WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 12th day of March next at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, and one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expense.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$111.49, to obtain Town Road Aid, the State to appropriate the sum of \$743.29.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the use of the Winnisquam Fire Department.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of trees and raise money for same.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for new equipment.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for oiling streets.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$420.24, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for use in controlling white pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be put in an existent building fund savings account for a Community Center.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at the west entrance to Redwing Trailer Park and appropriate money for same.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to exclude House Trailers (Mobile Homes) from all parts of the Town except Trailer Parks.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to request the State Tax Commission to revaluate all real estate property in the Town on the basis of true market value.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes as follows: two percent discount if Tax Bill is paid within thirty days from date of bill.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.
- 20. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for the year ensuing.
- 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 22. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls shall be closed not earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our

fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.

- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fires.

TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL Tilton, New Hampshire

The seventh year of operation of the recreation program has revealed two important facts: one, that the swimming program, in order to accommodate increased enrollment, must be expanded; and two, the continued need for some kind of community center.

Statistically, 621 students from the 5th through 12th grades are enrolled in the program, plus those below the fifth grade who go swimming. In order to be able to handle the swimming enrollment safely and satisfactorily it will be necessary to have two Red Cross trained instructors, plus a paid assistant, which, with a driver for the bus, should make it unnecessary for the director to turn away youngsters, as he had to do last year.

Because the swimming program is not confined by physical limitations, it has been able to grow; not so, however, the indoor program at the center, which is hampered by inadequate and insufficient facilities. If the room, time, storage space and office space could all be increased, a much more satisfactory program could be developed. With this aim in mind, a building fund was started years ago, to which Tilton added \$500 in 1962. The secondary purpose of the fund is to make it possible to begin negotiations for a purchase of land and/or building without having to wait for another town meeting to authorize funds.

Since Tilton raised its appropriation to \$2500 last year, it was not necessary to conduct an organized fund raising drive and the only tag-day was for baseball. It is to be hoped that the same situation or better will prevail this year.

The director, William Joscelyn, and the council members, wish to thank all those who have assisted the program either with time or funds.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Trustees are pleased to report that approximately one hundred and fifty new volumes were added to our library this past year. Of these, 112 were new purchases, 14 were received as gifts, and the balance donated through the Used Book Sale held by the Friends of the Library.

Book Committee members meeting regularly each month to select new books included Miss Edna Southwick, Mrs. Kenneth Randall, Mrs. Oakes Lawrence, Mrs. Raymond McReel, Mrs. Frank Poland, Mrs. Gordon Fox, Mr. Wilbur Heath and Miss Mary Osgood, Librarian.

As in the past two years, purchases were made through the New Hampshire State Library Purchasing Department. The additional discount thus obtained allows Hall Memorial Library to acquire a greater number of books than would be possible if purchases were made through other channels. The number of books purchased in various classifications was:

Adult Fiction	14
Adult Non-Fiction	16
Junior-Senior High School	34

The largest and most important single acquisition, which was in addition to the purchases listed above, was the 1962 edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica and the Junior Encyclopedia Britannica. These fine, up-to-date reference works are an invaluable addition to our collection both for the student and the general reader, now and for years to come.

The Bookmobile visited Hall Memorial Library four times during the year, and approximately 1,500 books

were borrowed from its shelves. This resource is greatly appreciated for the number and variety of titles thus made available for local circulation.

Many fine volumes were also circulated through our library from the Shieling Trust, in cooperation with the public libraries of Bristol, Franklin, Canterbury and Belmont.

Partial re-roofing was the largest physical improvement made in the past year. Completion of this project is planned for 1963. Special thanks are due to the children of Mrs. Floyd Miller's sixth grade class for their fine gift of a new electric wall clock with a clear, easy-to-read dial. The purpose of this gift was to allow bus pupils to spend after-school hours at the Library without any apprehension about missing their bus rides; the increased number of children using the library facilities during these hours testifies to the clock's great usefulness.

We take this opportunity to make particular mention of the Used Book Sale sponsored by the Friends of the Library for the benefit of Hall Memorial Library. All books for this sale were donated; before the sale opened, librarians of Hall Memorial Library and local school libraries were invited to choose any books for their collections that they considered worthwhile additions. Prices at the sale were extremely reasonable (10° and 25°) yet over \$100 was realized. This sum has been earmarked for some special improvement to the Library. The Friends hope to make the sale an annual event. The trustees would like to thank all those who donated books, time and effort to make the sale successful.

