

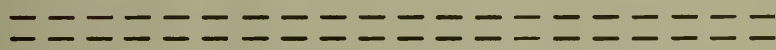

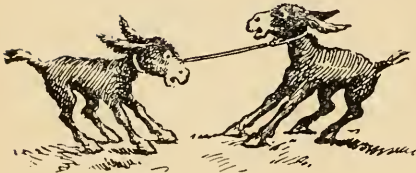

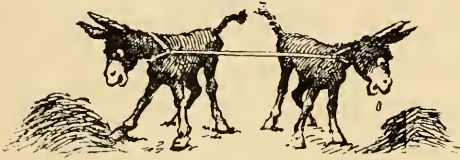
"PULL TOGETHER."

Were tied together with a piece of rope.



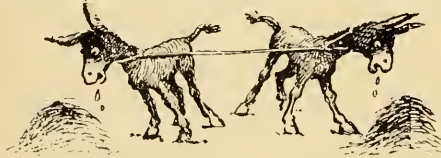
Then they faced about, these stubborn mules,

While I take a nibble of this new mown hay."



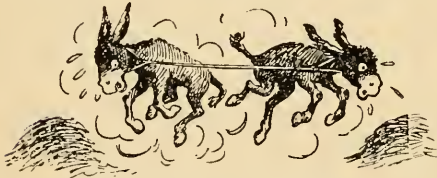
"Let's pull together. I'll go your way,

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in said County, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall in the Massabesic Lake Inn in said town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- First.* To bring your ballots for:
- Town clerk for the ensuing year,
  - One selectman for three years,
  - Tax collector for ensuing year,
  - Town treasurer for ensuing year,
  - Highway agent for ensuing year,
  - One library trustee for three years,
  - One cemetery trustee for three years,
  - One trust fund trustee for three years.
  - Three auditors for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M. the meeting will be open for the following articles:

*Second.* To choose all other necessary town officers.

*Third.* To see if the town will vote to abolish the Municipal Court. (By petition of twelve signers).

*Fourth.* To see if the town will vote to discontinue that portion of the highway, known as Hunting Road, which leads from the east line of Deer Neck Road to west line of Coffin Lane. (By petition of twenty-two signers).

*Fifth.* To see if the town will vote to let the plowing of snow on the highways on an open competitive bid basis. (By petition of twelve signers).



*Sixth.* To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

*Seventh.* To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

*Eighth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for town officers' salaries.

*Ninth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for town officers' expenses.

*Tenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for election and registration.

*Eleventh.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

*Twelfth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

*Thirteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for police department and \$35.00 for dog officer expense.

*Fourteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$1,200.00 for winter roads and \$500.00 for bridges and culverts.

*Fifteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$954.00 for street lights.

*Sixteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the library.

*Seventeenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the forest fire department.

*Eighteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for the Health Department, including vital statistics.

*Nineteenth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day.

*Twentieth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for old age assistance.

*Twenty-first.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for town poor.

*Twenty-second.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for aid to soldiers and their families.

*Twenty-third.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$527.89 for Class V roads, (town's share).

*Twenty-fourth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for interest on temporary loans.

*Twenty-fifth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 for rent of hydrants.

*Twenty-sixth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,810.88 for county tax of 1941.

*Twenty-seventh.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Volunteer Fire Department.

*Twenty-eighth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Village Cemetery.

*Twenty-ninth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for tarring and improving Bunker Hill Road.

*Thirtieth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for tarring the so-called Hooksett Road.

*Thirty-first.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for payment on principal of outstanding note.

*Thirty-second.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for purchase of a new snow plow.

*Thirty-third.* To see if the town will use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

*Thirty-fourth.* To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Since the last annual report the educational facilities in Auburn have been greatly improved due to the construction of the modern brick building in the village. As a result, the pupils who formerly attended the Village, Bunker Hill, and Number One Schools are housed under one room. The many fine efforts and extra time expended by the members of the school board to make these changes possible should be appreciated as a real public service by every citizen.

The conditions under which the pupils of Auburn attend school are more healthful than heretofore. The modern build-

ing equipped with flush toilets, good heat and ventilation, and well-lighted classrooms are benefits which cannot be denied.

There are several other distinct advantages to be gained by the school set-up as it now exists with no teacher, in either the Severance or Village Schools, teaching more than four grades. With fewer grades more time may be devoted to the various subjects. Pupils may be taught to learn and live together more effectively when the ages of the pupils are more nearly alike.

This year has necessarily been one of readjustment due to our new school. Certain difficulties arose from time to time. An adequate system of transportation was necessary and has been provided. Details as to the administration of the new building have been fairly well adjusted.

Steps are continually being taken to furnish adequate textbooks, materials, and supplies to pupils and teachers. Various additions as regards textbooks which have been made during the year include primary reading, language in grades seven and eight, history grades four and five, social science workbooks, and others.

The budget for 1941-1942 includes an item of \$5,000.00 for high school tuition. This represents an increase over the amount appropriated for this year. The fact that more pupils are entering high school after graduating from our schools is a commendable one. Reports from the secondary schools which are attended by Auburn boys and girls would indicate that, generally, these pupils are making the most of their opportunity to further their education.

However, occasionally a boy or girl registers in high school and attends for only a short period. As a result tuition is paid for a full semester when, as a matter of fact, the pupil may only attend for a few weeks and he withdraws from school. The money already paid cannot be recovered and is

lost to the district. It cannot be over-emphasized that only those pupils who intend to complete, at least the semester, should enroll in high school. Likewise, the school district cannot be responsible for more than four years of high school tuition for any one pupil.

Last spring a new state law which required instruction to the physically handicapped was enacted. As a result of this statute one child has been receiving home instruction during the current school year, the expense being absorbed in the present school budget. The advantages of this type of training are obvious. It should be pointed out, however, that provisions for this expenditure must be included in future budgets.

On Thursday evening, June 13, 1940, diplomas were awarded to fifteen boys and girls who had completed the work of the first eight grades of the Auburn Schools. Appropriate exercises preceded the presentation of certificates. Those who graduated were:

This is the time for criticism to be changed to commendation, for distrust to give way to confidence, and doubt to yield to understanding to the end that we will all dedicate our united efforts to preserve those institutions on which our American way of life is based.”
