

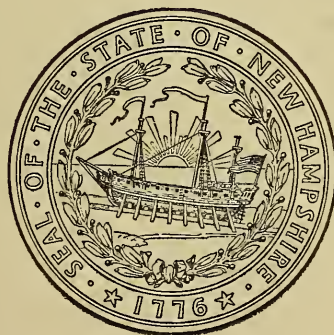

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

Carroll ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of Carroll, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kennett High School Auditorium at Conway, New Hampshire, March 11, 1958, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

- Section a. Town officers' salaries
- b. Town officers' expenses
 - c. Election and registration expenses
 - d. Municipal Court expenses
 - e. Expenses of town hall and other town buildings
 - f. Police department
 - g. Fire department
 - h. Insurance
 - i. Civil Defense
 - j. Health department
 - k. Vital statistics
 - l. Town office expense
 - m. Town dump
 - n. Town maintenance of highway, summer and winter
 - o. Libraries
 - p. Town poor
 - q. Old age assistance
 - r. Memorial Day
 - s. Soldiers' aid
 - t. Parks and playgrounds
 - u. Damage and legal expense
 - v. F.I.C.A.

- w. Interest on temporary loans and bonds
- x. Payment on bond issue
- y. County tax

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks mailed to all taxpayers on the property warrant records in preference to having the Selectmen distribute the blank inventories at the time they take their inventory of Head and Poll taxes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the town such sums of money as may be needed. Such sums not to exceed the combined School, Town and County tax budget, in anticipation of taxes raised for Town, County and School purposes.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.99 for Town Road Aid with the State contributing \$7,089.01 and to see if the town will raise and appropriate \$4,540.00 for Class IV Urban with the State contributing \$4,540.00.

Article 6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairs and grading the banks and slopes in front of the Greenhill Cemetery where same were damaged during T.R.A. construction in that section. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have the moderator appoint four members to the Municipal Budget Committee to replace those members whose appointments expire and to have the four outgoing members elected by ballot at all future town meetings until same is rescinded at some future town meeting.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to have the new properties appraised by the state tax appraisers and to see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for same. No amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to have the State Auditors audit the town accounts annually. Same to be continued until same be rescinded at some future town meeting.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to choose the members-at-large of the budget committee of said town by election at this and all future meetings of said town, each year annually. Agreeable to a petition signed by Burnham B. Davis and others.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to choose the members-at-large of the budget committee of said town by election by ballot at this and all future meetings of said town, each year annually. Agreeable to a petition signed by Burnham B. Davis and others.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take with regard to establishing a permanent Roll of Honor or Rolls of Honor com-

memorating the service of all persons who have served honorably in the armed services of the United States in time of war and whose name is not now contained on a permanent marker; this to replace the present Roll of Honor in the Railroad Station Park so-called in Conway Village, and raise and appropriate such a sum of money as may be necessary. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert W. Meserve and others. Such sums as may be necessary favored by the Budget Committee.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the use of the Redstone Fire department located at Redstone in the Town of Conway, N. H. Agreeable to a petition signed by John R. Moody and others. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to install a flashing traffic signal light overhead the turn in West Main Street near Kennett High School; and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation and maintenance of same. Agreeable to a petition signed by Walter H. Burnell and others. No recommendation by Budget Committee.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the Memorial Hospital in North Conway. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to reappropriate \$600.00 appropriated by Article 17 of 1957 Town Warrant, to cover cost of damage to water lines in connection with the reconstruction of East Main Street in Conway Village. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the general expenses of the information booth located in North Conway Village, and the sum of \$500.00 for the general expenses of the information booth located in Conway Village, and to pay said sums respectively over to the North Conway Chamber of Commerce and the Conway Chamber of Commerce to be expended for said general expenses of each such information booth respectively. Agreeable to a petition signed by William F. White and others. Above amounts recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 18. To see if the town will accept and hold in trust any sum or sums to be known as the Abbie L. McCall Cemetery Fund.

