

### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 4 To hear reports of Auditors and Committees, and to act thereon.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate by Public Auction acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for stoning up Water Holes. This work to be done under the supervision of Fire Engineers.
- 7. To see what action, if any, the town will take on the rental of the Town Hall. (This article sponsored by the Planning Board and an oral report will be submitted.)
- 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to keep camp roads in suitable condition for the safety of life and property at their (Selectmen) discretion. (This article submitted by the Planning Board and favorable action recommended.)
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue graveling Wash Pond Road.
- To see if the town will accept State Aid Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$171.84. State's share \$687.34.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Board of Selectmen to institute the necessary Court proceedings to see if a decree of Court may be obtained to authorize the town to use the lot of land known as the

Smith land, also as Ordway Field, situated in Hampstead, mentioned in Clause twenty-three (23) and the residuary clause of the will of Martha H. Ordway, late of Hampstead, deceased, for lawful town purposes other than or in addition to the purposes mentioned in the will of said deceased, and in accordance with the general intention of said deceased; and raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to defray the expense of such proceedings, and pass any vote relating thereto. (By petition.)

13. Moved, that the town of Hampstead raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 in support of the Seacoast Regional Development Association in its effort to promote the economic interest of the town, in participation with the other towns in the Seacoast Region.

### REPORT OF FIRE ENGINEERS

In the past year we had sixteen calls: Two calls to the dump on Kent's Farm Road; one major fire, the barn of C. A. Brooks; three out-of-town calls to Atkinson; ten grass, woods and chimney fires.

We now have thirteen water holes in town. They are located as follows: Opposite Harry Sunanday; W. Hampstead four corners; No. Salem Road, W. Hampstead, near Derry line; foot of Osgood Hill; opposite Congregational Church; foot of Stickney's hill; Pickard's Brook; opposite Joseph Heddamons; foot of Geo. Ayer's Hill; opposite Bixby's in Duston's gravel pit; opposite Mr. Rollins on Central Street; next to Mr. McGilvery's, E. Hampstead; Keezer homestead at E. Hampstead.

We have added to our equipment as follows: Six rubber coats; six pr. rubber boots; six hats; twelve pr. rubber mittens; 400 ft. 2½ inch hose; 100 ft. 1½ inch hose.

The Hampstead Volunteer Fire Protective Association, in the past year, has built a room in the fire station and installed a toilet and wash stand in same. Also a directional signal system has been installed outside of the station. These were paid for by the Association.

### FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVEN-TION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.



Also, no adult fiction books could be obtained direct from the State Library. However, the short time we were able to enjoy having the adult books, these were appreciated by all who came to the library.

Although we were not able to purchase as many books as we would have liked to this year, the selections we did choose had good circulation and as we tried to get some of each type of book, I believe our circulation increased this year and many new names were added to the list of borrowers.

Every month four new books come from the Junior Literary Guild for the children and intermediate group. These books are carefully selected for the young people and are enjoyed very much.

We wish that more people would come in to the library and see what we do have as we are trying to serve all of the people in Hampstead, East Hampstead and West Hampstead.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The following committee of five was appointed at the last Town Meeting to draft an Ordinance Plan:

David Otis George Chase Thomas Franklyn Ralph Rooney Glendon Emerson

George Chase was elected chairman and David Otis, secretary.

This committee held five meetings from March 20, 1949 to May 9, 1949. These meetings were approximately four hours long and had a 90 per cent attendance.

A day was spent in Concord by the committee at the various state agencies, obtaining data and information on zoning and building ordinance and the functions of a planning board.

The board discussed and compiled data for the policy of the planning board.

As information was gathered and compiled it became apparent to this committee that the planning board, as authorized by the State Enabling Act, would best fill the needs and wishes of the townspeople.

At the postponed Town Meeting held May 8th, the policy of a Planning Board was presented to the townspeople by the committee. At this time it was voted to establish a Planning Board in the town of Hampstead. The

following Planning Board was then appointed by the selectmen in accordance with the State Enabling Act:

Thomas Franklyn
Ralph Rooney

Glendon Emerson

George Chase was selected chairman and David Otis, secretary.

