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

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, Qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You Are notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next at 10:00 A.M. in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1, 2, 3 & 4 listed below and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 13th of March next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To bring in your votes for one Selectmen, for three years and for all other Town Officers elected by ballot, as passed by Town Meeting or State Statutes for the specified number of years.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to the Troy Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board. (To be voted on by ballot)

Amendment #1: Redefining the present **General District**, as the **Rural District**, and establishing certain regulations of the use of land in said Rural District.

Amendment #2: Update references to state statutes contained in the ordinance to reflect the recent recodification of State Planning and Zoning Laws.

Amendment #3: Establishing conditions for the conversion of existing one and two family dwellings to multi-family dwellings and/or the creation of additional dwelling units in existing multi-family structures.

Amendment #4: Establishing conditions for the construction of new multi-family residential buildings or complexes.

Amendment #5: Requiring the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy by the Selectmen for new or changed land uses, stating that the use complies with all provisions of the Zoning Regulations.

ARTICLE 3: "Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 53-B: 1 to 11 inclusive providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the towns of Chesterfield, Fitzwilliam, Gilsum, Harrisville, Hinsdale, Marlborough, Nelson, Roxbury, Surry, Swanzey, Troy and Westmoreland and the city of Keene, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen or Mayor?"

ARTICLE 4: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 466:33-a which make it unlawful for any dog to run at large, except when accompanied by the owner or custodian, and when used for hunting, herding, supervised competition and exhibition or training for such?

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to support public services as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

- a. Health & Health Related Services \$11,321.00
- b. War Memorial Program \$9,540.00
- c. Meadowood County Area Fire Dept. \$500.00
- d Meadowood County Area Fire Dept. (Bldg. fund) \$500.00
- e. Southwestern N.H. Regional Planning Ass'n. \$2,085.00

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums as necessary to support Town Departments as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

- a. Highway Summer and Winter -\$70,000.00
- b. Police Department \$47,000.00
- c. Fire Department \$19,500.00
- d. Overseer of Poor \$21,000.00
- e. Dogs \$1,000.00

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 for the care of cemeteries. \$11,000.00 to come from the Trust Funds, as recommended by the Budget Committee and the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$27,535.00 that the Town received from the State for the Calendar year 1985 for maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V Highways. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise \$123,710.00 for the Water/Sewer Department. Budget Committee Recommendation: \$100,000.00. Selectmen Recommendation: \$123,710.00.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,610.00 for the Gay Kimball Library as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$163,747.00 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$133,485.90. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 to be used by the Troy Industrial Development Committee. The expenditure of money to be used by the Committee with the approval of the majority of Selectmen for expenditures involved in promoting the development of the Troy Industrial Park. Budget Committee recommended \$2,500.00 Selectmen recommended \$5,000.00.

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Forest Fire Suppression as recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended for the Capital Reserve Funds for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereof: Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

- a. Reassessment of Town (1986) \$1,500.00
- b. Police Department \$2,000.00
- c. Fire Department \$3,000.00
- d. Highway Department \$3,000.00

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon. As recommended by the Budget Committee and Selectmen.

- a. Gay Kimball Library \$2,000.00
- b. Senior Citizens \$1,000.00
- c. Town buildings General Repair \$4,000.00

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$10,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund for the Highway Department to be used for the purchase of equipment and property as it becomes available if it is deemed necessary and advisable by the Selectmen. Recommended by Budget Committee and Selectmen.

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water/Sewer Commissioners to transfer \$8,000.00 from unencumbered funds from the operation of the sewer system to the Capital Reserve Fund created under Article 20 of the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Town of Troy to provide for capital improvements and capital equipment pertaining to the sewer system or the sewage treatment facilities.