Article 19. To see if the town will accept and hold in trust any sum or sums to be known as the Percy F. Garland Cemetery Fund.

Article 20. To see if the town will accept and hold in trust any sum or sums to be known as the Francis H. Parsons Cemetery Fund.

Article 21. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sign a license granting an easement to Leon C. Bolduc and Elina A. Bolduc on south side of East Main Street, Conway Village, for the

purpose of installing and maintaining a water drainage pipe and appurtenances.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to prohibit the erection of any additional gasoline service station on either side of Main Street in Conway Village from the bridge over the Pequaket River to the junction of said Main Street with Pleasant and Washington Streets, for a period of three years. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lucille S. Marshall and others.

Article 23. To see if the Northeast corner of the North Conway Park shall be used for the holding of Bazaars by those organizations that have been allowed to use it in the past, for non-profit purposes, with no one organization having use of the Park for a period exceeding fourteen days.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to the White Mountain Region Association for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the Town in co-operation with the other forty-five towns in the Region. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard G. White and others. \$500 recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to reappropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 as reappropriated under Article 13 in last year's warrant, for the proper drainage of Mechanic Street in North Conway Village. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to defray the cost of perambulation of town lines. Above amount recommended by Budget Committee.

Article 27. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Citizens of Conway:

The following is my report for the year 1957.

The circulation records again show an increase in reading in spite of television and other interests. Circulation among adults showed an increase of 883 over 1956. Juvenile increase was 66; this figure was not high enough.

We have added many attractive children's books to our permanent collection, replacing outmoded children's classics with more attractive new editions for one thing. Likewise, we are gradually replacing the adult classics with more readable copies. Parents should encourage their children to make more use of the reading facilities of the library.

Realizing that some of our classifications have been weak, we are trying to build them up. This year, Miss Stroud from the State Library, met with Mrs. Shedd and Mrs. Glackens from the Trustees and myself. A list was made up of books covering the various phases of science. These were purchased and added to the science shelves. It is hoped that the art and drama shelves may be added to in the near future.

Gifts of money and books have been received, for which we are grateful. An anonymous donor enabled us to place in our reference section a set of Collier's Encyclopedias, which already is being much used. The balance from the same gift was used toward a book truck, which has been needed for a long time.

There have been 23 supervised visits to the library, where the history of the library and use of reference books, etc., have been given. Throughout the year there have been various displays, among them three art exhibits, a 4-H Club exhibit, an exhibit from the U. S. Forestry Service, Mrs. Richardson's astronomy class and the Eleta Kindergarten, who also entertained one morning in place of a Story Hour.

In all, we feel that it has been a good year.

Report of Police Department

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE

1957

Once again it is time to make a report to you, the people of Conway, for the year of 1957.

Last year, I rendered a very detailed report of the work done by the police department. This year, I am giving it to you in a shorter form with the work of 1957 compared against 1956.

I have tried to pick officers who have an interest in the work and still be a good public-relations officer.

Uniforms

We are still using some of the dyed clothing from last year for part-time officers, and during the year have purchased two new uniforms.

Safety Program

Again it was my pleasure to present a safety program to the schools of Conway, through the courtesy of the Motor Vehicle Department. This program was given to a total of 1,133 students.

Probation Set-up

During the year, I have had three cases where children have been on probation with this department. As you may recall from last year's report, this is our own private set-up and is not open to the public. I honestly feel it did some good for these young fellows.

Parking in Villages

The change in the parking on Main Street from angle to parallel in Conway, with a one-hour time limit, has been very helpful and has increased many places for the shopping public. In North Conway after the Main Street was completed, it was necessary to do something to relieve the congestion in front of the chain stores. It was necessary to make parallel parking from Mechanic Street to Pine Street. I have been asked several times by people as to why we do not have parking meters. I feel that for the present that perhaps it might be a good idea to have a one-hour time limit for the North Conway Main Street. It would mean that all the store owners and help would be making that many more spaces for shoppers.

Police Station

Nothing was done to the building this past year. We have tried to keep it as clean as possible, kept the grounds outside mowed and clean. During 1958, we are in hopes to have the inside painted.