Fifteen meetings and many sub-committee meetings were held by members of the Planning Board, from May 22nd, 1949 to date. These meetings were approximately four hours long with 90 per cent attendance.

The following is a brief list of the items discussed and acted upon by the Planning Board with the cooperation of the selectmen and town departments:

- 1. The procuring of an up-to-date town map.
- 2. Methods of bidding and posting notices of town work. This item accounted for considerable saving of town money.
- 3. Rebuilding the spillway at Sunset Lake, and abtaining information and engineering data from state engineers on the construction of the spillway. This information was obtained by a trip to Concord by members of the Planning Board.
- 4. A ruling by the Attorney General's office on the expenditure of town funds on private roads.
- 5. Discussion and investigation of operating expenses of the Town Hall, at the request of the selectmen.
- 6. Discussion and extensive study of zoning and building code regulations. This necessitated another trip to Concord to obtain Underwriter's Bureau specifications which are on file by the Planning Board for the use of the townspeople.
- 7. The present Planning Board, as re-organized, due to resignations, is:

The Planning Board, in checking data and information relative to zoning and building regulations and the workability of them in other towns of comparable size in New Hampshire, have felt that this subject needs very careful study and consideration in compiling a brief and beneficial ordinance. The board is in agreement that the people of Hampstead do not wish numerous rules and regulations that are not concise in their purpose, and that might work hardship on the townspeople.



# SCHOOL WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampstead qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the thirteenth day of March 1950, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the District will vote to direct and authorize the School Board to provide transportation for all pupils attending Hampstead public schools, so that no child

will be required to walk more than one mile to school or to a school bus route.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of oiling the playground at the back of the Central School.

Article 11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other United States Government or State Agencies, or local or private agencies.

Article 12. To see whether the District will vote to renovate the former one-room elementary school building in Hampstead now used for athletic purposes so that it can be used both as an auditorium and as a gymnasium.

Article 13. To see whether the District will vote to raise and appropriate not exceeding \$10,000 for the purpose of renovating the former one-room elementary school building in Hampstead now used for athletic purposes so that it can be used both as an auditorium and as a gymnasium, and for this purpose to authorize the issue of notes or bonds of the District in an amount not exceeding \$8,000 under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Act as amended and to authorize the District to accept the balance of the sum appropriated in contributions.

Article 14. To take any and all action that may be necessary and convenient to effect the purposes of any vote passed under any of the foregoing articles.

Article 15. To see if the District will name the new auditorium the Veterans Memorial Auditorium, and authorize the School Board to take the necessary steps in installing an appropriate placque designating the auditorium as such.

Article 16. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education and Citizens of Hampstead:

I hereby submit my third Annual Report. This report will include supplementary staff reports from the Headmaster of the High School, the Supervisor of Music Instruction, the Supervisor of Art Instruction, and the Director of Health Services. This report will cover statistical information concerning the school year beginning July 1, 1948 and ending June 30, 1949; with additional information concerning the statistics of the schools from July 1, 1949 to December 1949.

#### I. GENERAL INFORMATION:

The school enrollment reached a total of 153 pupils registered for 1948-49. During the present year our total enrollment shows 165 pupils registered.

#### A. Teaching Staff

We have been fortunate to hold our well trained and experienced staff of teachers this year, with but one exception, thus insuring a continuity of teaching efficiency. Mrs. Rita Dubrule replaces Mrs. Eva W. Thompson as Supervisor of Music Instruction, who for reasons

#### II. CURRICULUM

The general aims of education for all children, youth and adults give direction to the development of the School Curriculum. It follows then, that all school activities and specific objectives should be closely related to the general aims of education. An educational program thus conceived provides opportunity for continuous guidance throughout life.

Education should help people control their physical and social environment, and adjust themselves to it by providing opportunities for:

- (1) Discovering, developing to the greatest possible extent and utilizing for personal and social benefit the unique abilities and talents of all persons.
- (2) Making minds and bodies function as efficiently as possible.
- (3) Participating in the activities of community groups which contribute to the general welfare.
- (4) Living wholesomely and fully day by day so that there will be established important habits of emotional health which will help in later life to choose and live with a mate, and rear children; and to acquire materials necessary for needs and comforts.

