Polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the second day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To vote on the following question: "Shall the provisions for absentee ballot for the election of Town of Weare Officers be adopted by this town?" RSA 60:38 (By petition)

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 3 through 50 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 4, 1976 at 7 p.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
  - A. Town Officers' Salaries
  - B. Town Officers' Expenses
  - C. Elections and Registrations
  - D. Expense Town Hall and other Buildings
  - E. Insurance

  - 4. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.
- 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1976 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and

payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,833.33 to be used with the sum of \$12,222.22 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for addition to the Capital Reserve Fund established by vote of Town Meeting of March 4, 1975 for the purchase of an Ambulance or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new Fire Trucks and for any major emergency repairs to trucks exceeding \$1,000.00 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 therefore or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition).
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition).
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of Radio Alerting Receivers for the Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto. (By Petition)
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Weare Fire Department to act under the 1955 N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated 154:24 "Aid Outside District" providing participation in Mutual Aid Activities or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Weare Civil Defense or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for waste disposal for the Town of Weare pursuant to RSA 147 or to take nay other action in relation thereto.

- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Tax maps or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$549.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$270.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to restore the horse sheds at the Town Hall or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to support planned Bicentennial celebrations during the year of our nation's 200th Anniversary 1976 or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the beautification of Weare Center, as a lasting part of the Bicentennial Celebration. (By Petition).
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee of three persons in conjunction with County and State foresters to prepare a plan for the selective cutting of timber in

the Town Forest and to report to the 1977 Town Meeting the procedures and cost of such a plan or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a paid Holiday and Vacation Schedule for town officials and town employees and prepare written guidelines to be followed in future years by future Selectmen, the guidelines and schedule to be completed by June 30, 1976 and put in effect by that date or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the construction of a sewage disposal system, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. RSA 33:7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$60,000.00 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended 33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq. and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$60,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. RSA 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 252 (supp), with relation to sidewalks and sewers.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take any and all such action as may be necessary to acquire whatever easements and lands as are required to comply with Order No. 579, initially issued by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission on 10/16/56 under the provisions of Chapter 43, Laws of 1951, and subsequently extended. Further, the Selectmen are hereby authorized to employ whatever statutory provisions, including RSA 31:92-a, as are deemed necessary or desirable in order to secure the easements and lands required for the project.

37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

Section 1: No person, firm or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or make substantial improvements to an existing building or structure, or cause the same to be done, within the Town of Weare without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen.

Section 2: "Substantial improvement" means any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the actual cash value of the structure either (a) before the improvement is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred. Substantial improvement is started when the first alteration of any structural part of the building commences.

Section 3: Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall be fined not more than the maximum amount allowed by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire and each day's neglect to obtain such a permit shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4: Appeals shall be as provided in RSA 156: 4-a,b,c.

38. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

39. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution: WHEREAS, certain areas of Weare are subject to periodic flooding from streams and rivers, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, and 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective

enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

- 2. Vests the Board of Selectmen with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
- (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.
- (c) Cooperate with Federal, state, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Board of Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- 4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.
- 40. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:
  - 1. The Board of Selectmen shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed ( or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistent to flood damage,

and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

- 41. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to become a member of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. The objectives of the Commission are to provide for and encourage regional planning analyses; promote a consensus on problems of regional concern; and assist with implementation of projects located within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of member communities. The Commission has only such authority as conferred on it by RSA Chapter 36: Sections 45-53, of 1955, as amended, and will serve in an advisory capacity representing the interests of the local governing body. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint two representatives of the Commission from among those nominated by the Planning Board in accordance with State law.
- 42. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to appropriate the sum of \$647.85 (\$.35 per capita) as the Town's share for the operation of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operating expenses, planning studies, technical assistance, and such other programs as may be authorized by the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with such other state and/or federal funds as may be available for planning purposes.
- 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to join the Merrimack Valley Region Association or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 44. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Highway Department to install traffic lights at the intersection of Reservoir Road and Route 114 and the intersection of Flanders Memorial Road and Route 114. The lights shall be sequenced to favor traffic on Route 114 with controls to permit time for vehicles to enter the traffic from the intersecting streets. (By petition)
- 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expenses on a Commission on Energy, consisting of eight members to be appointed by the Selectmen and Moderator, and which has the duty to study the advisability of all proposals to meet the energy needs of the Town, and to submit a report to the Townspeople by January 1, 1977. (By petition)
- 46. To see if the Town will vote to accept Woodland Drive (off Bog Hill Road) a distance of approximately 1,000 feet terminating in a cul de sac of a 75 foot radius. (By petition)
- 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to apply to the existing deficit or to take any other action in relation thereto.

48. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Weare gravel ordinance by repealing the paragraphs entitled "Permit Required" and "Penalty" and adopting the following:

"Permit Required. No commercial operation resulting in the alteration in the contours of any land not in public use shall be made by excavating, removing or relocating earth, loam, topsoil, sand, gravel, clay, stone, minerals or other earth materials, or by depositing any material, natural or otherwise, unless and until a permit from the Board of Selectmen is obtained."

"Penalty. The holder of a permit found guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined no more than \$100 per day for each day such violation continues after notice of such violation is given to the holder by the Board of Selectmen."

49. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following addition to the present Weare Dump Ordinance:

"Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100 and a separate offense shall be deemed committed on each day during or on which the violation occurs or continues."

50. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### RECORD OF TOWN MEETING March 4, 1975

The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Weare was called to order at 10 a.m. by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. (Before the meeting opened Mr. Tiffany took the oath of office as Moderator of the Town of Weare and also Moderator pro tem of the Weare School District. Since the School District Moderator had moved out of town, the School Board asked Mr. Tiffany to act as School District Moderator pro tem until a Moderator was elected).

Harold E. Thomson moved the polls be kept open until 7 p.m. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator read Article 1 of the Warrant. Harold E. Thomson moved the reading of Articles 2 through 44 be read at the continued meeting on Thursday, March 6, 1975 at 7 p.m. at the Weare School Gymnasium. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator read the School District Warrant for March 4, 1975. The error in place of voting was corrected. The Moderator declared the polls open for balloting at 10:07 a.m. for both Town and School District elections.

Proceeded to ballot for Town and School District officers.

The polls were closed at 7 p.m. by Moderator Gordon M. Tiffany for both Town and School District, and the Town Meeting recessed until Thursday, March 6, 1975 at 7 p.m. Ballots were then counted. At 9:13 p.m. the Moderator announced the results.

At 7:15 p.m. on March 6, 1975 the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator. The meeting was asked to stand to hear the names of town residents who had died since the last Town Meeting followed by a moment of silence. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Vernon Wood.

The Moderator read the rules of order for the meeting. He asked for a show of hands of visitors to the meeting. The Moderator noted that Cynthia Merrill's name was inadvertently omitted from the Finance Committee listing in the Town Report. Mr. Tiffany then appointed James B. Craig, Harold Delamater, Kenneth Gregg and Sheila Labounty to the Finance Committee for the ensuing term.

The Moderator recognized James B. Craig, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, who gave a State of the Town address. The Moderator then recognized Harold E. Thomson, Selectman, who also addressed the meeting.

