TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, 1957 at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman, for three years, Auditors, Town treasurer, Road Agent, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers and all other necessary officers.
- Article 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes as has been the custom in previous years.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds or bequests as have been left to it during the past year.
- Article 6. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real

estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deeds after being advertised.

- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to purchase a new truck.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to fix the Cheney Bridge, so called.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for expense in continuing the gathering of material for the new Town History.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$484.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to remain open until 6 p.m. or later if so voted.

THE TOWN HISTORY

New Town History Progressing—

Work on the proposed new Walpole Town History can this year show real progress. It took considerable time to get things rolling and for the committee to find the proper person to take up the actual work of gathering and preparing the mountains of material that has to be gathered before the final editing can be done. It was after reading the recent edition of the Charlestown History that it was thought the proper person had been found—Mrs. Martha Frizzell, who was principally responsible for that outstanding work in our neighbor town.

Mrs. Frizzell agreed to go ahead with our work and has been doing so at what we consider a nominal hourly fee to pay for the labors of an expert that she is. An outline submitted the first of this year shows that a great deal of early material has been gone through and notes made, but that there are still mountains of material to be gone through and digested. We know it will take several years to get all such details gathered in workable form, and that of necessity it will take several more appropriations of money by the Town to pay for just the labor. It should be remembered in this connection, though, that in the end much of this will come back to the Town treasury through sale of the volume when published. An article in the present Warrant will be found to ask for \$1500 this year, which will be used in connection with the balance of the first appropriation made in 1955.

The history committee appointed by Pres. Marion Bemis of the Historical Society has serving on it: Ellen Bellows Endicott, Edith Cole Tiffany, Anita Aldrich, Mrs. Alfred O. Hoyt, Donald Hubbard. The undersigned fills in wherever any help or coordination can be helpful.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, in said district on the 12th day of March, 1957, at 2:00 in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into a contract with the school district of Rockingham, Vermont, for payment of high school tuition.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any department or agency thereof, or from any state or private agency.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of providing kindergarten service in the southern section of the community.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as your superintendent of schools.

All the teachers of Supervisory Union 60 are participating in a program of professional growth and development this year. Monthly teachers' meetings are planned by the principals who meet with the superintendent a week in advance of the date of the teachers' meeting. Topics that have been considered to date are: Planning for Better Teaching; Getting the Most Out of Our Teaching Resources; and Science Education.

The Charlestown and Walpole Supervisory Unions held a joint teachers' meeting at Charlestown in October for the purpose of discussing ways and means of improving the teaching of handwriting. Miss Kittle, a nationally recognized authority in the field of handwriting, was obtained as a consultant for this meeting.

The results of achievement tests given in April each year show that Walpole compares favorably with national and area averages.

Mrs. Phyllis Coates replaced Miss Laura Barry as commercial teacher. Mrs. Coates is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and has had twelve years of experience as a teacher in New Hampshire schools. Mrs. Anne K. Lamothe was added to our staff and teaches one section of grade five. She is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and taught last year in Rye, N. H. Mrs. Clara C. Wood replaced Mrs. Glen Phelps as a teacher in Grade four. Mrs. Wood is a graduate of Keene Teachers College and formerly taught in Laconia, N. H. Mr. Raymond Presby replaced Mr. Wendell Beaney as Vocational

Agriculture teacher. Mr. Presby is a graduate of the University of N. H. and formerly taught in Raymond, N. H. Miss Mary Shaheen replaced Mr. Paul Robbins as vocal music teacher. Miss Shaheen is a graduate of Boston University and formerly taught in Sunrise, Wyoming. Mrs. Elizabeth Staples was with us previously and returned to us from a teaching position in Portsmouth to replace Miss Muriel Britton.

There was one change at North Walpole. Mrs. Ruth King replaced Miss Mae Hartnett who retired after many fine years of service as a teacher in the North Walpole School. Mrs. King is a graduate of Castleton Teachers College and has had several years of experience in Vermont schools.

Arrangements were made by the parents of twelve pupils to transport the children to the North Walpole Kindergarten Class this year. The class operated on a one-session basis as compared to the former two-session day in previous years.

The increased cost of operating our schools reflected in the recommended budget resulted in the decision to continue the kindergarten program on the same basis as this year and to include an article in the warrant that will give the voters the opportunity to express their wishes by voting on whether or not to increase the recommended budget by twenty-four hundred dollars which would be the amount needed to operate a one-session kindergarten in the southern section of the community.

