ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday March 8, 1966, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners, and any other Town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, One Highway Agent, One or more Auditors, One Library Trustee for the term of three years, One Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years, One Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chapter 118, Part 13, Laws of 1945, as amended.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town, as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders to provide for expenses of the current year in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or when they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to Administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes. such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that strip of road in the Woodsville Fire District running from the corner of Terrace St. to the top of the hill known as Smith St. to a line determined by the Commissioners of the Woodsville Fire District.

Article 11. To transact any other business proper to come before said Meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

We must all be careful:

1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush;
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 p.m.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

BLISTER RUST REPORT

In 1965, 142 towns and cities appropriated \$18,000.00 to advance the control program in their communities. This sum, combined with state and federal cooperative funds, enabled us to cover 197,083 acres of control area. This splendid cooperation, an indication of the towns continued confidence in the statewide control program, is most heartening.

Recognizing the town's fiscal problems, the Division's appropriation requests have been kept to minimum amounts necessary to maintain the present status of control.

The importance of the blister rust control program is evidenced by the prominent place white pine holds in our state economy—(1) approximately 70% of all lumber cut in New Hampshire is white pine; (2) 17% of our New Hampshire labor force is sustained by revenue derived from white pine timber sales, woods operations and the manufacture and sale of hundreds of white pine products. All of this was endangered by the advent of the white pine blister rust disease.

New Hampshire faced a big job in marshalling forces to combat the blister rust. It had the largest control area in the United States—2,500,000 acres. However, town, city, state and federal forces combined in a unique team effort to combat it. The state was given the job of directing the field work. The combined effort was successful. Control of the disease has been established on 98% of the entire control area. Our problem now is to hold the line and maintain our hard earned control by periodic examination of control areas to determine the recurrence of currant and gooseberry bushes and, when found, destroy them. Continued cooperation on the part of towns and cities is essential to the achievement of this goal.

Two new planes have made their home at Dean Memorial Airport this year, Guy Hebb's Aeronca and B. R. Farquharson's Luscombe. We now have four planes stationed here. Bob Gibson's Ercoupe and Murdock Newman's Tri-pacer Piper Cub.

During the winter, the North-South Runway is kept plowed by Road Agent, Arthur Bigelow.

Last Spring, the airport was closed from February 15 to May 9. The runways were too soft to permit safe landing. A business plane from Derry, N. H. did land and take off safely in April, the land being frozen at the time.

For the first time in many years, we had to close the airport in November. With the rains and freezing and thawing, the strips were not safe to be used.

Our most active months were June through October.

There was an increase in activity this year. A total of 287 planes were registered. Two hundred eleven planes were registered in 1964.

WOODSVILLE PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The year 1965 was again a year of change for our library. Mrs. Asa Waterman retired on September 1 and was succeeded by the assistant librarian, Mrs. Lawrence Cochran, and Mrs. James Leonard was elected assistant. Mrs. H. S. Mitchell, who had retired the previous year after 23 years of outstanding service, was employed during the month of September to help the new staff. Since then she has given many hours of voluntary service and has been available for valuable advice.

18,865 books were circulated during the year, many books being obtained on loan from the Bookmobile to supplement our purchases. During the summer a reading club was held for school children and certificates given to those participating. For the smaller children a story hour was conducted by Mrs. Kay Conrad, assisted by Mrs. Stimson, Mrs. Graham, and Mrs. Seriden.

During the fall an extension course on Book Selection consisting of ten weekly lessons, given at Littleton by a member of the State Library staff, was attended by both the librarian and her assistant. Our library has joined the statewide Library Development Association, with Mrs. Mitchell our representative to the District Council. At the annual meeting in September Mrs. H. B. Knight retired after many years of faithful service on the Board of Trustees, and Mrs. Mitchell was elected to succeed her. Co-operative book purchasing meetings have been attended by both librarians.

Children's Book Week was observed with posters, exhibits, and distribution of book marks, and Catholic Book Week was observed with special exhibits. Posters and book displays were arranged both at Thanksgiving and Christmas by one of the trustees, Mrs. Parker Spooner. A joint committee from the Progressive Club and the Lionesses provided attractive Christmas decorations. Sale of outdated books during the year brought in about \$40.00.

