TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dunbarton, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate above the amount required by law for highways.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Maintenance and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate above the amount required by law for the support of the library.

- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of its cemeteries.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a snowplow and tractor and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of providing shelter for the snow plow and tractor if purchased.
- 12. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Dunbarton:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report.

Our work for the past year has followed the regular lines. We were able to maintain a good record for attendance and progress, as shown by the statistical report.

The per cent of attendance, 93%, is the same as the previous year. In fact it is a little better, because during that year we lost on account of holidays and other causes 6½ school days, as against 5 days this year.

The efficient school year is a very important matter. New Hampshire State Law provides for a school year of 36 weeks, or 180 school days. Teachers are engaged for 36 weeks, and the district pays them for 36 weeks of service. While one week, made up of a day here and there, lost out of the year is not a very serious matter, anything more than that begins to be a real monetary loss to the district and a very great time loss to the children. This year each child averaged to lose through sickness or other causes one week of his school year. Adding this personal loss to the calendar loss, we will see that each pupil received on the average 34 weeks of schooling. In other words, each pupil had to do the work of 36 weeks in 34 weeks. The average loss for the past eight years has been much greater; hence it is safe to say that each child graduating this year lost during the eight years one-half year of his elementary school work. The remedy for this is a longer calendar year. A number of districts in different sections of the State have arranged their school calendars on a basis of 37 or 38 weeks, thereby making provision for "No School Days." Thus their actual school year amounts to from 177 to 183 days.

I emphasize this point because the majority of our children now enter High School and they, with a school year of 34 weeks or less, are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain their place in High School in competition with children who have had the advantages of longer school years, and two years of Junior High, in place of the old line work in grades 7 and 8.

It is the constant aim of the Superintendent and teachers to so organize and plan the work that the increasing requirements of High School standards can be successfully met. The majority of our High School pupils have thus far been able, by industry and earnest effort, to overcome their handicap in scholastic preparation, and maintain good ranks in their High School course.

In this connection I wish to say further that in planning the work for the different grades in the schools we have to combine classes in such a way that distinct grade lines are more or less obliterated. In the natural progress of events this enables some pupils to reach the limits of the eighth grade at the age of 11 to 13 years. Most children under 14 years of age are generally considered too immature, both physically and mentally, to do High School work with success or real satisfaction. A case of this kind recently came up in our schools: a pupil graduated at the age of 12½ years. He was considered too young for High School, so returned to his local school for another year, did very good work, then entered High School, much better prepared to undertake the difficult tasks involved.

During the spring term of last year we underook too many outside activities. All of these were very good in themselves, but they placed a heavy burden upon teachers and pupils, which of necessity interfered to a certain extent with the regular school work. Two of these, Memorial Day and graduation, are a regular part of the school program. Of the two, graduation is more important in so far as carrying out the regular school program goes.

I do not wish to recommend that the other activity, namely, the local Grange Children's Night, be considered unimportant. What I do recommend is that the Grange arrange to have their exercises in October or November, when traveling conditions are almost equally good and no special demands are being made on the schools.

I further recommend that we make our Memorial Day exercises much less elaborate, in so far as the participation of the school children is concerned. I am fully convinced that all of these activities have very great educational value and that the schools can profit a great deal from participation in them; but that it should all be done with due regard for the limits of the regular school program.

The consolidation of the Page's Corner and Waite schools at the Waite District has proven a very happy way out of a number of difficult situations. The enrollment of 15 pupils makes an efficient school from the point of view of business economy as well as from that of the administration of the school work. With the increased numbers we have been able to organize classes that are working well together and are making very satisfactory progress.

In closing, I wish to express appreciation for the loyal co-operation of teachers, school officials, parents and children, which has made the work of the year not only successful but very pleasant in every way.




