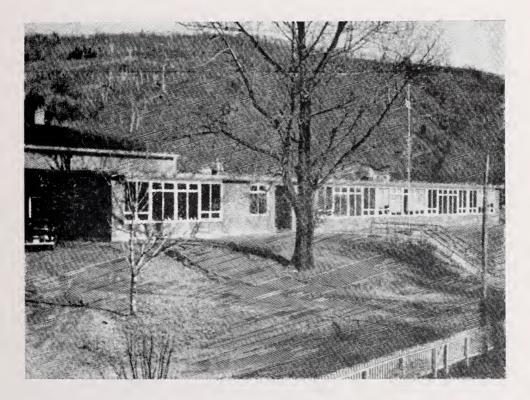

TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next, 1956 at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town treasurer, Road Agent, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers and all other necessary officers.

Article 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds or bequests as have been left to it during the past year.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deeds after being advertised. Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,650.00 to purchase a new truck.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$750.00 to remove and replace the old cement drain on South Street.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,600.00 to rebuild Ramsay Hill.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,250.00 to tar and improve the new road leading to the residence of James Harty; and including existing extensions. (By request)

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 (\$250.00 for North Walpole and \$250.00 for Walpole) to support the recreation programs in each end of the town. By petition.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$473.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 to contribute to the Elliot Community Hospital in Keene.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for the purpose of the Highway Dept. to furnish labor, equipment and materials to apply a gravel or treated roadbed and surface to the proposed highway in Maplewood Park.

2. That this proposed highway be known as Maplewood Drive. (By Petition)

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to remain open until 6:00 p.m. or later if so voted.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TOWN LIBRARY

In 1955 our library suffered a severe loss in the sudden death of Miss Margaret Porter, Chairman of the trustees for many years. Miss Porter gave unselfish and constant effort to increasing the usefulness of the library to the town. We are endeavoring to carry on her ideas as well as possible, especially in the improvement of the cataloguing system. In this we have enlisted experienced aid from the State Library, and we hope it can be completed this year.

The North Walpole Branch opened late in August in its new and very attractive quarters. Mrs. Hogan reports it has been well patronized, the book circulation about five hundred a month, and two hundred fifty new books added. Miss Graves reports a circulation of six thousand two hundred and twenty nine books, and two hundred fifty two adult and junior new books added with gifts of fifty more. Several of these gift books were in memory of friends. From one hundred eighty to two hundred books were borrowed from the Bookmobile and one hundred more from the State Library.

Suggestions for the purchase of new books are welcome, and, as far as possible, the Trustees will endeavor to make the library a pleasant and vital part of town activities.

THE TOWN HISTORY

Work in preparation of the material to go into the new volume of the Walpole Town History has been going along quietly since the 1955 Town Meeting appropriated the first amount of money needed to start the proposition. The financial statement of assets in the first section of this annual report does not show money to have been expended from this appropriation, for such small sums as were needed were taken care of temporarily by the Historical Society under whose supervision it was voted to have the book prepared.

By far the greatest amount of time has been put in by Mrs. Edith C. Tiffany, Historical Society Historian, and her assistant, Miss Anita Aldrich, working mainly through records in the County offices in Keene, both on real estate ownership, and thereby something in connection with old and present family names and their connections.

Considerable other preliminary work has been done in outlining sections and items in general. It should be said, too, that for years Mrs. Tiffany has been gathering a varied assortment of general and interesting items and incidents which she has kept in outline form for use as is seen fit. The Committee knows that this work has been invaluable in every way.

For supervision of expenditures the Historical Society directors, through the president, Mrs. Guy H. Bemis, appointed the following three to supervise the expenditure of the \$1,500 appropriated last year: Malcolm D. Williams, Donald Hubbard and Miss Jessie Graves. It is expected that by this time next year this sum will have been used for needed expense and that a further call will be made on the Town for an appropriation to carry on.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said district on the 13th day of March, 1956, at 2:00 in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into a contract with the school district of Rockingham, Vermont, for payment of high school tuition.

9. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of renting a room or rooms to be used for educational purposes.

