ago include a chain saw, wood working lathe, and small tools for the School Shop; maps and globe for use in teaching the Social Studies; compressor for the milk cooler; and such miscellaneous articles as are purchased now and then for instructional purposes.

High School Minimum Standards

In order to meet the minimum standards set up for high schools by the State Department of Education of offering at least twelve subjects in the Practical Arts, a Commercial Department is to be added to the high school next year, which will necessitate the employment of an additional teacher. The subjects to be taught in this department, offered on alternate years, will include Typewriting I and II, Stenography I and II, Book-keeping and Office Practice. It is planned, also, to add General Mathematics and Problems of Democracy to the Program of studies. Other

provisions called for to meet these standards include the establishment of a school library, an opportunity to study Art, and the purchase of more reference books. Recommendations made in addition to the above requirements ask that consideration be given to adding Third Year French and Social Studies Subjects.

Miscellaneous

The continued fine work done by the school music groups is very much in evidence when public programs are presented. Both the Band and the Choral Group contribute a great deal to the overall life of the school, and in establishing good community-school relationships.

With the largest number of pupils taking advantage of the School Lunch Program since it was first begun, the success of this activity becomes ever more apparent. Much credit is due the operator, Mrs. Helen A. Foote, for all that she is doing in contributing to the morale and good health of the school.

Conclusion

Again, I wish to thank the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and co-operation received in our work together to provide good schools. It is only with the assistance of you all that high standards can be achieved and maintained.
