TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for protection of the farms on the Ammonoosuc River, below the village, from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the Town will take for the purpose of securing State Aid for construction of highways in this Town under the provisions of an act to provide State Aid and for expenditure of other public monies in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its Town highways.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town, for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1942, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$490.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being one 1/100th of one per cent of the town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 8. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To choose any other necessary Town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to your schools:

The enrollment of pupils this year is the smallest for many years. The enrollment to date is 661 including the kindergarten. A year ago the enrollment was 732. The present membership is 617. The high school enrollment this year is 242, and the present attendance 226. The enrollment by grades follows:

The high school enrollment is also less than last year—although the present enrollment has been exceeded only six times in the history of the school. The enrollment by years follows:

The decreased enrollment is due to the fact that many families have moved from town during the past year. The decrease is so uniformly spread through the grades and buildings that no consolidation of grades or elimination of high school classes has seemed wise. Whether the school population will now remain fairly stable for the duration of the war or whether it will be further reduced by additional families leaving town is not known at this writing. The high school membership has already been affected by the Selective Service. We shall have several boys in the upper grades enter the armed services during the next year, without doubt.

The health program has been about the same as in former years. The report, submitted by Miss Bryant, is as follows: Number of pupils examined 676, pupils underweight 198, defective vision 95, defective hearing 11, defective teeth 288, diseased tonsils 19, miscellaneous ailments 23. Pupils receiving treatment from January to June included: Dental care 259, vision 46, hearing 11, tonsils 6, cardiac disease 8, others 15.

Milk was served to underweight pupils and hot lunches were served from December to May to those pupils who eat at the school buildings. Complete physical examinations were given all members of the athletic teams.

During the present school year you adopted the plan of the Agricultural Marketing Administration for distribution of milk to all school pupils at one cent a half pint bottle. Under this plan the Agricultural Marketing Administration pays the producer's cost of the milk, and the school district pays for the cost of distribution. Undernourished children who cannot afford to pay for the milk get it free. The Community Nursing Association from its collections in the community will pay for the milk distributed free to the pupils. The Littleton Dairy has the contract to provide the milk—pasteurized milk to meet specifications prescribed by the Agricultural Market-

ing Administration. The cost to the school district will be slight; the benefit to pupils probably great.

This year also you have applied for surplus commodities provided by the Agricultural Marketing Administration and distributed to the schools under the direction of the State Board of Public Welfare. Apples, canned grapefruit, and some other products have been received. These are distributed to the pupils free, or where combined with other products purchased by the district, at a small charge. The school district pays for the freight on these commodities. There is no certainty that the distribution of surplus commodities will be continued throughout the year. Provision will be made to continue the hot soup or cocoa for those pupils who eat lunch at the school buildings even though the federal products are discontinued.

More changes have occurred in the teaching personnel during the past year than for a long time. The high school has lost six full time teachers and one part time teacher, the Kilburn School two, and the Apthorp School one. Mr. Glazier accepted a position as guidance director in Dedham, Mass., Miss Corey a position in Groveton, and Miss Corea one in Connecticut. Miss Cox retired from teaching and Mr. Barry and Mr. Sommers were granted leaves of absence to enter military service. Mr. Bennett accepted a position in Connecticut. Miss Pennock was granted a year's leave of absence and Miss Willey accepted a position in Portsmouth, N. H. Recently Miss Woolson has joined the Waves.

For the positions in the English department Miss Dorothy Shields and Miss Mary L. Ransom were secured. Miss Shields is a graduate of Bates College, has a master's degree from the University of New Hampshire, and has had five years of teaching experience. Miss Ransom is a graduate of the University of Vermont, and has a certificate to teach in elementary grades from the normal school in Castleton, Vt. She has also had five years of experience.

