You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and one selectman for three years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$330.37 for Class 5 Highways T. R. A., and the State will contribute \$1,321.47.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Class 5 Highways and Bridges (Town Roads).

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for New Highway Equipment.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Removal of Trees beside the highways.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Railing Bridges according to State Specifications.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$61.00 for the Lakes Region Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26.00 for the Newfound Region Association.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Fire Protection.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15.00 for Memorial Day.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Blister Rust Control.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 to make repairs on the Brick School House and other Town Buildings.

17. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover same.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and deliver inventory blanks when assessing.

19. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousands dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners, and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up the fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on his guard. He should

1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
 - b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
 - c. Seeing that others comply with the requirements.

d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting.—that PAYS!

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1946, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