Robert Munro moved that the reading of the Warrant be waived. The motion was seconded. The Moderator stated a certified copy of the Warrant has been presented and each article will be read separately as it is taken up. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. To make provisions for the collection of taxes. Frank Farmer moved that the provision for the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year of 1975 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

Frank Farmer moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$70,000. Frank Farmer explained that a letter has been received from the Department of Revenue Administration stating the Town must raise and appropriate the entire sum of money needed to take care of highways and bridges for the year. From this figure the Department of Revenue Administration will deduct the state reimbursements the Town receives when figuring the tax rate. The actual sum of money to be raised by property taxes in 1975 will amount to \$34,159.52. Frank Farmer moved the sum of \$70,000 under this article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,000. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,928.78 to be used with the sum of \$12,858.53 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,928.78. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$7,900. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$112.00 to be matched with \$2,114.00 from a grant by Region V LEPC for two hand held four (4) frequency Portable Radios for the Weare Police Department.

Frank Farmer stated the Finance Committee is in favor of this article and moved it be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a full time police officer or to take any other

action in relation thereto.

The Finance Committee recommended no money be raised and appropriated under this article. After some discussion, Robert Hyman moved the article be dismissed and that the Moderator appoint a committee of five (5) people to thoroughly investigate the necessity for a permanent police force and policing in general in the Town of Weare and report to the Town Meeting in 1976 on this basis with the provision that they make petition to that Town Meeting with such action as they recommend. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$8,500. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of an Ambulance and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 therefore or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended no sum of money be raised under this article. Barry Eaton explained why the article had been placed in the Warrant and made a motion to change the sum of money to be raised and appropriated to \$500.00. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new Fire Trucks or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended no sum of money be raised under this article.

Craig Hadley spoke on this article and moved to raise \$15,000.00 toward the purchase of a new fire truck. After some discussion, a motion was made and seconded to amend the motion as follows: to issue bonds to purchase fire equipment over a period of years to be determined. The vote on the amendment was negative. The vote was then taken on the original motion and the vote was negative.

Robert Hyman moved that the article be dismissed and that the aforementioned committee (Article 10) be requested to look into the entire question of fire safety equipment, the need for new equipment, the need for new buildings, the need for repair to the present buildings and, further, that they, if so inclined that we need new equipment, try to ascertain if there are matching funds or state aid from other agencies and that this information be given to us at a subsequent Town Meeting in the form of a recommendation. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of new fire equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 therefore or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended no sum of money be raised under this article. Robert Knox made a motion to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new radio communications system or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended no sum of money be raised under this article. Chester Rhodenizer spoke on this article and moved that \$900.60 be raised and appropriated to be used with \$831.60 of the Weare Fire Department Communications Fund to buy a new radio. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,200.00. Raymond Eaton moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. After some discussion the vote was taken. The vote was negative.

Frank Farmer moved \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated for repair and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated or to take any other action in relation thereto:

James B. Craig moved this article be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply the accrued interest of \$3,312.32 from Revenue Sharing Funds plus residue of \$416.95 from allocation of Fire Truck plus \$64.46 in future interest to the overdraft in Town Hall and office equipment.

Finance Committee recommended this article be accepted. Frank Farmer made a motion to accept the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the purpose of painting the exterior of the Town Hall and complete the work needed to restore the second floor or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,800.00 for painting the exterior of the Town Hall. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded. There was some discussion and it was suggested by James B. Craig that the townspeople could get together and donate their time to paint the second floor of the Town Hall. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for waste disposal for the Town of Weare pursuant to RSA 147 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

A report of the Dump Committee was read. Malcolm C. Purington moved that the report be accepted and placed on file with the recommendation that the committee continue to gather information about waste disposal and report again to the Town in its annual meeting, or at a special meeting if it becomes necessary. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 provided that matching funds from the State in the amount of \$10,000.00 and the Federal Government in the amount of \$35,000.00 become available to convert the River Road from Riverdale to Clough State Park to a Class II State of New Hampshire maintained highway or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold E. Thomson explained this article and recommended \$5,000.00 be raised and appropriated. Frank Farmer moved this amount and the motion was seconded. After some discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Tax maps or to take any other action in relation thereto.

James B. Craig told the meeting of the Selectmen's work on obtaining information from tax mapping companies to date. He moved to raise and appropriate \$1,100.00 to go along with the \$10,000.00 which was previously allocated from the Revenue Sharing Fund; that \$9,350.00 be raised and appropriated at Town Meeting in 1976 and the balance of approximately \$5,000.00 be raised and appropriated at Town Meeting in 1977. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$535.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

David Souter spoke on this article and moved the amount of \$535.00 be raised and appropriated. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Beatrice Bockus spoke on this article and moved the sum of \$3,000.00 be raised and appropriated. The motion was seconded. Frank Farmer told the meeting the Finance Committee recommendation for this article was \$2,000. However, the Finance Committee did not realize that the Nursing Service was planning to establish an office. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town; further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the Town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

James B. Craig moved that the Town provide funds over a three-year period so that when the tax map is complete in 1977, the town can be re-assessed that year; \$8,000.00 to be raised and appropriated in 1976; \$8,000.00 to be raised and appropriated in 1977 and the balance in 1978 for reassessment of the Town of Weare. The motion was seconded.

Robert Munro moved the motion be tabled until Town Meeting, 1976. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The original motion was tabled until 1976.

ARTICLE 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,500.00. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$400.00. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,500.00. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$300.00. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$200.00. Frank Farmer moved the article be accepted as printed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare.

James B. Craig moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Ruth Jones moved to amend the article as follows: - and to direct the Selectmen, contingent upon a successful application for a HUD grant, to accept a deed to the old high school property and to do all necessary to rehabilitate the old high school building. The motion was seconded. After a lengthy discussion, the vote was taken on the amendment. The vote was affirmative. James B. Craig moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 31 as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Conservation Commission, the whole or any part of money so appropriated to be placed in the Conservation Fund established by vote of Town Meeting 1971, to accumulate from year to year and money may be expended from said fund by the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes according to Chapter 36A, RSA amended.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$250.00. Wilfred E. Lahey, member of the Weare Conservation Commission, moved that, since the Commission had no need of additional money at this time, in the interest of economy the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote was affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will accept Ridge View Road in South Weare for a distance of .8 of a mile, said distance being the remaining portion beyond that which the Town accepted in 1972. (Ridge View Road goes southerly from South Weare Fire Station past residence of Donald Lewis and others and continues to Route 77).

Wilfred E. Lahey stated that he feels the road meets Class V requirements and moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. After a lengthly discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the article lost. Volker Wyrenbeck moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will accept Woodland Drive (off of Rockland Road) as a town road.

Ginger Wentworth stated the road has been approved by the Road Agent as an approved road and that the Planning Board has told her it has been approved. Mrs. Wentworth moved the article be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote negative. The article lost.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify a portion of Burnt Hill Road from Route 77, adjacent to the Earl Sanborn residence to the Dumont residence (measures ¼ mile), from a Class VI to a Class V roadway, thereby removing the status of subject to gates and bars and assuming the responsibility for the maintenance of said section of road.

Leo Dumont moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. After some discussion, Eldon Townes stated this was an old town road and that it would not take much to get the road in shape. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to reclassify the East Shore Road, better known as Hunt Street, at Horace Lake from a Class IV highway to a Class V highway.

Louis Nikias moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the article lost.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the town grader shed at no cost to the town.