Correspondence

There has been a large amount of correspondence during the year such as record checks, location of people, armed services, business firms, etc.

House Guests: 1956, 72 — 1957, 65

There has been a total of 65 persons who have stayed at the Police Station for a night's lodging. As in the past, we have provided a breakfast to the needy ones. This year, we spent less than \$5 as compared to about \$20 last year.

Warnings — 580

It is still the policy of this department to issue a warning whenever possible. We are ever mindful that many, many people are in our town for a first time. We try to help them every time that we can. This applies to the local people as well. 526 warnings were issued in 1956.

Unlocked Doors

Last year's report listed the names of the places whose doors were left unlocked and I know many have been more careful as compared to 1956. Conway, 25, and in 1957, 15 were found unlocked. North Conway, 1956, 10, and in 1957, nine were found unlocked. It is the custom of the department to call the owners to come and lock up except in a few cases. The lock could be snapped and a card or note placed under the door, signed by the officer, stating the time it was found unlocked.

Accidents: 1956, 70 — 1957, 67

- 43 accidents over \$50 damage
- 19 accidents minor, under \$50
- 3 persons hit by cars
- 1 person died at Skimobile (natural causes)
- 1 accidental shooting (foot)

Only four persons were treated at the hospital or by a doctor from these accidents.

Family Troubles: 1956, 13 — 1957, 9

It is always the same. We are called to these homes at all hours of the day and night and very seldom does either party wish to sign a complaint.

Special Functions

As in the past year, we have tried to take care of games, musicals, graduations, concerts, church sales, auctions, etc., as a public service.

Funerals

Our department has covered nearly all of the funerals in 1957. I have personally covered most of them myself.

Drunks: 1956, 35 — 1957, 15

We are happy to show a decrease in the number of drunks picked up during the year. It is true we have sobered off a few and taken them home, the rest have gone through the court.

Assistance to People — 12

These people have been helped in many ways such as gas, locating persons, relatives, information, keys locked in houses, etc.

I am indeed very grateful to Dan Noel for his work this past year. He has assisted the trooper and myself. He has done it on his own and through him I have been able to get a conviction in court several times.

Conclusion

1957 has been a very busy year for us. Construction of the Main Streets in both villages, traffic is getting heavier each year and requires a lot of our time. There being only two regulars, it makes us spread ourselves very thin. This fall, we have tried to cover more hours by one man coming on duty at 1 in the afternoon and the other from 6 to 2 a.m. It is hard to be covering so much territory. It costs money to run a car and we are limited on our gas. We try to cover as much of the town as a whole, sometime during the night as possible. Lots of times we are on the street, the telephone rings, off we go, not knowing how long it will take. Then some person will say later on, "where

in the devil is the Police Force, I never see them." We are on night duty and perhaps in the afternoon, someone tries to get out of a side street and has to wait two or three minutes. They find fault because one of us is not there.

The Town of Conway is steadily growing bigger all the time and our work is increasing rapidly. It is going to be necessary to add another man to cope with the day work in the very near future. I myself am on the go days and nights. Perhaps I might be working until 4 a.m.; I go to bed and what happens? About 7:30, 8, 9 or so, the telephone rings, my rest is gone and so many times these calls are so unimportant. There are weeks and weeks that I average 75 hours. I have had days and days that I have been on duty around town, on calls and investigations, 12 to 18 hours. Very seldom can I refer a call to another officer, as it is the Chief whom they wish to see or talk to.

During the past year of 1957, we have had real co-operation between the Sheriff's Department, the State Police, Motor Vehicle Department and the Fire Departments.

We try our best all the time. We do travel this town, especially places like East Conway and other parts of the town, usually it is late at night and all are in bed sound asleep. We also have a group who ride all night in their cars. We feel sure that different ones are stealing gas here and there, but must catch them in the act before we can take them in. We are ever watching for fires or anything else about town.