The following cadet teachers have been at the Walpole Village School during the first semester: Miss June Drake, English; Miss Shirley Ingalls, Science and Mathematics; Miss Alice Pillsbury and Miss Anita Benard, Home Economics; and Mr. Nils Peterson, Grade six. During the second semester we expect to have Miss Rosaline Britton in Grade 1, Miss Garrity in Grade 3, Arthur Constine, Mathematics and Science, and Frederick Norris, Science.

Teacher salaries are increasing in our state as they are all over the nation; book prices have increased about

eight per cent; supplies have gone up about fifteen per cent and fuel prices have increased approximately ten per cent. In addition to increases in the prices of materials used in the schools we have had to add two teachers to our faculty, one in the elementary grades and one in the high school.

There is a real need for still another teacher at the high school level to enable the division of classes in some subjects that would allow a better teaching job to be done for both the college preparatory group and those who will complete their formal education at the high school level and to provide some subjects that should be available to the pupils and to relieve the principal of teaching and study hall assignments. An enrollment of 500 pupils with twenty five teachers and three buildings is an administrative and supervisory load that needs all of a principal's time. However, it was decided to get along with only two additional teachers next year.

The major item which contributes to more than one half of the budget increase is the added expense of payment of bonds, interest and maintenance of the new sixroom Elementary School.

It is not possible to maintain a good educational program at the same cost when the cost of materials, supervision, fuel, repairs and teachers continue to increase, plus the added factor of continual increases in the number of pupils that are attending our schools.

The construction of the new elementary school building has not progressed as rapidly as anticipated. The contractor promised completion on March 1st, 1957, if steel was delivered on time. The steel was delivered on schedule but the contractor was unable to get sufficient brick masons during the good weather period last fall to enable closing in the building before the inclement weather set in. It is now doubtful that the building will be completed before May 1st.

Installation of the new dishwasher and baking oven in

the cafeteria was done in time for use at the opening of school. The entire cafeteria project is expected to be completed by February 1st. Other changes in the high school building that were voted at the 1956 School District Meeting will be done during vacation periods and completion of this work is planned to coincide with the occupancy of the new elementary school.

The new school bus authorized at the 1956 district meeting has been in use since the opening of school in September. It was recommended to continue to use the older buses for another year. However, it will be doubtful economy not to replace the bus, operating on the Walpole Valley route, in 1958.

The land between the North Walpole School and the new road has been purchased as authorized at the 1956 school district meeting.

The projected enrollment given in last year's report forecast that 499 pupils would be attending the Walpole Village School. We have nine less than anticipated, the loss being greatest in grades 9-12. From September, 1955 to September, 1956 approximately 44 pupils moved from Walpole. The families that moved to Walpole did not have as many children which accounts for our reduction in enrollment as compared to the forecast. However, there was an actual increase of twenty as compared to last years enrollment. The anticipated enrollment for next year is 505.

The forecast for North Walpole was 141. The actual enrollment is 147, the increase being due to twelve additional kindergarten pupils attending from the village area.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE FOR WALPOLE AND NORTH WALPOLE

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1956.

- 335 pupils were examined by Dr. William Tatem.
 The following defects were noted and reported:
- 220 pupils in need of dental care.
 - 2 pupils have minor heart conditions.
- 620 pupils were weighed and measured.
 - 2 pupils were seen by the speech therapist weekly.
- 588 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse.
 - 15 pupils had eye examinations by an eye doctor.
- 379 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse.
 - 8 pupils had minor hearing losses report to parents.
- 529 pupils participated in the Polio Vaccine program.
- 422 pupils participated in the Patch Test Program.
 - 71 pupils and teachers were X-rayed.
 - 50 pupils attended the Pre-registration Clinic.

School Health Services include the following:

1. Appraise the health status of pupils.

- 2. Advise pupils, parents and others of the appraisal findings.
- 3. Encourage correction of remedial defects.
- 4. Assist in the identification and education of handicapped children.
- 5. To help prevent and control disease.
- 6. Provide necessary emergency service for injury or sudden illness.

These school health aims can be reached through the cooperation of a community. We are fortunate to have this cooperation.

My sincere thanks to all who gave their time and effort to make this year a success.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL NORTH WALPOLE SCHOOL

Mr. Elliott W. Keach, Superintendent of Schools, Walpole, New Hampshire.

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report as Principal of the North Walpole School.

SCHOLARSHIP

Intelligence tests were given in grades one, three, five, and seven. As a result of these tests, the teachers were able to adjust their teaching and materials to the needs and capacities of each pupil.