10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or from any state or private agency.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$130,000.00; \$124,000.00 of this sum to be used for the construction, equipment and furnishing of a new elementary school and the acquisition

of any real property that may be necessary for its location; \$6,000.00 of this sum to be used to accomplish alterations, additions and improvements in the present Walpole School and to purchase new departmental equpiment of a lasting character for use in the present Walpole School; and whether the district will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto.

12. If the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction of the new elementary building and alterations, additions and improvements in the present Walpole School and for the purchase of equipment and furnishings for the same or to take any action thereon.

13. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase a plot of ground on the south side of the North Walpole Elementary School.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of your schools:

The new Walpole Village School has been occupied for approximately six years. During this time the enrollment has increased by 36 per cent as shown by the charts at the end of this report. The enrollment is expected to reach 499 next year and be well over 500 by 1960. The average birth rate for the past ten years is 58, the average beginning class in Walpole for the last 6 years has been 45 and for North Walpole, 16. It appears that we can expect first grade enrollments to at least continue at the average and there is considerable evidence to indicate that it will be more.

Last year I reported the need for another classroom for the elementary grades. A storage room was converted to a small classroom. Our census figures show that we will need still another room this year. The library is now being used as a classroom; a room formerly used as a music room is now a classroom; the cafeteria and auditorium stage now serve the music classes, serve as overflow study halls and visual-aids room.

The present school plant used at maximum efficiency can accommodate 433 pupils. Our present enrollment is 469 with an additional thirty pupils expected next year. A thorough study shows that six additional classrooms are needed now, plus expansion of the school cafeteria, additional facilities for the music program and provision for an adequate building to house the vocational agriculture and 7th and 8th grade shop program.

There has been considerable growth in the vocational agriculture and manual arts classes in the past two years. The former has increased approximately 40 per cent in enrollment and the manual arts classes, about 25 per cent. Present facilities are inadequate due to the increased enrollment. At present we are not meeting State and Federal requirements for space and lack equipment because we do not have room for it.

It will probably be impossible to complete a new building in time for the opening of school next fall. There are several choices available as to means of providing needed space until a new building can be completed. We can continue to operate under the present crowded conditions and find a room to use in one of the buildings in town. Present estimates of the cost of renting vary from \$500 to over \$2,000, depending on the facilities and the amount of renovation needed to provide a suitable class room. Another choice is to combine small classes in North Walpole, which can be done to provide either one or two classrooms, and transport pupils from Walpole to North Walpole. The latter method would result in a saving of at least the salary of an additional teacher.

The new 54 passenger school bus bought by the district this year was delivered several weeks after the promised delivery date due to difficulties encountered at the factory. In addition to the regular daily routes the new bus is being used to transport athletic teams to interscholastic events and pupils who are taking part in music events in the state. Serious consideration should be given to replacing another bus this year as one of our vehicles is eight years old. Keeping a vehicle beyond a certain point results in additional repair costs.

The budget has increased again this year in spite of every effort to curtail expenses. It is not possible to educate more and more children without adding to the cost. Last year I reported that we could expect a continued shortage of teachers and a resulting increase in teachers' salaries. The shortage is greater this year and there is little if any hope that the number of new teachers will keep pace with the ever-increasing enrollments.

A thorough study of our insurance policies was made this year. The combination of all our building fire insurance policies into one policy resulted in a saving. Additional insurance has been purchased which includes Workingmens' Compensation and employees' liability, non-owner liability, fifty dollar deductible and comprehensive coverage for our school buses. The additional coverage gives greater protection to the district and to their employees.

The Walpole teachers participated with the teachers of Supervisory Union No. 60 in a three-day Guidance Workshop in October and have also participated in the monthly supervisory union teachers meetings. Miss Annette Eveleth, State Director of Educational Health Services, discussed the recently published Health Handbook at the November meeting. Subsequent meetings this year will be utilized to follow-up findings and recommendations of the Guidance Workshop.