Gilbert Bockus moved the adoption of the article. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will give a vote of encouragement to the special bicentennial program planned for the year July, 1975 - July, 1976 by the Town Bicentennial Committee. This program consists of non-profit, self-supporting activities designed to bring the people of Weare together in celebration of our 200 year old country's past, present and future.

Thomas Smith, Co-Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, explained the plans of the Committee and moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will appropriate an additional \$2,200.00 per year for the Selectmen to obtain additional secretarial assistance.

Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,200.00. Frank Farmer moved this amount be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: In order to permit the people of Weare to have a voice in the improvement of their roads, Town-maintained roads shall be widened and/or paved only with the prior written consent of the Board of Selectmen after a public hearing. In deciding whether to consent, the Selectmen MUST give substantial weight to the views and wishes of abutters as expressed at the hearing or in writing. This ordinance shall have no effect on road repair and maintenance.

A motion was made by Neal Kurk to adopt the ordinance as read. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: In order to preserve the scenic beauty of the Town of Weare, the height of any structure hereafter erected in the Town shall not exceed twenty-five (25) feet above ground level; provided, however, that this ordinance shall not apply to buildings or to structures erected by private individuals for personal, non-business purposes or to telephone and electric power distribution poles carrying less than 15 KVA.

Neal Kurk moved that the following be substituted for the article as printed:

In order to preserve the scenic beauty of the Town of Weare, and to promote the health, safety and welfare of its inhabitants, the height of any structure hereafter erected in the Town shall not exceed Thirty-five (35) feet above ground level unless approved by the Board of Selectmen after a public hearing. In deciding whether to approve, the Selectmen MUST give substantial weight to the views and wishes of abutters and neighbors as expressed at the hearing or in writing. Nowwithstanding the foregoing, this ordinance shall not apply to:

- a) structures erected by private individuals for personal, non-business purposes;
- b) telephone and electric power distribution poles carrying less than 35 KV;
- c) the maintenance, rebuilding or replacement of existing electric transmission lines; or

d) structures erected for agricultural purposes.

The motion was seconded. Donald Thomson explained construction procedures of transmission lines on behalf of the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire. Malcolm Purington asked if the telephone relay station planned for the Mine Hill section was responsible for this article. Neal Kurk replied that it was. The ordinance, if accepted, would require a public hearing.

Neal Kurk moved an addition to the substitute article as follows:

e) structures erected by the Town of Weare for municipal purposes. The motion for the addition was seconded. Gilbert Bockus spoke on behalf of the Granite State Telephone Co. regarding the company's plans to erect a telephone communication tower. Leo Dumont made a motion to move the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on the substitute article in lieu of Article 41 as printed in the warrant was taken. The vote was no. A hand ballot was called for. The result of the hand ballot: Yes - 90; No - 85. The vote was affirmative.

Robert Munro made a motion to table the article and turn the matter over to the Planning Board for further study, the Planning Board to make a recommendation of a similar article in next year's warrant. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The Chair declared the motion carried by more than a 2/3 vote and the substitute article was tabled.

ARTICLE 42. To see whether the Town will vote to designate the part of Mount Dearborn Road between Mill Road and Hodgdon Road as a scenic road pursuant to RSA 253:17.

Neal Kurk moved the adoption of the article. The motion was seconded. Eldon Townes asked if all land owners along the road have given their permission. The Chair ruled the article is in order; notice was given to owners by the Town Clerk that the article would appear in the Warrant. A discussion followed on the correct name of the road. Douglas Burnett stated the road has always been called Mount Dearborn Road. He read an excerpt from the Old Town History regarding Mount Dearborn Road. The Chair stated that the consensus of the meeting is that the name of Mount Dearborn Road shall apply to the entire length as described in the article. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 43. To see what action the Town will take to elect one Town Auditor on an annual basis for three years pursuant to RSA 41:32a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gilbert Bockus moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 44. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Frank Farmer, Chairman, moved for the Finance Committee that the Town vote to instruct its officers, Boards, Departments, Committees and Commissions, that requests for appropriations for capital expenditures (new equipment and/or repairs to buildings and grounds) of \$1,000.00 or more be made in special articles and not included in its annual operating budget. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

William Herman moved that the Town vote to accept the design appearing on the front cover of the 1974 town report as the official Town Seal. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Paul DeLamater moved that the Town from this day forward, so as to facilitate in the fair transaction of Town business, require all persons attending Town Meetings to pass before the registered voters check list and so duly be recognized as a registered voter or not. Whereupon each person would receive a form of identification that would be displayed in plain view at all times so that one could easily determine whether a given person was registered or not. Further, that non-registered persons be required to sit in a section of the meeting hall separate from registered voters so that they may be recognized as the guests and spectators they are and therefore be refrained from participation in any vote, be it oral, show of hands or paper ballot. The motion was seconded. A discussion followed this motion. Marjorie Eaton, Supervisor of the Check List, stated that at one time the Supervisors could tell by looking around the meeting who were and were not registered voters. However, with so many new faces, she finds it impossible to recognize all registered voters.

Robert Munro moved to amend the article by eliminating the phrase dealing with an identification tag. The motion was seconded. A discussion followed on the amendment. James B. Craig moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The vote was taken on the amendment to eliminate the means of identification. The vote was negative and the amendment rejected. The vote on the motion as read was taken and the vote affirmative.

The Chair recognized Dr. Frederick Vintinner who presented to James B. Craig, retiring Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, a hand-drawn parchment signed by several hundred taxpayers. The document read, "The friends of James B. Craig with the members of the Taypayers Association of Weare, in appreciation of your diligence and devotion to your responsibilities as Selectmen of Weare." The members of the meeting gave Mr. Craig a standing ovation.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town agree to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator expressed the thanks of the meeting to Frank Farmer, Chairman and the Finance Committee. The Committee received a hearty round of applause.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:45 a.m.

# WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The department received 1,600 calls during the past year; 1,193 calls were received on the Police line, the remainder (407) were direct calls to the Chief and other officers. Of the 1,600 calls received, 583 calls required the presence of an officer. The calls cover a wide range of activities — information, assistance to stranded motorist, larceny, breaking and entering, missing persons, lost persons, assaults, assistance to other departments, motor vehicle accidents, OHRV accidents, untimely deaths, and a variety of motor vehicle complaints.

The department handled 65 court cases, from minor traffic violations to Class B Felonies. At District Court level the department prosecutes its own cases. We have four officers who are capable of presenting the cases for the department, and are doing an outstanding job.

During the investigation of a minor disturbance, information was obtained which enabled the Manchester Police Department to indict a Manchester man for sexual assault upon a minor female. We make special note of this case because through our efforts and cooperation with another department, two minor girls were removed from a family situation that was detrimental to their physical and mental health.

The New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council sponsored a 32 hour Police Training Course at Concord, N.H., during the spring of 1975. The following officers were awarded diplomas; Deputy Chief Morton Perry, Sgt. Stetson Hunt, and officers Bernard Phelps, Donald Thomson, David Nichols, and Edythe Hunt. With the exception of our newest officer, Andrew Perkins, all of our regular officers have received firearms training at the Goffstown Police pistol range, and have met departmental standards.

Each year we have a large number of breaks at summer camps and homes. Usually these breaks are not discovered until late spring, making it extremely difficult to apprehend the responsible persons. PLEASE don't leave valuables (TV, radio, firearms, tools, etc.) in summer camps. Make arrangements to visit your camp several times during the winter, or have a neighbor check your camp for you. Many times storm damage is discovered this way and may be repaired before extensive damage is done.

