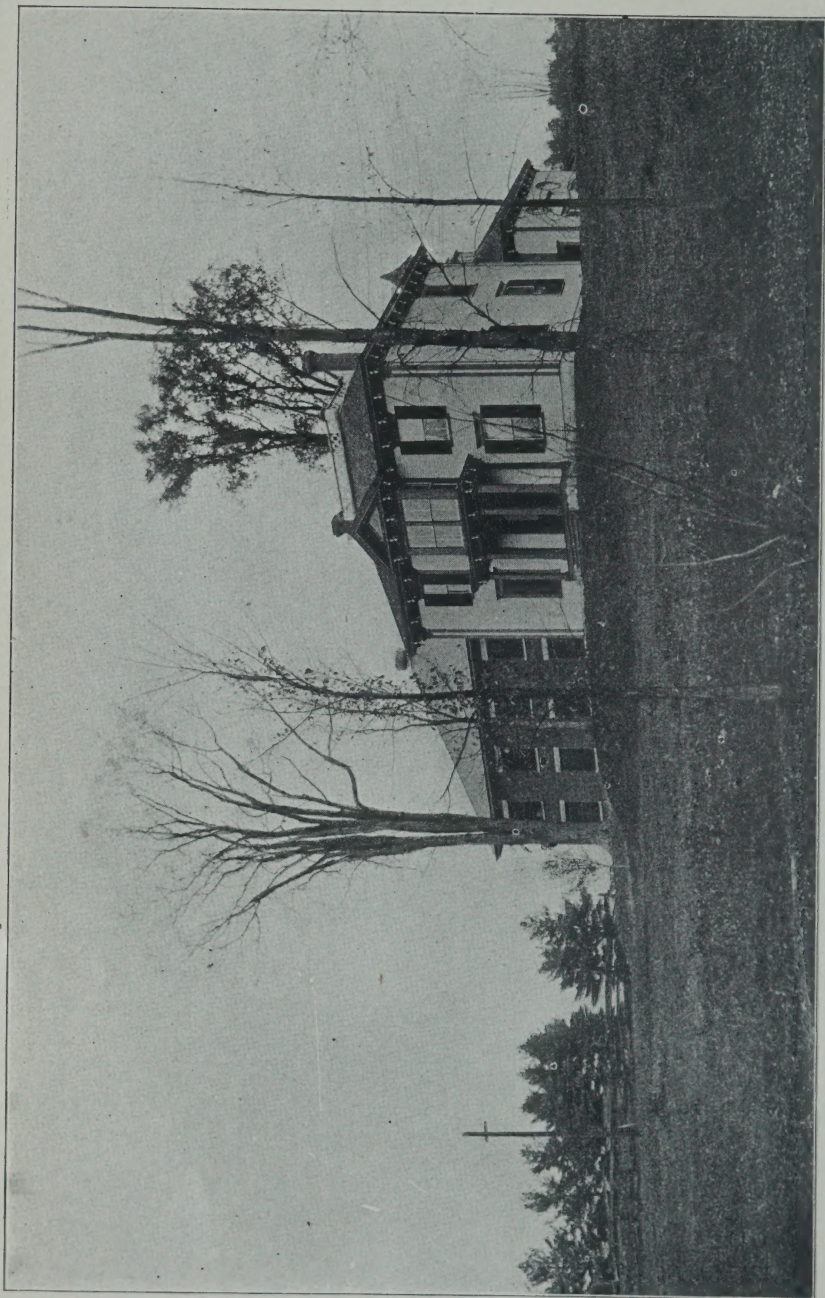

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

In accordance with the requirements of the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Sullivan County herewith present their annual report, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailor, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1912.

The County Farm and House of Correction continue under the management of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam.

Their service as superintendent and matron for the past six years has been very satisfactory.

The farm is in a good state of cultivation and an exceptionally good crop of hay was cut.

The stock at the farm is being improved and at the present time includes 80 head of high grade and pure bred Holstein cattle.

The expense of supporting the poor has increased during the past two years.

We wish to thank the selectmen and overseers in the several towns, for their assistance, also all of the em-

ployees at the County Farm for faithful service in caring for those under their charge.

While there have been several deaths we have attended only five funerals at the home the past year, the rest being taken to their former homes by friends.

