THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourth day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 2 through 44 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 6, 1975 at 7 p.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- C. Elections and Registration
- D. Expense Town Hall and other Buildings

3. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1975 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,928.78 to be used with the sum of \$12,858.53 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112.00 to be matched with \$2,114.00 from a grant by Region V LEPC for two hand held four (4) frequency Portable Radios for the Weare Police Department.
10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a full time police officer or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)
11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
12. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of an Ambulance and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 therefore or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new Fire Trucks or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)
14. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new fire equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 therefore or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)
15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new radio communications system or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By petition)
16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.
17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted

appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated or to take any other action in relation thereto:

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply the accrued interest of \$3,312.32 from Revenue Sharing Funds plus residue of \$416.95 from allocation of Fire truck plus \$64.46 in future interest to the overdraft in Town Hall and office equipment.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500 for the purpose of painting the exterior of the Town Hall and complete the work needed to restore the second floor or to take any other action in relation thereto.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for waste disposal for the Town of Weare pursuant to RSA 147 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 provided that matching funds from the State in the amount of \$10,000 and the Federal Government in the amount of \$35,000 become available to convert the River Road from Riverdale to the Clough State Park to a Class II State of New Hampshire maintained highway or to take any other action in relation thereto.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Tax maps or to take any other action in relation thereto.

23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$535.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town; further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the Town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare.

32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town Meeting 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A RSA amended.

33. To see if the Town will accept Ridge View Road in South Weare for a distance of .8 of a mile, said distance being the remaining portion beyond that which the Town accepted in 1972. (Ridge View Road goes southerly from South Weare Fire Station past residence of Donald Lewis and others and continues to Route 77.) (By petition)

34. To see if the Town will accept Woodland Drive (off of Rockland Road) as a town road. (By petition)

35. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify a portion of Burnt Hill Road from Route 77, adjacent to the Earl Sanborn residence to the Dumont residence (measures $\frac{1}{4}$ mile), from a Class VI to a Class V roadway, thereby removing the status of subject to gates and bars and assuming the responsibility for the maintenance of said section of road. (By petition)

36. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the East Shore Road, better known as Hunt Street, at Horace Lake from a Class VI highway to a Class V highway. (By petition)

37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the town grader shed at no cost to the town. (By petition)

38. To see if the Town will give a vote of encouragement to the special bicentennial program planned for the year July, 1975 - July, 1976 by the Town Bicentennial Committee. This program consists of

non-profit, self-supporting activities designed to bring the people of Weare together in celebration of our 200-year-old country's past, present and future. (By petition)

39. To see if the Town will appropriate an additional \$2,200.00 per year for the Selectmen to obtain additional secretarial assistance. (By petition)

40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: In order to permit the people of Weare to have a voice in the improvement of their roads, Town-maintained roads shall be widened and/or paved only with the prior written consent of the Board of Selectmen after a public hearing. In deciding whether to consent, the Selectmen MUST give substantial weight to the views and wishes of abutters as expressed at the hearing or in writing. This ordinance shall have no effect on road repair and maintenance. (By petition)

41. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: In order to preserve the scenic beauty of the Town of Weare, the height of any structure hereafter erected in the Town shall not exceed twenty-five (25) feet above ground level; provided, however, that this ordinance shall not apply to buildings or to structures erected by private individuals for personal, non-business purposes or to telephone and electric power distribution poles carrying less than 15 KVA. (By petition)

42. To see whether the Town will vote to designate the part of Mount Dearborn Road between Mill Road and Hodgdon Road as a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253:17. (By petition)

43. To see what action the Town will take to elect one Town Auditor on an annual basis for three years pursuant to RSA 41:32a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

44. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

March 5, 1974

The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Weare was called to order at 10 a.m. by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany.

Harold E. Thomson moved the polls be kept open until 7 p.m. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator read Articles 1 and 2 of the Warrant. Harold E. Thomson moved to proceed with Articles 1 and 2 and Articles 3 through 39 be considered at the adjourned Town Meeting on Thursday, March 7 at 7 p.m. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator announced that the polls were open at 10:40 a.m. The Moderator then introduced the School District Moderator, Grenville Clark III who brought the School District Meeting to order. Mr. Clark read the School District Warrant for March 5, 1974. Gordon Tiffany moved the articles be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The School District Moderator declared the polls open for School District Meeting at 10:05 a.m. Gordon Tiffany moved the polls for the School District be kept open until 7 p.m. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The School District Moderator announced the polls for the School District would remain open until 7 p.m.

The polls were closed at 7 p.m. by Moderator Gordon Tiffany and School District Moderator Grenville Clark III. Mr. Tiffany announced the Weare Town Meeting stands recessed until Thursday, May 7 at 7 p.m. Ballots were then counted. At 9:15 p.m. Moderator Gordon M. Tiffany and School District Moderator Grenville Clark III announced the results of the Town and School elections.

At 7 p.m. on March 7, 1974 the adjourned Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator. The meeting was asked to stand to hear the names of town residents who had died since the last Town Meeting followed by a moment of silence. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Volker Wyrenbeck. The Moderator called the meeting's attention to the names listed on page 3 of the Annual Report. The Moderator then read the rules of order for the meeting and then proceeded with the reading of the Warrant.