#### A. Program of Studies

The Curriculum implemented by our teaching force and community continues to strive for the above-mentioned ends. Our Secondary School Graduates are doing well in the post-secondary schools they have chosen to attend, and those choosing to enter employment show an earnestness of purpose which is above average. This indicates reasonable preparation in high school, both academically and vocationally.

The Program of Studies offered by the Hampstead Schools continues to provide adequate training in the skill subjects such as reading, writing, and arithmete; though there is room for expansion and improvement in the fields of social studies, health, science and physical education, and vocational training.

#### B. Testing Program

We are beginning to feel the results of our testing program, in aiding our children in areas of difficulty. A permanent record for each child has been instituted so that a complete educational, social and mental history is kept on file during his tenure in the schools of Hampstead.

The testing program in the High School continues, thus enabling us to work with you and your boy or girl in guiding him into desirable fields of endeavor.

#### III. TEACHERS AND PROFESSIONAL IMPROVE-MENT:

Our staff of teachers continue to improve themselves professionally with Miss Hoyt and Mr. Greenlaw attending Boston University and the University of New Hampshire respectively. This Fall Mrs. Sinskie and Mrs. Reynolds are attending an extension course given by Boston University. They are to be commended for this effort on their part.

#### IV. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS

During the year minor repairs were made at the High School and the Central School. Major alterations and additions were accomplished in that all the rooms in the Central School were painted; tile was laid in the kitchen; and part of the playground was scraped and leveled. The front approaches of the Central School were "hot topped." An oil burner was installed replacing coal for oil as fuel, thus relieving the custodian of the time-consuming coal stoking; such time being transferred to the ever-increasing maintenance work.

#### V. HOT LUNCH PROGRAM:

The Hot Lunch Program continues the high standards of good food well prepared, and the program is efficiently run. Mrs. Coombs is aided by Mrs. Walter Clark, and Miss Stimson of the High School faculty prepares the menus and keeps the accounts. The Parent Teacher Association furnishes funds to provide for a helper in the kitchen.

#### VI. SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES:

The Hampstead schools, pupils and community continue to reap the benefits derived from the close cooperation of the community organizations with the schools.

#### A. The Parent Teacher Association

The Parent Teacher Association continues to be active in its support of the Hot Lunch Program and the recreational reading program. They are ready at all times to give active support to worthy educational drives and causes.

#### B. The Greater Hampstead Civic Club

This organization has continued in an active and positive way to develop better facilities and services for the young men and women of Hampstead.

#### C. A Cooperative Citizenry

The strength of a school system lies in the cooperative action of its community citizens, and Hampstead citizens have, by use of their schools and support of its purposes, produced a system of which they may well be proud.

#### VII. RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSIONS:

In this section of my report I wish to state that these recommendations and conclusions look only to the future, and are not necessarily for immediate action. With some, such time and planning is necessary, and with others I suspect a negative reaction. However, the schools of Hampstead are your schools to make of them and those attending what you will.

#### A. Teacher Status

There still remains a teaching shortage in New Hamp-

shire and in order to maintain our present teacher standards, increases in salaries are indicated.

#### B. Manual Training

Careful consideration should be given to the employment of a Manual Training Teacher for the 7th and 8th grades and in the High School.

#### C. Textbooks, Supplies and Equipment

Continuation of the policy of gradual replacement in these areas as well as additional material to take care of increased enrollments, is recommended.

#### D. Maintenance and Repair

Careful consideration should be given in the procurement of funds for the upkeep of the capital equipment provided. When funds are available the continuation of the program of hot-topping or gravelling of the Central School Playground should be contemplated.