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$13,000.00 for a Veterans' War Memorial that has been selected and recommended by the Committee appointed for that purpose as voted in Article 28 of the 1984 Town Meeting. The funding, if voted, can be for one year or over a longer period as the voters desire. The terms of the existing committee should be extended until the project is completed. Not recommended by the Budget Committee. Recommended by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to accept the necessary amount of land from Map 1 - Lot 3 & 4 of the Tax Map, now owned by James & Carolyn Walsh, to allow the Selectmen to lay out a town road of about 300 Ft +/-. The cost of construction, maintenance and plowing to be the responsibility of the owner of Map 1 - Lot 3 & 4 of the Troy Tax Map.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to grant to the Planning Board the authority to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses or multi-family dwellings, which are defined as any structure containing more than two (2) dwelling units, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site; pursuant to the provisions of RSA 674:43-44. Upon passage of this Article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Cheshire County Registry of Deeds, a certificate showing that the Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town of Troy will change the Town meeting day to the first Saturday morning after the Town Election day. (By Petition.)

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town of Troy will increase the Board of Selectmen pay from \$1,200.00 per person annually to \$3,700.00 per person annually and abolish the Administrative Assistant position to the Board of Select persons. (By Petition.)

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:05b.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertized sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 27: To hear reports or committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

REPORT OF THE GAY-KIMBALL PUBLIC LIBRARY

The year was a busy one at the Gay-Kimball Library. On September 9, the public was invited to see the results of the many hours of work and planning that went into the refurbishing of the Howe-Haskell Children's Room on the part of the trustees and volunteers. Refreshments were served, helium-filled balloons and awards for the "Go-for-the-Gold" summer reading program were given, and a book sale added to the festivities. Selectman Bill Matson brought us books discarded by the Fort Devens Library to stock the sale; the proceeds went to purchase new children's books.

Several other programs and events enlivened the library calendar: an exhibit of photographs by Lynn Smith decorated the Ripley Room; Kathy Marrotte held chair-caning classes; Mr. Harry Kenney of the Homestead Bookshop spoke to the members of the Nubanusit Library Co-operative when they were guests of our library in February; children from the Troy Co-operative Pre-school, the Troy Christian School and the Troy Elementary School visited the library for a learning and story hour; Ervin Doyle, assisted by his family, demonstrated a microcomputer the the great enjoyment of some children and their parents; and Doralee Watkins, who decorated our outdoor bulletin each month, also gave a domonstration of her lively quilts.

The Nubanusit Library Co-operative, which represents more than twenty libraries in this area, has been in the process of setting up a book depository in the James A. Tuttle Library of Antrim. The plan is to have a copy of many outdated, but still occasionally requested books available to patrons, without each library having to give precious shelf space to seldom used books. The books donated will remain the property of the donating library. There will be a list of books available, and Antrim, as host library, will undertake the mailing responsibility for a nominal fee. This should be a welcome service to libraries and patrons in this area.

Janet Stover resigned as aide in July to take another position, and Marion Sargent, who has worked as a volunteer in the elementary school library for several years, is now the aide.


hear from you. It's volunteers that keep these fine organizations going.

School Street will have work done on it this spring where water does not drain. Each year as the money lasts, plans are to improve portions of roads so that they will all be up graded eventually.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

For the past few years the Civil Defense Appropriation has been used mostly to purchase excess property as it becomes available from the State Civil Defense and the Department of Education, excess property department. Most of these purchases have resulted in large savings to the Town of Troy for the equipment and materials acquired from these departments.

In the past year the Federal Government and State are focusing more effort toward Civil Defense and local Civil Defense organizations.

The Troy Civil Defense director and Deputy Director, in agreement with the Fire Wards and Police Chief and Selectmen, Town of Troy, has designated the Fire Department building as an emergency operation center.

What this means is that any type of emergency or disaster in this area where Civil Defense will be involved, the direction of assistance, and person in charge will be at the Fire Station.

By doing this we are told that purchases of equipment that are in volved in emergency assistance type of work, if purchased through the Civil Defense budget can in most cases be funded by 50% Federal dollar. We are talking about radio equipment, scanners, monitors, etc. Also included would be any equipment needed to maintain an Emergency Operations Center.

We feel that if there is a chance to save a few dollars where purchasing this type of equipment is needed it is worth a try.