The library continues to be of very real service both to school students and to the general public, though greatly hampered by lack of adequate space.

SCHOOL WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Union High School District of Woodsville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said district on the 14th day of March, 1966, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Woodsville Free Public Library.
11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars to be turned over to the trustees of the Woodsville Free Public Library, for the purposes of renovation and construction of an addition to said library.
12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
13. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

As your superintendent approaches the mid-point in his first year of tenure, he has observed many problems facing education in this area but the one single greatest dilemma is: "How are we going to continue supporting public schools with costs rising at such a rapid rate?". No one has the answer but one fact we all recognize—we have children and they must be educated to live in an atomic age that was inconceivable twenty years ago.

Our educational responsibilities are only beginning when we consider the rate at which man acquires knowledge. It is estimated that knowledge doubled for the first time at about 1700; again around 1900; the third doubling occurred about 1950; and the fourth in 1960. If it is true that we are now gathering new knowledge at such an astounding pace that we are doubling the world's gross supply of information every ten years, then the educational process may soon find itself under overwhelming stress. New ways of learning must be rapidly developed and installed in the schools if we are to maintain an intellectual balance between the acquisition and absorption of new knowledge.

Another factor which is often overlooked by many of us is the influence that technology has had on our everyday life and especially education. The technology of the 1960's has created a society which is far from stable. Spectacular breakthroughs in science and computer technology have generated an atmosphere of rapid and accelerating change. Evidence of a changing society may be seen at every turn. Even the relatively new concept of automation is giving way to a newer process called cybernation.

In order for all of us to become aware of the why's and wherefor's of financing education, we must become aware of the magnitude of the extravagant changes which are taking place in society. Our children must compete in-

tellectually and as citizens in a society that changes day to day. To keep pace, our educational system must continue to improve in the future. All of this will require more thinking and planning on the part of the educational profession and more money from the citizenry. There are two ways to get to the top of an oak tree, one is to climb it, the other is to sit on an acorn.

May I take this opportunity to thank the school board, teaching staff, and citizenry of Woodsville for their fine support during this first year.

Since the end of World War II, American education has been faced with many problems including inadequate facilities, shortage of qualified teachers, and the influence of the Sputnik era, which has exerted increasing pressure upon the students and the school systems. This pressure for strengthening existing courses and implementing new ones into the curriculum is largely predicated by the belief that students today have a greater capacity for learning than students of former years. This recognition of the greater capacity for learning of today's students places a constant burden upon the schools and the communities for providing adequate curriculum programs.

Woodsville High School is attempting to keep abreast with this ever-continuing emphasis for the search for greater knowledge by re-evaluating and revising our present curriculum. Although no major changes have occurred within our program of studies in this school year, we have attempted to strengthen all areas of instruction. For instance, the English Department has further developed the use of the S.R.A. Reading Program. We feel that if all students are to become enlightened citizens and be able to participate intelligently within our society, they must be able to read, to comprehend and communicate effectively. After two years in existence, the results of the Reading Program indicate much improvement in the reading abilities of most of our students. However, the Program is not the "cure-all" for all reading difficulties; therefore, we hope that funds already appropriated under new Federal legislation may be made available to us for the acquisition

of a reading specialist for these educationally handicapped children.

Our science, social science and commercial departments have all been strengthened considerably through the purchase of new equipment, slides, transparencies, etc. With these supplementary materials the students are receiving a greater insight into and understanding of subject matter being presented in each area.

The fall of 1965 saw three faculty changes at Woodsville High School. Mr. Everett Barnes replaced Mr. Donald Evans in the Social Studies Department; Mr. Jules Coté replaced Miss Lois Laurin in the Language Department and Mr. Frederick Wolfe replaced Mr. John Bagonzi in the Science Department.

The extra-curricular program continues to be an important aspect of our total educational program. The Glee Club under the direction of Miss Edith Emery participated in many activities including the New Hampshire All State Music Festival; the annual Christmas Concert; the Mount Royal Music Festival in Montreal, and the North Country Music Festival held at the Woodsville Community Building, the last-named concert being composed of students from all the high schools of the North Country.

