To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington, N. H., in the County of Hillsborough, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. s.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington, N. H., on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 2A. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Real Estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$133.00 for the Monadnock Region.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to purchase 100 ft. of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose and 500 ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approperiat the sum of \$1,500.00 for Tarring.
- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Old Home Day and vote to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of at least \$1,000.00 toward the purchase of a new Fire Truck with a 500 gallon capacity pumper. The balance to be paid annually with at least \$1,000.00 notes.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to petition the General Court to repeal Chapter 46 of the laws of 1951 viz. an act prohibiting the use of Power Boats on Lake Whittemore in the Town of Bennington, N. H.
- 13. To see what action the Town will take towards building a sidewalk from Edmunds Store down over Store Hill and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements, and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Due to the age of our equipment we suffered considerable damage in 1951.

During one of our practices last summer seven lengths or 350 ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose was destroyed under pressure. This hose was bought in the 1920s.

The selectmen took care of this emergency by authorizing us to purchase part of that which was destroyed.

We will have to purchase 500 ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch, plus 100 ft. of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch. this coming year to bring our hose capacity up to standard.

Our small truck suffered motor damage going to a and it was necessary to replace the truck with a new

motor. This was originally built for a 4 cylinder or B Ford motor; but with considerable rebuilding the V-8 Ford motor took its place.

Our large No. 1 engine seems to be our biggest trouble at present. Although it has given fine service it still remains a 1929 truck, and the age isagainst it. We had to put in a considerable amount of money for repairs (about \$300.00\$) and at present the distributor is badly worn and should be replaced and it is impossible to find necessary parts on the market today.

Knowing these conditions we feel that the Fire Department should have a new truck and we would like to see the tax payers of the town support us by purchasing a 500 gallon pumper.

GENERAL REPORT

1. The School Plant.

Because of a reduction in enrollment it was decided to reorganize the school so that all grades could be taught by three teachers. The free room has been equipped with folding chairs and used as an assembly or activity room.

This is particularly convenient for music classes and for showing films.

The school's heating equipment has been overhauled and is now in good condition. The interior of the building is to be redecorated during the winter vacation.

2. School Philosophy.

The only thing we can always count on is change. So

schools, like the rest of life, cannot remain static. They change because the work people have to do changes. They try to meet the needs of the children for the present and for the life they will lead as adults. Some of the following may point to the way it is being done in a few fields. This is not confined to any one grade level, but extends throughout the system.

A. The Three Rs.

A nationwide survey among adults shows that six out of ten adults believe children are better taught in reading than they were. America bought over 50 million newspapers every day last year, and think of the weekly papers and magazines that circulate to the millions. The modern reading program has been developed so that children read more books than ever, read faster and with greater understanding.

Writing is stressed in the early years of school. It is one of the essential skills which every person should possess. The big goals are legibility and speed.

Modern instruction in arithmetic conforms to the basic needs and use of this tool. Problem-solving occupies an important place. Faults are corrected by remedial exercises. A teacher can, by tests, determine how well her pupils rate with each other and with similar grades in other schools.

The amount of time spent on these three Rs is much greater than it was a hundred years ago. The techniques have improved, and the schools teach them better than ever before.

B. Health.

There are many ways in which the schools contribute to the health of the child. Physical examination, including sight and hearing, and organized recreation, furniture that encourages good posture and adequate lighting are all contributions of the modern school to the proper development of the whole child.

C. Music.

This is the one subject for everyone. All manners and kinds of people meet on common ground in music. There is perhaps no other experience of the school program that is carried over more completely into adult life than music appreciation and performance. To be sure, there are unmet needs in this field, but generally greater enjoyment, opportunity for display of special talents, and appreciation are end results.

D. Social Studies.

These include history, geography and civics. Their purpose is to create a more effective citizenship. History, we must have to understand the backgrounds. We study the past to learn about the present, the present to predict the future. Geography oftowns, states, nations leads to understanding of the relations of people with each other. Civics is the study of the principles of our government, including federal, state and local.

3. Student population and the School.

A. The following table shows the probable enrollment by grades for the next five years. These figures cannot be exact because families move in and out of town, all students may not stay in school throughout high school and the number of tuition students may fluctuate.

B. Authorities point out that the teacher load should be 20 to 25 in grades 1 through 3 and 25 to 30 in grades 4 through 8. As you will note the grades can be organized to meet these standards using three teachers during the next five years. However, there will be a big jump in the amount needed for high school tuition beginning next year.

In closing I would like to express my appreciation for the fine cooperation of your school board and teachers during my first year in your community.

Reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, and speech have always been and still are recognized as the fundamental skills to be developed in Public School.

Today, however, we recognize that all children learn at different rates; that all children need opportunities for a variety of social, emotional, physical and mental experiences to develop their personalities. Therefore, we have based our teaching upon individual needs in order that more efficient learning might take place.

The teachers found the work shop held at Henniker for the Hillsboro and Henniker Districts most beneficial.

The work shop this year dealt with audio visual aids and furnished many helpful ideas and suggestions.

The November parents' night was held in the town hall again this year. The custon of having a parents' night has been adopted because such a large percentage of the parents work, making it impossible for them to attend the regular school sessions.

The number of parents attending Education Night was most gratifying. We teachers realize that to have a successful school cooperation at home and school is absolutely necessary.

An honest endeavor has been made to give the pupils opportunities to plan, to think and to participate in meaningful experiences. More is being done than just teaching the fundamentals. A great deal is being accomplished in the way of citizenship, health and guidance. The teachers are trying to give the children an appreciation of the American way of life.