This past year we were able to obtain, at no expense to the Town, a second hand radar speed meter. We use this equipment in various locations in town in a continuing effort to keep the traffic within the posted speed limit, for the safety of our citizens and visitors.

Once again we ask that you note strange vehicles or persons in your

neighborhood, try to copy registrations and call us if you notice anything unusual. Many times during the investigation of a break a neighbor will tell us, "well, I thought it was odd that people were around that late, but I didn't want to bother the police." PLEASE CALL US!! We need all the information and help we can get, and we must rely on the community to keep us informed as to what is happening, we can't be everywhere at once.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1975

The Weare Fire Department answered 59 calls in the year 1975, with 236 calls being received on the red phone. The calls were: 59 for fire, 100 for the Rescue Squad and 77 for information and assistance to the townspeople of Weare. Fire calls were as follows: house fire - 1; chimney - 16; brush and grass - 10; out of town calls - 10; room fire - 4; car fire - 4; accidents - 4; truck fire - 1; stove fire - 1; under fireplace - 1; lightning strike - 1; dump - 2; trailer - 1; flooded oil hot water heater - 1; smoke in building - 1; electric wire - 1. We had to call for help from out of town three times; with one fire we called two towns.

The Department purchased: 1 new nozzle, 250 ft. 1½ in. hose, 200 ft. 21/2 in. hose, 6 hand lights, 4 back tanks, 5 used radios for the fire trucks and new foam to replace foam that was 25 years old. The new radio base station is in and working on our frequency and on the County police frequency that the Weare Police Department uses. The radio system was purchased with money from three different sources. It will show in the budget of the Fire Department as a large overdraft, but the sum of \$3,053.30 should be subtracted from the total. The money came from: an article in the warrant of \$900.00; reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire of \$1,292.50 and from the Fire Department Communications Fund - \$860.80. The five truck radios that were purchased by the Department last year are being converted to our radio frequency with the Department paying for it out of the Communications Fund. The men of the Department hope the Town will help now with the purchase of radio receivers for the men to have in their homes.

General maintenance on all trucks in the Department was performed, with major work done on the engine of truck No. 2. We also had to do transmission work and new batteries for the large tanker (\$160.00), repair a hole in tank on truck No. 1 (\$220.00) and replacement of the transmission and rear end of Lake View truck (\$500.00). Only the

repair work on engine No.2 was planned for with money in the budget. The other repairs are the main reason for the Department going over its budget so far.

Work done on the stations this year was as follows: new shingles on north side of Center station; painting of inside of Sugar Hill station; new shingles on South Weare station(shingles donated by G.C. Brown); waterproofing the outside of Lake View station and finishing of woodwork and painting of the inside of the Lake View station. We still have more work to be done on all stations, including painting outside of all buildings, and we hope the Town will appropriate the money so that it can be done for the Bicentennial.

Knowing how high the tax rate is, the Department decided not to ask for a new truck this year, but to ask that a Capital Reserve Fund be established to be used for trucks in the future.

Three water holes were cleaned up and new posts and fencing were installed to make them safe. More work will be done this next year on some of the water holes, and all water holes should be cleaned out with a backhoe as all have filled in some over the years.

## WEARE RESCUE SQUAD

The Weare Rescue Squad responded to 105 calls during the year 1975. There were 20 calls for automobile accidents, 19 calls for falls and fractures, 45 calls for medical emergencies, 2 calls for obstetrical emergencies, 4 calls for psychiatric emergencies, 3 calls for lacerations, and 12 calls for standby at fires and other activities.

There were a total of 85 patients transported, while 24 patients not requiring transport, were treated at the scene. We travelled to Concord Hospital 45 times, to the Elliott Hospital 9 times, to Catholic Medical Center West 15 times, to Catholic Medical Center East twice, and one run to the Veteran's Administration Hospital.

Four new members were added to the squad this year, giving us a total of 16 members. More help is needed to provide coverage during the daytime hours; many members work out of town and a big burden is placed on those remaining. The Rescue Squad urges any interested men or women to make application to the Clerk, and obtain the necessary information regarding training requirements.

Several members completed a refresher Emergency Medical Technician-Ambulance course, 2 members attended the annual Emergency Medical Services Workshop in Laconia, and 2 members became certified as Nationally registered Emergency Medical Technicians. Local training exercises included simulated snowmobile and automobile accidents with participation of both our own and the newly formed New Boston Rescue Squad.

Our present ambulance is going on 9 years old, and has served well for many years, but the age and design of the vehicle, and the increasing demands for providing better Emergency Medical Services, force us to have to plan for a new vehicle in the very near future. Federal Highway Safety matching funds are currently available for new ambulances, and the Weare Rescue Squad (having the oldest ambulance in the Concord area) is considered a top priority for replacement. So all we have to do is come up with our half of the cost.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of the Town of Weare for their Cooperation and support during the past year, and for the thoughtful families who have remembered the Rescue Squad in memorial funds for their loved ones. Any contributions are greatly appreciated and put to good use.

Lastly I would like to thank the members of the Resuce Squad, who during the past year, donated over 1500 hours in responding to calls, training, and maintaining equipment. Without this type of support the Weare Rescue Squad would not be a reality.

#### REPORT TO TOWNS

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow.

No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the traditional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

# THE WEARE COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT 1975

The Community Nursing Service provided 236 home visits and transportation of patients to cancer, mental health clinics, hospitals, and doctor's offices. Home visits included such nursing services as injections, blood pressures, hot packs, baths, and other patient care as ordered by physicians. A series of three immunization clinics, in connection with the school, were held for pre-school and school children. A free adult health screening clinic of the N.H. State Department of Health was sponsored by the Weare American Legion Post and the nursing service. There were many follow-up services provided, such as for diabetes, glaucoma, and hypertension. Plans to establish a nurse clinic and office facilities in Weare did not materialize. However, it is hoped that facilities will be established in 1976.

Consideration is being given for the Nursing Service to affiliate with the Nursing Services of Deering and Hillsboro. This would provide for interchange of nursing services, relief time of nurses and more effective utilization of limited medical services in this area.

# CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK ANNUAL REPORT 1975

The Park opened May 24 and closed October 19, 1975. Roy Johnson, James Rice and Bryan Sargent respectively served as gate attendants and special Park Police. Bernard Phelps served as Park Caretaker and special police on weekends. Among the various groups which used Park facilites without cost were: Elementary School classes for outings, Weare children (120) for swimming lessons, various civic organizations for outings such as Weare Winter Wanderers, Fire Department, Grange, others, four highly successful band concerts, and the Fourth of July fireworks sponsored by the Weare Fire Department.

Improvements made at the Park included installation of a stone wall, iron posts and grading to prevent erosion on the south shore, sand bulldozed back to the shores, six new picnic tables were purchased and existing ones repaired and stained with wood preservatives, wharfs and fireplaces repaired, and buoys installed and maintained to encircle the swimming areas. The band stand was installed at the Park, a project of the American Legion Post in Weare. Park grounds were mowed and kept in a clean and orderly condition. Water samples were taken periodically at the swimming areas for analysis at the laboratories of the N:H. State Water Pollution Commission. All showed the water to be safe for swimming. Also water from the Park well was tested and shown to be safe for drinking. The snack bar was open most of the time operated by Edith Belleville.