ARTICLE 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- C. Elections and Registration

- E. Insurance

- N. Damages and Legal Expenses
- O. Social Security

- Q. Warning System (Red Network)

Finance Committee recommendation - \$43,000. Frank Farmer, Chariman of the Finance Committee, moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

Frank Farmer moved that the provision for the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1974 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

Frank Farmer moved that the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$35,000 to cover both summer and winter roads. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$18,000. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,929.22 to be used with the sum of \$12,861.48 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$1,929.22. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Since the Road Agent has no plans to purchase equipment this year, the Finance Committee recommended no funds. Frank Farmer moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation — \$7,800. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish as an ordinance of the Town of Weare the following:

NOTICE OF BUILDING AND PERMIT ORDINANCE

Whereas, to secure the orderly development of the Town of Weare, and for the protection of the public health and safety, the following is hereby adopted as an ordinance in and for the Town of Weare.

No building shall be hereinafter constructed by any person or persons, unless said person or persons shall first file with the Selectmen a notice of intent to build said building, which notice shall contain the general specifications of the proposed building or new construction, its location and intended use, and such other information as the Selectmen may require, and upon the filing of such notice, obtain from the Selectmen a permit for such building.

Upon receipt of the notice by the Selectmen or any one of them, unless the Selectmen make a determination that said building is not in the public interest or in any way jeopardizes the public health or safety, they shall forthwith issue the permit to the person or persons filing the notice, which permit shall be visibly displayed by the person or persons at the site of said construction.

In the event the Selectmen shall make a determination that the proposed building is not in the

public interest or in any way jeopardizes the public health or safety, they shall forthwith notify the applicant of such determination and their refusal to issue the permit and the applicant shall, upon request, be granted a hearing before the Board of Selectmen within 15 days from the notice of such refusal, and shall be entitled to all rights of appeal as set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 36, as if said Board of Selectmen were a Board of Adjustment.

It shall be unlawful for any person to commence construction of any building within the Town of Weare, without having first filed the notice as herein required and obtained the permit as hereinabove set forth. Any person who shall be found guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be fined not more than the maximum amount allowed by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

James B. Craig, Selectman, told the meeting that a building permit would help the Selectmen in assessing new construction or taxable improvements. There will be no cost for the permit. It would take a week at the maximum to obtain a permit and the permits will provide a record to show the growth of the town. James Craig moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$7,000. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$1,500. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. Robert Wilson asked why the amount was increased \$100. this year. Frank Farmer stated this was basically for an increase in wages for the men who take care of the cemeteries. After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$400. Frank Farmer moved the amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$3,000. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. After some discussion the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$300. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$200. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$381.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$381. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, spoke to the meeting about this service and explained what the money was used for. He moved the amount of \$3,000. be accepted. The Finance Committee recommended \$2,469.00 be appropriated for the Community Nursing Service. Mr. Thomson stated he would accept a substitution of \$2,469.00 for the amount he had moved. The motion was seconded and the vote on Article 19, substituting the amount of \$2,469.00 for \$3,000.00, was affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate and do all other things necessary to

obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available in the construction of sewerage disposal system for the elementary school and the high school according to Phase One as described and recommended in the Engineering Report by Anderson- Nichols, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Joseph Souter moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved to amend the article as follows: That the Selectmen be directed to eliminate the property of Haskell Realty located on the north side of East Street from being serviced by the proposed municipal sewer system and the Anderson-Nichols design. This decision to be rescinded only by future vote of Town Meeting. The motion to amend was seconded. A lengthy discussion followed. Edward Gallagher said the amendment should not be adopted. He questioned the wisdom of a town meeting deciding on its own the ways and means of correcting pollution or exempting any particular party from the rules and regulations established by law. Mr. Wyrenbeck asked for a legal opinion on whether we would lose State Aid if we voted yes on the amendment. Douglas Hatfield, town attorney, stated that it would be proper for the town to designate the limits of the system. He didn't feel it would destroy the town's eligibility under the EPA grants if one property was not contained within the system. The final decision, however, would be made by Mr. Metcalf of the State Water Supply and Pollution Commission. Mr. Gallagher said his sincere belief is that the answer to the question is whether or not this property is contributing to the pollution situation. Further discussion followed and Eldon Townes stated Phase I and Phase II must be accepted in order to qualify for the grants. It would be up to the individual owners of homes to hook into the line. Edward Gallagher moved to end the debate. The vote was affirmative. A division vote was called for. The vote was: Yes - 65; No - 91. The motion to end the debate lost.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved to amend the amendment as follows: provided that if the elimination of the said realty on the north side of East Street would result in the loss of funds, it will be controlling. The motion was seconded. Grenville Clark moved to amend the amendment to the amendment by including either federal or state funds. The amendment was accepted by Mr. Wyrenbeck. The vote was taken on the amendment. The vote was negative and the amendment lost.

Wilfred Lahey moved to amend the article by inserting "Phase 2" so that the article would read "Phase 1 and Phase 2". The motion was seconded. Mr. Gallagher spoke on the importance of accepting this amendment. The vote was taken and the vote was affirmative.

Grenville Clark moved to amend the article by deleting the words "elementary school and high school" and inserting "Town of Weare".

The amendment was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on the amended article was taken and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preparation of plans and specifications for a sewerage disposal system for the elementary school and the high school according to Phase One as described and recommended in the Engineering Report by Anderson-Nichols, the Selectmen being authorized to arrange for such plans and specifications by that company and take any other action relating thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$2,500. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. Wilfred Lahey moved to amend the article by inserting "Phase 2" and the eliminating the words "elementary school and high school" and substituting the words "Town of Weare". The motion was seconded and the vote on the amendment was affirmative. After a short discussion, the vote on the amended article was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to transmit the thanks and appreciation of the Town of Weare to the Ford Foundation for its grant of \$2,375.00 towards payment for the Engineering Report entitled "Report on Necessary Correction of Pollution by Adequate Collection and Treatment of Wastewater at Weare Center."

