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DEMOCRATS SEEK TO EXPAND HEALTH CARE LAWS, REPUBLICANS PREFER ACA REPEAL

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DURHAM, NH – Just under half of New Hampshire residents were happy Congress failed to repeal the Affordable Care Act (ACA), also known as Obamacare, while only a third describe themselves as unhappy. Those who are unhappy blame Democrats and moderate congressional Republicans. Respondents are divided on what they would like to see happen with the ACA in the future, but support for expanding the law has increased since 2013. Residents are divided on the idea of a single-payer system, with Democrats strongly and Independents slightly in favor and Republicans strongly opposed.

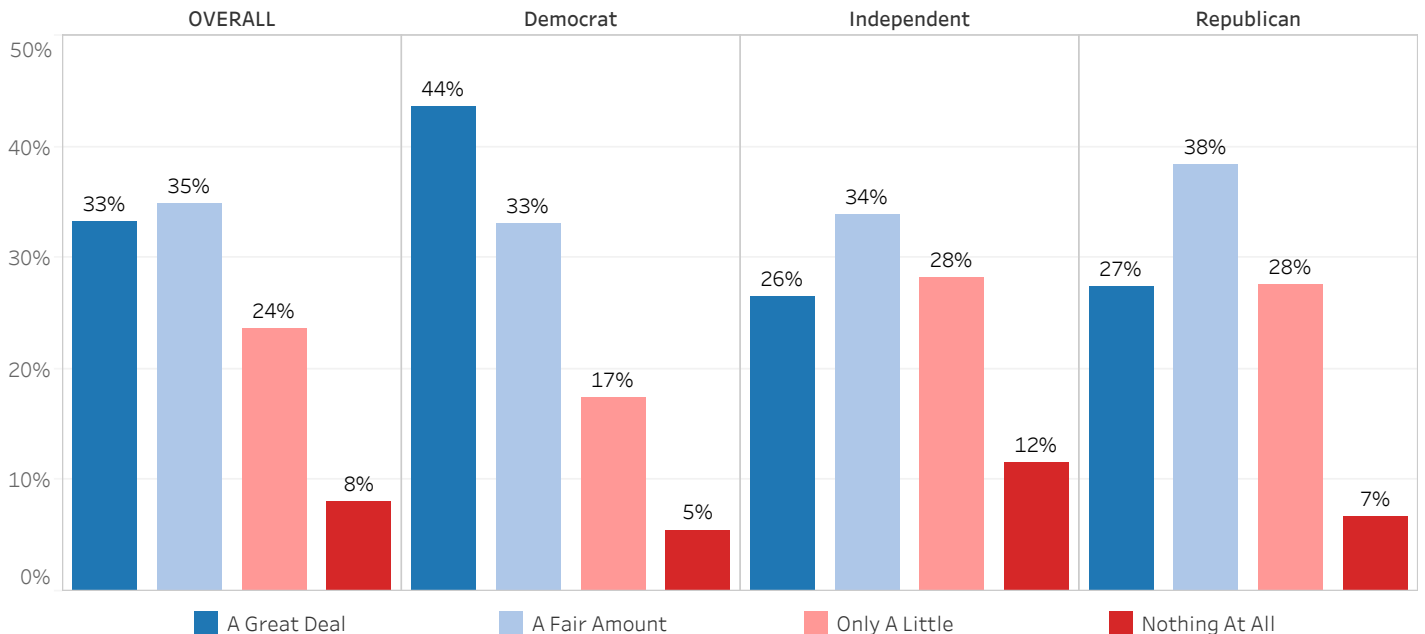
These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent.

Recent Health Care Debate

The debate over repealing the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, has intensified since the 2016 presidential election. Just over two-thirds of Granite Staters (68%) say they have heard or seen a great deal (33%) or a fair amount (35%) about the recent debate about changing the nation's health care laws. Twenty-four percent say they have heard only a little about it and 8% say they have heard nothing at all about it.

Democrats (77%) are slightly more likely than Republicans (66%) or Independents (60%) to say they have heard a great deal or a fair amount about the recent health care debate.