Mr. Arthur Toll, a graduate of New Hampshire University, with successful experience as teacher and coach in St. Paul's School, Concord, N. H., and Meredith High School, came here to succeed Mr. Glazier in the field of social science, and to assist in physical education and coaching. Since Mr. Sommers entered the army Mr. Toll has taken over the whole program of physical education and coaching for the boys. Mrs. Marion F. Kane accepted the position in the Home Economics Department made vacant by Miss Corea's resignation.

Miss Nellie S. Nutting, a graduate of Bates College with a year's study at the Yale Graduate School, and several years of successful experience was selected to teach science after Mr. Barry entered the navy. When Mr. Sommers was called to army service Mr. Cyril D. Norton was secured to take his work. Mr. Norton is a graduate of Harvard College and has had several years of experience in the Boston public school system. No successor to Mr. Bennett was elected.

The high school is very fortunate in having secured capable teachers for all of these positions. Some of the departments affected by the resignations are those in which the shortage is most pronounced. Schools which have been able to secure successful experienced teachers in these departments are fortunate indeed.

Miss Marion Colby with a bachelor's degree from Plymouth Teachers College and a year's experience was secured to succeed Miss Willey at the Apthorp School, and Mrs. Edith Burnham to succeed Miss Pennock at the Kilburn School. Miss Woolson has recently been granted a leave of absence to join the Waves. No new teacher has been employed for this position. Miss Holt has been transferred to the Kilburn School and Miss Chase, the kindergarten teacher, has been placed in the first grade room at Apthorp.

The kindergarten was operated last year for the first time. The enrollment was 33, the average membership 25, and the average attendance 21. Miss Chase did excellent work with her pupils. Parents were very pleased with the progress of their children in this school. Voters at the annual district meeting made a special appropriation for the continuance of the kindergarten. This year the enrollment was 20, the average membership 14 and the average attendance 10. During November and December the average attendance was 7. On my recommendation you considered the question of closing the kindergarten at the time of Miss Woolson's leaving and using Miss Chase to fill the vacancy. The parents were all sent statements of the membership and attendance and expressed complete cooperation with the proposal to close the school for the remainder of the year. At your last meeting you voted to take that action.

The shortage of trained teachers is real. Throughout the nation the figure is estimated to be 20,000 or more. It is very difficult to fill a vacancy in New Hampshire. Many married women who have not taught for several years have been recalled to service. In view of this shortage and of the very small attendance in the kindergarten I think your action in closing it is wise.

During the past year teachers here as elsewhere have been enlisted for many services to assist the war program. They have assisted in the selective service registrations. They have conducted the registration of civilians for Ration Book No. I, the registrations for gasoline users, and the registration for fuel oil users. Word has now reached them that they will be asked to conduct the registration for Ration Book No. II. They have led their schools in the drive for scrap, in the campaign to sell stamps and bonds, in the collection of keys, and in bringing pennies into circulation. Many of them have taken the courses of instruction for air raid wardens and for first aid. They have helped their pupils in knitting and sewing for the Red Cross. They have assisted in many phases of civilian defense.

In their classrooms all teachers have been asked to emphasize the fundamentals in English, science and mathematics, to stress the principles of democratic living, and to keep their pupils well informed of the different activities of our war program. Pupils in all grades have been taught what they can do to help win the war.

In the high school teachers have come to realize keenly that our schools are an active factor in the nation's program for an all-out war effort. Subject matter related to the war program has replaced much of the old in nearly every field of study. New courses in aeronautics, in physical fitness, in science, mathematics and in guidance appear in the curriculum. In your high school a credit course for graduation is being offered in aeronautics. A good beginning has been made in a physical fitness program. During the last half year practically all of the senior high school boys will be included in physical fitness classes one or two hours a week, and junior high school boys one hour a week. Classes for girls in physical education will be in operation. A class for seniors and juniors, informative of all branches of the armed services, will be in session. A review course in science and mathematics will be offered. This class will offer instruction in radio one hour a week. The school is adopting as much of the program recommended by the army and navy and aeronautics commission as its teacher time and facilities permit. You have made satisfactory provision for those seniors who are inducted into the service of their country.

