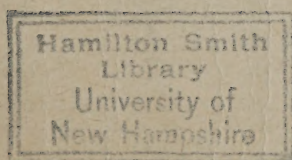

Town Meeting Warrant

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wentworth, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Wentworth, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for town highways and bridges for the ensuing year (summer and winter).

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$225.99. The State will contribute \$903.97.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the library.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1-100th of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1943 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth—Lake Sunapee Region. (\$44.24).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the white pine blister rust control.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital at Plymouth, N. H.

11. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on real estate and personal property taxes (total or partial) paid before July 1 and add 20% to Poll Taxes not paid before December 1.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes if necessary.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to cooperating with the Public Works Committee of the State Postwar Planning Council in regard to planning for public works and raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to instruct the Governor of the State of New Hampshire to send a request to the Congress of the United States, a plea that they pass an adequate bill for soldier voting that will enable every person in the armed forces to vote for Federal officers at the next Federal election.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE DARTMOUTH—LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

The Legislature of 1937 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each comprising a group of towns suggested by the State & Planning Development Commission. The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is PAID BY THE STATE (not by the towns). Thus your Region is a set-up established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existence the Dartmouth- Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments. Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paying summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the support of your town in continuing the program that has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which if carried through must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region. (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw

materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agriculture products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To cooperate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desirable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted, however, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Wentworth School Board:

To you, and through you to the people of Wentworth, my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools is now submitted. The report discusses those plans and policies which are of interest to parents and presents those principles of school procedure which are the basis of sound training for the children of this town. Only a few important statistics are here given.

My work in your schools has been most pleasant. The interest in and generous provision for public education prove that the people of your community recognize the importance of proper training for the duties and responsibilities of adult life. They are determined that their children shall have every possible advantage within the public means. Your teachers and your Superintendent are likewise pledged to the best effort of which we are capable because we are well aware that our success can be no greater than the achievement accomplished by those whom you place in our care.

Since the first day of school an effort has been made to improve attendance both as to punctuality and regularity. Teachers report to me at the end of each four-week period the amount of absence and tardiness recorded in the school register. Reports from all schools in Union 48 are arranged from highest to lowest per cent of attendance and a copy of the tabulation is handed to each teacher who keeps a register. These reports have been of considerable interest to pupils who are given a real incentive to improve their previous record and to earn a place at the head of the

list. The reasons for this emphasis on attendance will next be stated.

Since the business of education is the most important single undertaking of any unit of government, it is highly desirable that pupils get the most out of the public investment in their future. Loss of school time causes corresponding loss to the individual because absentee or make-up work is seldom as valuable as work done in class and in the regular course of events. We ought not to allow unnecessary absence to rob any child of his full educational opportunity. Furthermore, both absence and tardiness strongly shape the attitude of a pupil towards his school. They also are a powerful influence in forming habits that will be carried into adult life when school days are over. The person who is frequently late or absent will very likely attempt the same thing when he goes to work, but it cannot be continued without injury to him. Your schools will fail to do their full duty if they permit the foundation of habits and practices which will hinder your children in the years ahead.

Proper and ample teaching materials are needed if our teachers are to produce the results you have a right to expect. Uniform textbook equipment is an indispensable tool of instruction. Accordingly, we are standardizing reading not only in this town, but throughout the Union by extending the basal reading system introduced by my predecessor in some schools. That system will be carried upward, grade by grade, as need dictates and finances permit. All pupils will then have the advantage of the best findings of educational research and attractive textbook construction. They will also find it easier when they transfer from one school to another within any town or in the Union.

Reading is chosen because that is the foundation on which our educational process is built. Textbooks will be made uniform in other subjects as we are able to do so with due regard for the expense involved.

In authorizing such expenditures it is both my duty and my policy to exercise the same prudent care as though my own money were being spent.

The next logical step is to determine whether we are really getting the results we should get. That can most accurately be done by using standard tests to measure our accomplishment. Such a testing program is now under way to help us know more definitely what our children are actually doing and the ability they have to meet the standard set. The results of these tests, if wisely used, can be of great assistance as we attempt to meet the needs of every child.

Eventually, we hope to have a reading table in every school room to which pupils may go for recreational reading. These will have to be built up slowly as we see our way clear to make the necessary purchases. Gifts from interested friends and parents will always be welcome. A reading table furnishes an incentive to early completion of work which may be recognized by granting reading privileges. Besides present pleasure and growth children will also benefit by forming the reading habit so necessary when their education is continued in high school and beyond.

It is my belief, based on long experience, that the future good of every child can best be served by withholding promotion in those cases where there is a reasonable doubt as to the readiness of an individual to do work in the next grade. The educational process is so carefully planned and carried out that any gaps in

foundational training are bound to plague a child in his later progress. Any pupil is happier and more successful when the work assigned to him is within the range of his ability and preparation. We do not deal justly with a child when he is pushed into work for which a proper foundation is lacking. Temporary **disappointment** of either parent or child should never tempt us to lose sight of the child's total school success. Every decision will be made with a single purpose in mind--to do the best we know how for each child.

One important question for School Board consideration is what shall be done about continuing the Atwell Hill School in 1944-45. The enrollment of Wentworth pupils now seems likely to be sufficiently small to raise a doubt as to the financial advisability of keeping that school open. A considerable saving in school cost could be accomplished by transporting the few remaining pupils to the Village School for the coming year.

Throughout the year pupils, teachers and the School Board have extended every courtesy and kindness. The fine spirit of cooperation everywhere in evidence has made my work in your schools very pleasant. For all these things my sincere appreciation is here expressed.