Awareness by Party Identification

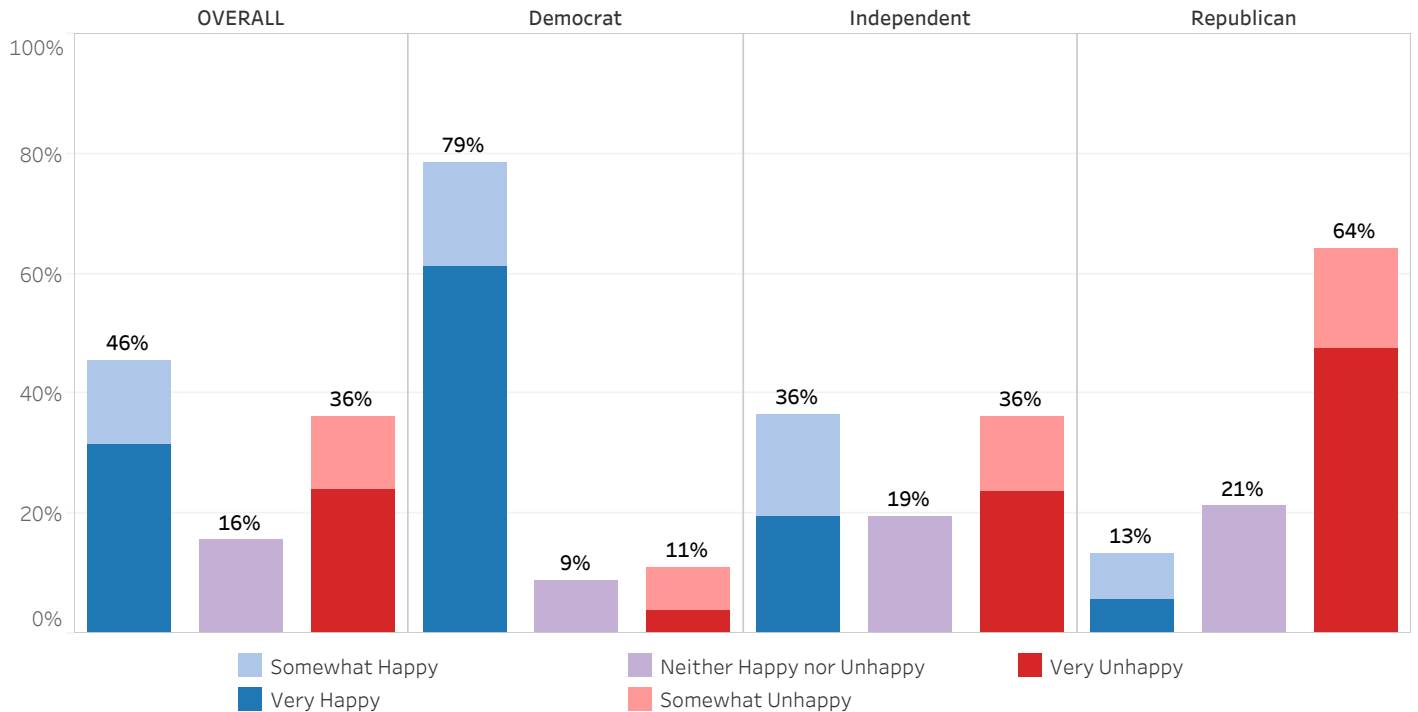

Despite multiple efforts, Congress has not repealed the Affordable Care Act. Among those who heard at least a little about the debate, nearly half (46%) say they are very (32%) or somewhat (14%) happy that Congress did not repeal the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare. Sixteen percent say they are neither happy nor unhappy, while 36% say they are very (24%) or somewhat (12%) unhappy Congress did not repeal the law.

