TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Lempster on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for interest on debt.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to keep the Common mowed around the Soldiers' Monument at Lempster Street.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$307.50 for State Aid Construction.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$307.50 for Town Road Aid and the State will contribute \$1,890.70.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver blank inventories at the time they appraise the property for taxation.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to reinsure the Town Hall and Union Hall.

ARTICLE 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Library.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for the Town in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to limit the Road Agents to the appropriations.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance and pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to elect one Road Agent instead of three, to take effect in 1945.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum per hour the Town will vote to pay for labor on the highway.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to receive sealed bids for mowing Town roads, a separate bid to be sent for each District.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Old Putnam Place to the Unity Town Line.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the east side of the State Highway around the Old No. 7 School House back to the State Highway.

ARTICLE 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for shingling Union Hall.

ARTICLE 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing the main structure of Union Hall.

ARTICLE 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repair of the toilet at Union Hall.

ARTICLE 22. To see what the Town will vote to do about the fence on the west side of the Cemetery from the Town Hall to the southwest corner and raise money therefor.

ARTICLE 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Fire Company.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1944 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the White Pine Blitser Rust.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division

of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

ARTICLE 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Lempster:

I herewith submit my thirteenth report as your Superintendent of Schools.

After several years of very successful work Mrs. Viola Horton resigned to accept another position, but we were fortunate in holding Mrs. Doris Abbott as teacher of the East Lempster School. The position at Lempster Street, grades five to eight was filled in September by Miss Marilyn Miller. Miss Miller graduated from Keene Teachers' College last spring, but had had some teaching experience. The lower grades under Mrs. Abbott are orderly and show great interest in their work. The upper grades with Miss Miller who puts energy and good preparation into her work are making good progress, but during the first part of the year tried many things usually attempted with a new teacher that had a tendency to make the room noisy. However, Miss Miller has a good disposition and now seems to have the school in excellent control.

The teacher situation in the State is far more serious than it has been. The normal colleges have only eighteen girls to offer as teachers for grade work next year. The State generally absorbs about one hundred new teachers. Many of the teachers in the State are only keeping their positions as a duty during the war and we have no young girls or scarcely none with the proper qualifications preparing to teach. The rural schools are in a more precarious position than those in the cities because there has been no great increases in incomes on farms comparable to those in factories and to the increased costs of education. However, the rural districts are faced with the position that in the case of a great shortage of teachers it will be harder for them to fill their positions at the same salaries than the cities. Yet, the salaries in the rural districts is by far the lowest.

Allow me to quote a paragraph from last year's report. "It would be a great help to equalize the cost of education in this state if a law was passed providing up to \$1,500.00 for each dis-

trict to help maintain high schools or to pay tuitions and other expenses of high school pupils." At the time of this writing, it seems that there might be considered in the present legislature a bill or bills that would tend to equalize the costs of education among the districts according to their ability to pay.

I feel it would be well if we looked ahead to the future and make plans for a consolidated school. It might be possible even to unite with a nearby town if the right location could be found. There would be advantages to have only two grades to a teacher, but there might be big disadvantages on account of distances. However, it would be well to have at least our own children in one school unit.

I appreciate the help and friendly understanding on the part of the Lempster School Board and wish to thank the teachers and the pupils for their loyalty and good work.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
