THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Carroll, in the County of Coos and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect all necessary town officers.
2. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for:
 - a. Town Officers' Salaries
 - b. Town Officers' Expenses
 - c. Election and Registration expenses
 - d. Expenses Town Hall and other buildings
 - e. Police Department
 - f. Fire Department
 - g. Health Department: Town Dump
 - h. Vital Statistics
 - i. Auto Permit Fees
 - j. Highways and Bridges:
 1. Road Maintenance—Summer
 2. Road Maintenance—Winter
 3. General Expenses of Highway Department
 4. Sidewalk Construction and Repairs
 5. Town Road Aid, Class 5
 - k. Street Lighting
 - l. Libraries
 - m. Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and aid to crippled children
 - n. Advertising
 - o. Memorial Day and Honor Roll
 - p. Cemeteries
 - q. Damages and Legal Expenses
 - r. Moth and Blister Rust Extermination and Ragweed
 - s. Interest on loans
 - t. Insurance
 - u. Printing of Town Reports
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money by temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through collector's deeds or otherwise.

5. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountains Regional Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to \$.10 per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation for 1956.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Civilian Defense.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,500; to be used by the Board of Trade for advertising—and to raise and appropriate money for same.

8. To see if the Town will accept a gratuitous deed, in the name of the Town of Twin Mt. Board of Trade, to the land it acquired from Bradford Veneer & Panel Co. as per deed recorded in Coos County records, Vol. 421, Page 362; which land comprises about 75 acres and through which Tuttle Brook flows—for the purpose of the Town establishing, equipping and maintaining a Public Playground thereon—by building a dam across said brook in order to create an artificial lake for boating and swimmings; building a bridge, developing the land abutting said lake for outdoor picnic and other recreational facilities, and constructing any buildings necessary thereon and said lake and park development to be administered by a Commission consisting of the Directors of the Board of Trade and the Board of Selectmen of Carroll and for these purposes to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not in excess of \$10,000, on behalf of the Town and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place in accordance with Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire revised Statutes annotated 1955 and amendments thereto entitled "Municipal Finance Act", as the Selectmen shall decide and raise and appropriate money for same.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the twelfth day of March 1957, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agent, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
7. To see if the Carroll School District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Carroll School District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$. to defray the School District's share of the cost thereof.
8. To see if the Carroll School District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.
9. To see if the Carroll School District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.
10. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Carroll School District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the School District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the School District will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
11. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of

statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

School Board Report

To the Citizens of the Town of Carroll:

The annual report of the School Board of the Town of Carroll is duly submitted to you.

Our school system has functioned most efficiently during the current year.

We have been very fortunate to have Mr. Ralph Linton again as our Principal. We were also fortunate in obtaining Mrs. Grace Bailey, Whitefield, as one of our elementary teachers for Grades IV, V and VI.

The school library has continued its increase in number of books which were purchased and donated.

We are pleased to report that we have procured all the curtains for the auditorium-gymnasium, plus a fine netting to protect the curtains. Also the construction of a new ceiling on the stage has been completed.

We have re-decorated the elementary classroom for Grades IV, V and VI. The floor was sanded, re-surfaced with seal and waxed. The ceiling, walls, and woodwork were painted. We have purchased new desks and chairs for this room, which makes the room very pleasant.

The floors in the boys' and girls' basements and the upstairs coatroom were newly painted.

All of the knotty pine in the auditorium-gymnasium was cleaned and refinished with two coats of gym seal. The floor was cleaned, refinished and waxed.

All the walls, woodwork, floors, desks, and chairs in the school building were cleaned.

We purchased new dark window shades for two of the upstairs classrooms.

We purchased a new record player machine and speaker for classroom use by the teachers.

The boiler has been thoroughly checked and inspected.

Mr. Truell, Mrs. Virginia Morneau and I attended a School Board Association meeting in Lancaster. A report on the White House Conference was given at this time which proved to be very interesting. A talk on consolidation of schools was given by Dr. Austin McCaffrey, Commissioner of Education for the State of New Hampshire.

