

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid on or before the first of July next.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for both fire companies.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on Town labor and pay for same out of the Highway Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 more or less, for Huggins Hospital. (By request.)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$428.29, the State contributing \$1,713.17, for Town Road Aid.
- 9. To see how much money, if any, the Town will raise and appropriate for White Pine Blister Rust Control. (By request.)

- 10. To see if the Town will accept in Trust the sum of one hundred dollars from Addie H. Garland to be invested in War Bond and the income to be for the care of Lot No. 83 Brookside in Riverview Cemetery, George F. Clark Lot.
- 11. To see if the Town will accept from Will J. Drew the sum of one hundred dollars to be invested in The Rumford Building & Loan Co. of Concord, N. H., the income to be devoted to Hall & Drew Cemetery on the old Jos. Hall Farm at North Barnstead.
- 12. To see if the Town will accept from the late Mrs. Fred Jenkins' will the following: "I give and bequeath to the Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire the sum of four hundred (400.00) dollars to be held in trust, the income of which to be used for the perpetual care of my cemetery lot, on the Richard Houle farm.
- 13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Instruction in reading should continue with the present system progressing into grade 5 next year. The Arithmetic system should progress into grade 4 next year.

You are fortunate to have, at this time, a loyal group of teachers that are trained for the approximate grades they are now teaching. They have been very effective in their teaching.

(b) Administrative Problems

As of February 1, 1944

The procurement and retention of teachers has been the number one problem this year. When there is a shortage of any article and an artificial method of controlling the cost is not used the cost of the article rises. The same is true of personal services and when applied to school teachers it becomes more critical as in past years salaries were kept down which in turn was felt at teacher-training institutions by a decrease in enrollment. Last year there was a call for 500 new elementary teachers in this state with but slightly more than one-tenth that number of new elementary teachers coming into service.

In this Union there is a total of 21 teachers new to their positions since the last report. Five positions have been eliminated since the last report. Five teachers have left their positions since Sept. 1943. There are now a total of 53

different teachers, 10 janitors, 3 nurses and 31 school buses operating in the Union. Everyone of these 97 items is personal service and at this time subject to a great deal of change due to manpower shortages.

The schools of Barnstead has had an abrupt change this year. The closing of three schools has been caused by a combination of the following circumstances: (1) decreasing enrollment, (2) shortage of teachers, (3) reduction in State Aid was indicated because of the size of the enrollment in the various rooms.

There are some items which I would like to call your attention to in the budget.

- 1. The Treasurer has been paid \$50.00 per year and required to pay for his bond \$20.00 from this amount. We have placed the payment of the bond under "other obligations" which includes "administration" and "other fixed charges," such as insurance where it rightfully belongs. This will give your treasurer a salary of \$50.00.
- 2. Three schools have been closed and your State Aid has increased because each room is now approved as a state aided room.
- 3. The transportation cost has risen but not comparable to what you would pay in teachers' salaries if the three schools had remained open and teachers were available. The only way that I know to cut this figure in a fair manner is to combine routes and use larger equipment. I have hesitated to recommend this procedure as a transporter should be offered a long term contract if required to buy equipment that is not usable in their other business, be it farm business or personal business. Whether persons will move back into Barnstead after the war is over is a moot question and on this question hinges a long term transportation contract with special equipment.

PART IV. SCHOOL PLANT

Repainting the rooms at Parade, Center and Beauty Hill added immensely to their attractiveness as well as improving the conditions of eye use. The addition of some screens at the Center School is a decided step in the right direction.

It is planned next year to repaint the outside of one of the two room schools as well as perform numerous small repairs.

PART VI. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

(a) Report of School Health Work (Barnstead)

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools:

There were very few cases of contagious diseases to supervise this year. The few which might have been very serious were followed up. There was some difficulty with a few cases of pediculosis which were eventually cleared up. Barnstead still has a relatively good health record as far as physical defects go on the strength of the many years of dental clinic work. The results of this dental clinic work will gradually lapse, however, until the teeth of Barnstead pupils are as poorly cared for as those of the average small New Hampshire towns with no dental clinic service, instead of being the most outstanding, unless parents see that their children go regularly to a dentist.

Several cases of bad tonsils and adenoids were operated upon this year, five being done in clinics. More need doing very badly.

A hearing test with the Belknap County Audiometer presented for the use of the schools in this general area by the American Legions of the County, was done with several bad hard of hearing cases revealed. Some of these cases should have a special examination and whatever treatments are recommended.

Some of the worst cases of defective vision have been fitted to glasses in a Concord clinic. This should result in better school work.