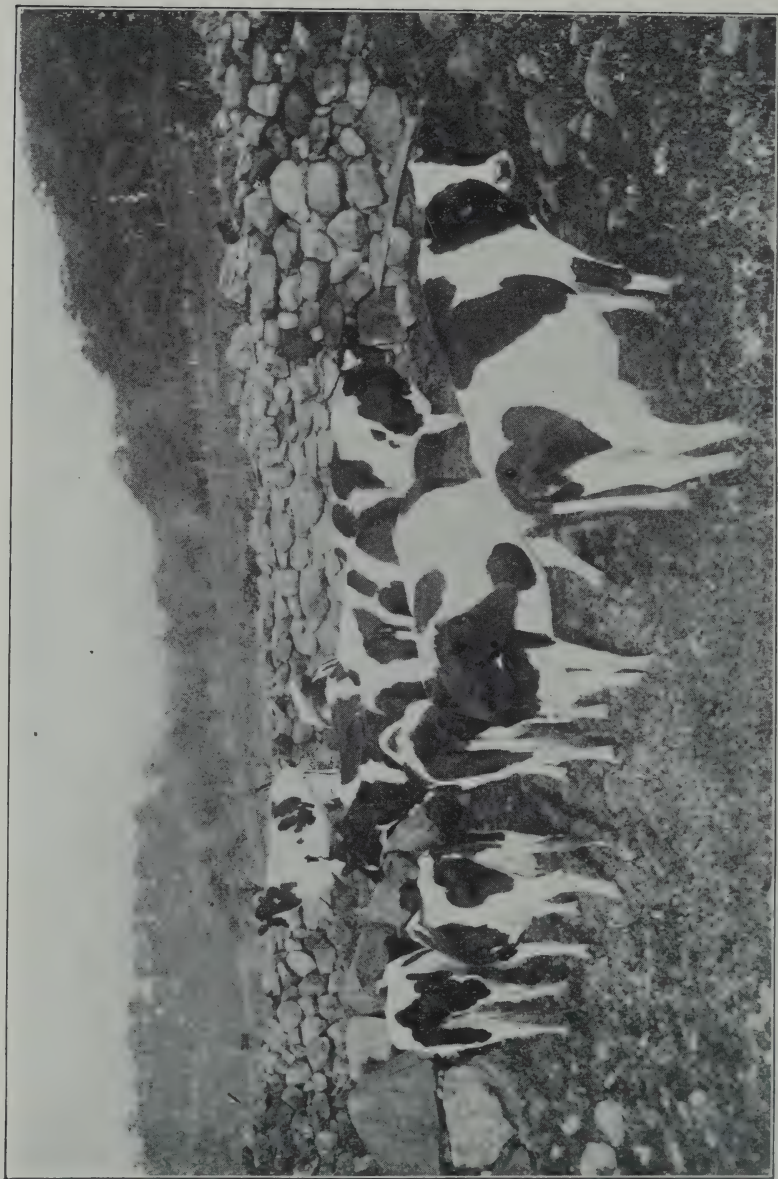
As usual the Claremont and Newport W. C. T. U. have visited the home with their fruit, flowers and other gifts to bless the unfortunates.

Solicitor's Report

During the current year nineteen criminal prosecutions have been instituted by me. Of this number 4 were for larceny, disposed of as follows, Viz., two sent to County farm for short terms; one indicted—plead guilty—sent to County farm for one year; one paid fine and costs. Eight liquor cases—five search warrants—nothing found; one bound over—no bill; one paid fine and costs; one presented to Grand Jury—no bill; one indictment for non support of family and same party indicted for obstructing an officer. On plea of guilty to first indictment, payment fine and costs and suspended sentence to County farm the state nol prossed the latter indictment; one obstructing officer—paid fine and costs; one complaint under pure food act—discharged; one simple assault—County farm, one assault with intent to kill—trial by jury—sentenced two years State prison; one homicide—bound over; one assault with intent to kill—indictment placed on file, respondent being in State prison.

All criminal cases have been disposed of to date, no continued cases appearing on the state docket, and there are no civil suits pending in which the County is a party.

The Grand Jury was in session but one day at either the May or November terms.

No fines, costs or money belonging to the County have been paid to me, as the statute provides.

The crimes and offences as above tabulated were committed in the towns of Claremont, Newport, Charles-town and Plainfield.