A motion was made and seconded to accept the article. The vote was affirmative. Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, spoke of the many hours of work given to this project by Edward Gallagher, Wilfred Lahey and Joseph Souter and called for a rising vote of thanks of the meeting for these gentlemen.

ARTICLE 23. To see whether or not the Town will vote to advise the Selectmen that certain abandoned roads or others not ordinarily maintained, as selected and determined upon recommendation by or consultation with the Fire Chief and Forest Fire Warden as strategic for fire fighting, should be cleared sufficiently to permit access by Fire apparatus.

Wilfred Lahey moved the article be accepted. The motion was seconded and, after a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town Meeting 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the

Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A, amended RSA.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$250. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to amend, effective upon passage, the ordinance regulating trailers by adding thereto the following sections:

1. Section No. B – In determining whether or not a variance shall be granted and before issuing a permit the Selectmen shall consider the effect of the proposed location on the general health and welfare of the town and the neighborhood, also the maintenance of the aesthetics in the neighborhood and the effect on land values of neighboring properties, also the hardship of the party petitioning for the variance.
2. Section No. D – Any person found guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and each day any person shall continue to violate the ordinance after notice shall be deemed a separate violation.

James B. Craig, Selectman, explained the reason for this amendment and moved the article be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an ordinance for the Town of Weare, the following:

“Whereas it is in the best interest of the Town of Weare that up-to-date records be kept as to new residents and their address, and

Whereas changes in ownership of real estate are reported to the Town by the Registry of Deeds,

Now Therefore, any person who shall rent any quarters for residential purposes within the Town of Weare for a period in excess of thirty (30) days, between January 1st and December 31st of any year, shall report the name and address of the tenant or tenants to the Town Clerk on or before March of the next succeeding year. Any person who shall be found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a violation.

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.”

Or to take any other action in respect thereto.

James B. Craig moved the adoption of this article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to require any town agency to report to the Selectmen in writing for publication in Town Reports any donations received, or to take any other action in respect thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the motion to dismiss was lost.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements on behalf of the Town whereby tax relief is granted to a new industry located in the Town of Weare, employing not less than ten (10) persons, provided said agreement shall be for not more than five (5) years and shall not give more than seventy-five (75%) relief of taxes to be paid, the authority to continue until rescinded by vote of the Town, or to take any other action in respect thereto.

Eldon Townes moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 29. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of a radar unit for the Police Department, or to take any other action in respect thereto.

Frank Farmer moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

THE MEETING WAS RECESSED AT 10 p.m. AND RESUMED AT 10:15 p.m.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town; further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the Town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation – \$25,000. Frank Farmer moved the adoption of the article with an amendment that this sum of money be paid over a two-year period. After some discussion, the vote on the amendment was taken. The vote was affirmative. The amended article was then discussed and a standing vote taken. The vote was as follows: Yes - 58; No - 85. The vote was negative and the article lost.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the collection of real estate taxes on a bi-annual basis, the first payment to be due July 1st and to be one-half (½) of the preceeding years taxes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold E. Thomson moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to promote sanitary waste disposal and to protect fresh water supplies by requiring that any building used for residential purposes and constructed, remodeled or enlarged hereafter to provide four or more dwelling units shall be on a lot containing not less than two acres for each dwelling unit in the building.

Neal Kurk moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to designate any of its roads as scenic roads under the provisions of RSA 253 as amended, each such road to be proposed at the meeting and voted upon separately.

Neal Kurk requested withdrawal of this article. There being no objection, the article was withdrawn.

ARTICLE 34. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to erect a barrier and a gate to the Town Dump, or to take any action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation - \$750. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. After some discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the article lost.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee consisting of a member of the Planning Board, a member of the Conservation Commission, and three other citizens of Weare, to investigate and report to the Town a comprehensive plan for sanitary waste disposal.

Malcolm Purington, Selectman, moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare.

Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to dismiss the present Civil Defense roster and, with the advice and assistance of the Fire and Police Chiefs and the Captain of the Rescue Squad, make new appointments to Civil Defense.

Robert McLeod moved to adopt the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee authorized to establish names for all streets, roads and numbered route sections, and have on file at the Town Clerk's Office by September 1, 1974 a map indicating these names.

A motion was made and seconded to adopt this article as read.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved to amend the article as follows: any private roads to be named would be named by the owners of the road. The motion to amend was seconded and the vote was affirmative. The vote on the amended article was taken and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

James B. Craig moved that the Selectmen be authorized and empowered to convey, without consideration, approximately 3.2 acres of Town land, located on the east side of Route 114, to the Weare School District for use as part of the Weare School land, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem just. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

James B. Craig moved that the Selectmen be authorized and empowered to allow the Weare School District to use the Town Hall for school purposes, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine to be in the best interest of the Town. The motion was seconded. Neal Kurk moved to amend as follows: provided that such use shall not impair the historic value of the Town Hall. The amendment was seconded and the vote affirmative. The vote on the amended motion was affirmative.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 31:105 and indemnify and save harmless any employee or agent of the Town from personal financial loss and expense arising out of any claim for damage while said employee or agent is acting in the scope of his employment or office. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Malcolm C. Purington requested the meeting to stand and give a hearty round of applause to Henry T. Osborne for his 34 years of service as Town Treasurer.