During the year, I wrote a piece which was published in The Reporter in regards to having a curfew for the town. I brought it to the attention of the parents, as so many times we were finding young children on the streets late at night, apparently with no concrete reason to be out. There are many things we have had to do during the year which would not look good in this report.

I would like to make a suggestion to any of you people: if you have any questions, come in and talk with us, just do not stand on the street corner or the post office and find fault. We are working for the town as a whole and not for a few. We try to be fair with everyone. It is so easy for a few to find fault, but ask these same ones to help sometime and see how quick they duck out of sight.

I wish to extend my sincere thanks to all who have supported us this past year.

I have watched our budget and have tried to make every dollar go as far as possible during the year. I was happy to finish the year with a small amount unexpended. It has been necessary for myself to do many, many extra jobs during the year.

REPORT OF OFFICE OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE

Selectmen of Town of Conway
Center Conway, New Hampshire
Dear Selectmen:

It was very gratifying to me that the town meeting voted my Civil Defense request for \$2,576. I immediately started proceedings to get the communication equipment for the town. After considerable preliminary work and meetings with the State Radio Co-ordinator, we have finally got the system worked out. I am only sorry that the equipment is not here. That is due to conditions beyond my control. There will be 11 mobile units and the North Conway and Conway Fire Departments have consented to pay the cost of a base station to be installed in the stations.

The Ground Observer Post in Conway is now equipped to be used in the winter. I am sorry that the G.O.C. will be on a stand-by basis as of January 1, 1958. This means that the group will be on call in a matter of a few hours. As reported in the newspapers, this curtailment was due to the advancement of radar nets around the country.

Our warning system needs to be revised so that all parts of the town can be warned very quickly – that is my goal for 1958. This I intend to work on this year.

We have a new group formed this year. I am very proud to say that we have the first Radiological Defense Group in Carroll County and one of the very few in the northern section of the state. This group is divided into two teams of five men. The purpose of these teams is to go out into the field when called upon to measure the degree of fallout in the area and report back their findings. This has to be done before any other units can start functioning. We have been given 10 instruments for this work with one more to come as soon as the teams are officially formed; on an indefinite loan basis.

There is another project that is due to be worked on this coming year; namely, the Survival Project. When completed, this will give information of every nature for the survival of people in the State and people that will be evacuated to the State.

I want to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped in the Civil Defense Activities during the past year.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in or near woodland. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires results from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects are far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forest, the protection forest provides for game, and the supply of ground water. They upset the local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Your local warden and his deputies are doing an excellent job in trying to prevent this shameful waste, but they must have the co-operation of the public and this means YOU. Remember, there are laws that cover the making of a camp fire, also the burning of rubbish or debris, and also the burning of brush whether this is on your land or land of other people, and to disobey these laws can cost you a great deal of money. So please see your local warden and he will tell you how to burn the rubbish, also when you can burn it, and also issue you a permit to do so if conditions are right.

In the "Keep America Green" program, there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we will call "I don't care." He is the person that builds a fire anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush, or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He also is very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called "I don't know any better" and the best way to describe him is he is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our valuable woodland being destroyed by fire. Even your homes can be burned by their carelessness.

It is up to you and you to report these two characters to your local forest warden whenever you see them operating. Remember, it is with your co-operation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

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**PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
MARCH 30, 1957**

Agreeably to the foregoing warrant, the meeting of the School District of Conway was called to order by Burnham B. Davis, Moderator, at 2:00 o'clock on March 30, 1957, and the warrant, certificate of posting and oath of posting were read. The certificate of posting and authenticity of the check lists were read.

On motion of Ralph L. Grindle, duly seconded, it was voted that the meeting take up Articles 1 through 5 simultaneously and take up 6 through 9 while continuing to ballot under Articles 1 through 5, and that the polls be closed not earlier than 6 p.m.

Under Article 6

On motion of Ralph L. Grindle, duly seconded, it was voted that the District raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred eighty-eight thousand, two dollars and twenty-six cents (\$388,002.26) for the support of schools, for salaries of School District officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Equalization Fund, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxation. Amendments to the above motion by Mrs. Irene Lucy, George Warren and Mrs. Macomber were offered. A vote being taken on each individually, they were lost.

