WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, 1943, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town Maintenance.
 - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (c) General expenses of highway department.
4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$411.71 for class 5 road construction.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for public welfare.
 - (a) Town Poor.
 - (b) Old Age Assistance.
6. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.

7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Patriotic purposes.

- (a) Old Home Day.
- (b) Memorial Day.

8. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to maintain an observation post.

9. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town, by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1943, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LIBRARY REPORT

The library situation has been for the past few months, and will be for months to come, a difficult one. Not only has the circulation in our little library dropped noticeably, but many larger libraries, we are told, feel the lack of patronage. We have many good volumes on the shelves, and many of our people would enjoy reading them, but how to obtain them is the problem which confronts us. We must learn to plan our riding—something new for Americans. We can do it if we will. There are nearly three thousand books available, many of them new ones. This year, you will notice, there are not as many additions in the number of volumes, but the trustees deemed it wise to add a few better books which necessarily cost more.

Since the addition of these new and better books, it may in the near future seem wise to limit the time they may be kept by any one family and to collect a small fine for each week they are held beyond the prescribed limit. Such an arrangement would bring about two results: books, when returned promptly, will have a wider circulation; and the fines will swell our library funds.

Our former librarian, Mrs. Ethel H. Colby, after a term of faithful service in our library, has felt it necessary to resign her position. Mrs. Colby has been of great assistance in selecting books, especially for the children. Her close connection with the younger people has made her suggestions of great value. When our Town House was sold and the library had to be moved, the undertaking seemed enormous, but Mrs. Colby directed the transfer methodically and successfully. Now our books are in crowded quarters. It is hoped that when the world is at peace once more, Webster will turn her attention and her endeavor toward a proper housing of her unusually good collection

of literary works. In plain words, WE NEED AND SHOULD HAVE A NEW LIBRARY BUILDING.

In looking about to fill the place made vacant by Mrs. Colby's resignation, we made an unexpected and very pleasing discovery. Mrs. Jean Piszczek, who rather recently has come to our town, has had experience in library work and is deeply interested in books. Beginning the first Saturday in February, she will take over the work and become our Librarian. We feel sure that when our people call at their library, they will receive willing help or advice in selecting the sort of books they like.

The trustees also wish to express their appreciation for the interested and faithful service of Mrs. Avis Hancock, who has acted as Librarian many weeks when it was not convenient for Mrs. Colby to be at the Library.

The full 180 days of school required by law were given in each of the two schools of the district. The percent of attendance was better than the previous year, although there was an increase in amount of tardiness per pupil.

The number of different pupils registered in the district was 48. High school pupils from the district were registered as follows: Hopkinton, 3; Warner, 4; Concord, 2; and Franklin, 2. This totals 59 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools, a decrease of 14 pupils from the total of the previous year.

Although the need of a new school building for the district still continues, it is useless to expect such an improve-

ment at the present time. After the war has been brought to a victorious conclusion, consideration of this need of the district should be resumed. The acute shortage of teachers still continues throughout the state.

The excellent cooperation of the school board, parents, and teachers in carrying on the work of educating the children of the district is much appreciated.