On October 26, 1956, Mrs. Margraet Rines and I attended the New Hampshire School Board Association meeting which was held in Plymouth, New Hampshire in the evening.

This meeting was continued on the following day at which time Mr. Harold Truell, Mrs. Margaret Rines and I were present. Common school problems were presented and discussed by specialists in the various fields. These meetings were both interesting and beneficial to your school board members.

New locks have been procured and installed for all the doors at the school which is a great improvement. This work was done by Mr. Clyde McCulloch, Whitefield, New Hampshire.

We wish to thank Mr. and Mrs. Donald Marshall for the help they have given the school in its Ski Program, also, in assisting us in procuring the rental of skis, ski poles and harnesses for the children who need them, for a small fee, from the Roland Peabody Association.

We appreciate the cooperation given us by Mr. Michel Perry in transporting our children from school to Cannon Mountain, enabling them to take skiing lessons from expert instructors. The children have approximately two hours of skiing instruction each week.

This year those children who are taking skiing lessons will have the privilege of belonging to the Franconia Ski Club which entitles them to participate in the various events sponsored by the club.

The members of the School Board are especially appreciative of the services rendered by Mrs. Mary Young during her term of office as a school board member. Her genuine interest and cooperation were ever present in promoting high standards for the school.

To Mr. and Mrs. Joseph O'Brien, we express our thanks for furnishing a television set to the school so that the pupils could enjoy the recent inaugural ceremonies of the President of the United States.

It is a pleasure to report that since your School Board chairman investigated the Dental Clinic, generous donations have been received from several organizations and townspeople. This program which began January 22, 1957, will benefit children attending grades one thru six.

We are pleased to report that children in Twin Mountain, between the ages of one thru sixteen years, have received at least two shots of Salk vaccine. Some children attending grades three and four have received their third shot. Other children will receive their third and last shot of vaccine after the necessary seven-month required period between the second and third shots have elapsed.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Parent-Teacher Association and other interested citizens who have worked diligently towards the improvement of our school. The Parent-Teacher Association has provided refreshments for the Christmas party and several picnics. Socials are being sponsored for the children from seventh grade thru high school. The Parent-Teacher Association and Grange together, are sponsoring square dancing one night a week to teach the children. This they enjoy very much.

We wish to thank Mr. Ralph Linton, Principal, and all teachers for the fine cooperation they have given us during the past year.

We wish to thank Miss Blanche Witherell, Elementary Supervisor, for her fine leadership in our elementary school.

Our appreciation goes to Mrs. Mary Spaulding, School Nurse, who has given so generously of her time in the interest of the pupils of Twin Mountain School.

We want to thank Dr. Ralph N. Jones, School Physician, for his assistance in helping to promote an excellent Health Program.

To Mr. Truell, Superintendent of Schools, for his interest, cooperation, wisdom and guidance, we wish to express our sincere appreciation.

To the School Board of the Town of Carroll:

My fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in the Town of Carroll is submitted herewith.

Supervisory Union No. 31

The Supervisory Union No. 31 is composed of the towns of Carroll, Lancaster, and Whitefield. The duties of the Union, as a whole, are to select the Superintendent of Schools, special teachers, supervisors and the Union secretary. The school nurse is engaged separately by the individual towns. The Superintendent's salary for the school year 1955-1956 was proportioned as follows: Carroll 6:5%, Lancaster 33.8%, Whitefield 19% and the State share 40.7%. The salary of the Elementary Supervisor, secretary and office expenses of the Union for the school year 1955-1956 were proportioned as follows: Carroll 11%, Lancaster 57% and Whitefield 32%. These percentages are based on two factors having equal weight as follows: (1) Average Daily Membership of District, and (2) District valuations (adjusted). The following chart might be of interest to show you how these percentages are derived:

Section 47 of Chapter 135 of the revised laws has been amended by the 1951 General Court to read, in part, as follows: "The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous school year and one-half on the last adjusted valuation of the District."