Acheivement tests were administered in all the grades last Spring. A study was made of the test results and the pupils were grouped for instructional purposes. The individual difficulties were noted and used to indicate remedial areas which needed more emphasis.

Faculty meetings are held once a month. The purposes served this year by these conferences have been, (1)

to discuss ways of working on common interests, concerns, and problems; (2) to share experiences; (3) to meet inservice needs of teachers; (4) to acquaint the teachers with new techniques and to demonstrate their use; (5) to give the teachers a preview of the topic to be discussed at the monthly district teachers' meeting.

The teachers from grades one through five have completed a course in Arithmetic at Keene Teachers college, thereby earning credits toward their degree in Education. Most of the teachers concerned expect to fulfill the requirements for their degree in the near future.

The faculty is grateful to Mr. Keach for the addition of several professional books to the School Library. The teachers have made use of these books in order to become informed on the trends in education and on the newer methods in teaching in the different subject areas.

ORGANIZATION

General Assembly Programs are held once a month, with two grades being responsible for the program, under the guidance and supervision of the teachers involved. All of the pupils of both grades participate, thus all gain valuable experiences, in speaking before a group, and in attaining proper speaking habits.

Our athletic program has been expanded this year in order to include the girls in competitive sports. The girls are being coached by Mr. Dulski and will play an eightgame schedule against Junior High teams in the vicinity. The boys' program remains the same, with the school being represented by teams in touch-football, basketball, and baseball. The basketball team won the Consolation Cup in the annual basketball tournament for Junior High Schools held each year at Bellows Falls, Vermont.

Social parties under the direction of the Student Council and supervised by Mr. Dulski and myself were held at various times during the year. The ones liked best by the student body were the Halloween, Christmas, and Valentine Day parties. A graduation party was presented to the graduates by the seventh grade after the graduation exercises. The parents of the pupils acted as chap-

erons, refreshments were served and general dancing was enjoyed by everyone in attendance.

The pupils of the graduating class of 1956 toured the White Mountains for their class trip. I wish to thank Mrs. Edward Reardon and Mrs. Malcolm Kiniry who loaned and drove their cars for the occasion.

I wish to acknowledge the following gifts to the school, an electric basketball scoreboard, presented to the school by the Honorable Harold T. Killeen, a member of the School Board; a giant slide for the playground, donated by Mr. H. H. Whitmore, a former member of the School Board; and a flag stand given by the graduating class of 1956. The faculty, students and myself wish to thank the donors for making available to us these facilities.

The annual publication of "Hilltop News" was well received by parents and friends. The school wishes to thank the advertisers, patrons, and others who helped to make the sale of this issue the greatest in the history of the magazine. It is the goal of the present seventh and eighth grades to surpass this mark with their issue of "Hilltop News" in the Spring.

In conclusion I thank the Superintendent, the School Board, the Citizens of the Community, and the Teachers of North Walpole for their cooperation and support given toward our Common Aim, namely, the best education possible for the children of the town.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Elliott W. Keach Superintendent of Schools Walpole, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Keach:

I herewith submit my annual report as principal of Walpole High School.

GRADUATES

Of the eighteen graduates of the Class of 1956, two are enrolled at the University of New Hampshire, one at Boston University, one at Concord Commercial College, one at the Concord Hairdressing School, one is in training at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston and three have entered the armed forces.

ORGANIZATION

The Walpole High School daily program of seven fifty-one minute periods has been continued from last year. Classes meet four times weekly except when laboratory and vocational courses require larger allotments of time. The extra periods derived from this method of scheduling are used to provide for various co-curricular activities inside the regular school day enabling all of our pupils the opportunity to take part. Such activities include band and chorus rehearsals, class meetings, assemblies and clubs.

It has also been found advisable to continue the division of the school on a 6-2-4 basis. As noted last year, this type of organization provides for a more natural and psychological division of the several age groups within the school. The new elementary school plant is a very desirable step in this direction. It is also particularly desirable to have a separate program for the junior high. This will become more and more necessary as the enrollment increases in these grades.

The course offerings in the high school are sub-divided so that pupils may enroll in college preparatory, commercial, vocational and general curriculums. Pupils are urged to decide which area to pursue as early in school as possible. This requires the cooperation of the parents and the school if best results are to be obtained.

This year we have continued the policy of dividing pupils into homogeneous groupings wherever possible. This is being done in the junior high in most basic subjects. In the high school, English 9 and biology are each divided into two separte sections. A large number of our classes, especially in English and social studies are divided so that pupils are taught in two separate groups inside the classes in order that pupils may progress more according to their ability. The faculty is to be complimented on the extra work and organization done this year in this respect.