The Moderator stated he had received a letter from the Governor of New Hampshire which he would read to the meeting unless there was some dissent. One member of the meeting voiced his dissent and the letter was not read.

Walter Knox III moved that the Weare Town Hall be available for the Weare Scouting program – Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Cubs and Brownies – with the permission of the Selectmen. The motion was seconded. James Craig stated that the Board of Selectmen would have no objections once the building has been put back in proper order and if people using the building will adhere to the rules set by the Board. The vote was affirmative.

Edward Gallagher called for a round of applause for Gordon M. Tiffany, Moderator.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m.

Following the meeting Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, Donald E. Thomson, Treasurer and Beverly M. Herman, Town Clerk were given the oath of office by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany.

ANNUAL REPORT WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Weare Police Department received 1,550 calls during the year 1974. 1,152 call were received on the police line. The remainder, 398, were direct calls to the Chief or other officers. This is an increase of 340 calls over 1973. 1,800 man hours were worked answering these calls and carrying out our routine patrol. This was an increase of 282 hours over the previous year.

There were 60 motor vehicle accidents reported compared to 43 in 1973. Motor vehicle complaints totaled approximately 100, showing the need for more concentration on highway safety.

There were 35 breaking and entering complaints investigated by this Department as well as 30 larceny complaints not connected with the breaks.

Dog complaints are on the increase. A total of 80 were received on our police phone and many more were given directly to the Dog Officer. This leads me to believe the Dog Ordinance is not being adhered to. PLEASE try to comply with this request.

Disturbing the peace complaints numbered 47.

Assisting other Departments - 41.

Stolen vehicles recovered - 4.

Vandalism -- 12.

Obscene and nuisance telephone calls - 10.

The Department had 15 requests to check property in the absence of the owners. Again, I ask you to please notify the Police Department if you plan a vacation or are going to be away for any length of time. Our vigil of your property may prevent a burglary or vandalism.

New equipment purchased in 1974 included a new typewriter and a camera. The camera is a Rapid Omega 200, roll film type. This is a much needed instrument for efficient and professional police work.

Our officers now have the opportunity for instruction in the use of weapons used in their work. This consists of fire arms training being conducted by the Goffstown Police Department at their shooting range. The instructions are given free. The only expense is for ammunition used which is purchased by this department for the men to qualify. This qualification must be met by August, 1975. I am proud to say most of my officers have already accomplished this goal. We are fortunate to have a neighboring town such as Goffstown to loan us the facilities of their Department.

The Goffstown Police Department has been very generous in loaning us the use of one of their two radar units. For the past month or so this unit has been used on weekends to monitor the speeding traffic through different parts of Weare and, because of this, we have appre-

hended a great number of violators. It is our intention to continue this policy until the Town of Weare can see its way clear to purchase a radar unit for our Department.

In this year's warrant you will notice that I have asked for two portable radios to be purchased this year. With the acquisition of these units, the officer will have communication with other units and dispatch centers when out of his vehicle. This will be a big factor in promoting greater safety to the officer while in the line of duty.

It is my pleasure to announce that Donald Thomson and David Nichols have become members of our force. They are an asset to our Department.

In closing, we would like to take this opportunity to thank the State Police, the Police of adjoining towns, and the citizens of Weare who have assisted us in the protection of life and property during the last year.

ANNUAL REPORT WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

The red network calls in the Town of Weare for the year 1974 numbered 300. Calls were for: Rescue Squad - 104; fire calls - 60; police calls - 29; cat up tree - 5; snake in house - 1; 101 were for information and wrong numbers. There were many more fire calls this year than we have had in the past and required more hours to control. Four of these fires were of suspicious origin. We had an increase of 25 alarms this year which is an increase of about 66%. The fire calls were as follows: building - 9; barn - 2; grass and brush - 15; chimney - 5; car fire - 6; trailer - 1; lightning striking homes - 2; out of town calls - 12; and 8 calls to the town dump. The calls to the town dump cost the men 65 hours of their time and about \$150 of the fire department budget. We had to call out-of-town help on two of our fires — on one fire we called for help from three towns.

The department purchased new tires for the large tanker and two nozzles — one each for truck # 1 and # 2. We did general maintenance on all trucks in the department and will have to do motor repairs to truck 2 this year.

Some of the radios in our department are very old and have cost the department much money to keep them in working order. The men in the department have started a radio communication fund with the money earned from a raffle and auction with the hope of replacing the

radio system that we now have with a new, complete radio system. This system would be a great help to your red network operator. The operator would be able to tone out (call) the men on the radios without making a telephone call. It would also be possible to blow the alarms on the other stations by radio. This system is very expensive and will require a considerable amount of money to complete.

The fire department held a number of drills this past year with several drills being held with other towns. We had one drill with another drill being called in in the middle of the first. This helped us to see how fast the men could pick up at one and move to the other.

A new air horn has been installed at Brownie's garage to help give the fire alarms. This horn can be heard in North Weare better than the one at the Center fire station.

This coming year we must replace the roof on the South Weare station and the north side of the central station in the Center. We must paint the inside of the Sugar Hill station because of smoke damage from a blow-back by the furnace. We will also try to put an alarm system in the station up at Lake View so that we can call the men out there by air horn.

We have a committee made up of firemen and members of the Board of Fire Wards to draw up specifications for a new fire truck which we hope the townspeople will vote to buy at Town Meeting. We now have three out-dated trucks in our department, and we hope to start a replacement program so that people living around the other stations will not lose their insurance ratings.

