Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District
of Clarksville:

Foreword

Regardless of what our thinking may be relative to where present day education is leading us, and of the extent to which the press, radio and television have influenced it during the past several months, it is believed that one thing will be agreed upon, namely, that more time, space, and expense has been devoted in focusing our attention upon public education than was ever before known. True, much that has been said has been questionable and even condemning in nature. Even in such instances, however, there has been, now and then a ray of hope. Probaby, the best example which could be cited in this respect is "Johnny's" growing up educationally, even though we were told he couldn't read. Now we hear more about him as "John" in high school who, in some miraculous manner, has picked up sufficient information along the way to know that he wants to shy away from Mathematics and Science.

To become really serious though, we are much concerned about the teaching of the three R's, especially Reading, in the elementary school. Likewise, we are equally concerned over the selection of the subjects, particularly those of a technical nature, in the high school. As has been alluded to above, apparently either nearly everything has been said that could be said about the need for more effective teaching in our grades or something is definitely being done to improve the once claimed deplorable conditions. Indications to this effect are found in the switch in emphasis to more upon the professed need of greatly increased enrollments in the Mathematics and Science courses at the secondary school level. A goodly number of people believe this to be imperative, if we are to continue to enjoy our position of world leadership. Undoubtedly, this is true to a certain extent. However, is there a danger here of yielding to technical hypnosis?

Although granted that the processes of physical research and the application of engineering methods enter into the solution of our present day problems in multitudinous ways, we have only to look about us to quickly sense that there are still problems of long standing yet to be solved. As a matter of fact, most of them would be just the same had

the atom never been split. They require not so much a knowledge of the nature of matter as they do a clear mind, the power of logical analysis, wisdom born of experience, and an understanding of how to get along with others. Personal relations between capital and labor, and international politics, provide good examples in this respect. The indications are that even though perhaps more attention should be given to specialized education, demands for the provision of a parallel in general education seem equally apparent. It is proven capacity to learn, rather than what has been learned, that really counts when one's formal education is completed, and he is out in the world on his own.

Teachers

With no relief in sight to alleviate the teacher shortage which, if anything, is becoming progressively more serious every year, we are extremely fortunate to have experienced teachers in our school. Mrs. Alma B. Chappell is teaching Grades 1-4, and Harry F. Huggins is teaching Grades 5-8.

School Nurse — Health

We are much pleased to have our school nurse, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, with us again after recovering from an operation which confined her for several weeks in the hospital and at home. It is during such a prolonged period, when the schools are not served by the school nurse, that the great importance of the work done by her in helping the pupils maintain good health is more fully realized.

Although it was not possible to perform the customary routine health work while Mrs. Sturgis was away, thanks to the sponsorship of the Mohawk Parent-Teacher Association and the excellent cooperation of many willing workers, much was accomplished to protect the physical well being of the people in this area. Two very successful polio clinics were conducted, one each in November and January for ages six months to twenty years inclusive, and a chest X-ray clinic was held in the latter month for all ages. It should be noted here, also, that in addition to the above clinics, Mrs. Sturgis had a very well attended pre-school one last spring, and that complete physical examinations were made of all Fourth Grade pupils shortly after the opening of school in September.

Water — Building — Equipment

In accordance with the action taken at the annual district meeting; the school board and water committee elected to work with the board members for this purpose, have done

an excellent job in providing a good, adequate water supply for the Clarksville School. After thoroughly examining the different possible sources, the district's own spring was deemed to be the best one from the standpoints of purity, amount of flow, and cost. The work done, which was completed with dispatch, included the digging-out of the spring; enclosing the vein opening with a cement box; doing the necessary ditch work involving the laying of the pipe from the spring to the building; and connecting the pipe to the plumbing already installed in the school. Much credit is due the water committee for the efficient organization and supervision of the work done on this project. A breakdown of the expenses will be found at the end of this report.

Thanks to the continued practice of keeping the building in a good state of maintenance, comparatively little repair work has been necessary during the past year. It is due to the same policy, too, that such items of equipment as have been added for the same period have consisted, for the most part, of those purchased for instructional purposes.

Enrollment and Attendance

The enrollment in our school of 33 pupils at the present time is the largest in four years, as it was 26, 25, and 26 respectively for each of the preceding years. Average percentages of attendance for the past year were 94.46 and 93.81 for the Primary and Upper Grades, respectively, while the average number of tardinesses per pupil for each of these groups taken in the same order was .16 and .00.

A breakdown of tuition pupils for the current year shows six at Pittsburg High School, one at Colebrook Academy, and two at Pittsburg Elementary School. The cost of the tuition of the latter pupils is paid by the parents.

Notes on The Budget

The School Board's budget for 1957-58 is \$13,941.00 as compared with the \$13,548.00 voted for the current year. This amount is reduced by anticipated state aid of \$500.00 plus an estimated balance of \$300.00 which leaves \$13,141.00 to be raised by taxes by the town. Since an additional \$1,000.00 to the budget was raised this year to cover the costs of providing a new water supply for the school, it can be seen that even with the small increase in next year's budget the amount to be raised and appropriated by the town is substantially less than last year, due to an increase in estimated income and no special article under which to raise money.

Legislation

Since the Governor is in agreement with the Commissioner in petitioning the Legislature for a substantial increase in general school aid for the next biennium, and the establishment of school building aid on a permanent basis, the outlook is promising for additional financial assistance from the state level to help pay the rapidly mounting costs of operating our schools. Other possible legislation which will be of vital concern to teachers, especially, will be the action taken by the lawmakers in their consideration of the proposed conversion of the present Teacher Retirement System into one of combination with Social Security.

Conclusion

May I again express my sincere thanks to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and cooperation received in our work together to provide good schools.