When you see the increase in the civil defense request in the Warrant, it included monitors for the fire department and is there for the above stated reasons.

HEALTH OFFICER CHILD DAY CARE OR NURSERY CARE

The law pertaining to child care has been changed. Anyone providing day care or nursery care for three or more children who are not related to the provider must be licensed by the State.

DOG OFFICER'S REPORT

The present Dog Officers are Charles Adams Sr. and his deputy, Daniel Breen.

We remind you that when dogs are picked up and brought to the humane Society, that the owner is responsible for the pound fee and cost involved in the officer taking them to the society.

You will find Article 4 on the Town Warrent, to be voted on by ballot on March 12th when you vote for town officers. This Article adopts a State Statute R.SA466:30 that allows the dog officer to take better action on dog complaints that are valid; when there is a danger to other animals, and to children and people. This doesn't happen too often but occasionally the dog officer needs the authority to pick up a suspected or dangerous dog.

If you have any questions on this Article, please ask the Dog Officer or inquire at the Police Department.

A reminder, all dogs have to be licenses on a yearly basis. After June 1st, if not licensed, they can be picked up.

Dog licenses are purchased at the Town Clerk's office.

Our appropriation request for 1985 is \$7,150.00 for clinical services (or the fee for service agreement as described in our letter) and \$1,925.00 for our Meals-On-Wheels Program.



MONADNOCK FAMILY & MENTAL HEALTH REPORT

Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service was organized in 1959 following a joint study by the Cheshire County Community Services Council and the League of Women Voters (Keene and Peterborough). Originally named Monadnock Area Family Service, the agency was organized through a merger of the Bureau of Public Service and the Keene Mental Hygiene Association. The service operated in this form through 1966, expanding in a five year period to a staff of two full-time social workers with psychiatric and psychological consulting support.

In 1967, following a study during the previous two years, a community mental health clinic service was organized providing direct psychiatric and psychological services. This program added two psychiatric consultants, a clinical psychologist and one social worker to the agency staff.

Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service from a staff of 12, providing only Outpatient services, has grown to a current staff of 68, providing the following services:

SOUTHWEST SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT DISTRICT

At the Southwest Solid Waste Management District Meeting of January 15, 1985, the operating budget for FY 1985-86 was adopted which will fund the continuing activities of the District commencing on July 1, 1985.

The total budget is \$31,623.00 which is broken down as follows:

In order to raise these funds, an assessment equal to 50 cents per capita will be apportioned to each member community. The assessment to the town of Troy, will amount to \$1,097.00, based on the latest population figures distributed by the New Hampshire Office of State Planning.

It has been determined by the New Hampshire Bureau of Solid Waste Management that the operations of the Southwest Solid Waste Management District are carrying out the responsibilities mandated by the State of New Hampshire and, therefore, this assessment should be included in the operating budget of the towns (as part of the Selectmen's Budget, Public Works Budget, Waste Disposal Budget or other appropriate budget item).

These funds will be needed regardless of whether the District remains a "149-M" or some towns decide to form a "53-B" District. Separate accounts will be kept so that funds may be transferred when and if necessary. If you have questions on this budget, I suggest you contact your District Representative or feel free to call me at 876-4503.

We apologize for the delay in getting this information to you, but the District has been carrying an extremely heavy work load in bringing a solution to the area's solid waste disposal needs to fruition.

SUMMARY OF PLANNING BOARD HEARING CONCERNING NEW ZONING ORDINANCES

The Troy Planning Board held a sparsely attened public hearing Wednesday (January 16, 1985) night to discuss proposed amendments to current zoning regulations.

Many of the changes are simply to update wording and correct format. One major proposal renames and redefines the general district as a rural district.

Currently, the general district is any area outside the village district and is virtually unrestricted in use. In an effort to protect the character of the town and existing areas, the rural district has been proposed, including guidelines dealing with types of businesses and dwellings that would be allowed.

The restrictions reflect the guildelines outlined in the master plan and, according to Planning Board Chairman Ronald Jacques, are designed to assure that "growth doesn't adversely affet existing neighborhoods. (It's) to protect people already in an area and set up guidelines so they don't have to worry about it (changing character)."