Muriel E. Britton replaced Mrs. Elizabeth Staples as a grade teacher. Miss Britton is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and did her practice teaching in Walpole. Mr. Glen Hutchinson replaced Mr. Paul Christiansen as teacher of Social Science and English in Grades seven and eight. Mr. Hutchinson resigned in October and was replaced by Mrs. Lacea Wilson who formerly taught in West Orange, N.J. Mr. Edward Lithgow, a graduate of Springfield College, was employed to teach Physical Education and Auto Driving. Mrs. Glen Phelps replaced Mrs. Audrey Ericson. Mrs. Phelps is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and did her practice teaching in Charlestown. Mrs. Rubie Plumb replaced Miss Carol Allen as a second grade teacher. Mrs. Plumb is a graduate of Atlantic Union College and formerly taught in Center Tuftonboro, N.H. Miss Jacqueline Greenough was transferred to teach in Grade four and Miss Barbara Roy was employed as a first grade teacher. Miss Roy is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and formerly taught in Greenfield, Mass. Mr. Aristides Stathoplos replaced Mr. Gerald Hague as Science teacher. Mr. Stathoplos is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and formerly taught in Colebrook, N.H.

We have been fortunate to have the following cadet teachers with us during the first semester of this school year: Mr. David Costin, sixth grade; Miss Eleanor Webber, Home Economics and Miss Shirley Holman, Home Economics.

Teachers are with some 25 to 35 pupils without a break for over six hours a day. During this time decisions have to be made in regard to pupil's behavior and it is not always possible to deal with a situation as if there was only one child in the room. We need your support to do the job you want us to do for your children.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE FOR WALPOLE AND NORTH WALPOLE

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1955.

338 pupils were examined by Dr. William Tatem.

The following defects were noted and reported:

- 85 pupils in need of dental care.
 - 3 pupils had sufficient wax in ears to obstruct the canal.
 - 2 minor heart conditions.
 - 1 inguinal hernia.
- 457 heights and weights.
 - 4 pupils were seen by the guidance clinic.
- 339 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse.
 - 3 pupils attended speech clinic.
- 615 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse.

- 23 pupils had eye examinations and defects corrected by a doctor.
- 36 pupils attended pre-registration clinic.
- 206 pupils participated in diabetic testing program.
- 241 pupils participated in dental program.
- 106 pupils participated in polio program.

In working with the children of Walpole and North Walpole we hope they become better able as young people to conserve and improve their own health, and thus enable them to secure that abundant vigor and vitality which are a foundation for the greatest possible happiness and service in personal, family, and community life.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOL

Mr. Elliott W. Keach, Superintendent of Schools. Walpole, New Hampshire.

I herewith submit my annual report as Principal of the North Walpole School.

SCHOLARSHIP

It has been the aim of the faculty of the North Walpole School to teach all the children as individuals and to guide them in good habits of citizenship. No two students learn at the same rate of speed, or in the same way. In each grade, groups have been set up, and the assignments have been so planned that they allow for individual differences. In this way the subject material is presented in a manner that will best serve the children in the process of learning. The pupil is thus aided to become an independent, responsible citizen in his society. At the faculty meetings, many ideas have been exchanged and tried out in the classroom. Most of the ideas suggested have proved to be highly successful as techniques of teaching. Currently we are discussing procedures to follow in the event of accidents and other emergencies.

The teachers and myself are grateful to Mrs. Dorothy Jones of the Bellows Falls High School Faculty for her talk and demonstrations on "Physical Education in an Elementary School."

The California Achievement Tests were given again in all the grades last spring. For the most part, the results were very satisfactory. The areas of weaknesses were noted and retaught by the teachers.

ORGANIZATION

The milk program, whereby the children get milk at half cost, has been continued this year. The program is proving very popular with the student body. The milk is served during the morning recess period.

Our activities have included assemblies, schools socials, plays, and athletics.

The evening of May 19th proved quite enjoyable for the large crowd which attended the two one-act plays given by the seventh and eighth grades. Grade Seven presented "Are We Dressing", and Grade Eight "Ten Per Cent Tommy." The boys and girls who participated, as well as Mr. Dulski, the director, are to be congratulated upon their work in providing an evening of delightful entertainment. The annual hobby and school work exhibit was held at the same time. Many of the townspeople viewed the exhibits after the two one-act plays, and talked with the teachers about the work that the school was doing for their children.