In closing, we must once again this year express our gratitude to the New Hampshire State Library for the

fine cooperation and assistance given to the Hall Memorial Library.

During this period the nurse cared for the following: 1,863 nursing calls and 363 cases.

Forty-one trips were made during the year taking patients to clinics or Doctor's offices.

Adult Sabin Oral Polio Clinics were held in June, July, and August. Over 400 attended the first clinic and over 300 the second and third.

State Triple Toxoid Clinics for the prevention of Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Whooping Cough were held at the American Legion Hall in October, November, and December, ages four months to seven years, sponsored by the School Department and the District Nursing Association. Thirty children were vaccinated and seventy-five received the Triple Toxoid.

The nurse assisted Mr. Bernard Chapman in sorting and delivering several Thanksgiving baskets of food donated by the Congregational and Methodist Sunday Schools.

Mrs. Thalia Coulter, R. N., substituted for the nurse for the month of August.

Mrs. Kathleen Hewitt, R. N., the School Nurse, and the District Nurse wrapped and distributed children's gifts at Christmas. A total of sixty youngsters were remembered in fourteen families. The teachers in Junior and High School gave \$24.00 and with a personal gift of \$7.00 toys were bought. Others were donated by the Lions Club, the Rotary Club, and the Future Homemakers. The latter also gave a big dinner to a family of seven. Other dinners were given by the Odd Fellows, the Elks, the American Legion, and the Salvation Army. Twenty-five more families or individuals were remembered in this manner. Four food baskets were given by the Woreco Club.

The many ways of friendly cooperation and assistance given this past year was appreciated. To list a few — the use of the Town Hall for the Adult Polio Clinics, the use of the American Legion Hall for the Preschool Clinics, and the many who willingly gave their time to work on these clinics.

My sincere thanks and grateful appreciation go to the fine people who have helped in so many ways throughout the past year, Dr. Frank Robinson, Dr. Archie Grevior, the members of the Tilton and Northfield District Nursing Association, the selectmen, and the residents of both towns.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Tilton-Northfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-North-field High School in said district on the thirteenth day of March 1963, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3a. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Alexander G. Mac-Gregor.
- 3b. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Charles F. Dwinal.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance be-

tween the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the District will vote to: A. Authorize the purchase of equipment for the new Tilton-Northfield High School addition and, B. Authorize the construction of sidewalks; grading, leveling and filling; construction of a parking lot; and hard surfacing for the Tilton-Northfield High School addition.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the appropriation of the sum of forty-five thousand (\$45,000.00) dollars to carry out the provisions of Article 9 to be raised by borrowing, in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act R.S.A. Ch. 33 or otherwise and to authorize the School Board to execute any contracts relating thereto, or otherwise, and to authorize the School Board to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or desirable.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to use the Australian ballot commencing with the annual 1964 School District meeting.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

We know that her excellent teaching and living example have been an inspiration to the children starting school, and her influence has reached all the children who attended our elementary and high schools.

Her dedicated teaching of our children for twenty-eight years has given them the proper start in their school life. Her results on standard tests for subject matter have been outstanding. She could take pride on the success of her pupils in grade school, high school, college, the armed services, and life. Her whole career of honesty, character and integrity will ever stand as a monument to high ethical standards among our children.

We especially take pride that this esteemed teacher was a graduate of our local grade school, Tilton School, and Plymouth Teachers College. We know that she refused offers in other communities and other states at greater financial rewards, because she could not bear to leave her home, her town and her children. She was a person who loved to teach and was proud that she was a teacher. She will always remain Teacher Emeritus to us and to the parents who each year wanted their child in her grade.

Such a teacher as Anna M. Hussey appears on the educational horizon only once in a generation. We and our children have been very fortunate to have enjoyed her teaching and cooperation these many years.

The quotation from Life's Mirror, Stanza I epitomizes her life:

'There are loyal hearts, there are spirits brave, There are souls that are pure and true; Then give to the world the best you have, And the best will come back to you.'"

TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD ACCEPTS ALFRED H. PUCCI MEMORIAL AWARD

The Tilton-Northfield School Board unanimously voted to accept the Alfred H. Pucci Memorial Award given by the Pucci immediate family consisting of — Mr. Alfredo Henry Pucci, Mrs. Alfred H. Pucci, Mr. & Mrs. Sebastian T. Pucci, Mr. & Mrs. Thomas R. Pucci and Mr. & Mrs. Richard A. Pucci.