The average percentages will vary slightly each year due to changes in the valuation of the districts and the average daily membership of pupils in the districts.

The Union School Board employs a full time elementary supervisor whose duty it is to aid and direct those teachers teaching Grades I through VI. This position has been in existence for approximately seven years. -Miss Blanche Withereil, Supervisor of Elementary Education, has done exceptionally well this year in aiding these teachers. Special programs relative to the progress of the pupils, both individually and as a whole, are carried on under her guidance. We recommend that her report be read and digested as we feel that this field of education should be understood by all interested parents and citizens.

School Personnel

The Town of Carroll lost one teacher at the end of the school year 1955-1956. Mrs. Dorothy Linton, teacher of Grades IV, V, and VI resigned and is now teaching Grade IV at the Whitefield school.

Mrs. Grace Bailey, Whitefield, New Hampshire, was employed to teach Grades IV, V, and VI for the school year 1956-1957. Mrs. Bailey attended Plymouth Teachers College.

Mrs. Ruth Fisher continues as teacher in Grades I, II and III, Mr. Harry Peach continues as Science teacher in the high school, and Mrs. Mary Watkins continues as Commercial teacher in the high school.

Mrs. Ruth Wentworth is Music Supervisor for the school year 1956-1957.

Mention was made in last year's report of the scarcity of teachers available for employment in small towns. It is possible today for college graduates in the field of teaching, to obtain work most anywhere they desire. Teachers of Mathematics, Science, Home Economics, Industrial Arts and Commercial subjects are scarce and in demand. Teachers of other grades and subjects are able to find very attractive positions in the larger school. This trend has left available for the small school systems, to a large degree, only married teachers who have settled in the vicinity in which the school is located. As the school enrollment throughout the country increases and the number of available teachers de-

creases, the problem of securing teachers in small communities continues to increase. Based on this information, your Superintendent of Schools is in no position to say how much salary it would be necessary for him to pay to any teacher filling a vacancy which might occur as of June 1957.

No provision is made in this year's school budget if the above condition should occur in the Carroll School system for the school year 1957-1958.

Enrollment

The following table on present and future school enrollments will show to some degree what the elementary attendance for the Twin Mountain School may be for the next five years. Whereas we may expect a more or less constant enrollment in our elementary grades, we must be cognizant of the fact that the high school enrollment varies continually.

A study of the above chart would indicate that the enrollment of the elementary school is going to continue to increase for several years. It should be pointed out, however, that the actual enrollment continues to vary from the one presented in this table. According to the census taken in September 1953, there was anticipated an enrollment of six pupils in Grade I as of September 1954; according to the census taken in September 1954, there was anticipated an enrollment of seven pupils in Grade I as of September 1955; according to the census taken in September 1955, there was anticipated an enrollment of eight pupils as of September 1956. If these figures were accurate there would be twenty-one pupils in Grades 1 thru III enrolled in the Carroll Elementary school as of September 1956. Actually there were

twenty-nine pupils enrolled in these three grades as of September 1956. These facts show that this table may be used as one of the criteria for determining future school enrollments. Migration to and from the town has a great effect upon its school enrollment. This fluctuation may be so great at times that long range planning of school problems is extremely difficult.

High School

Keeping the Twin Mountain high school open has been of major concern to your School Board. This is in evidence if one reads the school district reports which have been submitted during the last three years. There is little that can be added at this time. Your School Board has endeavored to meet every request as stipulated by the State Board of Education. Without doubt it is evident by now to all the citizens of the Town of Carroll that the State Board of Education does not look with favor upon the continuation of high schools with enrollments of under 150 pupils. Nevertheless, it is the desire of your School Board to carry out the wishes of the Carroll citizens in keeping the Twin Mountain high school in existence. Unless otherwise directed, your School Board will continue the existence of the Twin Mountain high school as long as permitted by the State Board of Education. This may entail a greater expenditure of money than is now contemplated. It is very difficult to employ teachers who qualify to teach the many and varied subjects necessary in a high school program. To be eligible to teach a subject in the New Hampshire schools, a teacher must have a minimum of 18 semester hours in the major subjects being taught. He cannot teach any subject in the high school unless he has had at least one year of preparation at college. This means that in most cases only experienced teachers are available requiring the payment of larger salaries.