Under Article 7

On motion of Robert S. Morrell, duly seconded, it was voted that the District accept the gift of a parcel of land in the Village of Conway, lying westerly and southerly of the Kennett High School Lot from Frank E. Kennett and Robert H. Kennett individually and as trustees, pursuant to their quit-claim deed to the District dated December 7, 1955, and their extension deed dated May 8, 1956, but subject to the covenants and restrictions set forth therein.

Under Article 8

On motion of Robert S. Morrell, duly seconded, it was voted that the District raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000) for the purchase of classroom and cafeteria equipment for the new elementary schools in the Villages of Conway and North Conway and that there be allocated to the sum so appropriated any unencumbered surplus funds of the District remaining on hand on June 30, 1957, and that any balance of said appropriation remaining after such allocation be raised by taxation.

Under Article 9

On motion of Dana Haley, duly seconded, it was voted that graduation exercises for the elementary schools in the Conway School District be included in the program set up by the School Board, these exercises to be of a formal nature with the presentation of diplomas,

exercises to be held separately for the several schools involved, within the village in which the school is located, at a meeting place large enough to accommodate parents and friends who wish to attend and at a time most suitable for parents of the members of the graduating class.

The polls were closed at 6:00 o'clock p.m. and the ballots counted.

To the Conway School Board:

The opening of our two new elementary schools is tangible evidence of the willingness of the people of Conway to pay for and to support new schools for our children. It is an expression of their faith in education, the youth of our country, and faith in our way of life and its institutions.

Good teaching presupposes good teachers. We have good teachers in our schools, but we must be concerned with the problem of securing and retaining our good teachers. The teacher shortage is the most serious problem confronting our schools today.

Throughout the country education is being discussed and debated as never before. This is also happening in Conway, but it is evident that these discussions will not only create a new and high level of interest and concern for the education of Conway's children, but also a

Our schools want and need citizens who will genuinely attempt to understand the purposes, programs and problems of our schools.

I want to express my deepest appreciation to you, the members of the school board, for the assistance given the administration, and for your untiring efforts toward the continued improvement of the instructional program of our schools.

REPORT OF SUPERVISING PRINCIPAL

KENNETT HIGH SCHOOL

February 11, 1958

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sir:

The experience as principal of A. Crosby Kennett High School has been and is a definite challenge. To effectively organize a school of this size, certain accepted practices of administration are necessary. The high school is a place of business and has to fulfill an educational need. With a strong, experienced faculty, such as ours, the high school can do exceptional work with the students.

The establishment of a library room in the high school has long been desired and it was only through the release of the grades from our building that this became possible. This room is now decorated with green curtains (made from Government surplus goods by the Home Economics' girls) and flame book shelves (painted and restored by the woodshop boys) and new tables. Before this can become a first-class library, we must invest in many reference books, reading books, magazines and newspapers. Our students would use this library extensively, if it is possible for us to expand our reading material in the next three years.

The introduction of girls' physical education has expanded and

enriched our curriculum. It has been a great contribution to the girls themselves. The program has resulted in better posture and more wholesome personality development. The girls enjoy the classes and are learning the value of co-operation, health (personal and general), poise, grooming and confidence in themselves.

Our testing program is designed to measure the progress of the individual students in high school. It is evident that much time needs to be devoted to guidance and there is a definite need for a trained guidance person in the high school. Although the homeroom teachers are acting as advisors, as are the other teachers in the faculty, there should be one trained person who can concentrate on parental conferences, vocational opportunities in industry, testing and the results, surveys of educational opportunities beyond high school and personality problems.

The teacher load in our history department has increased tremendously and with the expected increase of about forty students next year, it is highly recommended that we secure the services of another teacher to keep the ratio of the number of pupils per teacher at an effective level.

It is hoped that the athletic fields can be developed to have greater usefulness by our students. The baseball, track and softball areas need expansion and if, each year, one area can be accomplished it would not be too expensive.