Enthusiasm in the musical field has resulted in a membership of approximately fifty students in the school band. This organization has participated in many schools and community activities, as well as in student exchange concerts with other high schools. Increased student interest has also resulted in the creation of a student dance band.

The formation of the Quill and Scroll Club and of the National Junior Honor Society has increased the opportunities of the student body to participate in the school's extra-curricular program.

The school play, *The Broom and the Groom*, under the direction of Mrs. Marion Mullen was presented at the Woodsville Community Building. The Drama Club also presented three one-act plays during the school year.

Woodsville High School continues to uphold its athletic tradition. The soccer team, coached by Mr. Robert Richard, completed the season with a creditable five wins and five losses record.

On the basketball court, the Engineers under the direction of Mr. John Bagonzi compiled a season mark of 16 wins and two losses and advanced to the semi-finals in the N.H.I.A.A. state tournament at Portsmouth before losing

to Goffstown. In baseball, Coach John Bagonzi guided the team to a five wins and five losses seasonal mark.

I wish to thank the school board, Mr. Mullen, the Woodsville High School faculty, and all the people of the town of Woodsville and the surrounding communities for making this year a most rewarding, educational experience.

WOODSVILLE GRADED SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of the Woodsville Elementary School for the year ending December 31, 1965.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 327 pupils. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten—20, Grade 1—34, Grade 2—42, Grade 3—36, Grade 4—43, Grade 5—39, Grade 6—32, Grade 7—47 and Grade 8—34. Grades 2 and 7 are split into two sections. The large number of pupils in grades 4 and 5 necessitated the employment of a full-time helping teacher. This position was filled by Mrs. Edna Foss who replaced Mrs. Lois Henson who was doing part-time helping work and is now teaching in Haverhill. Miss Jean Mileski, a graduate of Keene State College, replaced Mrs. Barbara Seiferth in February of 1965 and is teaching English and Literature in grades 7 and 8.

The elementary school is making use of educational television programs broadcast from channels 3 and 8. Subjects being used by various classes include art, history, logic, music and science.

The school library was fortunate to receive the sum of \$433.22 from the National Forest Reserve Fund which enabled the school to purchase many new books in addition to those regularly purchased by the school district. The part time use of the library as a classroom has interfered with the use of the library as an audio-visual room. I would recommend the addition of dark shades to the classrooms so that audio-visual materials could be used in each room.

The school lunch program continues to serve approximately 240 pupils and teachers each day. The program is supervised by Mrs. Virginia L. Bradley.

The surface of the playground was greatly improved by the use of fertilizer and grass seed in the summer and again in the fall. Continued periodical use of fertilizer and grass seed over the next two or three years should make a fine play area for the children.

A student teacher was placed in the elementary school in the fall of 1965 by Plymouth State College. The student teacher, Mr. Peter Reininger, worked in the social studies field in grades 7 and 8.

The elementary school again took part in the New Hampshire Statewide Grade Eight Testing Program. These tests consist of intelligence and achievement tests and are now being scored and interpreted by the Test Service and Advisement Center in Durham. In addition to results of the individual tests a prognostic stanine score is received for each pupil which indicates their chances of success in future education. Achievement tests are also given in grades 1 through 7 and intelligence tests in grades 3 and 6. Readiness tests are given in the kindergarten in May.

A spring music program was presented by grades 5-8 and the school band. The Christmas program was presented by grades 1-4, the junior high chorus and the school band. The junior high chorus sang Christmas carols at the Woodsville Hospital and at the County Farm.

Boys and girls basketball teams and the boys baseball team play a regular schedule of games with nearby schools. The athletic teams are coached by Mr. Robert Wilmot.

I wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board and the members of the teaching staff for their constant cooperation in all matters.

All routine vision and hearing screening tests were completed and referrals made if necessary.