I also wish to emphasize that sixteen academic credits are required for graduation. Many pupils take more than the four required subjects. Credits given in physical education, driver education, band and chorus are included in the permanent records in addition to the units necessary for a diploma.

CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The co-curricular program has been further organized this year. Clubs and organizations meet weekly on Friday the last period. A large percentage of the student body takes part in these activities which include the Science Club, Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America, Chicks' Chirp, and Warbler. The Athletic Association, Thespian Club and junior high art classes meet at other times.

The school presented two one-act plays at a junior high Open House in the fall. This was a new innovation allowing parents of these pupils the opportunity to become better acquainted with faculty, review work being done and to discuss the program of studies.

Three one-act plays will be presented in the spring, the winning play to appear in the annual Competition Play Contest to be held at Walpole in April.

Two boys and two girls were again sponsored by the Lions Club, Grange, American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary to attend Boys' and Girls' State. The Lions Club also sponsored another boy to a Conservation Camp. The faculty chose a girl to compete in the annual D.A.R. Good Citizenship Contest. A girl in the music department was also sent to a Music Camp with community assistance.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council has taken on additional importance and responsibilies this year. Two boys were sponsored by this group to attend the Older Boys' Conference. Their annual magazine campaign grossed \$1715.00 of which approximately \$550.00 was retained by the Council. Money was donated to the library, athletic teams and cheerleaders. Money is also budgeted for academic awards to be given out Class Night. The Council is responsible for the monitor system in the corridors as well as planning and supervising school assemblies.

This year the Student Council joined the Monadnock Student Council Association which includes many schools of our size in the Monadnock Region. One of our students is a district officer. Much value is derived from pupils of these schools working together on suitable projects and activities.

ATHLETICS

Under the supervision of Coach Edward Lithgow, the sports program of the school has been further coordinated and extended. The Athletic Association, an organization of all the pupils taking part in athletics, is proving very successful.

The boys' varsity basketball season opened in October with thirty-two boys out for practice. Varsity and junior varsity teams have been organized with a seventeen game varsity schedule. The junior varsity will play a majority of the preliminary games this year. The varsity, winners of the Keene Teachers College Invitation Tournament last year, has a good number of veterans back this year

and is expected to make a good account of itself this year.

The girls have also been divided into two groups this year. The varsity will play a schedule of sixteen games, ten of which are scheduled in the afternoon.

The junior high sports program is scheduled on a Saturday basis. The boys will play with local schools and in the Bellows Falls Tournament in March. The girls will also play a limited number of games in the area.

The boys' baseball season last spring proved very successful. There was much interest and excellent participation. The team's record of five wins and three losses made it one of the stronger teams in its class in interscholastic competition.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

We are now in our second year of organized physical education classes. Pupils in grades 7-12 attend these classes twice each week in groups from ten to thirty-five. Physical education is required for all pupils in Grades 7-10 and is an elective in Grades 11-12.

This year we opened with an organized game program. The skills of each sport introduced are carefully presented and practiced. Basketball, volleyball and gymnastics make up the winter program. Efforts are being made to include such carry-over activities as badminton, golf and tennis in our overall physical education program.

A start is being made this year to give physical education instruction in Grades 1-6. The instruction will consist of introducing new games and activities to fit the grade level of each class.

Calisthenics are given at the start of each class in Grades 7-12 and in a mild form in Grades 1-6. This is done in an effort to improve physical fitness. Classes are also held from time to time to keep pupils informed of new rules and regulations regarding the various activities in which they are taking part.

MATHEMATICS, CHEMISTRY, AND SCIENCE

This year chemistry is being taught in place of physics—the two being offered in alternate years. A total of fifteen pupils comprise the class. As in the past, the course

this year is being enriched by a series of 16 films and 10 film strips which are arranged periodically to meet topics as they arise. Sufficient quantities of reagents and equipment provide considerable opportunity to learn by actually doing. Although equipment and supplies are adequate for the time being, the time is near when chemistry and physics should be taught on a yearly basis due to increased enrollment in the present eighth and tenth grades.

A change in the math department is also contemplated in the near future, which is partly due to the increased emphasis in college mathematics courses, particularly in preparation for the field of engineering and also to the increased number of students taking mathematics courses. The present mathematic course lists Algebra I and Geometry taught the first two years respectively and Algebra II and Trigonometry alternated the last two years. If the change materializes, four years of college entrance math will be offered every year. This should mean that in the senior year, the students will take a course primarily of anlytical geometry and fundamentals of calculus.

