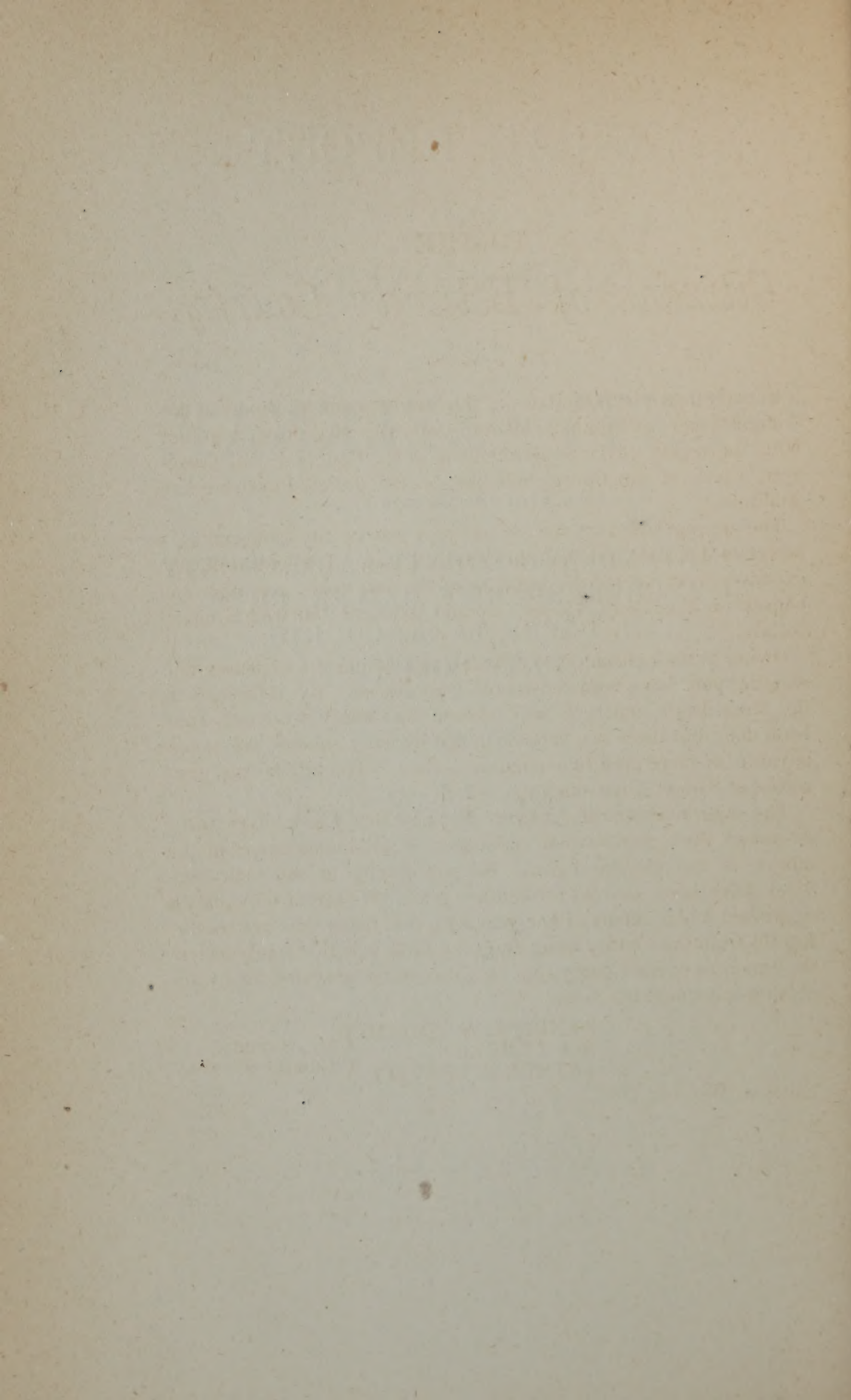

In compliance with the laws of the State the annual report of the Commissioners of Belknap County is herewith submitted, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Treasurer, Clerk of the Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailer, Physician and Auditors.

