The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

Polls open at 9:00 A. M. and close at 6:00 P. M.

The articles in the Warrant will be taken up at 10:00 A. M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.
3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to that required by Law for the support of the Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise or appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister, or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the Town buildings and Town trucks.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

16. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same, or take other action relative thereto.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to defray its share of Old Age Assistance.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate as its share of the deficiency of the Concord Hospital.

19. To see what action the Town will take relative to the laying out and construction of a new street extending westerly from Hall Avenue, and make an appropriation for same.

20. To see what action the town will take relative to a Memorial to our Veterans, and make an appropriation for same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to make an audit of the Town accounts, and make an appropriation for same.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for removing snow from sidewalks, and purchase of equipment for same.

23. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of the Town, and appropriate money for same.

24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provi-Municipal Budget Law.

25. To see if the Town will vote to observe, during August 1949, the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

26. To see what action the Town will take relative to discontinuing the following portions of roads subject to gates and bars:

1. That portion of old road from the Weare line northerly to its intersection with the new trunk line.

2. That portion of road from the farm of Roberts Edwards to the Deering line.

3. That portion of road from the Vincent Place to the Weare line.

4. That portion of road from the Colburn place northerly to the corner on the Craney Pond Road.

5. That portion of road from Quaker Street across to the Hatch Farm.

6. That portion of road from Quaker Street up the hill along the telephone line to the road between the L. Huntington and H. Huntington Farms.

7. That portion of road extending southerly from the C. J. McCormish Farm through the Hawthorne Place.

8. That portion of road from the Butter Road easterly to the Craney Hill Road.

9. That portion of road from the Colleague Pond Road northwesterly to the Warner line.

10. The Shaker Hill Road from the F. Durgin Farm to the Hopkinton line.

11. The Falls Road from the Plummer Cemetery northerly to the river.

In March, 22 pupils and 2 adults were patched by Miss Constance Martin, R.M., of the State Tubercular Association. No reactors.

The hearing of all pupils from Grade III up were tested by audiometer. Results were: 1 pupil with a hearing loss in left ear.

In May, a Child Health and Toxoid clinic was held at the Central School under the direction of Mrs. Gertrude Snow, R.M., State Public Health nurse.

Drs. Gilland and Brown of Henniker and Dr. Penhale of Concord were the examining physicians. Seventy-two children received physical examination and immunization.

In June and July, follow-up clinics were held for the second and third injectives. Dr. Brown was the attending physician.

In conclusion I wish to thank all for their kindness and cooperation during the past year.

Then the questions to be answered, many puzzling and amusing, for instance a little tot came in and was anxiously looking at the dishes in the case in the Historical Room, when asked what she wanted she her mother wanted the Custard Cup, but she did not know which one that was.

Being sent home with the book "Custard Cup" by Livingstone, she still looked puzzled feeling sure we were mistaken in thinking that was what her mother really wanted. We could write pages of interesting anecdotes about library life, and we love it all. Ask my very faithful assistants and see if they do not agree, or better still come in and work a while with us.

The librarian enjoyed a two weeks vacation in April, during this time the library was closed, owing to the illness of the Assistant Mrs. Garland, who later recovered and is now able to assist again.

The Superintendent's report, by its very nature, should deal with the present school year and the new school year which starts in July, 1949. It should also attempt to present the possible problems in the next ten years and the possible means of meeting these problems.

The supply of high school teachers is fairly good in a few fields. In other fields, it is just as bad as ever. The supply of elementary teachers will be even worse than last year, with no relief in sight for the next four or five years. The only solution that I can see is a system of recruiting on a local, state, and national level. In one of our towns we are trying the experiment of giving two very fine high school seniors, an opportunity to get some work experience in the grade school. We certainly should make an effort to get some of our outstanding high school graduates to enter the teaching profession.

The tendency in the next ten years will be a gradually increasing school enrollment which are coming worries for superintendents and school boards all over the country. In the elementary school the situation is not so desperate as in many of my other towns. There is an opportunity to convert rooms into classrooms in the elementary building.

There is one situation which the people of Henniker should face. At the present time there are fourteen children at the Quaker Street School, while one teacher at the Central School has over forty in her class. This is hardly a fair division of teacher load. Moreover, the children in the seventh grade should be having the advantage of the more varied program possible in the Junior High School group. There is no question that either this year or next, that the State Department will refuse to approve the Quaker Street School.

Although I have never been approached by any one of the groups, I know that there has been much talk locally about the use of the gymnasium. In general the building should be used to the fullest extent possible. No group has

the legal or moral right to deprive the High School youngsters to carry on their full program. On the other hand, I see no reason why New England College should not use the gymnasium providing that it does not interfere with the school program, that a fair share of the cost is paid, that it is used properly, and that other organizations of the community are not deprived of their right to use the Gym.

The high school is not in the same fortunate position as far as meeting increased enrollment as the elementary school. The school is reaching its capacity. There are twenty-nine pupils in grades nine and ten, while in grades seven and eight there are forty-nine pupils which will mean at least an increase of fifteen pupils. Some interest in this area is being shown in the cooperative school movement. Probably some member of the Henniker board will be asked to participate with a committee in this area.

The Cogswell Fund Committee has been very cooperative in aiding needed renovations in the High School. New showers have been added for the girls, the ceiling of the gymnasium has been insulated and a new stoker installed in the High School. The Board also installed a stoker in the elementary school. This coming summer the Board is planning to replace the toilets in the elementary building also paint the building.

I have enjoyed my work in Henniker and appreciate the cooperative spirit of all concerned. It has been very pleasant meeting the different parents at the P.T.A. meetings. This group is doing a fine piece of work and all people who are interested in the Henniker schools should make an effort to attend these meetings.