The Master Trophy for this award is a beautiful trophy on which the name of the recipients will be engraved. This trophy will remain in the permanent possession of the high school and is now on display. The annual winner will also receive a miniature trophy and an Award Certificate. The Board voted that the award shall be made annually at the Graduation Exercises. The Pucci family Mr. Donald Piper, Principal of Laconia High School, make the presentation this year. He was Headmaster and Coach of Tilton-Northfield High School while Alfred H. Pucci was making one of the best records ever compiled as a school leader in class affairs, athletics, citizenship, character and good scholarship. He graduated with the Class of 1948 at Tilton-Northfield High School.

This annual award to keep alive the memory of the most distinguished alumnus of the high school as an inspiration to all the pupils will be made to a senior male who has to the best degree the character and integrity and school achievement closest to the record of Alfred H. Pucci. The Award will be decided by the Principal and teaching staff, and approved by the Superintendent and School Board Chairman. A record will be maintained at the High School office and the office of the Superintendent of the general record of this Memorial Award.

A copy of the Certificate giving the general history of the man whose memory will be honored annually, unless some year does not find a worthy recipient follows:

THE ALFRED H. PUCCI MEMORIAL AWARD YEAR RECIPIENT

This award is presented in memory of Alfred H. Pucci, class of 1948, who established an enviable record in character development, leadership qualities, scholarship excellence and athletic participation. He was an exceptional baseball and basketball player and was well known for his fine sportsmanship in all competition. His excellent school record was recognized by Tilton-Northfield High School where he was president of his graduating class and was the recipient of the Headmaster's Tro-

phy.

Although his years following high school graduation were too few in number, he established a record of world service that is seldom equalled in such a short time. He was graduated from the University of New Hampshire and soon entered the service of our country as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force. His distinct contributions at Wright Patterson Air Development center in the world wide field of Electronic Intelligence provided data that was significant to the National Defense Planning and Welfare of the United States. Much of his work which took him all over the United States and foreign countries was of a confidential nature which prevented wide-spread publicity; but most important was the fact that he continued being the same outstanding citizen for his country. His personal contacts were with some of the leading military men and scientists of the nation, and in every instance he was regarded with great respect and was sincerely loved by all those who knew him.

It is interesting to note that in his busy adult life, which included a position as college instructor, he continued to maintain interest and find the time to do volunteer work with young people interested in promoting their athletic abilities. He continued to be a leader

among men and youth. His untimely death removed an important servant from society.

To keep the memory of this person alive as an inspiration to the youth who follow, this trophy is, at this time, and will be in the future, awarded to a senior who can be looked upon by the community, the teaching staff and students as a person to be honored as having fulfilled these desirable qualities of athletic ability, leadership, scholastic achievement and outstanding character excellence.

The administration of this high school and assisting teachers have examined the graduates with great care so that the recipient will do creditable honor to the name of the person for whom this award has been established.

We were very pleased that Tilton-Northfield High School opened school as planned in September and that it was not necessary to make up time in June. Workmen were employed for several weeks after the start of school but did not interfere with school classes.

The School Board, the Building Committee and the Clerk of the Works spent the entire day of Saturday, November 16, in inspecting the building and developing a list of items not in accordance with the contract. A second inspection was held on Saturday, January 26, 1963. The Board has not officially accepted the building.

We are asking for a bond issue for the following pur-

poses:

(1) sidewalks; grading, leveling and filling; construction of a parking lot; and hard surfacing.

(2) equipment for new addition, including new language laboratory, library, audio-visual, home economics, administration, new wood shop, mechanical drawing, pupil desks and chairs, agriculture, electricity, hand tools, stage curtain, physical education, business education, health room, science, glazetite for corridor walls, bleachers, and temporary stage.

The original bond issue of \$415,000 completed the building and purchased the following:

- (1) lockers
- (2) 129 pupil desks and chairs
- (3) 5 standard and 3 electric typewriters
- (4) Cafeteria tables, chairs and trucks
- (5) 25 modern typewriter desks
- (6) building of a temporary new road for school busses
- (7) new floor cleaning machine
- (8) electric light fixtures
- (9) 25 swivel typewriting chairs

(10) curtains for the entire addition

(11) complete equipment for the new cafeteria kitchen

The bond issue is recommended to spread the costs over a ten-year period rather than raising the cost of taxes by a great jump in one year.

The plan adopted by the Study Committee before the building was erected called for the development of a modern curricula along with the needed expansion be-

cause of overcrowding and larger enrollments.

We have added French 4 so that pupils may now take four years of French and two years of Latin. Electricity was added this year. This bond issue will allow us to add a second year of electricity, sheet metal, mechanical drawing for college pupils and general pupils, completely replace our old outmoded wood shop equipment, and equip the course in agriculture. The bond issue will add ten booths to our present ten and will give our pupils outstanding equipment for this modern method of teaching French.

