You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New London, on the second Tuesday of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Schools for the ensuing year.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks for the ensuing year.
5. To see if the Town will appropriate twenty-five dollars for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and pay the same to the Treasurer of Anthony Colby Post, G. A. R.
6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for a new Chandelier for the Town House.
7. To see if the Town will appropriate money for one more Snow Roller.
8. To see if the Town will appropriate fifty dollars for improving the looks of the Cemetery.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise above what the law requires for Town Library.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

TO THE CITIZENS OF NEW LONDON:—

The report of your School Board is herewith submitted.

The school year, now closed, has been only twenty-six weeks, shorter than for several previous years. The Board were obliged, much to their regret, to close the winter term at the end of seven weeks. It has been our purpose to use judiciously the available funds, but they have proved inadequate for a longer school year.

We ask for a larger appropriation, next year. Our schools should be in session for thirty weeks. Some repairs will also be needed. The school rooms should be made more attractive by fresh paint and paper. The desks and seats in Pleasant St. school-house are ill-matched, and there is danger of injury to the pupils. The Board have in mind the transfer to it, of some furniture from the North school-house, as it does not seem probable that a school will be reopened in the latter, for years.

At the close of the spring term, Prof. LaRoy Griffin resigned from the Board, as he was about to remove from town. By the vote of the other two members, Miss Abbie J. Roby was elected to serve on the Board, in his stead, for the remainder of the year.

Mr. John D. Pingree, the truant officer, reports the number of children, last April between five and sixteen years of age, to be 103,—52 girls and 51 boys.

We would ask all who are interested in our schools, to study carefully the act passed at the last session of

our legislature, "An act to equalize the school privileges of the cities and towns of the state," Sections 1, 2, 3 and 4, and to inform themselves as much as possible, regarding the practicability of combining with other towns, to employ a supervisor, as the question will be voted upon at our next annual school meeting.

Some changes have been necessary, in teachers. Nine different instructors have been employed, during the year. Of these one was a graduate of the Plymouth Normal School, and seven were graduates of Colby. Several of our best teachers, who have served us long and faithfully, have given up the work, to meet the demands of other duties, and the question, who is to take their places, is one which the Board have deeply at heart.

Three of our teachers had no previous experience. They were faithful, and for the length of the terms, fairly good work was done. Our schools, however, demand experienced teachers. It is our purpose not to employ inexperienced ones, unless necessity compels, and our finances should be such that we can make it an object for trained instructors to remain with us, giving their best selves to the work.

Every year, the standard of an ideal teacher becomes higher. It is not enough, now, that those wishing to make teaching their vocation, be graduates of an Academy. It is more and more rigidly required that they have Normal training. Many have succeeded without it, but it has been under great disadvantages, of which they, themselves are fully conscious. The fact that a teacher has had normal training gives her a consideration that nothing else can give, in seeking a position.

We urge those who, every year, are graduating from Academies, and are waiting their chances to enter the list of teachers, to avail themselves of the advantages

offered by the Plymouth Normal school. It may cost some self-denial, but they will, surely, never regret a sacrifice which will make them better fitted for their work.