We recommend that you read the report of your high school Principal to get a complete picture of present school enrollment, subjects taught, and courses offered in your high school.

Social Security

It will be noted that there are four articles in the School District warrant dealing with Social Security. Even though the Carroll School District has voted favorably for participation of the school district employees in the Social Security Program, the Attorney General has requested that these articles be voted on again at the next Annual School District

Meeting, due to a recent amendment in New Hampshire legislature. At the present time all school district employees with the exception of the teachers come under the Social Security Program.

Insurance

This year your School Board, in conjunction with the Lancaster and Whitefield School Boards, once again offered to all pupils in these towns the opportunity of participating in a Special School Child Accident Policy for one dollar and twenty-five cents per year per pupil. This is the fourth year that the pupils attending the Twin Mountain school have had this opportunity. Previous to this time the expense of an accident was born directly by the parent. It is thought that this accident insurance policy will be a great help in meeting expenses which occasionally occur at school.

This policy became effective September 15, 1956, and will continue until September 15, 1957. Fifty out of seventy-nine pupils and teachers took advantage of this opportunity. This shows that approximately sixty-four percent of the entire student body participated in this project.

Handicapped Children

By law, handicapped children who are unable to attend school have the privilege of being taught at home for a period of not less than two hours per week. Referring to the budget for 1957-1958, you will note that a sum of \$300 has been requested for this purpose. One cannot tell how much the expense for this item might be. There could easily be a greater demand for this service than we now anticipate during the coming year.

If you have a child who is handicapped and cannot attend school, be free to contact the office of the Superintendent of Schools as he may be in a position to give you assistance.

Repairs

During the school year 1956-1957, your School Board had the room being used by pupils attending Grades IV, V and VI painted. The outside walls of the school building were touched up wherever necessary.

We suggest that you read the report of your School Board for further information relative to repairs that were made during the school year 1956-1957.

1956-1957 Special Appropriations

At the regular School District meeting held March 8, 1955, there were three special appropriations made for the school year 1955-1956 pertaining to the improvement of the

auditorium-gymnasium. At that time money was raised for the construction of a ceiling over the stage, the purchase of curtains for the stage, and for the installation of an amplifier system. The first two projects mentioned have been completed. The \$250.00 which was raised and appropriated for the installation of an amplifier system in the auditorium-gymnasium was carried over to the school year 1956-1957 in the hope that it might be possible to get some of this equipment under the Federal Government surplus commodities' division for a very small cost. Up to this time there has been no equipment available to our school. If your Superintendent of Schools is not able to get any surplus commodities for the amplifier system from the government by May, action will be taken to complete this project within the amount of the special appropriation. This account will be closed as of June 30, 1957.

Article No. 9 in the warrant for the school year 1955-1956: three hundred fifty dollars was raised and appropriated for the Construction of a ceiling over the stage in the auditorium-gymnasium. Of this amount the Board spent two hundred forty-three dollars and eight cents to complete this project, leaving a balance of one hundred six dollars and fourteen cents which was returned to the Town of Carroll as of June 30, 1956.

Article No. 10 in the warrant for the school year 1955-1956: five hundred dollars was raised and appropriated for the purchasing of curtains for the stage in the auditorium-gymnasium. Of this amount the Board spent three hundred fifty dollars to complete this project, leaving a balance of one hundred fifty dollars which was returned to the Town of Carroll as of June 30, 1956.

Article No. 11 in the warrant for the school year 1955-1956: two hundred fifty dollars was raised and appropriated for the installation of an amplifier system in the auditorium-gymnasium. Whatever amount is left, after completing this project, will be returned to the Town of Carroll as of June 30, 1957.