Our school proposed budget for 1963-64 was adopted after four lengthy meetings. The greatest item in the budget is the item for Instruction, with its largest section the amount for teachers' salaries. These have been increasing annually because of the competition for teachers and the teacher shortage in special fields.

We are planning to develop a senior high and a junior high library and are requesting five hundred dollars for

each library annually.

The cost of operation of the schools has increased. We believe it very necessary to add one custodian for the high school who will serve as a maintenance man for the three Tilton-Northfield schools during the summer and vacation months. This man could do a great many minor repairs that would keep the buildings in excellent shape.

The Union School Secretary is paid partly by the school lunch program. We believe that this should be

changed so that the entire salary would come from the district. This would financially help the lunch program.

Our budget includes 35 desks and chairs, 3 teachers desks, 1 motion picture machine and 1 duplicating machine for the elementary schools. It also includes 35 desks and chairs for the junior high school. We have included \$675.00 for the purchase of large musical instruments for the band. Our band program in all the schools is developing very rapidly.

We especially wish to thank the Tilton Lions' Club for its donation of the Titmus Optical Vision Tester. This very expensive equipment will be very valuable to our

testing program in all three schools.

The Womens' Club of Tilton-Northfield has successfully operated its annual Dental Clinic from funds received from the Outgrown Shop. They deserve our appreciation for their continued efforts to improve dental health in the schools.

We wish to express our thanks to the Verham News and Mr. John Tomasi for the contribution of a magazine rack to our new Tilton-Northfield High School library.

We thank the Journal-Transcript for its annual achievement in securing funds for scholarships for graduates of Franklin High School and Tilton-Northfield High School and for its establishment of a permanent fund.

We thank the Benevolent Order of Elks for their annual scholarship for graduates of this area.

We thank the Tilton Rotary Club for cash scholarships for Tilton-Northfield High graduates and for its annually sending two high school youngsters to the United Nations at Plymouth Teachers College.

We wish to thank the American Legion Whitman-Davidson Post 49, the Garden Club, Stevens Mills, Friends of the Library, the Library Trustees, the Holy Name Society and all other local civic and professional organizations which have contributed scholarships, special gifts and assistance. We thank Mr. Raymond McReel, Vice-President of the Citizens National Bank for his excellent management of our bond funds.

We wish to thank the Catholic Youth Organization for the gift of a character plaque to the High School.

We wish to thank the members of the Building Committee, Ernest Decato, Richard Pucci and Brackett Hill, for their hearty assistance and cooperation.

We thank our Superintendent, Principals, Teachers, Treasurer, Office Workers, Custodians, Cafeteria Workers and Bus Operators for their excellent cooperation.

We thank the Citizens National Bank, Iona Savings Bank, Gales Insurance Agency, Giles Dairy and Shepherd Funeral Home for their special gifts to pupils and teachers.

The Selectmen of both towns have continued to give us their very valuable support, cooperation and assistance.

We appreciate the excellent cooperation and encouragement received from the Town Budget Committees.

The people of Tilton-Northfield should be very proud of the excellent schools maintained by the taxpayers. The building of the Tilton-Northfield High School addition is a landmark in the educational history of this cooperative district. The new addition has relieved the overcrowded school and is leading to an excellent development of new curricula.

We request your help, your constructive criticism and your suggestions how we may continue to improve our schools and the education of our children.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters:

The Tilton-Northfield School Board continued its excellent policy of a balanced fiscal budget, continued improvement of the schools, establishing policies for the advancement of education and purchasing a dollar's worth of education for every dollar provided by the taxpayers, the State of New Hampshire, and the Federal Government.

The School Board took the following actions during the past year for educational progress:

1. Worked very cooperatively with the Building Committee on the many problems of the Tilton-North-field High School addition, the building equipment and in checking the building construction.

2. Held over twenty-five extra meetings in addition to regular board meetings to confer with the Building Committee, architect, contractor, sub-contractors and hear recommendations from the school principals and teachers.

3. Approved tuberculin Clinic for school pupils under the direction of Supervisory Union nurses, Kathleen Hewitt and Helen Bellavance and Dr. Prince of the State Board of Health.

4. Approved an Art Workshop under the direction of Art teachers, Barbara Comee and Maude Gray, Teacher Consultant Esma Ford and Dr. Alice Baumgartner of the State Education Department.