The Weare Fire Department wishes to thank the Ladies' Auxiliary and the people of the Town of Weare for all the help and assistance they have given us this past year. Always remember to get a permit from the Forest Fire Warden to burn when the ground is not completely covered with snow. This way we will know when people are burning and it will save us time and you, money.

REPORT WEARE RESCUE SQUAD

The Weare Rescue Squad responded to 104 calls during 1974. There were 11 calls for automobile accidents; 10 calls for home, farm and industrial accidents; 9 calls for recreational accidents; 63 calls for medical emergencies; 2 calls for transfer and 9 calls for standby at fires or other activities.

There were 56 patients transported to Concord Hospital; 16 to Notre Dame Hospital; 7 to Elliot Hospital and 5 to the Veteran's Administration Hospital.

Seven squad members completed the 71 hour Emergency Medical Technician-Ambulance course. Several have completed the in-hospital phase of this program that gives the graduate the opportunity to work directly with the nurses and physicians of the emergency room to provide patient care.

One new member, a registered nurse, was added to the squad roster this year. Reassignment of personnel within the Fire Department now provides for members who have a primary duty to the Rescue Squad. This will help insure that people will be available when fire calls are being answered.

Time involved in answering calls, training, administrative duties and maintenance amounted to over 1,500 man hours donated this year.

REPORT FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire, then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid-August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

REPORT OF CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR 1974

Active interest in 1974 was in furtherance of the Anderson-Nichols project to correct pollution at Weare Center. A member of the Commission, E. W. Gallagher, was authorized by the Selectmen to act as liaison with the engineers in the process of applying for federal and state approval and aid. It proceeded toward final approval until complications caused by dredging from the school hill and other changes in the original conditions required solution and new plans. It is hoped that by March these complications will have been solved.

As provided by law, the Commission was asked to advise and inform the Water Resources Board regarding an alleged violation by dredging and filling without permit; and in another case regarding an application for dredging and filling. Both matters were resolved satisfac-

torily. Applications for dredging and filling are referred to the Commission for investigation and report.

Constitutionality of the N.H. statute prohibiting dumping refuse in N.H. from any other state is being challenged by a Boston company. This company wants to dump refuse from Somerville and Cambridge in a gravel pit in Ossipee. The present statute protects Weare and other towns from such dumping of out-of-state refuse and garbage.

Open burning at town dumps is prohibited after July 1st. This and other public health and safety laws mean that towns must make plans for appropriate refuse disposal. The Conservation Commission gathered information on this subject for the town committee considering it.

The Legislature was to consider enactment of a new law for conserving and planning land use and guiding growth and development throughout the State. An important point is that such a law should contain provision so that a town would not be deprived of home-rule nor denied the privilege of authority and expression regarding plans for lands within its boundaries. If we at home do not undertake to solve our own land use problems, the State will do it for us – in a way we may not like.

Environmental Protection Division, Office of Attorney General, State House Annex, Concord 03301, telephone 271-3659, provides forms for reporting environmental complaints concerning pollution, subdivisions, sewage disposal, dredging and filling wetlands.

The amount accumulated and held-over at the end of 1973 for the Conservation Commission Fund was \$824.60. In March, 1974, \$250.00 was appropriated to make the total \$1,074.60. There was no expenditure by the Commission in 1974 and no charge to the Town for administrative expenses.

CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK Annual Report 1974

The Park opened May 25 and closed October 15, 1974. Roy Johnson served as gate attendant and special Park police, Bernard Phelps as Park caretaker and special police on weekends. Among the various groups which used the Park facilities without cost were: swimming lessons (two weeks) for approximately 120 Weare children, four (4) highly successful band concerts, Fourth of July fireworks sponsored by the Weare Fire Department, New Hampshire State Hospital Staff outing, Weare Taxpayers Association picnic and others.

Improvements made at the Park were held to a minimum in view of increased costs for labor necessary for Park operations. However, picnic tables were repaired and stained with wood preservative, wharfs and fireplaces were repaired, a new diving board purchased and a new hand pump installed at the well.

Samples of water at the beaches were taken for analysis at the laboratories of the State Water Pollution Commission and proved to be safe for swimming. Similarly, water from the Park well was tested and shown to be safe for drinking.

Park grounds were mowed and kept in a clean and orderly condition. A United States flag was flown every day, weather permitting. Buoys were installed around the swimming area to prevent entrance of boats. Water skiing from Park shores was prohibited. Several dead trees were cut down for safety. The snack bar was open most of the time operated by Beatrice Chase, Goffstown.

A car sticker system for identification of Weare taxpayers' vehicles was continued. All such stickers were issued at the season rate of \$2.00 per immediate family. Additional stickers for more than one car per family were issued without cost.

The previous tables show that the Park is supported mainly from income derived from non-Weare taxpayers. In fact, Weare taxpayers contributed, through season stickers purchased, approximately 20 per cent of the costs for Park maintenance and operation. To meet increased costs for Park operation (labor), the season rate per immediate family of Weare taxpayers was increased from \$1.00 to \$2.00 which provided for use of all Park facilities. In 1974, season stickers sold to Weare taxpayers amounted to \$680.00 as compared with the income derived from non-Weare taxpayers, a total of \$1,958. A comparison of the number of season stickers sold to Weare taxpayers in 1973 and 1974 shows that in 1973 440 were sold whereas in 1974 only 340 were sold.