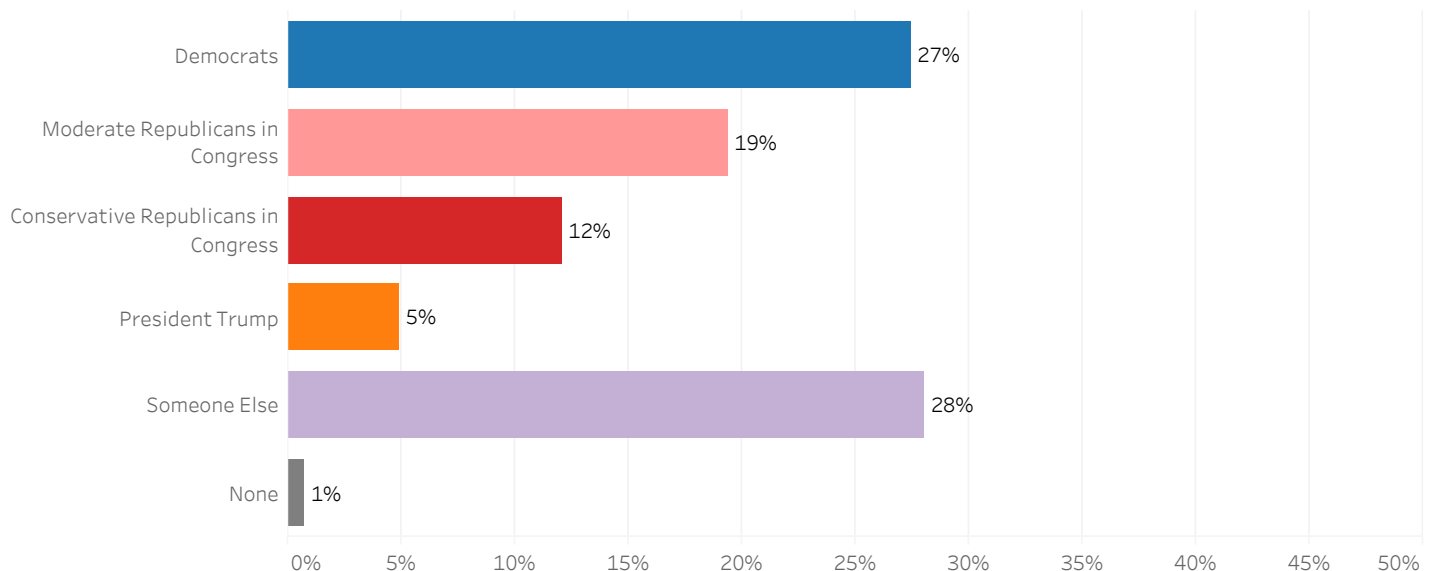
Most Democrats are happy with this outcome (79% happy), Independents are divided (36% happy, 36% unhappy), and Republicans are largely unhappy (64% unhappy).

Among those who are unhappy with Congress's failure to repeal the Affordable Care Act (N=313), 27% say Democrats deserve the most blame, 19% blame moderate Republicans in Congress, 12% blame conservative Republicans in Congress, 5% blame President Trump, 28% blame someone else, and 1% don't blame anyone. Those who say they blame someone else most frequently mention specific legislators such as Senator John McCain or blame all of these groups.