Two operettas, "Sleeping Beauty" by the Primary Grades and "Sliding Down A Moonbeam" by the Intermediate Grades, played to a capacity house in December. The Toy Orchestra, made up of the pupils from the Kindergarten and Grade One, entertained the audience between the two operettas. I wish to express my thanks to the pupils who took part in the operettas, to the teachers who directed the plays, and to the many parents and friends who attended. All contributed in making the evening a gala occasion. Part of the proceeds was used to buy Film Strips for Grades one through six, and to purchase records for the record player.

In athletics, the boy had successful seasons in all three sports sponsored by the school, namely touch football, basketball and baseball. The basketball team finished as runner-ups in the annual basketball tournament.

Halloween and Christmas parties were held in all the grades. Games were played and refreshments were served. These social affairs were planned and held under the direction of the Student Council.

The student Safety Patrol, under the guidance of the Principal, has performed its duties of guiding pupils across the dangerous intersections of our community in a very commendable manner.

The graduating class made a trip to Concord, New Hampshire, the State Capitol. They enjoyed visiting the Legislature, the State Police Offices, and the State Penitentiary. While there, they were the guests of the Honorable Louis Ballam, their Town Representative.

I wish to thank the School Board, the Superintendent, the Teachers, and the Citizens of the town for their cooperation and support in giving the best possible education to the children of the village. A Good School is the result of the concentrated efforts on the part of parents, teachers and administrators.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Elliott W. Keach Superintendent of Schools Walpole, New Hampshire

I herewith submit my annual report as principal of Walpole High School.

GRADUATES

Of the nineteen graduates of the Class of 1955, four enrolled at the University of New Hampshire, one at Boston University, one at the Bentley School of Accounting, three at Burdett Junior College, two at Plymouth Teachers College, one at the New Hampshire Technical School, and one is in training at the Peabody Nursing Home in Peabody, Massachusetts.

ORGANIZATION

The Walpole High School daily program has been changed this year to a seven period day. Class periods are fifty minutes in length with the non-laboratory classes meeting four times weekly. The extra periods derived from using this type of program are used to schedule rehearsals for the band and chorus, class meetings and assemblies. On Friday of each week, clubs and organizations meet for one period on an alternating basis.

The division of the school on a 6-2-4 basis began last year and has been extended and continued with particular emphasis being placed on the junior high area. These grades now have their separate physical education classes, cafeteria period, assembly period and homeroom activities. Many of the study halls for the junior high are scheduled in their respective room under the supervision of their homeroom teachers. These changes are in keeping with present educational practice.

In the high school a course in economics has been added. This course introduces the pupil into the study of consumer economics as well as economic theory. The course in Civics and Youth Problems at the ninth grade level and the course in Psychology in grade eleven which were introduced last year have both proved to be worthwhile and are being continued. The new course in Driver Education and the newly instituted physical education program are both definite additions to our school program. A more detailed account of these courses will be given under separate headings in this report.

I am also pleased to report that the high school has been accepted for membership with the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This is the accrediting agency for the New England area, and the approval of our program by this body should be of considerable interest to Walpole citizens.

Definite encouragement is constantly being given to our pupils to prepare for further training beyond high school, and it is to be noted that approximately 37 per cent of our pupils are carrying five academic courses this year. Driver Education, physical education, chorus, and band are assigned credits which are in addition to the sixteen credits required for graduation from the school.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The extra-curricular program of the school has been extended this year. A total of eight clubs or organizations have been meeting on the average of twice monthly during the club period scheduled as a part of the school program. This has allowed many pupils to participate who would otherwise find it impossible to remain after school.

The school presented three one-act plays during the fall, is presently working on a three-act play presentation, and will participate in the annual one-act play competition held each spring.