In summary, there are major improvements which should be made at the Park in the near future. These include a wall to prevent erosion of the bank on the south shore, repair of all wharfs and extension of the asphalt pavement. The present sources of income in relation to expenses for Park operation does not provide sufficient economic resources for these improvements. The Town of Weare should, in the near future, make the decisions as to whether or not it is willing to support the operation of it's Chase Recreational Park, to establish controls on it's use by non-Weare taxpayers and provide sufficient economic resources, annually, to ensure proper Park maintenance.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The plan for the school building program, as voted on at the School District meeting in March of 1974, has been substantially completed. The Town Hall has been renovated and repaired for auditorium, band and other school uses. The four room addition to the elementary school has been completed. The sewage disposal system has been substantially completed for the entire school system. (The sewage system was much more extensive than anticipated). The water system, including two additional wells and controls relocated to the janitors' headquarters, is in operation. Site development with tremendously increased space for athletic activities nears completion. The new high school, started late in the year, will be finished shortly. The gym addition/cafeteria with necessary hookups for a new kitchen is in the works. By the School District Meeting of this year the entire project will be substantially complete.

RECORD OF SCHOOL MEETING
Weare School District
Annual Meeting - March 6, 1974

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m., by Grenville Clark III, Moderator.

Mr. Clark announced that Clark's Rules of Order, patterned after Robert's Rules, would be followed. A motion to dismiss will be recognized and it will be debatable. Carried by a majority. The Moderator pointed out that there are bond articles in this warrant and that these will be by written ballot.

Robert Munro moved to suspend the rules and take up Article 4 before Article I. Seconded by Arthur Brennan. The Moderator stated that the chair understands that the reason for suspension was in order to comply with state law that a bond article be acted upon as the first order of business. Motion carried.

Article 4:

Chester Colburn, Jr. moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$678,273.00 for the purpose of building a new high school; site preparation, including sewerage facilities, making repairs to the existing gymnasium, the town hall and an addition to the existing elementary school as per plan of John Sullivan. That said sum be raised by the issuance of notes or bonds of the District upon such terms and conditions as the School Board shall determine to be in the interest of the District. The School Board is authorized to enter into all contracts and to execute all documents that may be necessary for the undertaking of the work and the issuance of the bonds. Duly seconded. The Moderator appointed Charles Brown, Jr. to act as assistant Moderator during the time the Ad Hoc Committee presented the proposal and answered questions.

David Titcomb presented blue prints showing proposed locations of the buildings on the 15 acre elementary school site. Eldon Townes explained proposed site preparation. Sewerage problems in Weare Center were discussed. It was explained that Phase I and Phase II of the sewerage proposal would both have to be voted to qualify for 95% Federal funds. Charles Brown, Jr. explained proposed additions to the elementary school and improvements and repairs to the town hall. Chester Colburn, Jr. explained proposed additions to the gymnasium. Mr. Titcomb described proposed new high school and Priscilla Kendrick explained room layout. Robert Munro explained about insurance rates

and also that, if present tax base doesn't change, the cost of the plan would add approximately \$5.00 per \$1,000.00 to the tax rate. Arthur Brennan summarized the proposal-Cost-\$678,273.00, less state aid of \$198,982.00, leaving balance of \$479,291.00.

The meeting was turned back to Mr. Clark, the Moderator. James Craig moved that there be no further debate and that Article 4 be put to vote. Duly seconded. Motion carried by two-thirds vote, Vote was by ckeck list and paper ballot. Polls were opened at 8:58 P.M. and closed at 10:00 P.M. The Moderator appointed Norman Wood, J.S. Middleton, Barbara Cram and John Ridwell to count the ballots under the supervision of the District Clerk and Moderator. Results: Yes 183 - No 49. Motion carried by over 2/3 majority.

Robert Munro moved that the existing building committee be dismissed with the thanks and gratitude of the town. Seconded by Charles Brown, Jr. Motion carried.

Robert Munro moved that the School District vote to give authority to the present Ad Hoc Committee to act as a building committee in all dealings on behalf of the School District with the architect and contractors and have final approval of said Plans, Specifications and Contracts for the entire project previously noted-that being the new High School, additions to existing Elementary School, provided all plans and specifications have the approval of the State Board of Education and Fire Marshall's office. Seconded by Arthur Brennan.

During discussion, Neal Kurk raised the point of conflict of interest of the Committee members bidding on the contracts which they would be approving. Motion put to a vote and motion carried.

Article I:

It was moved by Verna Martin and seconded by Priscilla Kendrick that the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and compensation of any other officers or agents of the District be accepted in the amount of \$785.00 as listed in the budget. Vote was in the affirmative.

Article II:

It was moved by Priscilla Kendrick and duly seconded that reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Motion carried.

Article III:

Robert Munro moved that the Town Auditors audit the School District accounts and that a study group be formed to make a study of

the disposition of the present high school. Arthur Brennan offered an amendment to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five, including at least one School Board member and one Selectman to make the study. Seconded by Charles Brown, Jr. Amendment carried and main article as amended carried.

Article V:

Raymond Rogers moved that the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States. Duly seconded. Motion carried.

Article VI:

Arthur Brennan moved that Article 6 be dismissed as it is included under Article 4. Seconded by James Craig. Motion carried.

Article VII:

Raymond Rogers moved to dismiss Article 7 as it is included under Article 4. Duly seconded. Motion carried.

Article VIII:

Raymond Rogers moved to dismiss Article 8. Duly seconded. Neal Kurk raised the point that the Colburn property adjacent to the school might be needed at a future date.

Charles Brown, Jr., moved that the District appropriate \$35,000.00 to be used with the \$15,000.00, already voted in the March, 1973, meeting, to be used only for the purchase of the Edgar Colburn property and to authorize the School Board to enter into such contract as may be necessary to take title to said land. Seconded by Robert Munro.

