

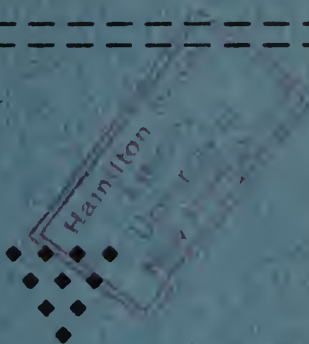

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in said County, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall in the Massabesic Lake Inn in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- First.* To bring your ballots for:
- Town clerk for the ensuing year,
 - One selectman for three years,
 - Tax collector for ensuing year,
 - Town treasurer for ensuing year,
 - Highway agent for ensuing year,
 - One library trustee for three years,
 - One cemetery trustee for three years,
 - One trust fund trustee for three years,
 - Three auditors for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M. the meeting will be open for the following articles:

- Second.* To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Third.* To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- Fourth.* To hear the report of the Budget committee and act thereon.
- Fifth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for town officers' salaries.
- Sixth.* To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for election and registration.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for police department expense.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the forest fire department.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Volunteer Fire department.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the Health department, including vital statistics.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$1,000.00 for winter roads and \$300.00 for bridges and culverts.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$954.00 for street lights.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$527.30 for Class V roads, (TRA-town's share).

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the library.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for town poor.

Nineteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for old age assistance.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 for rent of hydrants.

Twenty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Village Cemetery.

Twenty-third. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for town dump rental.

Twenty-fourth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Twenty-fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for tarring Bunker Hill Road.

Twenty-sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for tarring the so-called Hooksett Road.

Twenty-seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for tarring and improving the Deer Neck-Pingrey Hill road, so-called.

Twenty-eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for payment on principal of outstanding note.

Twenty-ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,444.77 for 1942 County tax.

Thirtieth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

Thirty-first. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to provide for additional forest fire protection due to the war emergency.

Thirty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to provide for additional police protection due to the war emergency.

Thirty-third. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any or all real estate acquired through tax collector's deeds.

Thirty-fourth. To see if the town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Thirty-fifth. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

With the opening of school in the fall Miss Clara Marquis who has served most satisfactorily as music supervisor in other towns in Union Number Ten for two years, succeeded Mr. Ralph V. Matthews. Miss Marquis' training and experience well qualifies her to supervise the musical instruction of the Auburn school children.

The teachers of the Severance and Village Schools have served, both efficiently and faithfully, for several years. In these times, when there is a scarcity of good teachers, the citizens of the town should realize the advantage of capable teachers. Every effort should be made to retain the present staff.

Various additions as regards textbooks have been made during the current year. Our main concern has been, as it should be, the providing of the necessary reading material. As a result work books have been provided for the primary grades in addition to basic readers for grades one and four to supplement others provided in

previous years. A new language series was installed in grades five through eight to replace an out-moded set. The difficult social science series which had been used for several years was discarded in favor of texts which were well within the grasp of those pupils who had to study them. Sets of histories and civics were purchased for the seventh and eighth grades to supplant the social science texts. Other books furnished were: arithmetics for grades three, four and five, geographies for the third grade, plus various items necessary to supplement those already in use.

Appreciation should be shown Mr. Charles McLaughlin who has proven to be a most generous and public spirited citizen. His gift of a fine steel flag pole for the new Village School adds much to the school lot.

When the occasion warrants bulletin boards and wardrobe doors should be installed in the new school classrooms. These additions, along with other minor items, should make the Village School one which the citizens of Auburn may be proud.

The appearance of the Severance School will be greatly improved if, in the near future, the outside of the building is painted and the grounds graded. Inside painting and improvements should not be neglected.

As I conclude my duties as superintendent of the Auburn schools I wish to express a sincere word of thanks for the cooperation and loyalty of the school board, teachers, pupils, and my other friends in the town. It will be pleasant to remember the many fine associations in our work together. The helpfulness of all is greatly appreciated.

“Never was there a time when the profession of education carried such a heavy responsibility, never a time when its members might feel a greater pride in the significance of their work, never a better opportunity to

serve the nation. Let our profession but answer boldly the call of the crisis and we shall fashion, even out of the harsh necessities of war, a school system more fit for the education of free men."