Vandalism occured several times usually late at night. Among the damage, the flag pole and band stand posts were ripped down, snack bar broken into, bottles and trash scattered through the Park. Trash cans and picnic tables were thrown into the lake, buoy cords cut and boards ripped off buildings. The Weare police caught one group in their acts.

A car sitcker system for identification of Weare taxpayer's vehicles was continued. All such stickers were issued at the season rate of \$2.00 per immediate family. Additional stickers for more than one car per family were issued without cost.

The previous tables show that the Park is supported mainly from income derived from Non-Weare Taxpayers. The number of season stickers sold to Weare Taxpayers was 433, an increase of 93 over those sold in 1974. The income from these season stickers (\$866.00) represents approximately 23 per cent of the total income to the Park. Park income from Non-Weare Taxpayers (gate and boat admissions) was \$2,304.00. This is greater than any previous year which represents about 75 per cent of the total Park income.

In summary, major improvements at the Park have been made with the exception of extension of the asphalt pavement to the snack bar in order to eliminate dust conditions which now exist. There will always be cost to maintain the Park but these costs should be less in the future. However, to prevent vandalism and misuse of the Park, at night particularly by Non-Weare persons, frequent police patrol should be established.

The Annual Report of the Town of Weare 1974 shows carry-over funds from previous years income of \$1,997.25 for the Park. If the present admission rates are maintained in future years and since major improvements now have been made, the Park income should exceed operational cost.

#### REPORT OF THE WEARE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

The Weare Civil Defense is now an active organization, and was approved by the State of New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency February 11, 1975. The organization is staffed by a Director, Deputy and seven members.

Since the beginning of our program, the Deputy and Director attended a three day civil defense seminar at UNH in Durha, N.H. Another meeting was called by the N.H. Civil Defense Agency. This meeting was held at the Manchester Armory for members of Region 1 to evaluate our Civil Defense Program.

In March 1975, a booklet for home use titled "II. Time of Emergency" was distributed through the Weare school students. This is a citizen's handbook, a copy of which should be in every home as it contains valuable information every Weare resident should know. The Weare Post Office has a supply of these booklets on hand, and they are also available from the Weare CD Director and the Deputy Director. There is no charge for the booklet. The importance of information in this booklet can be stressed by the fact that the Weare Junior High School students are receiving a course on the program under the subject "Your Chance to Live."

As a result of having our program brought to date and approved by the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency, we have become eligible for State and Federal government access and surplus property. Because of this eligibility we received through the White Mountain National Forest six radios which will be in service with the Weare Fire Department. This represents a savings of approximately \$3,500.00 to the Fire Department. The cost to them was \$150.00 for the six radios.

During this past summer residents have seen a Navy box-type ambulance at the Center fire house. This vehicle came to us free through Civil Defense and was turned over to the Weare Fire Department for restoration and service.

On September 23, 1975 the State of New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency, under the code name "Checkerboard Profile," tested the Weare communications system of alert and found it to be adequate.

The Weare Civil Defense maintains frequent contact and good relations with the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency in Concord. They have been readily available in assisting us with problems, for which we are very grateful.

#### BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

This is a review of last year's report in which many projects had been started and many loose ends were lying about.

As previously stated, the joint effort on the Town Hall is completed, as is the four room addition to the elementary school. They are now in their second year of use. The move into the new high school was made last April.

The gym addition which includes ventilation and emergency exits in the basement of the gym, plus cafeteria and hookups for a new kitchen is working out very well. We hope that in the near future, the money will be raised to make the move into the new kitchen possible. The sewage disposal system was completed with the hopes that many years of problems were in the past, but the first large gathering at the gym brought back the old problems of flooded basements. Further investigation found that the original (1963?) septic tank had been installed backwards. The situation was corrected and the system is working well.

The two additional wells and relocated tank and control center is a big improvement.

Lawns and shrubs around the new high school, bark mulch on the slope in front of the gym and elementary school, hot-top walkways

from the high school, elementary school and gym, straightening and regrading the front driveway to improve surface drainage, removing the mound that contained the old pump house and extending the driveway around the high school to connect with the parking lot expended our funds.

At a meeting with the Selectmen, Eldon Townes and the Chairman of the Building Committee, it was agreed that in the best interest of the Town, the parking lot would be paved. A price of \$5820 was accepted from Lane Paving Co., the project was completed in early September.

#### TAX MAP PROGRESS REPORT

On April 16, 1975 the Selectmen entered into an agreement with Robert B. Todd of New Boston relative to the preparation of a Tax Map for the town of Weare pursuant to RSA 31:95A which states that all towns in the state must prepare tax maps by 1980. This agreement provides for the completion of this project in three phases, each to be completed and funded during three fiscal years, commencing in 1975 and being completed by April 1977.

Phase I is running behind schedule as the first draft of the planimetric base maps has not been completed. This phase is, however, about 75% complete by the delivery of; a set of 9"x9" contact prints of aerial photos covering the town at a scale of 1"=2000' to be used for stereo compilation of the base map, a photo index map, and a set of photographic enlargements on reproducible material to be used in identifying property lines and placing parcels. The enlargements are at a scale of 1"=400' for the entire town and at a scale of 1"=200' for the developed areas. Completion of phase I will be within the next eight weeks upon delivery of the draft copy of the base maps.

Phase II is underway and is about 10% complete. To help reduce costs of the project a committee of local citizens has solicited voluntary information from all landowners by means of a questionnaire which was very successful. 35% of these questionnaires were returned and the committee is grateful for this exceptional response. Further, about 500 deeds have been researched and filed for use in plotting properties. This phase will be completed during the year by the gathering of remaining deeds, plotting of properties and the public review of the first draft.

Phase III involves final drafting of the map sheets, computing parcel areas and index preparation. The completed project should be presented to the Board of Selectmen during April 1977.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY POLICE AND FIRE DEPARTMENTS

At the March 1975 Town Meeting the townspeople voted to have the Moderator appoint a Committee to study the Police Department (to see if a full-time department was necessary at this time) and the Fire Department (to see what new equipment, mostly new fire trucks, was necessary at this time). The reports are as follows:

## Police Department

The Study Committee met with the Police Chief, Frederick Cleveland, and the Assistant Chief, Morton Perry. The Committee

concludes that at this time a full-time Police Department is not needed in the Town of Weare. To cope with the increase in the number of calls the Department is now receiving, the Committee does recommend an increased budget. These additional funds would permit more police patrolling time. The Committee has estimated that the cost of a full-time Police Department would be approximately \$30,000. Even then it is doubtful that the town would receive adequate coverage.

#### Fire Department

The Study Committee met with Chief Raymond Eaton and Assistant Chief Russell Coleman. After much discussion the Committee concluded it was not recommended that the purchase of fire trucks or major equipment be made at this time. The Committee estimates present equipment will be adequate for approximately five years. It is recommended, however, that a \$5,000 per year capital reserve fund be established to permit the purchase of a new fire truck at the end of that period. The capital reserve fund should be available for emergency repair or replacement of equipment exceeding \$1,000.

## REPORT OF WEARE BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

Two hundred years ago "our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation."

Dedicated to the ideals and purpose of these founding fathers, the United States of America is entering the threshold of its first two hundred years of self-government, a mere child to most countries of the world.