Two boys and two girls were sponsored by community organizations to attend Boys' State and Girls' State and another boy was sent to a Conservation Camp. The faculty chose a girl to compete in the D. A. R. Good Citizenship Contest. Practice for basketball began November 1 with approximately thirty boys reporting to Coach Edward Lithgow. This squad has been divided and a separate schedule has been arranged for each group. A varsity schedule of twenty games has been arranged for this school year.

In girls' basketball, a surprisingly large turnout of twenty-two girls has made for considerable interest and competition this year. A schedule of sixteen games has been arranged.

The junior high basketball program is organized on a Saturday basis, and a good turnout of both boys and girls has been maintained. The boys are participating in the junior high league as in the past, while the girls are playing a limited schedule with local schools.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council has carried on a good number of worthwhile projects during the year. Five boys were sponsored by the Council to attend the Older Boys' Conference held in Nashua. Three boys in the Council participated in the Youth in Government program sponsored by the YMCA. A magazine campaign grossed a total of \$1258.00 of which \$475.00 was kept by the school. Two hundred dollars was turned over to the varsity Athletic Association for the purchase of uniforms for the varsity teams. Other things to mention include the erection of dugouts on the athletic field, the planting of flowers donated by the Woodward Florists, and recognition of achievement by presenting awards to the members of the student body at graduation.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Organized classes in physical education were arranged this year for the first time with classes ranging in size from eight to twenty pupils in the high school and twenty to twenty-five in the junior high. Pupils have been assigned lockers for which combination locks were purchased by the school. All pupils in grades 7-10 are required to take two classes of physical education each week while pupils in the upper two grades may choose the course as an elective. The fall season opened with the introduction of soccer in all classes. Touch football was also included. Although soccer is a new sport in this area it proved to be of considerable interest, and we are planning to play soccer on the interscholastic level next year.

During the winter season basketball fundamentals are being stressed in all classes. A portion of the time in physical education is spent on classroom work in which instruction is given in teaching types of games as well as the rules and regulations involved. The proper attitudes toward physical health, conditioning and care of injuries are also included.

During the early spring season a period of time will be spent giving instruction in tumbling and gymnastics. Recreational games will be emphasized. For spring activities, softball for the girls and baseball for boys will constitute the major sports. Other sports such as tennis, badminton and golf are being considered. Such sports have carry-over value which will be of benefit to our young people after leaving school.

The physical education program is still in the planning stage and we are attempting to gear the program to the needs and interests of the entire school population.

DRIVER EDUCATION

The driver education course has an average of fifteen pupils enrolled each semester. During the eighteen week training period, the pupil will receive six hours of behind the wheel instruction and thirty hours of classroom work. The main objective of the course is to develop in each pupil the proper attitudes and skills necessary for a good driver.

We were fortunate to secure a 1955 automobile from Farr's Garage in Bellows Falls. This car is equipped with dual controls. At the end of the course all pupils will be given examinations by state inspectors at the school.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The music program is again under the direction of Mr. Robbins for vocal instruction and Mr. Miner in the instrumental field. Classes in both areas meet twice weekly.

We have a chorus numbering fifty five members this year, an increase of fifteen from last year. In the junior high, all pupils are required to take fifty minutes of general music weekly.

The Senior Band has also increased by about ten members during the past year. It is also to be noted that we have a large number of pupils in the beginner's band.

Pupils from the music program participated in the New Hampshire All-State Chorus and band groups last year, and will be included again this year. Several pupils participated in the New England Music Festival as well. Joint Christmas concerts were held with Vilas and an annual spring concert by all music groups is planned for this spring.

The music department wishes to thank the Parent Teachers Association for providing a sousaphone for the school band.

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The home economics department has approximately seventy girls enrolled in all classes this year. Special projects undertaken include reseating chairs, making slip covers and redecorating the teachers' room and painting the stage flats. These projects are of course in addition to the usual projects in clothing, foods and homemaking.

The girls entered two national contests, "The American Homemaker of Tomorrow" and the "Cherry Pie" contest. One pupil won the regional pie contest and placed fourth in the state.