The establishment of a course in music this year, under the direction of the music supervisor, Mr. Paul Mayerson, has enriched our program and a continuing expansion in music and art in the future is a real need.

The co-operation of the staff and your office has been of the highest type and this is deeply appreciated.

REPORT OF SUPERVISING PRINCIPAL CONWAY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

February 7, 1958

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sir:

I have the honor to submit herewith the first annual report for the new Elementary School and the Junior High School for the school year 1957-1958.

Conway is indeed fortunate in having well-qualified teachers in preparation, experience and in an intense interest in children. The special talents of these loyal and co-operative teachers have been exploited far more than could have been done while working in smaller isolated units.

One of the major aims of curriculum development is help the staff

“back up” and look at the total program of the school, so that they can “see” the relationships of their teaching and subject field to the over-all objectives of the school. With this in mind, I have spent a large portion of my time in studying past achievement tests, aptitude tests and the interest of pupils and parents in education. To date, I have been able to type, duplicate and distribute a course of study in Arithmetic for grades 1 through 6, which gives the sequential development of Arithmetic together with suggested methods of teaching.

I am at the present time working on two major projects:

1. Exercises and Games for Developing Recognition of Sight Words and Phrases.
2. The Sequential Development of Reading Skills and Abilities for Grades 1 through 8.

Miss Shirley Austin, the Physical Education teacher for the district, has given careful consideration to the selection of games and exercises which will provide and encourage opportunities for creative play. Our concern is for the development of sound physical bodies and good mental hygiene practices for children.

Mrs. Delema Mayhew, our cafeteria manager, and her assistants have done an excellent job in preparing attractive and well-balanced lunches. Over 200 pupils are now buying their full lunch at school.

Mr. Paul Mayerson has been most co-operative in his efforts to organize and carry out a workshop for the improvement of the teaching of music in our schools. This is a time-consuming project and will take many weeks to complete.

At our first faculty meeting in September, each teacher was requested to reserve each Monday afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock for faculty meetings. We have taken advantage of the majority of these afternoons and devoted many others to conferences.

There is a keen interest in, and a desire for, the changes that have and are taking place in our educational program. Both teachers and pupils like working in their new surroundings and have taken a pride in their new building. Our desire is for our program to be in keeping with our new building and our efforts will be toward this end.

We started our testing program during the fall months to measure the growth and individual needs of our pupils. Each teacher will, I am certain, do all in her power to achieve a maximum growth and development for her pupils. We are particularly anxious that each child understand the value of education in our rapidly changing environment.

Arrangements were made during the fall months at the Conway Public Library for library instruction for grades 3 through 8. Mrs. Persis Berry has been most co-operative and successful in this project. It is my hope that parents will find time in which to help their children use the library facilities more often. As the twig is bent, so grows the tree.

Many thanks for your confidence in my leadership and for your support in our program.

REPORT OF SUPERVISING PRINCIPAL

JOHN H. FULLER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

February 7, 1958

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sir:

The basic requirement for measuring the standard and the progress of education in the public school is the requirement of meeting the needs of the community children enrolled in the school.

For example, we determine the adequacy of our building facilities, not so much by comparison with other schools, as by a consideration of the particular needs of our own students in respect to the floor space needed for our enrollment of 284, for proper lighting, for proper ventilation, for adequate equipment, for lunch programs and for physical education.

We "discover" the needs of students by studying the child through a program of teacher evaluation of students based upon group and individual tests with national norms, by parent conferences, by physical examination, by observation of characteristics of mental health, by observation of social behavior, and by accounting for the characteristics of physical growth, of mental and emotional growth and of growth in individual responsibility.

The John H. Fuller school faculty is a professional staff with considerable educational experience and deep loyalty to the community it serves. Continuous progress is being maintained by the faculty in the two-fold job of discovering the needs of individual students and of providing a curriculum of educational experiences that meet the requirements of student needs.

