TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years. Also one Trustee of Trust Funds for one year.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. The raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to haise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by tax deed.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class Five roads, and how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Orford Common so called.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundredth of one percent (1-100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based upon assessed valuation of 1940 for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the Town, in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee region.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to repair the Lower Street road from the Dartmouth College road to Lyme line, and see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same.
- 18. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Orford:

The school law of the State requires that an annual report of the workings of the schools shall be prepared. It has recently become the custom of school boards to include in such annual reports the report of the Superintendent of Schools. This, then, is the third such report prepared by the writer. As in previous reports, this will include some of the statistical facts and all of the financial transactions of the School District. There will be also an account of some of the changes in the schools and such other items as seem to be of immediate and practical interest to the citizens.

The Staff. The close of the year in June 1940 found the board confronted with the necessity of securing new teachers for three of the four classrooms in use. This was caused by the resignations of the teachers formerly employed, who had other plans for their year's work. Serious consideration was given to the best means of replacing these teachers, and it was found possible to secure for two of the positions persons who had mature experience as teachers, and the third a man very highly qualified for the work who had recently graduated from Keene Teachers College. It now seems that the work of the elementary schools is in good hands and that the pupils will move forward in their educational careers without undue loss of time.

The Budget. It was not possible to reduce the expenses for operating the schools very materially. There are some slight decreases in amounts of money needed for some of the items in the budget, but in the main these are of such a minor nature that they do not materially affect the total. The income side does not produce quite so much as formerly. This is due largely to the fact that the lesser number of pupils attending the high school makes it impossible for Plymouth Teachers College to operate the school with a sufficient balance

to meet the entire school note. It might not be possible to receive the full amount of the other estimated income, but it seems desirable to include an amount in this item. If it is not met, it is possible that there will be sufficient income in other items to meet the requirement.

When it is remembered that this budget includes the operation of the elementary schools, plus the care for the education and training of high school pupils, it cannot be regarded as an excessive amount to be raised, particularly when the boys and girls of Orford are provided in their later years with a rather more extended program of studies than could be provided without such a high school. This also makes possible the attendance at the high school of certain pupils who would be deprived of the privilege were the high school to be closed and elementary schools alone operated in the town.

High School. The high school program has been carried on with its usual degree of satisfaction. The boys are girls are very much interested in their work, and in general show a seriousness of purpose which does not always exist in the larger high schools. The Headmaster and Sub-master co-ordinate their work in such a way that it is possible to supplement and build up several of the courses so that the young people are able to carry on in their next steps.

The spirit of co-operation which was shown by the pupils in the school during the illness of the Headmaster was quite unusual. Through the efforts of these people, under the direction of the Sub-master, money was raised and plans made for a provision for an office for the Headmaster. This had been a point of need ever since the building was completed, but it took the energy of the youth to secure final action. Now there is provided at that building an office which is ample for the purposes. The Alumni Association, Sorosis Club and other organizations in Orford very generously provided equipment for this room. Thus through the action of the pupils, the citizens, and the school board, one project has been carried through to completion this year. It remains only for some group to provide for adequate office chairs to make this project complete. So long as such a spirit

of united action can prevail, so long will the work of the Orford High School be of value not only to the generations of young people who receive the benefits of the education provided there, but to the community as a whole. It is not an idle statement to say that this spirit of democratic action is in the long run much more valuable o the citizenry of our town, our state, and our nation than are some of the technical learnings which are acquired.

Special Training. Perhaps the most outstanding new activity of the schools this year is a provision made through the State Department of Education, in co-operation with the Federal government, for classes in giving short intensive courses to boys for the purpose of building up a technical background which can be capitalized either in industry or later in government service if that be required. This again shows that much can be done toward assisting young people in making their life adjustments without too great loss of time in their younger years. Such direct approaches as these may do much toward establishing a front line of defense in future years than will courses conducted with less definite objectives.

Equipment. Some new equipment has been provided during the past year. The major expenditures have been for additional chairs for the use of the pupils and for a sewing machine for the domestic arts classes. It is hoped that soon provision will be made for additional chairs and for additional teachers' desks so that the inconveniences which have been suffered at the school will be very much lessened. One other expenditure will need to be made due to worn out and somewhat obsolete equipment. Reference is made to the typewriters, as several of them are now getting to an age when it may be more economical to exchange them for new machines than to have them repaired and put into shape so that they may be used. Money will need to be spent in one way or another to have an adequate number of machines ready for the several groups requiring them. The purchase by the agricultural department of the Mann henhouses made possible a very well-organized project in chicken-raising and egg production. It is exceedingly gratifying to know that this project was carried on at little or no expense to the school district itself, but was financed largely through the profits accrued from the hatching of eggs in the incubator, the production of chickens for the market, and later the production of eggs and the sale of pullets.

Repairs. No major repairs were made during the summer. The steps were provided for the Orfordville school and other minor reconditioning done there. It will be necessary in the very near future to have that building shingled, and it may not be long before paint will be required in order to keep the building in proper condition. It may be necessary to renew the toilet facilities at that building so that more sanitary conditions will prevail. All of these items will, of course, depend for their completion upon the ability of the citizens to raise sufficient funds to meet the need.

The most outstanding development at the Street school was the provision for parking space at the foot of the hill. This was possible only because the Upper Street school at the north end of the town was sold and the money thus realized was utilized for the filling and grading required. This provides not only better parking space, but an easier approach to the rear of the high school building, and also lessens the hazards on the short road leading from the Danied Webster Highway to the school.

There will, of course, be the usual number of necessary repairs in order to keep all the school plants in usable condition.

Next Steps. It was mentioned in the previous report that the pupils of the Orford High School were able to adjust themselves to their careers in higher institutions of learning or in many of their life activities. This situation continues to prevail. There are certain additional improvements which might be made which would have a tendency to further enhance the educational success of the pupils. The report of last year mentioned one such step — that of attempting to combine the schools in such fashion as to have included in the senior high school the seventh and eighth grades, thus making the high school a six-year high school. It was pointed out that such an arrangement would in the end tend to

lessen somewhat the cost of high school instruction. This plan can still be put into operation if and when the citizens of Orford and Orfordville are willing to permit a year or two's trial of the plan. Some discussion has been had with the teachers' colleges who send cadet teachers to see if a little more permanency of teaching staff cannot be provided so that the pupils will have a little better sequence of instruction in their high school years. But, as in all activities where several agencies are involved with the resulting human relationships, these measures cannot be brought to pass too rapidly. They are presented at this time to call to the attention of the Board and citizens some of the desirable practices which might result in little better opportunities for the pupils of Orford in their later school years.

Conclusion. It can be truly said that Orford is continuing its public interest in the schools and is doing its part toward providing for a continuing strong citizenry. The teachers in your schools recognize this and are giving their best toward improving the educational opportunity of your boys and girls.