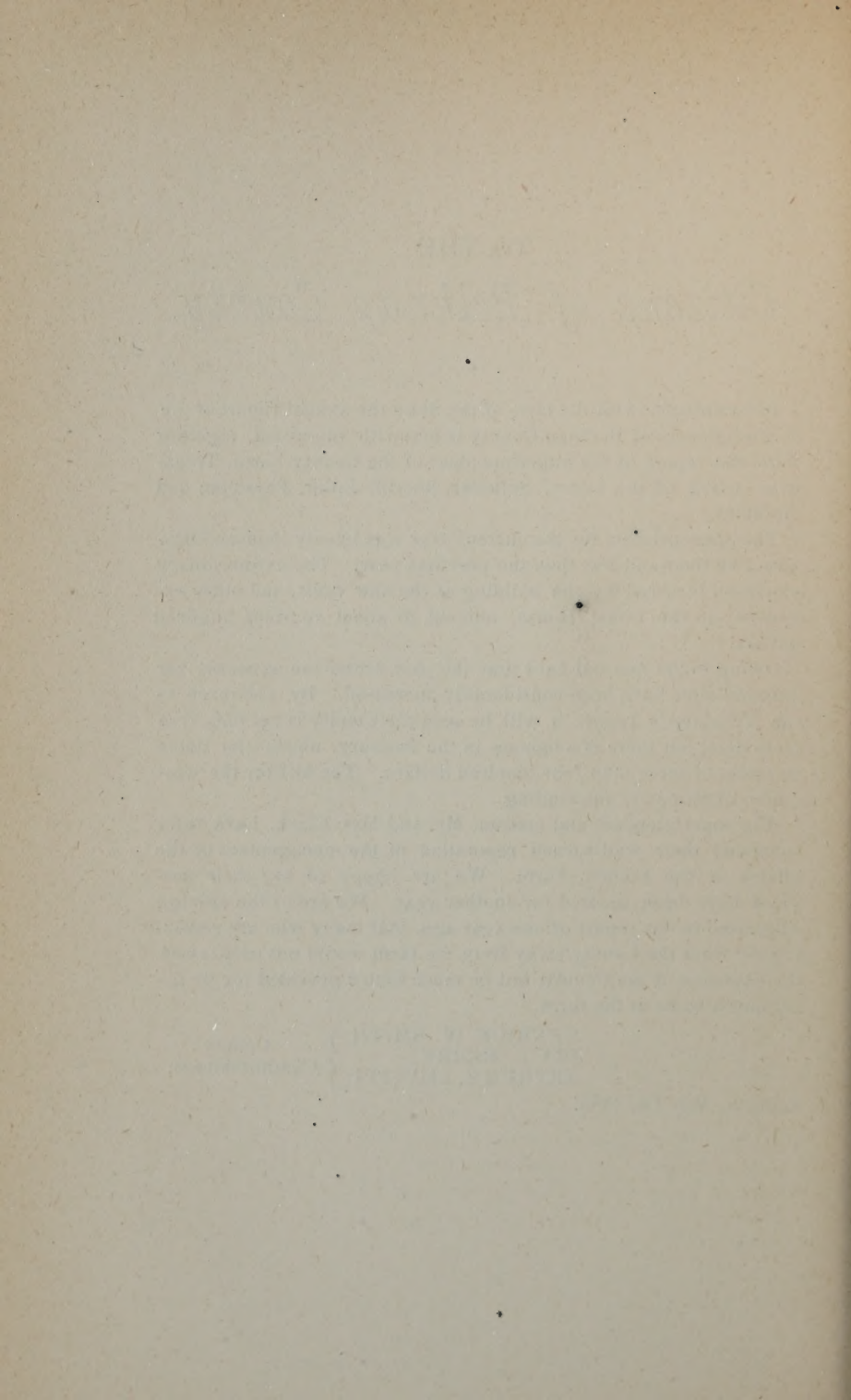
The appropriation for the current year was twenty thousand dollars, five thousand less than the previous year. The extraordinary expenses incurred by the building of the new vault, and other expenses on the Court House, amount to about fourteen hundred dollars.

Owing to the unusual hard time the past winter the expenses for external poor have been considerably increased. By reference to the Treasurer's report it will be seen the County is not only free from debt, but there is a balance in the treasury, above the notes payable, of more than four hundred dollars. The bill for the execution of Samon is outstanding.

The superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Clark, have fully sustained their well-earned reputation in the management of the affairs at the County Farm. We are happy to say their services have been secured for another year. We are of the opinion expressed in our report of one year ago, that many who are receiving aid from the County away from the farm would not only lessen the expenses of the County, but be much better provided for by accepting a home at the farm.

## Physician's Report.

To the Commissioners of Belknap County—Gentlemen :

I regard it a happy prospect for the county poor at the farm, as the Superintendent and wife who have had them in charge for some time past are to remain another year.

The house on the farm is not in all respects what it should be for the accommodation and comfort of the poor. I would suggest that the drainage be made good, and that bath-tubs and water-closets be placed in the house; that separate apartments be provided for the sick and the insane; that the jail, which is located and arranged in such a manner as to be quite unfit to be occupied by human beings, should at least have means of ventilation.