Our testing program is becoming comprehensive. In addition to achievement tests for all students, IQ tests are given to all first-grade students and to incoming students. Group diagnostic reading tests for determining reading level and knowledge of reading skills are being given to all students in grades one through four covering instruction in all basic reading texts. The Durrell-Sullivan individual diagnostic reading test is used in all grades for individuals who require more specific tests in reading skills.

Considerable time is being devoted in the construction and analytic use of an individual arithmetic test for use in grades one through six.

Parent conferences are becoming more frequent and effective. For example, from January 14 to February 4, thirty-seven parents were called for conferences by the supervisor. During the week of January 24-31, principal-teacher conferences following teacher-parent conferences determined that nine students had been effectively programmed by tests, study of records, parent conferences, teacher-pupil conferences and program recommendations. From January 1 to February 7, 72 parent-teacher conferences were held.

All students have had eye-ear, height-weight examinations and grades one, four and seven have had hospital examinations.

Plant facilities for education are excellent. In most subject areas of learning, materials and supplies are adequate.

Having the advantage of an excellent building, of proper materials and supplies, of a proper knowledge of the child, and of proper professional training, the teacher who has "discovered" the needs of the child by professional analysis begins instruction by grouping, the level of achievement being the determining factor.

It is noteworthy that grouping in grade one, the class having been divided by the addition of a teacher, has made it possible for some students, upon the recommendation of the supervisor, to proceed with second grade level reading.

It is also a fact that grouping the two fourth grades has shown a marked increase of achievement, and the class median in all subjects is consistent without extreme ranges in achievement.

To help meet the needs of our students, the curriculum has been expanded.

Physical education classes are being instructed. A revised music program provides for grouping within the class allowing (1) rapid learners to learn at a fast rate, and (2) more individual instruction in music for voice and note reading.

An arithmetic curriculum of minimum essentials has been established. It compares favorably with the best programs of instruction available in public education. A similar curriculum is being prepared in reading.

Our cafeteria program is a part of our curriculum. Over 200 students participate in the program daily, and 14 students assist the program in responsible positions.

Nearly 40 students have similar responsibilities in the school apart from their classroom activity.

A Junior Hi-Y program has been organized, and it is developing an organized program for indoor activity during inclement weather.

Our Junior Ski Program operates by a definite set of rules for participation.

The North Conway Library instructs one class each week in library education, and with its co-operation our school library is being assembled.

It is most gratifying to account that an increasing number of citizens are visiting our school for an evaluation of the educational program.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

1956 - 1957

The school health program is designed to raise the health standard of all pupils; to know what is good for one's health; to help parents to know where they can go for desired help outside of the community. The formations and extension of desirable practices, attitudes and understandings associated with nutrition and growth; relaxation; rest and sleep; activity; fresh air and sunshine; elimination; cleanliness and care of teeth, body and clothing; importance of and means of securing dental and medical attention; control of infections; care of eyes and ears; posture; safety; and emotional and social adjustments.

In the fall of 1956, 373 physical examinations were done. All pupils desiring the examination from the first, fourth, seventh and 10th grades were done at the hospital. The pupils out for sports who were not done at the hospital were done at Kennett High School by Dr. William Duprey, Jr.

During the year, 717 first, second or third shots were given of the Salk Polio Vaccine; 450 patch test, 36 chest X-rays were taken; 712 vision tests were done, 12 vision defects discovered and 10 of these were corrected; 507 hearing tests were done, 20 defects were discovered and 10 have received treatment. In the fall and spring, an orthopedic clinic was held at the Memorial Hospital. Dr. Halfman from Laconia was the orthopedic specialist, and Dr. Ursula Sanders of the State Department of Health was the medical examining physician. Sixteen pupils attended; two treatment centers were held at Kennett High School for the checking of exercises of the orthopedic defects, and an average of 12 to 16 pupils attended.

Forty-nine pre-school pupils attended the pre-school Summer Round-up. Each child was weighed and measured, teeth checked by dental hygienist; and parents were advised as to the importance of immunization that are available for polio, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

I want to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation to everyone who has helped to make this program possible.