Recently you have voted to grant diplomas of graduation to all senior boys in good standing inducted during the last half of the school year. This action will be an encouragement to all, and in case of enlistment in certain types of service a definite help for special training.

Transportation of school pupils may have to be curtailed to a degree not experienced since the law of 1919 requiring statewide transportation went into effect. The Office of Defense Transportation (O. D. T.) is having great difficulty in providing the transportation needed for military purposes and for war production workers. School transportation is said to use one half of the busses in operation in the country. In a final evaluation of needs the war effort will have precedence over school transportation. This is right. If the need exists many of the busses can be taken from school use and the remaining busses cover additional territory. Instead of two busses being used for two separate routes, one bus can cover both routes. Pupils can be required to walk longer distances, thereby reducing mileage. Schools can operate on a staggered timetable, beginning earlier in the morning for those transported pupils the first to arrive, and remaining in session later in the afternoon for those last returning home. plan, could, if necessary go into effect here, and in many other places at any time without destroying the consolidated school and with but little, if any, additional cost. Should the schools take the initiative? They should, at least, cooperate with the O. D. T. in curtailment of the transportation program.

The major improvement in the school buildings last summer was the painting of much of the interior of the high school building. Some new fence was erected at the Apthorp grounds. Minor repairs were made in all of the buildings. The repair item in the proposed budget for next year has been radically reduced. No large expenditures are contemplated. In three years the high school building bonds will be retired. It would seem wise to postpone building improvements of major cost until after that date so far as possible.

The present school year will close with little or no deficit. A year ago the budget presented to the school district amounted to \$71,163.00, or \$72,163.00 including the kindergarten expense. It was then estimated that the deficit last June 30 would be \$718.00 The net deficit was \$1,298.00. This difference was due to buying of fuel and supplies for use during

the present year. The budget you accepted a year ago has been reduced to \$69,978.00 not including the bookkeeping item of Penny Milk. Of this reduction of \$2,185.00 about \$500.00 has been saved by closing the kindergarten at mid year. Changes in the teaching staff have resulted in some reduction in the item for salaries. The sums for fuel and for school supplies will be less this year because of the excess bought last year. On some of the other items of the budget small savings have been effected. While receipts may be somewhat less than was estimated a year ago, the total will nearly equal the expenditures.

The budget for next year has a total of \$69,538.00. This is \$400.00 less than the revised budget for the present year. It is recognized that additional salary increases may be necessary and that fuel, supplies, and labor costs will be higher. Expenditures for building repairs and improvements and for replacement of equipment should be kept at a minimum. Only the most needed books and supplies will be purchased. Transportation may have to be curtailed, though no cut has been made in that budget item.

Receipts from sources other than taxation will be about \$3,200.00. An appropriation of \$66,000.00 would seem necessary unless your educational offering is to be definitely reduced. That is \$2,000.00 less than was raised last year.

I am very grateful for your kindness and your help during the weeks last summer I was not in the union and not very active in the work of the school system. You and Mr. Nelson and Mrs. Howland did everything necessary to complete the last school year and to carry on during the summer. I am glad of this opportunity to publicly thank you and to thank all of the teachers and the school board members in Bethlehem and Dalton for their cooperation and their expressions of good-will. Local and state officials in word and

in deed strengthened my appreciation of professional fellowship and of my dependence upon associates.

Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Total war has placed upon the schools of America responsibilities over-whelming in size and vital in importance. To our schools belongs the trust of preserving our American culture and of protecting those principles of democracy upon which our American way of life is founded. To them likewise belongs the sacred duty of preparing youth for its important place in a war torn world. These make up the yard-stick by which schools of today must be measured, and it is by these standards that I trust you may appraise the progress of Littleton High School as outlined in this, my fifth annual report to you.

REGISTRATION

The total registration this year has fallen off 30 in the senior high school but has remained at the same number in the junior high school. This decrease of 30 pupils is less than what might be expected normally when compared with the number of families leaving our community during the past year.