#### E. Planning for the Future

Thorough investigation should be made into the advisability and possibility of establishing an area vocational agricultural school in Hampstead. Factors to be considered are:

- 1. Finances
- 2. Students in outlying districts available for enrollment.
- 3. School Plant
- 4. Instructional Force

#### F. Conclusions

I wish to take this opportunity to commend the citizens of Hampstead for the unusual effort made both financially and personally in offering educational opportunity to the youth of this community.

The above average per-pupil costs are due primarily to the comparatively low teacher pupil-load as opposed to the rest of the State. These figures also indicate, in my opinion, the need for State Aid, which will alleviate the already heavy burden placed upon property tax-payers not only in Hampstead, but in like communities.

#### G. General

To the citizens of Hampstead may I express my sincere thanks and appreciation for the cooperative spirit shown when called upon to support worthy educational advance.

To the teachers and Members of the School Board, my deepest gratitude for your team work in securing a victory for Hampstead's boys and girls.

I hereby submit the annual report for Hampstead High School.

Four curricula are offered in the program of studies for the school: Classical, General, Commercial, and Home Economics. Electives may be made in more than one curriculum.

A large percentage of recent graduates are continuing their education in other institutions.

The Senior Class presented its annual play in December, under the direction of Mrs. Gladys Dyke. Proceeds realized from the play, and other activities sponsored throughout the year, enable the class to enjoy a trip to New York in April. A Christmas Concert was presented by the Glee Club.

Interest in athletics is very high. At present, eighteen of the twenty-two boys are members of the basketball squad, while seventeen girls are participating in the activity. Soccer was introduced for the boys in the fall and a schedule of four games was played. Baseball attracts a large number of candidates in the spring. Hampstead has been fortunate in having a number of boys interested in athletics and possessing ability that has contributed to the success of the teams. Favorable comments have been received from coaches and principals of opposing teams, officials, and

spectators concerning the conduct and attitude of Hampstead players during games. We trust that it will continue.

The Hampstead Parent-Teacher Association has continued to supply magazine subscriptions for the school and to contribute to the success of the hot lunch program.

The people of Hampstead have an interest in their schools and are always willing to cooperate in every project for their betterment. This support is largely responsible for any achievement which the school makes. To the superintendent, school board, Parent-Teacher Association, and citizens of Hampstead, the staff expresses its appreciation.

#### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To Mr. L. Munro Grandy, Superintendent of Schools:

I am pleased to make my first report on my work as Supervisor of Music in Hampstead, N. H.

In working to accomplish the aims of music, I have tried to present a varied and interesting program which will correlate with the work of the teacher.

This consists of rote singing, rhythm bands, listening periods, dramatizing, creating and other activities for the primary grades.

The program in the intermediate grades consists of music reading, folk dancing, singing in rounds and canon, rhythmical activities, folk dancing, singing games, creative activities, listening periods, and beginning study of the instruments of the Symphony orchestra.

In Junior High, subject matter and procedure must minister to the physical, emotional and intellectual conditions of adolescent years, and children should realize music as a means of expression. Vocal music, group and individual performing games, social and folk dancing, appreciation periods are all a part of the Junior High Program.

In High School, we have a chorus of twenty-five voices which is very good for the small enrollment of the school. We presented a Christmas Concert which was well attended on the night of December 18, 1949. In the near future we hope to present an operetta.

In closing may I thank Mr. Grandy, the School Committee and all the kind teachers who have helped so much.

I hereby submit my report concerning the art activities and instruction in Hampstead.

The art program is now in its third year, and since its introduction in Hampstead has come a long way. With a foundation of fundamentals laid last year, the results of the effect of such a program are making their appearance in the classrooms. A similar program of fundamentals of lettering, color, design, figure drawing, and seasonal decorations is being continued this year in the school.

Each month the students create the decorations for the main bulletin board. At this time they not only have the opportunity to create but, also, to arrange their designs in a given space. The Christmas story was painted on the windows in the front of the building. The seventh and eighth grades did an excellent job in making their own manger scene. The figures and animals were carved out of soap, and the manger made out of pine boughs.

Placemats, nut cups, and favors are being made for the Junior Red Cross in Haverhill, Massachusetts, for the various holidays, and sent to the many hospitals.