We wish to express our appreciation to the members of the Twin Mountain Parent-Teacher Association for all they have done to help the school during this past year. A well-organized Parent-Teacher Association can do much to help a school.

We wish to thank Mr. John McGee, school custodian, for his interest in keeping the school clean. A clean wholesome school is desired for both teachers and pupils.

To Mr. Ralph Linton, Principal, and to all members of the Twin Mountain teaching staff, may we express our sincere appreciation for the splendid and fine cooperation which they have displayed during the year.

May we express our appreciation to Mrs. Mary Spaulding, school nurse, for the outstanding work which she has done for the pupils. Mrs. Spaulding continually works for the interest of all pupils in the school. Many times she goes beyond the call of duty. Our appreciation is extended to Dr. Ralph Jones, school physician, for his able assistance to Mrs. Spaulding. Our Health Program is a very fine one.

To Miss Blanche Witherell, Supervisor of Elementary Education, for her outstanding work and cooperation which has been evident throughout the year, we express our sincere appreciation.

In behalf of the members of the School Board and myself, we wish to express to Mrs. Mary Young our sincere thanks for the fine work which she performed while a member of the Carroll School Board. Mrs. Young worked extremely hard and gave freely of her time for the best interest of the school and its pupils. She gave much toward the improvement of the school system.

May we express to the members of the Carroll School Board our sincere appreciation for their fine cooperation which they have given your Superintendent of Schools during this past year. Their continued interest in the welfare of the pupils has helped greatly to improve the over-all school system. Their untiring efforts are greatly appreciated by the citizens of the Town as well as myself.

The school philosophy is to develop proper attitudes, habits, ideals, and action patterns to enable its graduates to live a happy and fruitful life in the community of which someday they will become a part. Visit them frequently.

Elementary Supervisor's Report

Dear Mr. Truell:

This report for the Twin Mountain School is respectfully submitted:

Since the basis for all successful learning is the child's mastery of Reading, our primary concern must be to develop this ability through training and drill in reading techniques. We feel that good progress is being made and we are daily striving toward greater achievement. This requires special emphasis on oral and silent reading, on Phonics, and on the Social Reading which is designed to give the child some enrichment and much pleasure.

The Arithmetic results are encouraging and show the steady and continuous effort exerted by both teachers and children to master the fundamentals. And we are placing special emphasis on regular and insistent drill.

Because each child should have a language background that will enable him to express himself clearly and confidently, we have set up standards which, if achieved, will accelerate the Language program and result in improved work for every grade.

Two tests were administered to the Elementary children during the year: (1) Stanford Achievement Test which covers the field of general information and (2) California Intelligence Test. Although these tests are a fairly reliable indication of the child's progress and mental ability, they serve as only one of many criteria which together form an over-all picture of each individual.

This year we have introduced new Report Cards to Carroll Elementary School. These cards are a digression from the ones previously in use, but we believe they will prove most satisfactory.

Twin Mountain teachers have participated in many workshops. Some of these meetings were concerned with discussing Curriculum content, especially in Reading, Arithmetic and Language; Others were workshops in Phonics. But for each one we derived workable knowledge and inspiration.

The week of November 11-17 was observed as American Education Week. During the week parents and interested

friends were urged to visit the school and to observe its activities.

One change was made in our teaching staff with the resignation of Mrs. Linton. We regretted this loss but feel most fortunate that Mrs. Bailey has joined our staff. We appreciate the cooperation and loyal support of Mrs. Bailey and Mrs. Fisher.

We are sincerely grateful to you, Mr. Truell, for the time and effort spent in counselling us and assisting us with the work at Twin Mountain School.

For making adequate provision for our needs and for demonstrating a genuine interest in the School's activities, we express our thanks to the members of the Twin Mountain School Board.

We appreciate the kindly advice of our principal, Mr. Linton, and the constant help extended by Mrs. Spaulding, our school nurse.

And we express real gratitude to each friend of the school whose encouragement has spurred us to attempt greater things for Twin Mountain School.