THE CURRICULUM AND TIME-TABLE

With the exception of several pre-induction courses summarized later in this report, there have been but three minor changes in the curriculum. A college preparatory course in physics has replaced the more general senior science course given last year. The course in junior civics has been dropped to make room for aeronuatics, a pre-induction course, and the freshman course in business arithmetic is no longer necessary as it duplicates in many details two other freshmen courses, general mathematics and general business training.

There have been no changes in the time-table, but the economy of time adherent in the 60 minute class period has been of tremendous advantage in making the changes necessary for the war program.

THE WAR PROGRAM

The opening sentences of this report directed attention to the general and long range obligations of American schools in time of war. Supplementing these, and of immediate and practical value, are other obligations vital to the war effort; for at these times when the energy and the skill of every individual are being recruited schools must turn out youth who are not only healthy in mind and body, but who possess the physical strength, the endurance, and the technical skills that will shorten their post-school period of training in the war service, in defense industry, in agriculture or in domestic activities.

Littleton High School began to plan early in the school year to meet these immediate objectives, and the summary of activities which follow is the result of this effort.

PHYSICAL FITNESS PROGRAM

Our school is fortunate in having Mr. Toll to head this program. He was in the first group of teachers in the state to receive instruction in the physical fitness program as organized and sponsored by the army, navy and air corps. Consequently, our physical fitness program for boys was started early in the year.

On January 28 a Physical Fitness Institute, one of six such institutes sponsored by the State Board of Education, was held at our school. One week later a physical fitness program for girls was inaugurated.

Both the boys' and the girls' programs are on a voluntary basis. At the present time in the senior high school 98 boys and 94 girls are enrolled. This registration accounts for 89 per cent of the boys and 87 per cent of the girls. The boys meet two periods per week under the leadership of Mr. Toll, and the girls meet one period per week under the leadership of Miss Colby, a teacher at the Apthorp School.

In addition to these pupils, both classes in the junior high school have one period per week in the gymnasium, the boys under Mr. Toll and the girls under Miss Ransom.

PRE-INDUCTION COURSES

These courses are primarily given to better prepare high school seniors and juniors for the part that they may have to play in the war. With the exception of one, aeronautics, they are non-unit courses and enrollment is voluntary. A summary of these follows:

In addition to the above formally organized courses each teacher in his or her daily classes has redirected the instruction wherever possible so that it will have a direct significance to the war effort.

Both the physical fitness program and the series of preinduction courses have been added without lengthening the school day or interrupting the regular school program to any serious extent. This has been made possible by decreasing the number of periods per week from five to four for certain classes which are scheduled on hour periods.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR WAR ACTIVITIES

There are few, if any, organizations these days whose programs do not center around war work to a greater or less degree. This is true of our student organizations, and two of these, the National Honor Society and the Junior Red Cross, deserve special mention at this time.

In weekly war savings stamps sales conducted for ten minutes on each Monday by members of the National Honor Society, stamps and bonds totalling \$3,001.65 have been bought in the first 16 weeks. This is an average of \$187.50 per week. The high mark was made on December 14, the anniversary of Pearl Harbor Day when the total was \$586.30. The smallest sale of the year was on October 12 with a total of \$33.95.

The Junior Red Cross, which has a membership of 307 in the junior and senior high school, is directed by Mrs. Kane. Among its projects for the year are: collecting Victory books and cancelled stamps, making hospital bags, hot water bottle covers, afghans, scrap books for soldiers, and decorating napkins, place cards, and nut cups.

WAR ACTIVITIES BY THE TEACHERS

In my report to you of a year ago I listed in some detail the outside war activities of the members of our teaching staff. A similar survey conducted this year reflects the same unselfish devotion of time and energies to the needed civilian war services of our community.

THE TEACHING STAFF

Littleton High School has been no exception in the general turnover of teachers incidental to the war period. Of the teachers with us one year ago, six full-time teachers and one part-time teacher are not members of the current staff. In making replacements our school has been particularly fortunate in securing teachers whose professional training and experience are making for effective and efficient accomplishments.