5. Approved a Career Day for high school pupils with representatives of industry from Tilton, Franklin and Concord.

6. Accepted gifts of "Personal Management" booklets for Tilton-Northfield High School seniors from Mr. Raymond McReel, Vice-President Citizens National Bank of Tilton. 7. Approved study of twenty-five sets of basal readers by teachers and approval of new reading books which stress phonetics.

8. Allowed use of Tilton-Northfield High School auditorium for Legislative Interim Committee meeting for the school districts of Gilmanton, Belmont, Laconia, Gilford, Canterbury and Tilton-Northfield.

9. Operated another successful summer playground under the direction of Mr. Donald Addario, Miss Cindy Emerson and Miss Judith Larrivee.

10. Accepted gift of a piano from Mr. & Mrs. Stanley Webster for the Sanborn School.

11. Approved pre-school registration for first graders at the American Legion Building.

- 12. Approved attendance and competition of Tilton-Northfield High School Industrial Arts pupils, under the direction of teacher George Phippard, at the Manchester, N.H. Memorial High School where Tilton-Northfield took eleven first place prizes, twenty second place prizes and eight third place prizes in competition with the entire State.
- 13. Held several meetings with Mr. Richard Pucci and approved the general principles of the annual Alfred H. Pucci Memorial Award.
- 14. Purchased 125 desks and chairs for the new addition.
- 15. Approved an oral polio Clinic for Tilton-Northfield pupils with Mr. John Tomasi of the Tilton Pharmacy making the serum available at cost.
- 16. Voted to close the Sanborn and Union Schools and premises daily after 9 p.m. in cooperation with the Selectmen of Northfield and the Northfield Police Department.
- 17. Purchased new typewriters under the lowest bid ever received for the Tilton-Northfield Commerce department.
- 18. Purchased 25 new typewriting tables on bid.

- 19. Approved purchase of tables and chairs for 200 pupils for cafetorium.
- 20. Approved purchase of new library tables and chairs.
- 21. Voted to approve a policy of separation as far as possible of Tilton-Northfield Senior High School and Tilton-Northfield Junior High School. The two schools mutually use the cafetorium, gymnasium, home economics and shop.

22. Voted to have Mr. Alton Currier serve as Principal for the Senior High School and Mr. Richard Incerto

as Principal of the Junior High School.

23. Voted, after questionnaire to parents, to hold separate social functions for Junior High and Senior

High pupils.

- 24. Congratulated Mr. & Mrs. Harold Shepherd for the honor won for the second year at St. Paul's School, summer session, by Miss Josephine Shepherd, a Tilton-Northfield High School pupil. She won first place in Calculus I in 1961 and second place in Calculus II in 1962.
- 25. Congratulated Mr. & Mrs. John Hewitt on their son, Robert C. Hewitt, a Tilton-Northfield H.S. pupil, who was selected to attend St. Paul's School, summer session, where he took first place in Calculus I.
- 26. Approved operation of extension course at Tilton-Northfield High School for teachers entitled "Health and Physical Education in the Elementary School", taught by Professor Howard Goldman of Plymouth Teachers College.

27. Approved formation of Parents' Music Club to encourage the progress of the grade school band, high school band and chorus.

- 28. Voted, after a survey with parents of senior high school pupils, to discontinue sponsorship of overnight trips of the Senior Class and suggested substitutes of various kinds.
- 29. Sponsored a meeting of parents with Mr. and Mrs.

Robert Hoogerzeil, to show substitutions for Senior Class trips used in Methuen, Massachusetts.

30. Held two all day Saturday inspection trips with the Building Committee, Architect Irving W. Hersey, Contractor Winston P. Titus, and Clerk of the Works Ephriam J. Bolduc.

31. Granted leave of absence to William Powers to work for his Graduate Degree in Science at Syracuse Uni-

versity.

32. Accepted gift of piano to the Tilton-Northfield High School from Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Dwinal, Jr.

- 33. Accepted gifts of ball point pens for all pupils and teachers from Raymond McReel, Vice President of the Citizens National Bank.
- 34. Accepted gifts of calendars from savings booklets from Mr. Robert F. Bibeau, Treasurer of the Iona Savings Bank.

35. Voted to accept safety calendars from Shepherd's Funeral Home and Giles Dairy Bar.

36. Accepted school room calendars from Gales Insurance Agency and Iona Savings Bank.

37. Voted to accept with great pleasure the presentation of a gift of a school vision testing machine from the Lions Club of Tilton for use in the three Tilton-Northfield Schools. This machine will be officially presented at the school dedication.