Principal's Report

Carroll, New Hampshire
December 1, 1956

To the Citizens of the Carroll School District:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Principal of the Twin Mountain School.

No major turnover in the teaching staff of our school occurred this year. Mrs. Grace Bailey of Whitefield is the only replacement. She succeeds Mrs. Dorothy Linton as teacher of Grades IV-V-VI. Mrs. Linton accepted a position in Whitefield. Our present school staff is as follows:

High School

Ralph Linton, Principal: English, Latin, and Mathematics

Mrs. Mary Watkins: English and Commerce

Harry W. Peach: Social Studies and Science

Elementary School

Mrs. Grace Bailey: Grades IV-V-VI

Mrs. Ruth Fisher: Grades I-II-III

It is a pleasure for all of us to work in a clean, comfortable, and well-lighted school building. The janitor is doing an effective piece of work in keeping our building clean.

One of the most important changes made in our building during the summer months was that of replacing the safety locks on the front exits. While these doors may be locked from the outside, they may always be opened from the inside. Further replacements of locks have been made on the doors of the book room, the supply room, and the gymnasium entrances. An additional door has also been installed between the intermediate room and the supply room, thereby providing additional storage space.

Last summer the intermediate room underwent an extensive renovation. The modern furniture, refinished floor, and repainted walls have rendered a pleasing transformation conducive to better school work. The blackboards in this room, however, should be resurfaced. When this is done in all the classrooms, we will be in a position to consider the renovation of the interior of the school plant as completed, with the exception of the replacement of the obsolete furnishings in the high school rooms.

In contrast to the modern furnishings in the lower grade rooms, those in the high school are worn with decades of

use, and in some instances, falling apart. Three new teachers' desks and chairs are urgently needed. The present ones are obsolete and beyond the stage where they could be repaired. For the same reasons, pupils' desks and chairs should also be replaced. The new window shades in the high school rooms have proved most helpful in the adjusting of classroom lighting. Similar replacement should be made in the intermediate room, where it is a problem to control the glare from sunlight.

In the high school laboratory, we have endeavored to supplement the existing science apparatus by the purchase of numerous items for experimental work in physics and general science. Each year, additions should be made to this equipment, until we shall have all of the necessary material for an adequate laboratory interpretation of these important subjects. At the present time, there are no storage facilities for science apparatus. If we are to give this valuable equipment the care that it should have, it will be necessary to install built-in wall cabinets to house it when it is not being used.

During the closing months of the preceding school year, a complete set of curtains was provided for the stage in the gymnasium. These have added decidedly to the attractiveness and utility of this part of the building. The gymnasium floor also underwent a complete refinishing.

Our high school program is made up of three curricula. These are: College Preparatory, Commercial, and General. An outline of this program has been appended in the conclusion of this report. For the first time in several years, Latin is being taught, and it is encouraging to witness the increase of interest that is being shown by the pupils pursuing courses in mathematics. While it is highly important that definite quantitative standards be maintained in all departments, quality should be a prerequisite to this.

Because the classes in our high school are small, it is possible for us to give our pupils a considerable amount of individual attention and help. However, it should not be construed that such attention will remove the necessity for self-reliance, self-application, and home study. A pupil who is not doing an average of two hours' home study nightly may be "getting by", but he is hardly working to the full extent of his capacity. No pupil should be satisfied with an average below B in any subject, especially if he is contemplating post-secondary study. A program for college preparation is available in our school. The teachers have proved themselves

ever ready and willing to help pupils on an individual basis, but the desire to learn, to progress, and to achieve must ultimately come from the pupil himself. He should remember that nothing of lasting value or interest will exist for anyone without exacting its toll in effort and hard work.

On the whole, both pupils and parents are meeting the responsibility of school attendance. There have been occasions, however, when detentions from school classes have been questionable. Any boy or girl under sixteen years of age and residing in a town where a secondary school is being maintained is legally obliged to be in attendance at all of its sessions, unless excused from the same by reason of illness, family emergency, or through an arrangement satisfactory to the appropriate executive school authority.