There was no replacement for Kermit Bennett, part-time teacher in mechanic arts, as the decreased registration made it possible for Mr. Welch to carry on the work without serious curtailment in pupil class time.

The six full-time teachers leaving our staff to enter the service or accept other positions were: Walter Barry, Genoveffa Corea, Ellen Corey, Avis Cox Colby, Frank Glazier and George Sommers.

ATHLETICS

Probably there is no department in school that has had to reorganize and adjust its activities more because of war conditions than that of athletics. Early in the year schools began to cancel their football schedules because of transportation difficulties. The White Mountain Basketball League suspended its operations "for the duration." Coach Sommers left for service on the day preceding the opening football game. Yet in spite of these difficulties our high school played a football schedule of five games, winning 2 and giving a splendid account of itself in the other 3.

During the winter months a boys' varsity basketball schedule of 11 games is being played with the record at the time of this report of 7 won and 1 lost. In addition to this an extensive intra-mural basketball program is being conducted for both boys and girls under the leadership of Mr. Toll and Mrs. Lunderville.

Much of this entire set-up has been made possible through the contagious enthusiasm of Mr. Toll and the policy of the school's Athletic Council that an adequate program of intramural and varsity sports is more necessary than ever in promoting the war effort. That this found favor with the student body is manifested in the largest paid-up membership in the history of the Athletic Association, a total of 237 members.

OTHER REGULAR EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Although much of the pupil's time is devoted to activities embodied in the war program, there still remains the time and interest necessary for the successful and regular functioning of our glee club groups, our high school orchestra, our National Honor Society chapter, and our school paper, "The Record." Plans for a Littleton Victory Corps unit, under which much

of the students' war efforts will be recognized and guided, have been completed.

NYA PROGRAM

The appropriation and the activities of the National Youth organization have been greatly restricted by the federal government. However, our high school has been granted a monthly budget of \$24.00 which is one third of last year's allotment. Seven pupils have qualified for this program under conditions similar to past years.

MISCELLANEOUS ACTIVITIES AND FUNCTIONS

The following activities have been successful and important in the school life of the past year, and have brought credit to those responsible for them.

The annual Stunt Night, "Bombs-a-Droppin"

The senior class banquet at Darling Inn

The Freshman Hop sponsored by the seniors

The Hallowe'en Dance sponsored by the sophomores

The National Education Week night school and Armistice day assembly

The senior play "One Mad Night"

The school census taken by the seniors

The Christmas assembly given by the junior high school

The defense stamp assembly

The Twelfth Night Party given by the freshmen

The Victory Corps assembly

The football banquet given by the Rotary Club

The Physical Fitness Institute sponsored by the State Board of Education

The Colonial Club program at which the teachers and many of the student body were guests.

The cooperative service bureau, inaugurated four years ago by Mr. Glazier functions adequately under the direction of the headmaster. Physical and health examination of all pupils has been completed by Dr. Page, assisted by Miss Bryant.

As in past years hot noon lunches are being served by the home economics department during the winter months to both the high and Kilburn schools.

Approximately 150 bottles of "Penny Milk" are served to high school pupils daily, while on several occasions "surplus product" apples have been distributed.

SCHOLARSHIP AND SCHOOL APPROVAL

It is most important that all pupils should do well in their school subjects, and a prime necessity that those pupils who plan college careers after graduation should maintain a consistently high average. In the war atmosphere of change and uncertainty the attainment of these fundamental objectives is not made any easier. It is in difficult times like these that the weak are weeded from the strong, and it is with some satisfaction that a study of the first semester marks for the current year does not reveal any trend from the norm of other years.

Our school enjoys the same approval and certificate privileges as in the past.