Most to Blame for Failure to Repeal



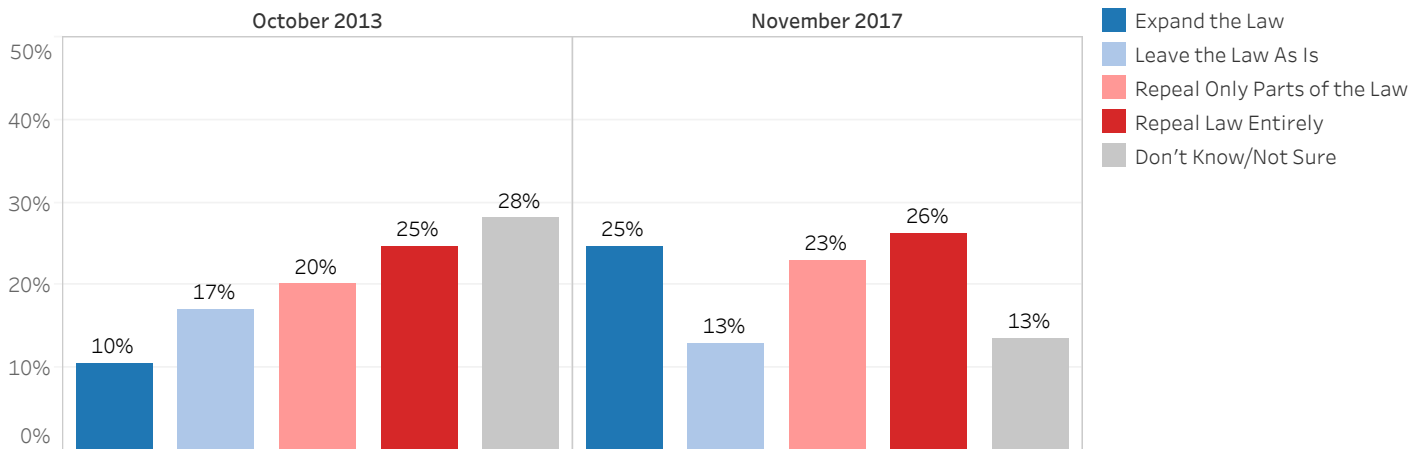
Future Health Care Policy

When asked what they would like to happen with the Affordable Care Act, a quarter of New Hampshire residents (25%) say they want to expand the law, 13% want to leave the law as it is, 23% want to repeal only parts of the law, 26% want to repeal the law entirely, and 13% don't know or are unsure. Just over half (51%) of Democrats favor expanding the law while just over half (51%) of Republicans favor repealing it entirely.

Compared to 2013, a larger percentage of respondents say they want to expand the law (10% in 2013, 25% in 2017) while fewer respondents don't know or are unsure (28% in 2013, 13% in 2017).

Those who primarily get their national news from newspapers, self-described liberals, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 are most likely to favor expanding the law, while those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016 and those who watch Fox News are most likely to favor repealing the law entirely.

What Should be Done with Affordable Care Act

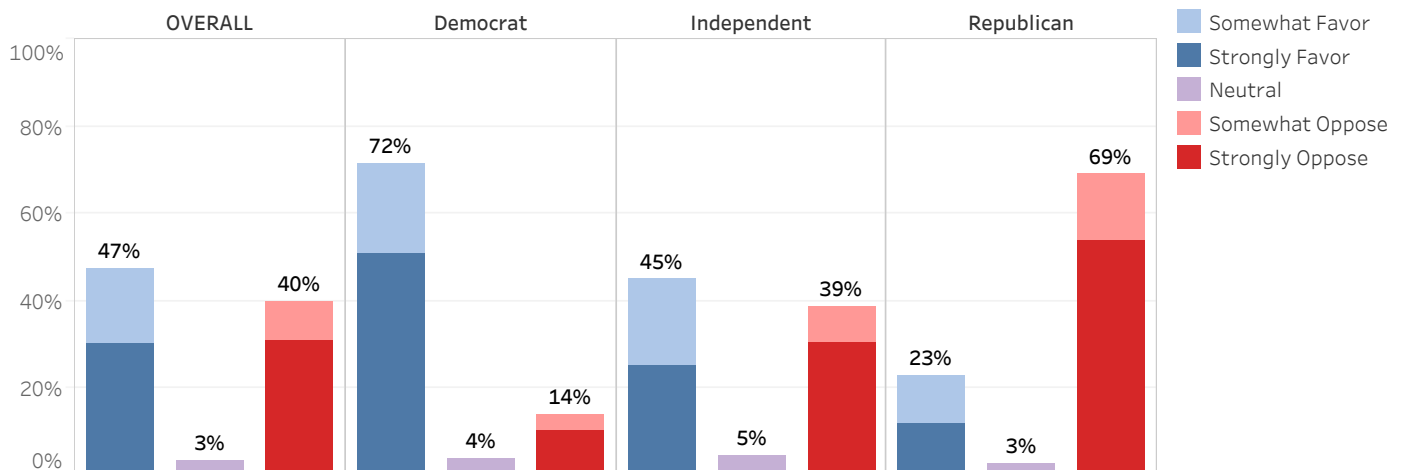


Nearly half (47%) of Granite Staters strongly (30%) or somewhat (17%) support a national single-payer health care system in which all Americans would get their insurance from a single government plan; 40% strongly (31%) or somewhat (9%) oppose such a system while 3% are neutral and 9% don't know or are unsure.

A large majority of Democrats (72%) favor a single payer system, a large majority of Republicans (69%) oppose it while Independents are divided with 45% in favor and 39% opposed.

Self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, those who primarily get their national news through newspapers or radio, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those aged 35 to 49 are most likely to support a single-payer health care system, while self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, and those who watch Fox News are least likely to support it.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Nine hundred and fifty-six (956) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between October 26 and November 9, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.2 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.3%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