In the natural science this year we have scheduled two classes in biology, one class in general science, two classes in 8th grade science and one in 7th grade science. This makes a total of six classes and a pupil enrollment of 140.

It has been necessary to make special arrangements to carry out this program. Some classes have had to be held in ordinary classrooms with limited laboratory activities. This situation will be corrected with the addition of a junior high lab next year.

ENGLISH AND HISTORY

This year all the high school English and American history students have been grouped homogeneously by classes or by divisions within classes in order that instruction will provide better for individual differences. The results of the English Cooperative Tests plus the students' achievement results have provided the criterion for these groupings.

The instructional program has attempted to offer the students those units of study which will enable them to have both suitable, challenging learning experiences and sound preparation for their futures.

The promising results, which have already been seen this year, are the product of better teacher planning and the assistance of some student-teacher supervision to help with the various groupings.

VOCAL MUSIC

In the elementary grades there are approximately 285 students who have music once a week. They have presented a Christmas Pageant and later in the Spring will begin work on a program to be given at the annual spring concert.

The Junior High grades meet once a week and consist of 86 students. We are particularly concerned with singing in two and three parts and hold that as our goal with possibly another public appearance in the spring.

There are 62 students in the High School Chorus, which meets twice a week on Mondays and Thursdays. The group works primarily on selections which will be presented to the public at various programs. Their schedule includes two Christmas programs, a spring concert, baccalaureate and graduation. In addition, some students will participate in All-State, and New England Festivals.

DEPARTMENT OF INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

Participation in Instrumental Music in the Walpole school is increasing in quantity as well as quality. This present school year the enrollment in our Grade School Band is 20. The Junior or training band has 23 members and the Senior Band, 36.

It has been possible through the fine continued cooperation of the faculty to have one period per week for Junior High Band.

The excellent start the Grade School children have had is due much to the pre-band Song Flute classes, which include the third, fourth, and fifth grades. The classroom teachers have been of great help in building this program and credit is due them for their encouragement to the beginning student.

This school year, pupils from the Senior Band have participated in the Teachers' Convention Band, the New Hampshire All-State Band and in other music festivals and clinics.

In the fall of the year the band played for the School Fair parade. November 6 the three bands presented their fall concert. The annual combined Christmas concert was given at Vilas and in Walpole. The Spring Concert which is supported largely by the Walpole Parent Teachers Association will be presented in May. Through their efforts we were able to purchase a Bass Clarinet for the school band. The Music Department wishes to thank them for their encouragement and support.

We believe that music is an integral part of our educational program. Your interest and cooperation in furthering music training in our school is much appreciated.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE AND

MANUAL TRAINING

Enrollment in vocational agriculture by classes is as follows: Freshmen, 6; Sophomores, 7; Juniors, 3; Seniors, 6. One freshman and one senior entered these classes after school started and there have been no drop-outs. Next year's enrollment should increase due to there being 31 boys in the present 8th grade.

A four-year course of study has been made so that a student may enroll each year and not repeat units of study from previous years. These units of study are made in seasonal sequence and are integrated with field trips, visual aids, and farm mechanics. Each of the 22 students enrolled has, or has had, plans for very worthwhile supervised farm programs at home or farm placement on a good commercial farm where they can get practical farm experience.

Twenty-one of the twenty-two students enrolled are active members of the Future Farmers of America. Their activities started with the Cheshire Fair when 15 members entered 102 individual exhibits, a chapter exhibit, and 7 participated in the tractor driving contest with the Keene and West Lebanon chapters. A sum of \$110.00 from FFA premiums and \$44.00 from open classes was realized.

A slate of officers for the coming year and committees for the 30th annual school fair were elected soon after school opened. With the full cooperation of the student body, faculty, and townspeople, a very successful fair was held on October 5th. There were 431 exhibits in the cafeteria and Home Economics rooms, as well as many exhibits in the classrooms and first floor corridor. Allan Kendall and orchestra made the Harvest Dance most enjoyable.

On November 29th 6 new members received their Green Hand degree and bronze pin at Vilas High School. On December 3rd 10 members received their Chapter Farmer degree and silver pins at the Hooper School, along with 6 members from Vilas High School. A father-son banquet is being planned for next spring.

