

STATE OF NEW HAMPPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the town of Bath qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To chose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, one trustee of the trust funds for three years, one library trustee for three years, a town treasurer, auditor, one or more highway agents, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To see what action the town will take in regard to securing state aid for highways, and to raise and appropriate money therefor.
- Article 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries and expenses; for the repair and maintenance of highways and bridges; for the support of the town library; for the support of the poor; for Memorial Day and Old Home Day; and for all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- Article 6. To consider and approve for submitting to the State Highway Commissioner names for

highways according to provisions of Chapter 154, of the laws of 1921.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the cross road leading from the Walker place, so called, to the road leading from the Reed place, now occupied by Ellsworth J. Blair, to the farm owned by Charles L. Woolson.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept from the estate of the late John M. Carroll the sum of Eighty Dollars in trust, to be known as the John M. Carroll Fund; the income from said fund to be used for the care and maintenance of the Carroll lot in Bath Village Cemetery.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to dispense with the delivery of inventory blanks until April 1st.

Article 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Bath School District:

I am presenting for your consideration my fifteenth annual report, the nineteenth in the series of district superintendent's reports.

The total registration for the present school year at date with the name of the teacher in each school follows: Swiftwater, 36 pupils, Helen MacDonough; Nutter, 15 pupils, Mary Graham; Hibbard, 10 pupils, Maxine Lawless; Pettyboro, 16 pupils, Esther Lang; Carbee, 6 pupils, Joy Delevan. There are four pupils in the Woodsville grades, three in Woodsville High, eigth in Bath Union High, and six in Lisbon High.

With one exception all of the teachers in town are Normal school graduates. This fact may account for the smoothness and efficiency with which the schools have been running. The large increase in the number of Normal trained teachers in the state will make it possible to fill all vacancies even in rural schools by teachers who have been carefully trained for their work. In state aided districts the State Board will no longer allow the employment of a high school graduate with six weeks of training at summer school nor any other teacher who has not the equivalent preparation in training and experience of the Normal graduate. This type of trained teacher with the higher salaries which state aid enables districts to pay will give to rural schools as good educational opportunities as the villages have at present. In the maintenance of good schools, however, one great responsibility Ifalls on the community. It must offer its teachers a boarding place where they can be comfortable and contented. The best homes should be available as living places for teachers in country districts. They need not merely material comforts but social opportunities as well.

The per cent of attendance for the year ending June 30 was 95.2 for all schools together. The average loss of time due to holidays, institutes and bad weather was 3.4 which is a minimum loss. Nine pupils were not absent nor tardy during the year. They were: Elizabeth Arsenault, Arthur Arsenault, Agnes Campbell, Roland Campbell, Eleanor Church, Iola Moulton, Elsie Young, Viola Young, Zelene Young. Nutter and Swiftwater schools had the best record for attendance.

The budget for next year calls for a considerable increase in the amount of money to be raised for high school tuition. This is caused by an increase in tuition rates. A law passed by the last legislature permits a district to charge a tuition which does not exceed the average per capita cost of instruction in all of the high schools of the state provided its rate does not exceed the per capita cost in that particular school. The state average for the present year is \$97.65. This year's rate in Woodsville is \$70, in Lisbon \$75, and in Bath Union \$96. The rate is likely to change from year to year.

Ten pupils finished the eighth grade in June. Seven of these entered high school. They are: Darrell Arsenault, Glenn Blair, Owen Blair, Alvah Chase, Harry Chase, Dorothy Hunt, Russell Mitton, Ruby Tewksbury, Leon Wheeler, Lionel Young. Under present day conditions it is a great mistake to allow a child to miss high school training. No child in Bath is so far from a high school that he can not attend if he is willing to make a little effort.

During Thanksgiving vacation a new chimney

was built at the Swiftwater school and a heating and ventilating stove installed. The result is that the school room is evenly heated and under ordinary conditions is well ventilated without resorting to the use of doors and windows. This means less fuel and more comfort. The district should put in one of these stoves each year till every school house is properly heated.

BATH UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Bath Union School District:

I am presenting for your consideration my fifteenth annual report.

At the beginning of the school year Franklin G. Martin took the place of Mr. Owen as Headmaster of the Bath High School. Mr. Martin is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and has had one year's experience in teaching. Mrs. Chase continues her work as assistant and Winifred Sargent and Una Dearth still have charge of the grammar and primary rooms. The district owes much to the earnest and untiring efforts of this little group of teachers who are giving such loyal service to its children. Again on approving the high school for the present year Deputy Commissioner May commends the work of the school both as to quantity and quality.

The high school has twenty-six pupils registered for the year. Nine of these are tuition pupils from Bath town and Landaff. A new state law permits a tuition charge of \$96 which will give the district a considerable income from this source. The indications favor a still larger group of tuition pupils next year. Norman Houston and Ruth Reed graduated from high school in June.

Six pupils had a record of perfect attendance for the school year of 1924-1925. They were, Allen Aldrich, Phyllis Bailey, Walter Campbell, Marjorie Chappell, Lawrence Chase, and Benjamin Elliott. The average attendance for all schools for the year was 95.3 per cent. Four and one-half days were lost on account of holidays, institutes, and bad weather. There were 55 tardy marks. The whole attendance record for the year is very creditable. Luvia Crawford, Marjorie Chappel, Morris Gilbert, Edward Poor, Cecil Tupper, and Dexter Whitcomb passed from the grammar school to the high school in June. There are 36 pupils registered in the primary room this year. This number over-crowds the seating capacity of the room and makes the teaching a serious problem. If the number of pupils in the first four grades continues as large, some change must be made to remedy the situation.

Last year's report called attention to some needed repairs on the building and heating plant. These are still needed.

The first requirement in a program of modern education is teaching health habits. In the school this must largely be done by the teacher, but to be effective the home must cooperate. The school nurse is one factor in making the contact between the home and the school. Often she fails to get the proper assistance from parents even in cases of contagious disease. The law makes the parent liable for sending children to school who are infected with a communicable disease. Miss Underhill last year made thirteen school visits and seven house visits. Thirty cases received treatment.

Your attention is called to the detailed report of Headmaster Martin.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sir:

I hereby present my first report as Headmaster of Bath Union High School.

Bath Union High School opened Sept. 15, 1925 with an enrollment of 26 pupils. Two have since left school, leaving the present attendance 24. Of these 8 are tuition pupils.

During the summer vacation a new water pipe from the main line to the schoolhouse was installed. This has helped the water supply in the school materially. A sink was also added in the laboratory which was a much needed improvement. The laboratory equipment is now adequate for the present needs and compares favorably with that of any school of its size.

Two new fire extinguishers have been added to the school, also a fire escape from the laboratory. These precautions lower our fire risk to a large extent.

The walls and ceilings of the building should be repaired and refinished as they, in their present condition, detract from the appearance of the school. Electric lights also would be a welcome addition, as the light on dark days is not sufficient for studying without straining the eyes.

The Bath High School has presented a short play this year, also an operetta, "Polished Pebbles." This type of activity is valuable to the students in that it provides for actual training, of the pupil, in dramatic appreciation and facility in oral expression.

The Bath Union Spirit, the school paper, is handled entirely by students. Athletics include basket ball, base ball and volley ball in which all students take an active part. Athletics contribute valuable elements to the social as well as the physical development of the pupils.

The trustees of the library have kindly given us several new books and a set of encyclopedias.

The percent attendance for the first half year was 97.2.

The superintendent and school board have given unqualified support to the school at all times.