Neal Kurk moved to add the amendment "to be used in connection with the School Building Program voted under Article 4." Duly seconded. Amendment carried.

Neal Kurk offered an amendment to the main motion to insert the words "raise and" before the word "appropriate". Seconded by Arthur Brennan. This amendment was defeated. Main motion carried, "That the District appropriate \$35,000.00 to be used with the \$15,000.00, already voted in the March, 1973, meeting, to be used only for the purchase of the Edgar Colburn property to be used in connection with the School Building Program voted under Article 4, and to authorize the School Board to enter into such contract as may be necessary to take title to said land."

Robert Munro moved that the sum of \$35,000.00 voted under Article 8 be raised by bonds of the District as part of the bond issue voted under Article 4. Seconded by Raymond Rogers. Upon advice of Town Counselor, the Moderator announced that voting would be by voice rather than by paper ballot. Motion carried by more than a two-thirds vote.

Article IX:

Robert Munro moved that Article 9 be dismissed. Duly seconded. Motion carried and Article 9 was dismissed.

Article X:

Neal Kurk moved that the District vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for District Employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident within the scope of his employment or office. Seconded by Marjorie Clark

Robert Munro offered an amendment to insert "not enforceable until July 1, 1974", following the word "indemnification". Duly seconded. Motion lost. Main motion carried as printed in Article 10 of the Warrant.

Article XI:

Marjorie Eaton moved that the District raise and appropriate \$481,828.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. Duly seconded.

Frank Farmer, a member of the Finance Committee, gave statistics and moved that the amount to be raised be amended to \$438,700.00. Duly seconded.

Following a long discussion, Neal Kurk moved to amend the amendment so that the amount to be raised would be \$451,000.00. Duly seconded. Standing vote taken on amendment to amendment.

Results: Yes 73 - No - 34. Motion carried, so that the first amendment was for the sum of \$451,000.00 while the main motion was for \$481,828.00. The amendment to the main motion carried so that main motion became whether to raise and appropriate the sum of \$451,000.00 The main motion was then voted upon and carried so that the vote of the District was to raise and appropriate \$451,000.00 for the school budget.

Article XII:

Marjorie Eaton moved that, as of the School District Meeting in 1975, the Finance Committee supply a copy of its report and recommendations to the School Board not less than 14 days prior to the School District Meeting. Duly seconded.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To The School Board and Citizens of Weare

I herewith submit my 1974 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

Three years ago, the United States Commissioner of Education made a courageous appeal for a new sense of purpose in American education. He proposed that we reorder our whole education effort around the new concept which he chose to call "career education."

His call triggered a quiet revolution in American education. The Commissioner said:

"Education's most serious failing is its self-induced voluntary fragmentation. The strong tendency of education's several parts to separate from one another, to divide the enterprise against itself . . . "I propose that the universal goal of American education, starting now, be this: that every young person completing our school program at grade twelve be ready to enter higher education or to enter useful or rewarding employment . . . "

This appeal has been widely misconstrued by educational policy makers, and thus its far-reaching nature has been misunderstood. "Career education" is NOT simply a new name for what we now call "vocational education." The Commissioner was not saying that our concept of vocational education should be somewhat enlarged and the enlarged concept called "career education." Nor was he saying that new programs in something called "career education" should be developed at the cost of vocational education.

He was saying something much different and much more fundamental. He was saying that the old distinctions which have crippled our educational effort should be forever laid aside and a new unity of purpose be expressed by a new universal term: "career education."

Right now we have a bewildering variety of designations within the educational system, but the principal ones are these: College preparatory education, Vocational education and General education.

These terms have come to suggest choices which need not be made, distinctions which have no meaning, divisions of what is really indivisible, and conflicts where none need exist.

Our thought and our practice about education should at last be integrated. The result of this integration should be called "career education." It would come about when American education emphasizes preparation for work as a prominent and permanent objective of the public schools to include unpaid work as well as the world of paid employment.

We believe the public wants two things: one very consciously, the other more subconsciously. The public's conscious demand is a demand

that education be made relevant to the world of work. The public's subconscious demand is another matter altogether. It is a demand that education be made more relevant to the achievement of the good life. We have educated large numbers of people in the liberal arts, but the practical arts and the fine arts have been reserved for a few.

The principal barrier to the conversion of education to a career orientation is simply: it costs a little more than general education. A career program requires more and better counseling, and more "real-world" equipment. Career education requires staff to involve community resources. It requires new instructional materials and the planning and operating of "work experience" stations in industry and the community and in schools. However, community, business and education people, coordinated and working together can minimize increased cost and, yet, fulfill the goals of career education: relevant experiences in the world of work and a chance to participate in conditions of the good life.

The first step to implementing Career Education to its rightful prominence in school and community is the establishment of a local Career Education Council which we are in the process of organizing.

BUILDING PROGRAM

The critical facilities' weakness referred to in last year's Report is dramatically being remedied as the Elementary School 4-room addition has been completed and is occupied and the new High School and cafeteria are nearing completion. Remodelling the Town Hall for music rooms is also completed. The Citizens of Weare are to be commended for showing their confidence in the proposed program and plans by passing the \$678,237.00 bond issue.

The following members of the Building Committee have labored many hours to assure that the construction is done properly and follows specifications.

These facilities will house projected enrollments for the immediate future. More importantly, the educational program will be able to improve in many areas that administration and staff have recognized as needing improvement.