The manual training classes consist of 15 7th grade and 31 8th grade students. The 8th grade is divided into 2 groups. Each group meets 3 periods per week. The 7th grade will study the use of small tools and woodworking throughout the year. The 8th grade will study the use of small tools and power equipment and woodworking until the Christmas vacation. The remainder of the school year will be devoted to short basic studies of electricity, soldering and sheetmetal, ropework, concrete, forgework, and metal work.

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The Home Economics department had sixty-two girls enrolled in all classes this year. The Junior High School studied several new units including: child care, good grooming, and textiles, in addition to their usual projects in clothing and foods. At Christmas time they served supper to the 4-H Junior Leaders of Cheshire County. Grades 9 and 10 studied textiles, made many articles of clothing, and their foods classes were based on the preparation of dinners. Grades 11 and 12 had a complete course in family relations, including: dating, preparation for

marriage, family life and relations, money management, child care, home nursing, and in the spring they had a unit in clothing where they made dresses for graduation.

Beginning in February, a special class in food was held once a week for 12 8th grade boys. A great deal of interest was shown, and near the end of the year they planned, prepared, and served their own luncheon.

Several new pieces of equipment have been added to the department this year. A new gas stove was installed and an electric stove was replaced. Three new tables were bought to make the kitchen more complete and attractive. A new sewing machine was purchased for the sewing classes. Several new reference books were added.

The Senior girls entered the national contest to select the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Mary Lou Hall was the winner from our school.

Several girls took part in the Cherry Pie Baking Contest. Marjorie Blake won first place at the school and the regional contests and she participated in the State Contest.

In the Spring the girls in grades 9-12 participated in the D.A.R. Style Show in Westminister. Many of the girls received first awards and the following girls received a gold star showing outstanding workmanship: Joyce Bingham, Kathaleen Boudrieau, Charlotte Patnode, and Gloria Fairbanks.

The Future Homemakers of America were very active during the year. Several members took degrees, and they attended State Meetings. They co-sponsored the School Fair with the FFA boys. Charlotte Patnode received the \$5.00 award for the most points on articles exhibited. In May they planned and prepared the annual Mother and Daughter Banquet and presented a style show for entertainment.

DRIVER EDUCATION

The driver education course has been scheduled two periods daily this year. A total of thirty pupils will have received their training by June. The program consists of 30 hours of classroom work and six hours of behind-thewheel instruction for each pupil. It is our purpose to install in each pupil the necessary attributes for being a good citizen on our highways.

We have used a training car loaned to the school district by Farr's Garage in Bellows Falls. This car is equipped with dual controls. At the half of each semester tests are given to all pupils in the course by the state motor vehicle inspectors at the school.

FACULTY MEETINGS

Faculty meetings have been held periodically throughout the year. In addition committees of teachers have been organized as the need for special work has arisen.

In the elementary grades faculty projects have emphasized news reports on the curriculum and a complete study of the language arts program.

In the high school topics in faculty meetings have centered around improving the junior high program, evaluating test results, citizenship marking and the formulation of school policy. All teachers have taken part in the in-service training program held monthly under the direction of Mr. Keach.

GUIDANCE

There has been no significant change to report in the school guidance program for this year. Continuous use is being made of the University of New Hampshire Testing Service for grades 9 and 11. There are aptitude and interest tests which allow us an insight into the future capabilities of the pupils. English Co-operative Tests are being given annually. They measure progress in reading, grammar and vocabulary. The New Hampshire Employment Service Agency has given their aptitude tests to all seniors this year. Individual conferences for all seniors are then carried out by the Agency, giving the seniors first-hand information concerning their fitness in the labor market.

Seniors have visited the University of New Hampshire as well as other institutions of higher learning. Speakers

representing several types of schools have been at Walpole at various times throughout the year.

Time is allotted in the daily schedule for pupils in grades 7-12 to confer with members of the faculty. All pupils in the upper grades meet at least once a year for consultation on subject selection. More time also has been devoted to personal and social guidance problems.

THE SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

The School Lunch Program has been operating since the opening day of school. During the months of September, October, and November over 22,500 lunches were served to students and 1,220 to adults. This is a type A lunch and is approved by the State. The Walpole School has a Federally Aided program with no assistance from other organizations. The Federal government allows 5c for every Type A meal served.

This year we have added to our equipment a new baking oven and a dishwashing machine. Two serving tables, one portable, have also added to the convenience and efficiency of the kitchen.

The lunch program is again under the capable direction of Mrs. Dwight Jeffrey assisted by Mrs. Arlene Jeffrey.

I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent, faculty, pupils, and parents of Walpole for their continued cooperation.