As a member of the Thirteen Original Colonies, the state of New Hampshire will be one of the main focal points during this, our Bicentennial Year.

Although the Pine Tree Riot and numerous enlistments are Weare's only "claim to fame" during the Revolutionary period, its celebration of our nation's birthday will be equally joyous as the other communities throughout the land.

Designated a National Bicentennial Community by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration in Washington, Weare received its recognition at a special Columbus Day ceremony featuring Rep. James C. Cleveland, Sen. Robert B. Monier, representing Gov. Meldrim Thomson, Jr.; Barry J. Palmer, a member of the New Hampshire American Revolution Bicentennial Commission; Rep. Harold E. Thomson and Malcolm C. Purington, chairman of the Board of Selectmen.

With plans to offer a little something for everyone in the community, a calendar of events for Weare's bicentennial celebrations shapes up as follows:

March 25-27 — A brighter, larger and more festive version of last year's "Minstrel Melodies" will be staged at the Town Hall. The annual production will be co-sponsored by the Weare Bicentennial Committee and the Weare Junior Historical Society.

May 22 - Old Home Day - Leading into the July 4th festivities will be a day-long program of events beginning with our Bicentennial Parade. The day's events will include the parade in the morning, a program honoring Weare's oldest and youngest citizens and direct descendants of Revolutionary Weare residents, a band concert, a "Fat and Lean Men's" softball game, an old-time outing in Weare Center, all climaxed by a cabaret-style dance featuring the crowning of "Miss Weare 1976."

June, 1976 - The graduation of the Class of 1976.

July 1-4 - A four-day schedule of activities is almost completed with activities and events for people of all ages.

8:00 p.m. - Bicentennial Ball

July 4 (Sunday)

10:00 a.m. - Community Church Services on Town Common (weather permitting)

1:00 p.m. — Old Time Outing in Weare Center. Bring-your-own-basket lunch with family style competitions including Men's Beards, Ladies Costumes, Kid's Freckles, Pie-eating contests, sack races, pig scrambles, egg tosses, three-legged races, greased-pole climbs and more.

7:00 p.m. - Band Concert in Weare Center

Dusk - Fireworks Display by Weare Fire Department

An Antique Show will be featured on Saturday July 3, while a family carnival, refreshment booths and an information booth will be available throughout the festivities.

August 6-7 — "The Horse and Buggy Era" will come alive in displays and demonstrations presented by the Weare Historical Society.

A Community Church Service will conclude Weare's Bicentennial activities during the latter part of August in the South Weare Union Church.

To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of Six Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$6,200) from the proceeds of the sale of portable classrooms and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800) to pay for additional transportation costs of the 1974-75 school year or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 9. To see if the School District will vote to appropriate a sum of Three Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$3,400) to erect a fence between Carter's property and the school or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 10. To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate to satisfy the obligation in the Colburn Deed

- regarding a fence between the school land and Colburn land, or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of Four Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4,450) to erect a galvanized fence for baseball stop and a section of fence 200' by 10' high located between the school and the athletic field, or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to appropriate all income from Building Fund investments and prior building appropriation, to the payment of additional costs of the School Building Program; or take any other action in relation thereto.
- 13. ## RECORD OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT MARCH 5, 1975

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by the District Clerk. Mr. David Titcomb was elected Moderator pro tem.

Mr. James Craig made a motion that the moderator dispense with the reading of the warrant in its completeness and read each article as it is taken up. The motion was seconded and carried.

### Article 1

It was moved by Martha Knox and seconded that the salaries of the Truant Officer and the compensation of any other officers and agents of the District be accepted as listed in the budget. The motion was carried.

### Article 2

George Kendrick moved that the report of Agents, Auditors and Committees or Officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Town Report. The motion was seconded and carried.

Malcolm Purington was then recognized by the Chair to report on the High School Study Committee. Mr. Purington reported on the availability of HUD funds and stated that the committee suggests the following.

- 1) the school district deed over the high school building and real estate to the town (a school district is ineligible for HUD funds)
- 2) the town apply (before the May 15, 1975 deadline) for \$85,000 in HUD funds to remodel the building for community uses.

3) a five member board, including a selectman, be appointed by the moderator to oversee the property if the transfer is accepted by the town.

Mr. Purington made the following motion: I move that the report of the High School Study Committee be accepted with the thanks of the district and that the recommendations therein be adopted and furthermore that the School Board be authorized to transfer title of the old school building and real estate to the Town of Weare upon such terms and conditions as they feel in the best interest of the district. The motion was duly seconded.

Mrs. Kathy Conroy asked the intent of the committee in regards to the present shop building. The committee recommends that the town enter into a lease agreement with the Sugar 'n Spice Kindergarten. Mr. Hatfield clarified that the only purpose of the motion was to transfer the property to the town to dispense at will. The motion was carried.

The Moderator then recognized Mr. Frank Farmer, Chairman of the Finance Committee who gave a short report on the history and responsibilities of the Finance Committee.

### Article 3

Mrs. Martha Knox moved that the School District accept the Town auditors as auditors for the district. The motion was seconded and carried.

### Article 4

Mr. George Kendrick moved that the district authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

Jim Craig made a motion that the Superintendent, Principal and Town Attorney be granted priviledges to speak on the finer points of the school budget. The motion was seconded by Harry Chase and passed.

Harold DeLamater moved that the rules be suspended and we move to Article 13. A 2/3 majority vote is needed. Wendell Colburn, Alan Bresslin and Bert Brown were appointed as counters. The count was 202 in favor, 78 in opposition. The motion was carried.

### Article 13

Marge Eaton moved that the School District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$630,692 for the support of the schools, for the payment of School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the

State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. The motion was seconded by Wendell Colburn. Frank Farmer, representing the Finance Committee, gave the following recommendations:

- 1) cut 1 new teacher
- 2) cut extra custodian new floor machine will help with maintenance
- 3) cut \$5,000 from electrical heat
- 4) cut \$6,097 from fixed charges of \$43,538
- 5) cut from Capital Outlay \$500 from meat slicer Total of \$22,069 cut from \$630, 692 budget

The Finance Committee recommended a 1975-76 operating budget of \$608,996 plus \$21,696 past interest for a total of \$630,692. The School Board was in agreement with this figure. This represents a \$68,000 increase in the operating budget.

Martha Knox gave a breakdown of the \$68,000

\$28,791 - salaries

\$ 3,268 - textbooks

\$ 4,850 - library and visual aides

\$ 4,395 - teachers supplies

\$ 1,256 - contract services

\$ 1,283 - other expenses

\$24,415 - operational expenses of the plant

\$4,358 - salaries

\$2,000 - supplies

\$7,412 - heat

\$7,225 - transportation charges

\$7,816 - capital outlay

\$ 650 - other expenses

The vote was taken by written ballot. Harold Thompson, Ed Gallagher and Gordon Tiffany were appointed to count the votes. The results were 119 yes - 196 no. The motion for a \$630,692 budget was defeated.