In the fall of 1964, a representative from the Crest Company met with Mr. Bennett, Dr. Jamback, and myself to discuss the Educational Program that Crest was offering to the elementary schools. After the meeting, it was decided to take advantage of this program. The Crest Company furnished educational materials to grades 1-8. Grade III pupils were given the Dental Instructions Kit designed as a tool for teaching dental Hygiene in the classroom. The Kit included toothbrush, disclosing tables, Crest toothpaste. In February, Dr. Jamback came to the school and talked with the third grade about care of the teeth and a demonstration of tooth brushing was done using the kits. I want to thank Dr. Jamback for taking the time to come to school and assist with this special educational program.

The annual Heaf tbc. tests were done in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11.

In April 1965, pupils in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11 were given Tetanus and Diphtheria Boosters. Vaccine was furnished by the Department of Health. The needles and syringes were donated by the Woodsville Nurses' Association. Dr. Eastman gave the shots at school. I want to thank Dr. Eastman; Mrs. Russell, Public Health Nurse; and Mrs. Eve Maccini, R. N., for assisting at this clinic.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their continued support of the Sight Conservation Program. I also want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for providing funds for medication plus two visits to a dermatologist at Hitchcock Clinic.

I want to thank each one that donated used clothing. These articles are most useful.

Four professional meetings were attended during the year.

An extension course was taken during the Fall semester. This course was sponsored by the University of Vermont and consisted of 15 evening classes taught at McIndoes, Vermont.

I want to thank Mrs. Gordon and her grade VIa pupils for the gift of money received at the end of the year. This will be used to pay for dental emergencies that often arise during the year.

Again, I want to express my appreciation to Mr. Mullen, Mr. McKelvey, and their teaching staff for continued sup-

port and cooperation with the School Health Program.

I especially want to thank Mr. Bennett for his cooperation and assistance during the past years. I also want to wish Mr. Bennett many years of happy retirement.

10. To see if the District will vote to expend funds for making a Warranty Title search on the Haverhill Academy, Pearson Hall, and Alumni Hall buildings.
11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

As your superintendent approaches the mid-point in his first year of tenure, he has observed many problems facing education in this area but the one single greatest dilemma is: "How are we going to continue supporting public schools with costs rising at such a rapid rate?" No one has the answer but one fact we all recognize—we have children and they must be educated to live in an atomic age that was inconceivable twenty years ago.

Our educational responsibilities are only beginning when we consider the rate at which man acquires knowledge. It is estimated that knowledge doubled for the first time at about 1700; again about 1900; the third doubling occurred about 1950; and the fourth in 1960. If it is true that we are now gathering new knowledge at such an astounding pace that we are doubling the world's gross supply of information every ten years, then the educational process may soon find itself under overwhelming stress. New ways of learning must be rapidly developed and installed in the schools if we are to maintain an intellectual balance between the acquisition and absorption of new knowledge.

Another factor which is often overlooked by many of us is the influence that technology has had on our everyday life and especially education. The technology of the 1960's has created a society which is far from stable. Spectacular breakthroughs in science and computer technology have generated an atmosphere of rapid and accelerating change. Evidence of a changing society may be seen at every turn. Even the relatively new concept of automation is giving way to a newer process called cybernation.

In order for all of us to become aware of the why's and wherefor's of financing education, we must become aware of the magnitude of the extravagant changes which are taking place in society. Our children must compete intellectually and as citizens in a society that changes day to day. To keep pace, our educational system must continue to improve in the future. All of this will require more thinking and planning on the part of the educational profession and more money from the citizenry. There are two ways to get to the top of an oak tree. One is to climb it, the other is to sit on an acorn.

May I take this opportunity to thank the school board,

teaching staff, and citizenry of Haverhill for their fine support during this first year.

For the 1965-1966 school year the biggest change at the Academy has been the new physical education program for both boys and girls.

For the first time, we are now able to offer a fine educational program of physical fitness for the continued development of our youngsters. This program includes basic muscle development exercises, tumbling, gymnastics, and both individual and team competition in badminton, volleyball, soccer, basketball, baseball, softball, track and field.

Today not only are we concerned with the development of a sound mind but we believe that with this program we can also be conscious of and develop sound physical condition as well.