Another change in the regulations is the addition of an amendment to establish a certificate of occupancy permint. According to Jacques, the certificate is to insure that what is proposed is actually accomplished. It would prevent someone from moving into a new or renovated building until the land or building complies with all pertinent regulations.

Generally, discussion of the amendments was favorable. Asked by Herman K. Scherioth whether they had considered reducing the required lot size in the village, now that town water and sewer are available, the planning board decided to take the question under advisement. They will look into the matter, gather information from the townspeople and come up with a recommendation sometime in 1985.

The Planning Board continues to meet on the first and third Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall. Any intersected residents are encouraged and welcome to attend the meetings.

The past year's efforts have been directed towards the revision and update of our present zoning ordinance. Also, the Planning Board will ask for authority to adopt site plan regulations for the purpose of protecting the public health, safety, and welfare and to promote balanced growth within the districts.

The Industrial District and its regulations that were approved at the March 1984 Town Meeting have not yielded the anticipated results that the Town had hoped for. However, some interest has surfaced recently and perhaps 1985 will be the year for development of that district.

A total of four (4) subdivisions and one (1) boundary line adjustment were approved during the year. This enabled the Planning Board to return \$160.00 to the Town Treasury.

As in the past, your Board has made extensive use of our membership in the Southwest Regional Planning Commission and has utilized its resources. Their input is a tremendous asset to the Town's future development.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the Board who so faithfully have given of their time and energies.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission has changed its meeting date to the last Thursday of every other month beginning November 1984; time 7:30 PM; place, Town Hall.

At its November Meeting the committee reviewed each parcel of land owned by the town, not being used for town purposes at this time, and sent its recommendations to the Selectmen for consideration. These were: to restore the house-lot sized lots off Bigelow Hill Rd. to the tax rolls; use the extra land adjacent to the Soft Ball Field for recreation; develop the parcels of land just off Rte. 12 at the north end of town as a rest area for travelers; and also consider the same use for the 14 acres along Rte 12 off Fitzwilliam Rd. (for industrial use at a later date.) All other parcels to be left "as is."

During 1985 the commission will undertake two projects in addition to its continuing interest in urging the development of a park site along the stream flowing through the town and its work with the Bureau of Solid Waste Management in monitoring any possible ground water pollution. The projects will be; one, to prepare a report of local wildlife resources; and, two, to research the extent and location of the Metacomet Trail within the environs of Troy.

REPORT OF THE WAR MEMORIAL MONUMENT COMMITTEE

The War Memorial Monument Committee was created at Town Meeting 1984 to make recommendations to the Town as to a suitable monument, to be erected on the Common; to recognize those Veterans from Troy who served their country during World War II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam Conflict. The Committee has met many times and after much consideration recommends the erection of a granite monument to be placed on the northern end of the Common. The monument will be engraved with the names of those veterans who served from Troy during World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. A drawing of the proposed monument will be available for inspection at the Town Hall -March 13. The Committee feels that the proposed monument is tasteful and reflective of the Town's appreciation of her Veterans. The Committee has worked with the Keene Monument Company and recommends acceptance of their proposal of \$14,425 for the design, Construction, and erection of the monument. Mr. James Hodge of Keene Monument Co. has been very helpful to the Committee in advising the group as to the procedures used by other communities who have erected similar monuments.

Assuming the meeting passes the appropriation for the erection of the monument the schedule for completion would be as follows:

March 1985 - Selectmen sign contract.

March 1985 - July 1985 - Completion of lists of eligible Veterans for inclusion on the monument, by the Committee.

July 1985 - October 1985 - Final approval by Committee and construction of monument.

October 1985 - Erection on Common of Monument.

November 11, 1985 - Veterans Day - Dedication of Monument.

The proceeds of the sale of the 1956 Dodge Fire Truck to go into the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Budget Committee Passed as read.