Mr. Harold DeLamater moved that the sum of \$591,000 be raised and appropriated for the operation of the schools and that the School Board be directed to freeze the number and salaries of teachers and employees at the 1974-75 level and further that the School Board be

directed to spend money as indicated in the line item budget. Seconded by Mr. Knox. The suggested breakdown of the \$591,000 is;

\$451,000 basic budget

- \$ 91,000 principle and interest
- \$ 22,000 past interest for 1974
- \$ 20,000 toward heating cost
- \$ 7,000 for transportation of students

This motion was carried

Mr. Robert Hyman made the motion that the School Board be directed not to engage in deficiency spending beyond the \$591,000 budget with the expectation of being reimbursed for the same in the 1976 school district meeting. The motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. DeLamater made a motion to recess the meeting until Tuesday, March 11, 1975 at 7:30 p.m. The motion was seconded and carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 a.m.

The continuation of the Weare School District meeting was called to order March 11, 1975 at 7:40 p.m. by moderator David Titcomb.

### Article 13

Marge Eaton, Chairman of the School Board, made the following statement: The School Board acknowledges the will of the voters as expressed March 5 and to the extent possible will abide by the vote. Teacher salaries will be frozen and programs cut to keep within the budget. Since the budget of \$591,000 included \$21,969 as the bond payment made in 1974-75 school year, we offer the following motion for clarification: I move that \$21,696 of the 1975-76 school budget be allocated as a deficit appropriation and be transferred for the bond payment due in January 1975. The motion was carried and the Chair so declared.

James Craig moved that Article 13 not be reconsidered at this meeting or any further meeting for one year. The motion was passed and no further business declared under Article 13.

### Article 5

Martha Knox moved that Article 5 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and declared passed.

### Article 6

Frank Farmer moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of (\$9,639) Nine Thousand, Six Hundred Thirty-Nine Dollars for repair of the gymnasium roof. The motion was seconded and declared carried.

### Article 7

Frank Farmer moved that the District raise and appropriate a sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-Five Dollars (\$2,885) for repair of the elementary school roof. The motion was seconded and passed.

### Article 8

The School Board moved that the School District vote to appropriate a sum of Six Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$6,200) from the proceeds of the sale of portable classrooms to pay for additional transportation costs of the 1974-75 school year. The motion was seconded and declared carried.

### Article 9

Frank Farmer moved that Article 9 be dismissed. Seconded and carried.

### Article 10

Frank Farmer moved that the District raise and appropriate Eight Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$880) to satisfy the obligation in the Colburn deed regarding a fence between the school land and Colburn land. The motion was seconded and carried.

### Article 11

Frank Farmer moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Four Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$4,450) to erect a baseball stop and section of fence between the school and athletic field. David Dunning moved that Article 11 be amended to read a sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800) for a baseball stop. The amendment was seconded and carried. The Article was moved by Frank Farmer and seconded to read: to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800) to erect a baseball stop. The motion was seconded and decalred carried as amended.

### Article 12

George Kendrick moved that the School District vote to appropriate all income from Building Fund investments and prior land appropriation costs to the payment of additional costs of the School Building Program. The motion was seconded by Robert Munroe and declared carried.

### Article 14

Frank Farmer, representing the Finance Committee, moved that the School Board be instructed that requests for appropriations for capital expenditures (new equipment and/or repairs to buildings and grounds) of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) or more be made in special articles and not included in its annual operating budget. The motion was seconded and declared carried.

William Herman moved to see if the District will vote to instruct the Weare School Board to include in the annual report to the town a detailed statement of payment similar to that of the town fathers beginning with the report for the year beginning July 1, 1974, July 1, 1975 and thereafter. After much discussion the motion was withdrawn.

Voker Wyrenbeck moved that the next annual report of the Town of Weare include a breakdown of the expenses of the Supervisory Union or percentage of those. Seconded and carried.

Art Brennan moved a vote of confidence and appreciation of the teachers of the Town of Weare.

Mr. David Moody moved to delay the opening of the new High School until the fall of 1975. The motion was defeated.

James Craig moved for adjournment. The motion was seconded and passed. The moderator adjourned the meeting at 9:50 p.m.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To The School Board and Citizens of Weare

I herewith submit my 1975 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

Our new high school, the elementary addition, and the Town Hall renovation have greatly improved the educational process by giving more flexibility in program and facilities. The new high school, especially, has improved the learning environment for our students and has made its' management much easier. Students, faculty, and administration were very elated about the change from the old to the new. The elementary expansion not only added a cafeteria for students but has also given an area to build a library media center, a very important part of a school's educational program. It is important for students to have an opportunity to become acquainted with a library media center at a very early age. We have developed a Library Media Center at the high school level with the help of the staff, students and people of the community. Five thousand used books were acquired through the book drive. We have also received Federal Funds to hire a library aide for the library. The aide has done an outstanding job in cataloging and in encouraging students to use the area. We hope to be able to employ her next year.

I would like to take this opportunity to compliment and to thank the Building Committee for the many hours that they have given of themselves to help our students have a better learning environment. It is interesting to note at this time that of twenty-six recent building projects in New Hampshire, there were only two School Districts that had lower construction costs than the cost for Weare High School.

### **ENROLLMENT**

### COOPERATIVE SPECIAL SERVICES

A study was done in the Weare School System along with the other school systems in Union 19 to determine the greatest needs of our special students. The study was conducted through a planning grant under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), Title I. Coming through loud and clear as the area of greatest concern was learning disabilities. Learning disabilities can often be found in a pupil functioning at a significantly substandard level, usually two or more years below grade level for some reason or reasons, exclusive of mental retardation. The retardate, in comparison, may have intact learning systems, but is limited in the amount he can comprehend and put to practical application.

More often than not, learning disabilities refer to dysfunction caused by sensory impairment in one or more areas, resulting in that person's inability to process information effectively. In language dysfunction, for example, the impairment may be receptive, central, or expressive in which the child's power to discriminate sounds may be defective or he cannot reason with the information he hears or sees or he may be limited in his working vocabulary as he attempts to express himself. A dyslexic child may have a visual impairment in which he cannot handle the geometric configurations of words. For whatever reason, it is important to remember that the learning disabled child is functioning below standard for causes over which he has no current control. Our traditional system of education, for instance, is terribly handicapped to the child who physically is unable to read.

The second grant, an operational grant, supported a Special Services Coordinator and teacher aides in each one of the elementary schools to work with identified learning disabilitied children. The grant supported equipping a learning problems resource center at the Supervisory Union Office and a local center in each one of the elementary schools. It also provided an intensive in-service training program for all staff involved. The program has already noticeably helped many youngsters.

Though federal support is assured to the end of the 1977-78 school year, present indicators predict that aid to be in smaller grants. In the meantime, the program will be studied to determine its effectiveness and to decide what recommendations should be made, if any, to assume partial local support through the Grant's periods and ultimately full local support. To date, the Cooperative Special Services Program has helped over eighty pupils through individual attention and has brought "Special Needs" in-service experiences to more than twenty-five teachers, educational assistants (aides) and administrators. Education

should make a difference. The Cooperative Special Services Program is making an important difference for certain youngsters.

### PRESCHOOL SCREENING

To ascertain and identify learning needs as early as possible, a preschool screening program for all children entering the First Grade was conducted in the summer of 1975. The screening of incoming children involved the areas of speech, language, auditory, motor coordination and emotional-social development and was conducted in a five-station process. While the child was moved through the five stations, the parents were informed about the program by the Principal of the School.

Teachers, educational assistants, and principals involved in the screening process attended a three-day workshop earlier in the summer to learn how to identify specific learning needs and how to implement the screening process.

We feel the program has been very beneficial.