The Future Homemakers of America club has also been active. In April of last year, it served the Father and Son Banquet for the FFA, and in May prepared the annual Mother and Daughter Banquet. The seventh grade girls served a luncheon for the mothers and the eighth grade girls put on a dinner for the local 4-H leaders as an additional project.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE AND MANUAL ARTS

Shop 7 and 8 are principally classes in woodworking. The younger boys in the seventh grade are using hand tools, and making projects which require relatively simple construction. The eighth grade group is being instructed in the use of some of the power tools such as the woodturning lathe, jig saw, power sander, drill press, bench grinder, etc. Safety in shop practice is stressed although we are faced with the problem of teaching shop to a much larger number than can be safely handled in the space available at the Hooper Building.

One of the Vocational Agriculture boys represented the State of New Hampshire at the Eastern States Exposition this fall as a member of the state cattle judging team. Two other boys received purebred cattle from the Sears Roebuck Foundation.

Inclement weather forced the School Fair indoors this year, except for the school parade which was actively supported by all grades at the school. Although the attendance and the size of the fair was not as large as in a year ago, all who took part considered it a successful venture for the FFA.

Part of the required curriculum in Vocational Agriculture is a farming project or program which each boy carries on at home. Some of the projects are extremely well handled, so much so that we had the honor of having another student chosen as one of the top ten agriculture students in the state this year. The student was awarded the State Farmer degree at the annual FFA convention held in Colebrook last July.

The Hooper Chapter has twenty members enrolled this year. This group is responsible for the School Fair, the annual Father and Son Banquet, as well as several other undertakings throughout the year. The aim of the group is to teach leadership and cooperation to all its members.

It is our hope that additional space and facilities can be added to this department in the near future in order that a more extensive program may be worked out in agriculture and in the field of manual training.

CAFETERIA PROGRAM

The cafeteria program is being directed by Mrs. Dwight Jeffrey again this year with Mrs. Arline Jeffrey as her assistant. Twelve pupils assist in serving meals. From September through December a total of 23,725 lunches were served to pupils and 1240 meals to adults. The Type A program requirements for a complete school lunch are being adequately met by our program. Government surplus commodities made available to the school have consisted mainly of dried milk, shortening, cheese products, vegetables and fruits. The charge of 25c per meal to pupils has been continued.

GUIDANCE

The guidance program has made considerable use of the University of New Hampshire Test Battery. This battery measures the pupil's interests, aptitudes, and primary mental abilities. A test of English comprehension is also included. The battery is given each year to all pupils in grades nine and eleven which allows a pupil to take this battery twice during high school.

The New Hampshire Employment Agency in Keene administered their occupational tests to all members of the senior class. This test is of particular value to pupils who are considering entering the work field with a minimum of advanced training.

Seniors visited the University of New Hampshire this year and plan to attend several visiting days at several other institutions. Speakers have been at the school to talk to the pupils on several different types of training available in nursing, technical fields and government work. Advice concerning opportunities in the armed forces has also been made available.

Each pupil in the school has an individual folder. Included in the folder is pertinent information about the progress of the pupil, test results, personal data sheets and other anecdotal records compiled as the pupils continue through school.

FACULTY MEETINGS

Faculty meetings with the elementary junior high and high school teachers are held periodically throughout the year. Committees in each group have been organized to study and recommend ways of improving the school program.

In the elementary area a handbook designed for new teachers and substitutes was developed and it has proved to be an extremely useful tool. Considerable work on the report card revision was brought up for faculty discussion. Individual folders for elementary pupils were approved as a guidance technique in grades one through six. With the high school faculty and school nurse, a policy to cover procedure in case of accident and sickness at the school is being formulated this year.

In the high school, the subject of improving the junior high program has received continued attention. A new special report to be sent home at the mid-term mark was studied and adopted. Faculty study and approval were given to the use of standard tests in the field of English the results of which have been of value to all. Standard tests at the end of the school year to measure the progress of our pupils against regional and national norms were given in science, mathematics and social studies in June of last year. It is hoped that the continued use of such professional tools by our faculty will result in a better school program.

I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, faculty, pupils, and the parents of Walpole for their continued cooperation.