ARTICLE 20: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners to establish a Capital Reserve Fund as provided in RSA 35:1 (supp) and RSA 149:10(supp) said Capital Reserve Fund to

be used for the financing of specific capital improvement pertaining to the sewer system of the town, or the acquisition of a specific item of equipment pertaining to the sewer system of the town, or (b) the construction, reconstruction or acquisition of a type of capital improvement or the acquisition of a type of equipment pertaining to the the sewer system of the town, expenditures from said fund shall be made only by a majority vote of the legal voters present and voting at an annual meeting of the town under a proper article in the warrant. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Water/Sewer Commissioners to transfer any unencumbered surplus funds from the operation of the Sewer System to the Capital Reserve Fund created under Article 20 of the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Town of Troy to provide for capital improvements and capital equipment pertaining to the sewer system or the sewage treatment facilities. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to change the position of Police Chief from a Part Time Position to a Full Time Position. (by petition)

Moderator Howe recommended that this article be voted on by secret ballot. The first results were more ballots than names on the checklist, therefore a second ballot was required. Defeated 79 yes 85 no.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to reduce the number of Street Lights by twenty four (24). (by petition) Theodore Johansson wanted to know where the 24 lights to be removed were coming from. Paul Theroux who entered the petition stated that there had been no survey made to date Mr. Johansson suggested that a committee of 3 to be appointed by Selectmen be added to the article. This was defeated. The motion was made to move the article, this was also defeated. The suggestion was made that more detective work be put into this matter and after deciding which lights should come out, put an article into the warrant in 1985. When at last a vote was taken, the article was defeated.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote that a Selectperson shall not serve the Town of Troy in any paying capacity but that of Selectperson, and at the current rate of pay for Selectpersons. (by petition)

Peter Breen made comment that there are very few people in town who have the knowledge or time to devote to all the work of an Administrative Assistant, and also that the Town could not affort to pay a Town Manager who would be responsible for such duties. Defeated.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to change the manner in which the police chief is selected from appointed by the Selectmen to elected by the town meeting annually. (by petition) passed over

ARTICLE 26: If the town votes affirmatively on Article 26 (above) then to see if the town will vote to elect a police chief until the next annual meeting. (by petition) Passed over.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant cable television franchise in accourance with RSA 53-C: 1-5. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee of 6 to study and come up with a recommendation for a Memorial, Memorials, or a plaque for recognition of the Town of Troy Veterans of World War II, the Korean War and the Viet Nam Conflict to be placed on the Troy Common. At present there is one for World War I. The Committee to consist of the Commander of Edward Boufford Post #56, one Troy Member of VFW Post and the remaining four to be appointed by the Town Moderator. If passed a report or an article will be brought forward at the 1985 Town Meeting. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote for the adoption of RSA 654:34-a as follows: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 654:34a permitting applications for changes in party affiliation to be made with the Town Clerk?"

This was included on a special ballot during the voting on March 13, 1984. Results were 255 yes and 63 no.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to authorize the Water/Sewer Board to hire a forester to selectively cut timber on the Watershed of the Town resevoir, and to allow the proceeds from the sale of the timber to be placed in the Water Department Capital Reserve Fund. Passed as read.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town of Troy shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the Citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Troy, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire." (by petition) Vote taken by hand vote 54 yes 29 no Passed as read.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of a certain tract of land identified as Map 12, Lot 41A on the tax maps and listed as "Town of Troy" in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as Justice may require.

George Foskett made a motion to include Map 11 Lot 2, which is the property the Town owns from the end of Dort to the gate to the Sewer Plant. Therefore Article 32 was amended to read: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of two certain tracts of land identified as Map 12, Lot 41A and Map 11, Lot 2 on the tax maps and

listed as "Town of Troy" in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Passed as amended.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money form the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:05-b.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money to pay charges and the interest thereon.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

ARTICLE 36: To hear reports or committees, agents or officers here-tofore chosen and take any action relative. All of the above articles 33-66 passed as read.

As there were no reports to be heard, the meeting was adjourned at 11:00 PM.