### CAREER EDUCATION

Career Education was a major topic of my message last year. Further implementation of the practices associated with Career Education were advanced this year with the establishment of a union-wide Career Education Committee and the Committee conducting a day-long workshop at Goffstown AREA High School for the Union's teachers, specialists, and administrators. The keynote speaker's address, Career Education in Perspective, and the repeated, ten concurrent sessions led by practitioners experienced in CE defined Career Education in its broadest ramifications and gave ideas for implementing CE programs.

To the teachers and administrators who found themselves at various stages in understanding Career Education and in putting together sets of activities supportive of Career Education instruction in all subjects, the workshop offered these elements as guideposts: Career Awareness, Self Awareness, Educational Awareness, Economic Awareness, Decision Making, Appreciations and Attitudes, Beginning Competences and Employability Skills.

### STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The new Staff Development process for the professional improvement and recertification of faculty and administrators became

operational July 1, 1975. The provision of activities for professional development is now a local and/or personal responsibility. Prior to this time, the determination of satisfactory kinds of activities to qualify the individual for recertification was a State responsibility. Now, recommendation for recertification is a responsibility of the Superintendent of Schools with issuance of the Certificate a State Department of Education function.

Educators are now recertified each six years during which time each person will have cycled through two three-year personal in-service plans with their associated activities. The opportunities for in-service work may now include many local and personal activities which previously were not applicable toward recertification. Any activity viewed as advancing a person's effectiveness in his or her local school position and as acceptable to the person's Review Committee, which measures the activity against the person's Personal Plan objectives, is credited toward that person's three-year plan.

Acceptable courses remain in-service alterantives but are not seen as the dominant option they were.

The five-member Weare Staff Development Committee is chaired by Andrew Messner, one of the four citizen representatives.

### LIBRARY/MEDIA CENTER RESOURCES

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title II (ESEA II) has provided assistance to strengthen libraries and media centers since 1965. Last school year, the Supervisory Union 19 five-District, ten-person ESEA II Advisory Council, representing teachers, administrators, librarians, specialists and citizens, recommended the purchase of materials in three priority areas: health (in its broadest categories), career education and art with 75% of the expenditure for elementary schools and 25% for secondary schools.

The resulting \$5,091 outright grant purchased filmstrips, cassettes, records, films, slides, cards, posters, and guides. Housed and card-indexed at the Goffstown AREA High School Media Center, the dozens of packaged sets are available for circulation to the Union's schools and the Villa Augustina. Pamela Shepard, grade 4 teacher, was the Weare Council representative last year. Weare schools are represented on the Council this year by Vicki Wechsler, Grade 4 teacher.

All material purchased through this year's grant of \$3,157 will be housed in the Weare High School Library Media Center.

### **CORE EVALUATION TEAM**

To help more pupils make the most of school more often, the Weare Schools have established a Core Evaluation Team. The team receives referrals from faculty or any other person concerning some aspect of the education of a pupil which in some way is or may be felt to be inhibiting continued successful education of that pupil. The referral concern may be scholastic, behavioral, heath-based, handicap-oriented, minor but fraught with growth and potential seriousness or even new and serious. Weare's basic Core Team has five members and meets when necessary. The teacher of a referred pupil and, if necessary, other persons knowledgeable in the area of concern supplement the team.

I commend Principal Stevens for his administrative leadership that he has shown in the past year, and especially, for his drive and desire to seek ways of improving the educational program by going after Federal and State monies that would not have otherwise been available.

I wish to acknowledge my sincere appreciation for the aid and cooperation provided me by the Principal, Teachers, School Board Members and Citizens of Weare.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT -WEARE SCHOOL SYSTEM-

I respectfully submit my Second Annual Report as Principal of the Weare School System.

The 1975-76 academic year finds Weare students housed in new quarters. Grades 7-12 are now located together in the new high school. This move has allowed us greater flexibility in staff utilization. The transition has been exceptionally smooth. The facilities have done a lot in developing student pride and respect. We plan to do our best to maintain our buildings at their present condition.

This year, we have several new staff members. Mrs. Vickie Wechsler, Grade 4; Mr. Robert Lemire, 5th and 6th Grade Language Arts; Mr. Bruce Wechsler, English and Social Studies; Mrs. Jean Stapleton, French and English; Mr. Jack Ahern, English; Miss Rosalyn Beaudet, Music Supervisor; Mrs. Dawn Coughlin, School Nurse; and Mr.

Edgar Hunt, Custodian. Mrs. Dianne Klein and Mrs. Louise Duperron served successively in Junior and Senior High Math. Through a Grant from the C.E.T.A. Program, we have also hired Mrs. Marilyn Gould as a librarian aide.

We have several new projects underway, thanks to the contributions and volunteer efforts by many Weare Citizens. The P.T.A. is currently building two Creative Playgrounds for Grades 1-6. The P.T.A. is also remodeling an elementary classroom to be used as a Resource Center. In the high school, we are building our Library by purchasing equipment and furniture made possible by donations from the Riverdale Reading Improvement Society and the students of Weare. A book drive was conducted, boosting our total volumes from 1,000 to 6,000 books.

This year, our concentration in curriculum is focused on English, Reading, and meeting the needs of slow learners and special students. We will spend the year establishing a written curriculum based on skill inventories. Also, we are trying to return to fundamentals by improving reading, writing and Math. We will also evaluate and adjust our new Social Studies program, which has proven very satisfactory so far.

Weare participated in an ESEA Title III Grant to set up an Early Intervention of Childhood Failures Program in the First Grade. Last summer, our elementary staff screened all in-coming First Graders for Learning Disabilities. Some students were placed in schools with Special Services; others are being remediated in regular classroom settings. So far, the program has been very successful.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the cooperation extended by the Board, staff, students and Citizens of Weare.

First aid was administered 365 times during the course of the school year, and 760 pupils were seen in the health office.

All school personnel were given a TB Heaf test by the school nurse, and flu shots were given to all personnel requesting one.

In the halth teaching field, a program on adolescence was presented to all 5th and 6th graders. Two movies depicting the hazards of smoking were shown to students in grades 5 thru 8. The movies were provided by the TB Association and the Cancer Society. Grades 5 and 6 also saw a filmstrip on acne.

Mr. Palmeri from the Program on Alcohol and Drug Abuse spent a day talking to the Junior High and a day showing the movie "Chalk Talk" and talking to the Senior High on the problems of alcohol in our society. My sincere thanks to Mrs. Gagnon, Jr. High Science, and Mrs. Purington, 5th and 6th grade Science for their assistance with the above programs. A venereal disease program was presented to all students in the Jr. and Sr. High. This program was presented to the P.T.A. before presentation to the students. Marie Ericson, from the State Department of Health, VD program, spoke to the members about the State VD Program.

Before the smoking and alcohol programs, the Jr. High saw a film on self-awareness entitled "Johnny Lingo." I hope it helped at least a few students look inward. My thanks to Mrs. Blanding for her help with this project. It is so very important for our young people to believe in themselves - to know that they are good people, and to know that they can achieve whatever goal in life they desire! They must have a good self image to succeed.

The fourth grade participated in a state wide dental health program. A short dental program was done with Mrs. Russell's third grade, and grades 2, 3 and 4 were shown a movie about "Being Friends."

Immunization clinics were held at the Town Hall in March, April, and May. My thanks to Evelyn Reade for setting them up.
