WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, 1942, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town maintenance.
 - (b) Oiling town roads.
 - (c) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (d) General expenses of highway department.
4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$873.00 to secure State Highway Construction, or to raise and appropriate the sum of \$411.25 for Class 5 road construction.

5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for public welfare.

- (a) Town poor.
- (b) Old age assistance.

6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the town library.

7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for patriotic purposes.

- (a) Old Home Day.
- (b) Memorial Day.

8. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for cooperation with the state in the control of white pine blister rust.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for advertising the resources and attractions of the town in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to help in moving the Old Meeting House to its new location. The money to be given to the society for the preservation of the Old Meeting House in Webster, N. H.

11. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town, by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1942, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to au-

thorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

From the above tabulation, it will be noted that the opportunity was provided for all pupils to attend schools in the district for the full 360 half-days required by law. The percent of attendance was low. We hope that it may be improved next year. However, there was a decrease in the total amount of tardiness per pupil. The number of pupils registered and the average membership were somewhat increased on account of an influx of workers on the Black-water dam. The total number of pupils registered was 54. In addition to these, there were 19 pupils who attended high schools outside the district. This makes a total of 73 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools, ten more than last year.

There is great need in the district for a new two-room

school with an adequate and safe playground. This need has existed for some length of time, and it is now further accentuated by the construction of the new road at Corser Hill. In order to protect the children from traffic danger playing in the tiny yard at this school, it has been necessary to erect a wire fence entirely around the building.

Although no decision to erect a new school building was reached at the two district meetings last spring, we hope that this year the conditions due to the building of the Blackwater dam have become so clarified that a favorable vote may be given. In the meantime the children of the district continue to attend school under the existing unsatisfactory conditions.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

We wish to direct the attention of the board and the parents of pupils in the district to the serious shortage of teachers. During the past two years, this has been becoming more acute, particularly among elementary teachers. Now, it is greatly accentuated and is extended to high school teachers. The reasons for this are: (a) Large numbers of young men have enlisted in the army or navy. (b) Others, both men and women have gone and will go to work in essential industries where they receive much higher wages or salaries than they would in teaching. The latter will be followed by others who are now teaching, unless higher salaries are paid. Prices are going up, and the value of the dollar is coming down. The cost of living has increased eleven percent since August, 1939. Food prices are up nineteen percent. A dollar at the grocers is worth only about eighty cents.

Twelve million factory workers have already received an increase of 30% in average weekly earnings. Farm products have gone up 45%. Teacher's salaries, however, remain the same. Prices by the end of the year 1942 will in all probability be 25% higher than in August, 1939. Thus

the teachers salary of \$1,000.00 will be cut to \$750.00. To have purchasing value equal to that of 1939, it should be advanced to \$1,250.00. This will, of course, mean an increased budget and higher taxation, but to meet this, incomes of the people in general are rising faster than the cost of living. Property is worth more.

At the coming district meeting, it will be necessary for the people of the community to choose whether they will jeopardize the welfare of their children through the loss of their best teachers, or whether they will increase the salaries of these teachers enough to hold them in the district. Already several of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 26 have received very attractive offers to teach in neighboring states or in the larger towns and cities of New Hampshire.

The schools are our long-time line of defense. It is the responsibility of the people to strengthen rather than weaken this line.

In conclusion, we wish to thank the parents, teachers, and school board for their cooperation and assistance in our efforts to have the best possible schools within the means of the district.

It seemed impossible for all those concerned to agree on the choice of a dentist. A strong effort should be made to have a clinic the coming year.