Because of the youthfulness of our present high school student body, it has become impractical for us to attempt any participation in conference basketball this year. Upon referring to the table of high school registration below, it will be realized that most of our pupils are registrants in Grades VII-VIII-IX. However, a boys' team has been organized under the supervision of Mr. Harry Peach, and games have been scheduled with the junior varsity squads of several of the neighboring schools. Next year should see our high school in a better position to meet the usual competition encountered in conference basketball. There were not enough interested girls to form a girls' team this year.

At the present time, the Senior Class is hard at work compiling its yearbook, *The Mountaineer*. Considerable progress has also been made toward making the annual class trip a reality through various money-raising projects. The high school has participated in a magazine subscription campaign promoted by the Curtis Publishing Company, and there is a senior play in the offing. Mrs. Watkins has shown untiring interest in the direction of this work.

In concluding this report, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperativeness afforded the school by the members of the staff; our Elementary Supervisor, Miss Blanche Witherell; our Music Supervisor, Mrs. Ruth Wentworth; and Mr. Harold Truell, our Superintendent of Schools. The helpful effort of the Carroll School Board is also to be commended. The understanding interest that our School Nurse, Mrs. Mary Spaulding, has shown in our problems of pupil personal welfare has contributed to a higher morale. The local Parent-Teacher Association has shown a cooperative interest that deserves our thankful recognition, as does the general

positive attitude that we have found to be existent throughout our community, whenever the welfare or betterment of our school has been concerned.

Report of Supervisor of Vocal Music

Dear Sir:

I hereby submit my annual report as Supervisor of Vocal Music at the Twin Mountain school.

I had three different groups of children for music. Grades I, II, and III were in one group; Grades IV, V, and VI were in the second group, and the Junior High and High School in the third group.

In the first group many rote songs were learned. Matching of tones to help those who find it hard to keep their voices on the right pitch was stressed. This work was done daily, and much improvement was realized. The fundamentals of music theory were drilled on which included note, rest values, music staff, clef sign, bars, and measures. Some note reading was started by some of the older children.

In the second group a thorough review of the fundamentals was done. Observance of music phrases was introduced and interpretation was greatly improved. Reading of music was also improved upon. Listening to records to improve their appreciation of music was indulged in several times.

In the third group much improvement in voice quality was shown and interpretation of music was studied. Folk music of different countries was worked on, as well as other good choral numbers. Music by different composers, both old and new, was occasionally listened to and discussed.

Health Report

Dear Mr. Truell:

I hereby submit my report as school nurse for the year 1955-1956.

In September seventy-two students were weighed and measured. Head examinations were made for Pediculosis or Ringworm. This inspection is done periodically.

Three Polio Clinics have been held during the year. All pupils, with the exception of three, have had their first and second Salk Vaccine shots.

In April, Patch tests were done by Mrs. Gladys Fancy, District Tuberculosis Nurse. A Tuberculosis Clinic was held at the Morrison Hospital in May. Eleven students were X-rayed. No active cases were revealed.

In November, Hearing Loss tests were given to all pupils by the use of the American Legion Maico Audiometer. No hearing defects were found.

Visual Acuity tests with the Snellen Eye chart were done.

The cooperation of the teachers regarding the pupils' eye habits in the classroom is a vital help. Many children have had their eyes examined during the school year and, in some cases, glasses were needed.

Several tonsillectomies were performed by family doctors. Much improvement is noted in the general health of a child after this operation is done.

In October, physical examinations were done by Dr. Ralph N. Jones. Seventy pupils were examined.

Seventy-one home calls have been made during the year. I derive a great deal of help, through the visits with the parents, discussing medical problems of their children. The parents are most cooperative in every way.

Parents, teachers, and school nurses work together toward one goal—Good Health for the children.

I am very grateful to you, Mr. Truell and the teachers for your interest in helping to detect symptoms and troubles regarding the pupils.