SENIORS ENTERING THE SERVICE

At the date of this report two seniors have joined the armed services of our country: Lawrence Holmes and Ray Patterson. These two were meeting the scholarship requirements of our school at the date of enlistment, and will be granted their diplomas in June if then in the service or possessing an honorable discharge from the same.

AWARDS

The following awards were made during the last semester of last year:

1. The George H. Tilton awards, fourteen in number

- 2. The American Legion medal
- 3. The American Legion Auxiliary award
- 4. The participation in the D. A. R. Good Citizenship Pilgrimage.

The first three, together with National Honor Society membership cards, were awarded during commencement week.

The Good Citizenship Pilgrimage, made possible through the courtesy of the Gunthwaite Chapter of the D. A. R., is awarded in February of each year.

Two additional awards have been offered for the current year.

The first is a prize of five dollars to be awarded at commencement to that member of the senior class who during his or her four years received the highest scholarship in the social studies. The prize will be known as the Frank H. Glazier award in the social studies, and was given by Mr. Glazier, former social science teacher at Littleton.

The second award will be known as the John L. Tuck, Jr. Trophy and is given each year in memory of John L. Tuck, Jr. by his parents. It will be presented to the boy in the eighth grade who is adjudged by his classmates to be most unselfish, gentlemanly, considerate of his fellow classmates, honest in endeavor, and above all, kind to animals.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the Annual Report of the Librarian Is Herewith Submitted:

The circulation figures of the Littleton Public Library, by which one judges in part the service of any library, maintained about the same level in 1942 as in 1941 with a slight drop attributable to the number of families which left town. It is an established fact that times of prosperity decrease book borrowing and war activities leave less time for recreational reading which ordinarily accounts for a large part of library use in a town such as Littleton.

The number of books, larger than usual, added to the children's collection is justified by an increased percentage of juvenile books in the total circulation. Teachers at the Apthorp School have continued to borrow classroom collections and the circulation for home use of these books during 1942 was 1,389, a substantial increase over last year. Still more children's books in the fields of the grade studies are needed; an aim for 1943 is to provide these if possible. An effort has also been made to buy more attractive and readable copies of books suitable for high school book reports.

A new wall case to shelve the expanding children's collection has been authorized and will be installed. The congestion in the stack room was somewhat relieved by the installation of two double-faced wooden bookcases. These provided space for about 700 books, and although, after the shifting was done, there was a noticeable improvement, it is easy to see that if we continue to add new books at the rate of about 400 a year the old problem of shelf space will again be serious. Early in the year a blackout room was prepared in the basement to provide shelter in case of air raid warnings during library hours.

An inventory was taken during the summer. Only 35 books were found to be missing after a period of four years, an unusually small number. Seventy-one books were given in 1942

by interested patrons. We are especially indebted to Mrs. Sylvia Boardman, Reverend Harvie Zuckerman, and Mrs. Frances G. Lee for their generous gifts.

The 1942 national Victory Book Campaign, conducted in Littleton by the library and the Red Cross, collected 784 books for the men in service. The 1943 campaign, just begun, will provide more. One check for fifty dollars has been received. The Littleton Public Library is again the sorting center for this section of New Hampshire. Miss Marion Goodwin of the N. H. Public Library Commission, taking Miss Buskirk's place, will use her room at the library for the work.

Exhibits of the year included one for Music Week sponsored by the Music Lovers' Club, a display of specimens from New Hampshire forest trees, and a number of government collections of posters, and pamphlets of informational material on war problems, the different branches of the service, civilian defense, and wartime economy. This material is on file and may be consulted at any time.

A Simmons College Library School student assisted under supervision in the library as a part of her practice work period. This was a professional courtesy we were glad to extend.

The death of Miss Helen Bingham, for several years an interested and faithful member of the Board of Trustees, is deeply regretted. She left a bequest of \$500 to the library the income from which is to be used for the purchase of books. Miss Mildred Silsby has accepted appointment to complete Miss Bingham's unexpired term.

In closing I should like to thank the Board of Trustees and the library patrons for their interest and help during the past year.
