Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of the County of Sullivan herewith present their annual report, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailor, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician, and Auditors for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1911.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam are still in charge of the County Farm and House of Correction, and have proved themselves well adapted for the position, as Superintendent and Matron.

We wish to remind the citizens of the County of the necessity, in the near future, of remodeling the Superintendent's house and providing a new heating plant, separate from the main buildings, as recommended by a recent report of the State Board of Charities and Corrections.

In the report of 1910, the price stated as cost for board was \$2.10 per week, when the cost was really \$2.52 per week.

The above error was made by a misplacement of figures in footing up the inventory of the Personal Property at the farm, and was not detected till the statement for this year's report was being prepared.

We wish to thank the selectmen and overseers in the several towns, for their assistance and request them to exercise the greatest care in assisting the poor in their towns, and investigate each new application thoroughly before rendering aid.

In conclusion we wish to thank the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Whipple, and all other employees at the County Farm for faithful work in caring for those under their charge.



The County Convention shall consist of the representatives of the Towns of the County. They shall meet on the Second Wednesday of each biennial session of the General Court, or other day in the same week, shall choose a chairman and clerk, and may adjourn as they see cause.

The County Convention shall, during each biennial session of the Legislature, grant county taxes for its county for two years; but the taxes for each year shall be voted separately, and collected in the year for which they were voted.

The County Commissioners of each County shall publish attested copies of the proceedings of the County Conventions, with the printed reports of the County Officers, for the year in which such proceedings occurred.
