TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To choose one or more and not exceeding three Highway Agents, for the ensuing year.
- 4. To hear reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Road Agents, Overseers of the Poor, Library Trustees and other Town Officers and take any action relative thereto.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money to pay Town debts or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Maintenance, raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars or take any action relative thereto.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tractor and snow-plow complete, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to have more electric street lamps.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purpose of painting the interior of the Public Library or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see what the Town will do in regard to better fire protection, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Greenfield School Board:

Standard achievement tests, given in the fall of 1925 were made the basis for the correction of such method or pupil deviations as could immediately be put into effect. Further investigation showed, last spring, the great need for more reading material, for the introduction of a complete arithmetic course, instead of the former method of dictation of problems and computations by the teacher, added to some extent by a small number of books. The children now have a complete, standardized arithmetic program extending from grade two through the eighth grade, and are partially equipped to take up junior high mathematics. Algebra and Geometry can wait until all the children of the upper grades have arrived at a sure foundation of basal arithmetic. At no greater expense than was cared for by last year's budget Junior High mathematics can be introduced this coming year, provided that the faithful work of the teacher in the grammar grades continues to bear fruit.

Spelling books are now available for all children, and the

improvement in composition shows a notable gain.

Reading is being unified throughout the six towns of this supervisory union, the same basal readers and supplementary texts being purchased and used. This greatly reduces the time that must be spent by supervision in teaching the rudiments of the various methods and allows the exchange of certain material. A small annual expense for three years will provide all the supplementary material for one basal method, while a variety of texts in any town cause many teachers rightly to ask for corresponding material.

Diagnostic work has been added to the testing for achievement. Throughout the six towns of the supervisory union the teachers are working under ideal conditions for arriving at a knowledge of the training lacking in any grade, and to what extent each child has fallen below his expected standard. Re-

medial drills are then given.

We suggest that the School Board give careful attention to the physical condition of the school rooms and see if something cannot be done to improve them. New blackboards are sadly needed. The desks are reaching the point where they are liabilities when good handwriting or composition is desired. By spreading the expense over two or three years it will be possible to have the same excellent working conditions as Hancock and

Francestown have arrived at in the matter of good desks of the movable type which allow the room to be used for other gatherings than actual school sessions, or for Friday afternoon sessions of special interest.

Equipment for warm lunches might well be extended.

The teaching of history and geography is seriously hampered by a lack of suitable new maps. We recommend the purchase of a complete set of Sanford-Gordy maps or their equivalent, thus combining in one purchase the needs of two courses.

The schoolhouse at Greenfield is in a strategic position. It cannot fail of being noticed by travelers through the town. We suggest that sufficient grading of the grounds be done to enable a more attractive appearance to be presented, and that a flower garden and shrubs would add greatly to the attractiveness of that corner.

The children of Greenfield need more playground activities. A small amount invested in playground apparatus, installed by citizens who remember their own childhood, would pay excellent dividends in the form of better organized team play and health. Play is part of a child's rightful work in schooldays. Much of the mischievous tendencies disappear when a proper outlet for youthful spirits is provided.

There is work for a school nurse, for following up the excellent medical inspection.