The Building Committee is to be complimented not only for the outstanding job done but also for their full cooperation with the School Board as the building project was being developed. There will be a Building Committee Report forthcoming.

NEW STAFF

Miss Janet Dombrowski joined the Elementary School faculty in Grade 4, while Miss Linda Vasil teaches a Grade 2 class. Mrs. Janice Gagnon, who with Miss Vasil was a practice teacher in the Weare system, assumed the Junior High School science/math position. Mrs. Janice Jenkins replaced Mrs. Margaret Downes, who had served Weare Schools so well, as part-time School Nurse. Mr. Joseph Picchione became Weare's first full-time Music Instructor, teaching vocal and instrumental music motivationally in grades 1 - 12.

Mr. Robert E. Stevens, who was elected by the Board following a unique and democratic screening and candidacy process, came to a very demanding and critical Principalship of the combined elementary and secondary schools in July of 1974. Mr. Stevens is meeting his responsibilities courageously and productively as the administrator of the Weare School System.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The Staff Development Program reported in the 1973 Report will become a Supervisory Union 19 cooperative endeavor with each district maintaining a maximum autonomy. The Supervisory Union 19 MASTER PLAN for certification/in-service work has been a Union-Wide plan, worked on by district chairpersons following continuous consultation with each district's committee members. Local unique practices and provisions which do not counter Union procedures are supplements to the PLAN. Staff Development in accordance with the PLAN and its supplements becomes effective July 1, 1975.

The District was one of few New Hampshire districts to cooperate fully with State Board of Education recommendations to meet the Energy Crisis. Schools were closed January 2, 3, 4 and the week of February 11 - 15. Faculty participated in curriculum work, workshops, and staff development survey activities while pupils were out.

ADDITIONAL STAFF

The school system needs additional staff members the coming year for several reasons. With the complexity of modern day life a full-time guidance counselor is needed to serve both the elementary and secondary schools. There are times when a pupil needs a trained counsellor to help meet personal situations. Pupils need career exploration help, vocation selection aid and post-secondary schooling guidance. Personal attention can minimize misguidance or no guidance. Certain students are fitted into the regular classes and programs with great difficulty. They need special attention and even lessons designed for them individually and specifically. A special education teacher is needed to work with these students whom we've identified. The junior high school staff is overloaded. One new staff member, with partial science instruction strength, will bring the pupil-teacher ratio to a reasonable level. The need for a full-time librarian has been a deficiency for several years. Two factors now make the addition of such a person imperative. New Hampshire Elementary School Minimum Standards become effective across the State July 1, 1975. These standards stipulate a part-time librarian for a school Weare's size. The new high school should certainly be an "Approved" high school. Again, a part-time librarian is one requirement.

I wish to acknowledge my sincere appreciation for the aid and cooperation provided me by the principal, teachers, school board members and citizens of Weare.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - Weare School System -

I respectfully submit my first annual report as Principal of the Weare School System.

This year, Weare High School is undergoing a revision of its course offerings. Juniors and Seniors are now eligible to participate in vocational programs at Concord High School. The State pays 75% of the tuition costs and 100% of the transportation charges. This year, seven students are participating – five boys in auto-mechanics and two girls in Health Education. Next year we hope to send more.

Weare has added a full time Music teacher. Under the direction of Mr. Joseph Picchione, band and chorus are now offered for full academic credit. Elementary and Junior High students are also able to participate in an expanded music program.

This year, we have adopted a new reading series of grades 1-8. Weare follows a five year rotation for updating its textbooks. After a year of study the Economy Reading Series was selected. Next year social studies will be updated and a new series adopted.

Additonal changes in staff this year include Miss Linda Vasil, Grade 2; Miss Janet Dombrowski, Grade 4; Mrs. Janice Gagnon, Junior High Science and Math; and Mrs. Janice Jenkins, School Nurse.

In September we occupied four new classrooms built by Greenville Construction. We currently house Grades 3 and 4 in these rooms. We have sold our portable classrooms and have moved the Junior High into the Elementary School. Currently, work is underway on the new High School and the Cafeteria addition. We hope to move into the new facility by March 1st.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the cooperation extended to me by the staff, students and citizens of Weare.

Routine physicals for all pupils wishing to join in athletic programs and those necessary for driver education were given early in the school year. Physicals were also given to all cafeteria workers, as well as to all pupils in fourth, seventh, tenth and twelfth grades.

All grammar and high school children were screened for vision and hearing defects and appropriate recommendations and follow-up were made.

Films on smoking were supplied to be shown to pupils in fifth through eighth grade.

Teachers in the elementary grades conducted individual units in a variety of health related areas including: nutrition, growth, hygiene, safety and physical anatomy.

A special unit on venereal diseases included the showing of a film followed by discussion and a question and answer period involving all pupils in seventh through twelfth grades.

Tuberculin skin tests were given to all necessary elementary and high school staff members.

Pre-school registration was held on June 8th, at which time twenty-four children were registered for first grade in September 1974.

The problems of most concern, such as alcoholism and drugs, mental health, nutrition, chronic illnesses and the environment can be approached only through an effective, positive and comprehensive health education program. Health education prepares children and adults to live more intelligently and attempts to develop attitudes that promote healthful living in a constantly changing world. Sound health habits in the promotion of individual health necessarily have a direct influence on all fields of endeavor, they are the foundation of individual effectiveness physically, mentally, socially and academically. Health education is a most vital part of the total education of our children.

I wish to express my thanks to the Superintendent, parents, teachers and school board for their cooperation.