We are constantly adding to our other departments with new equipment and materials being purchased for the sciences. A new mimeograph was bought for our business curriculum and all text books have been revised and brought up to date in every department.

Continued improvement should be shown our library. More funds are needed for annual purchases to bring both the quantity and quality of volumes up to the standards of a basic school collection. Room space is still needed for other instruction now that our music and physical education programs are functioning.

In the fall of 1964, a representative from the Crest Company met with Mr. Bennett, Dr. Edwin Jamback, and myself to discuss the Educational Program that Crest was offering to the Elementary schools. After the meeting, it was decided to take advantage of this program. The Crest Company furnished educational materials to grades 1-8. Grade 3 pupils were given the Dental Instruction Kit designed as a tool for teaching dental Hygiene in the classroom. The kit included toothbrush, disclosing tablets, and Crest toothpaste. In February, Dr. Jamback visited the third grade classroom and gave the pupils a talk on proper dental care. A demonstration on both brushing and using the kits was also done. I want to thank Dr. Jamback for taking the time to go to the school and assist with this special educational program.

In April, Tetanus and Diphtheria Boosters were given to pupils in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11. Vaccine for this clinic was furnished by the Department of Health. Needles and syringes were donated by the Woodsville Nurses' Association. Dr. C. D. Eastman gave the shots at school. I wish to thank Dr. Eastman; Mrs. Russell, Public Health Nurse; and Mrs. Eve Maccini, R. N., for their assistance with this clinic.

Annual Heaf TBC skin tests were done in grades 1, 4, 8, and 11.

There were eight dental clinics during March, April, and May 1965. Sixty-six pupils were examined, 51 pupils were treated. Grades 1-4 participated in this clinic. Transportation was donated by the following: Mr. Roy Dunkley, Mrs. Alice Girouard, Mrs. Denise Ryan, Mrs. Madeline Bixby, Mr. Everett Sawyer, Mrs. Nora Davidson, Mrs. Persis Moses, Mrs. John Wardrop, and Mrs. Irene Morris. I want to thank each one that gave the time to take a group of children to the dental clinic. Without transportation, there could be no clinic.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their continued assistance with the Sight Conservation Program.

**REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER TOWN
OF HAVERHILL, N. H. FOR YEAR ENDING
DECEMBER 31, 1965**

- Three Well Child Conferences were held in Woodsville—
- 18—Infants and Preschool children were given a physical examination by the physician
 - 33—received polio vaccine
 - 26—received diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough vaccine
 - 25—were vaccinated against smallpox.

Next year we hope to add the measles vaccine.

We also gave the pupils in grades 1-4-8-12 the opportunity to receive booster shots for diphtheria and tetanus. These same grades are done each year so that the children can remain protected against these two diseases while they are in school.

Home visits were made by the state public health nurse for follow up.

This is the year when "Medicare" will come into effect. Starting July 1st, 1966 home nursing will be paid for by Medicare for those who are covered, over 65 years of age and in need of nursing care in the home after discharge from the hospital or nursing home. With Medicare it is anticipated that there will be a shortage of hospital beds making hospital stay shorter and requiring nursing care at home. For this reason we are urging the town fathers to start planning to provide this type of service, and to discuss means for hiring a local Public Health Nurse. Already you have some of your local Clubs interested in this project. Health Education, Prevention of Disease by teaching proper Immunizations, Care of the Sick and Rehabilitation of the Aged are all nursing services needed in each and every town. The state nurse covers 15 towns so would not be able to do this work. The possibility of combining small towns together to be serviced by one nurse, Ex. one nurse for Woodsville, Monroe, Bath and Benton. Another nurse for North, East, Center Haverhill, Pike and Benton Flats. This is feasible and would be less costly. The office of Economic Opportunity, with headquarters in opera block Woodsville, may be able to assist with funds to start this

project. Later on we hope it would become self supporting.

Tax money is used for schools, road maintenance, police and fire protection. Healthy citizens should be as important if not more, because without health we cannot function.

My sincere thanks for the cooperation received.
