Warrant for Annual Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, County of Hillsborough, and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town and State Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, March 8th, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects and any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. To choose all Town Officers for ensuing year.
2. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating to same.
4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of State Aid Highways or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of the Highways under the law passed at January Session of 1905, and to say where such shall be laid out, or take any action in regard to same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes or take any action relative thereto.

11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for destruction of Gypsy and Brown Tail moths.

12. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to distribute resident inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day, or take any action in regard to same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to paint Library.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$150 from Estate of Cora B. Sayles for perpetual care of Sayles Lot in Pine-grove Cemetery.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to take new valuation.

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow Sunday sports as specified in the law passed at last session of Legislature or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$1000 from estate of B. M. Hutchinson, the income therefrom to be spent for books, papers and magazines for Public Library.

Warrant for School Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Brookline qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Daniels Academy Building in said district on the fifth day of March, 1932, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year, July 1, 1932 to June 30, 1933.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools, and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate for repair and alteration of school property, for new construction, for new equipment, and for improvement of school grounds; or take any other action in relation thereto.

10. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate for insurance of property of the School District.

11. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 123, Public Laws of 1929, providing for medical inspection.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Brookline:

I herewith submit my thirteenth report as Superintendent in Supervisory Union No. 40 which comprises the school districts of Amherst, Brookline, Milford, and Mont Vernon. It is also the thirteenth in the series of such reports in Brookline. Full details of the organization of the union were given in last year's report.

TEACHERS

There have been no changes in teachers since last year. Mrs. Bennett continues for her fourth year at the Grammar room. Miss Baker at the Primary and Miss Waegeneere at the Intermediate are both serving their second year. Miss Josephine MacKinnon has charge of the music for her third year as music supervisor in the Union.

The summer work in 1931 was as follows:

1. Refinishing desks in the Intermediate room.
2. Shingling north side of the Primary building.

Needs for the coming summer vacation:

1. Interior painting and further refinishing of furniture at the Primary building.
2. Improvements of toilets.
3. Permanent repairs to side porch at the Academy building.
4. Ventilation at Grammar room.

For this work funds raised a year ago are still available so it will only be necessary to re-appropriate them for the uses named above.

SCHOOL BUDGET

In these times it is important that school service and supplies be used with great care, and that no unusual nor ex-

traordinary expenditures be proposed. Accordingly the consumption of supplies and the use of books and other materials have been closely scrutinized both in their immediate use and in plans for next year, with the result that next year's budget as printed by the School Board shows a decided decrease without sacrificing the most important item of all, the salaries of the teachers.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

In November Education Week was observed. This was sponsored by the National Education Association, American Legion, and the Federal Bureau of Education. Our program included talks to the pupils by School Board members, Headmaster Morgan of Milford, Superintendent of Schools, seniors from Amherst High school, School Nurse and School Doctor. A special Armistice Day program was held on November 11 with the Parent-Teachers' association cooperating. Pupils took part and Mr. Norman Spencer of the American Legion spoke. On one evening the Grammar School gave an entertainment in the Daniels Academy building as a graduation benefit. On Sunday Mr. Phillips had a special service in his church. Pupils in Grade VIII were invited to a cafeteria luncheon served by the Domestic Arts department at Milford High school one noon after which they spent the afternoon visiting Milford schools.

Another very special feature this year is the George Washington Bicentennial Celebration. Pupils in school will make a special study of Washington and will prepare a George Washington entertainment.

The National Education Association has a winter meeting each February. This will be at Washington, D. C., this year, and will, of course, emphasize very greatly the life and work of George Washington.

In conclusion a quotation from the January Journal of the National Education Association is most fitting: "To interpret the school to parents and citizens is as much a part of the teacher's work as the instruction of children. Our

schools belong to the people; they will go as far and no farther than the people wish; child guidance is a joint task of parent and teacher. Every officer in the school system is an interpreter, but the teacher can do more than anyone else. The teacher is linked to the parent by a common personal interest—the child for whose welfare both are responsible. The ideal, CHILDREN FIRST, demands that the schools be kept at their best and still further improved.”

Report of School Nurse

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Brookline, N. H.:

The following is my fifth report of the health work in the Brookline schools, it being the twelfth year of this work.

The annual medical inspection was made in October, 1931, by Dr. Dearborn, the nurse assisting. A tabulated account of this inspection will appear on another page.

The eye and ear tests are not yet completed.

Nineteen visits were made to the schools at which time short talks on health and class room inspections were given.

There have been cases of pediculosis but at the last inspection this condition seems to have cleared up. The pupils appear to be in good health and thus far there are no cases of contagious disease.

This year there probably will be an opportunity for all school pupils up to twelve years of age, whose parents will give consent, to be immunized against diphtheria by toxin-anti-toxin at a clinic to be held in the near future.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the school officials, teachers, pupils, and parents for their co-operation in the past year.
