



Town Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of Dalton, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dalton on Tuesday, the 8th of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects. The polls will open at 11:00 o'clock.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will accept the Budget for 1955 as prepared by the Selectmen and make appropriation of the amounts therein or to make any changes.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.55 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1/100th of one percent of the Town Valuation.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$65.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$50.00 for Civilian Defense, and make appropriation for same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen the rights to issue temporary loans on the anticipation of Taxes.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Thirty-One thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-Five dollars (\$31,735.00) for the construction of a new road beginning at the Littleton Line on the Manns Hill Road and ending at the State Road: The loan to be repaid over a period of ten (10) years with State B. Funds contributing \$4,139.00 and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To choose an auditor for the ensuing year.
6. To hear the reports of officers, auditors or committees of the district and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 as a capital reserve fund for the construction of a new central school, said funds to be placed in the custody of the trustees of trust funds and reserved for the construction of a new central school in accordance with the Laws of 1943, Chapter 160 as amended by the Laws of 1945, Chapter 35 and Laws of 1947, Chapter 8.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools. for the salaries of school officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Dalton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your school.

This past year brought one change in the faculty in the school. Mrs. Shirley Aldrich resigned to accept a similar position in the Lancaster school system. Mrs. Marian Clarkson of Whitefield, a graduate of Keene Normal School with 15 years' teaching experience, was elected to fill this vacancy in Grades five and six.

The enrollment this year in the six grades is 81 compared with a total of 89 last year. There are 29 pupils enrolled in the elementary grades in Whitefield and 39 in the high school.

The excellent report of the school nurse will be found on separate pages of this report.

This past summer the toilet facilities for boys were increased and booths were provided.

A three day workshop in the Improvement of Reading was held in September which was helpful to all teachers. Consultants from the State Department of Education, Plymouth Teachers College and Scott Foresman Company were present and rendered valuable assistance.

The school lunch program sponsored by the Community Club is operating very efficiently. New tables were furnished by the district, a six burner gas stove was purchased along with a gas hot water heater and tank. Members of the Community Club cleaned and painted the basement room and built shelves and work areas. It seems fitting at this time to mention the work of the Community Club that was organized in 1951 with only 26 members and has grown to a total of 70 at the present time. During the past four years this group has raised over \$2,600.00. Over \$2,000.00 has been used for the betterment of your community, especially the school and its pupils. The major projects

sponsored by the club include the new large water tank in the school, examination of pre-school children, school lunch program, dental clinics and the cleaning and painting of the basement room in the school. Special mention should be made of the work of Mrs. Eleanor Bell who gave full time to the school lunch program last year at no charge. The interest and cooperation of this group is sincerely appreciated by everyone.

Your school is provided with adequate supplies, textbooks and teaching aids. All teachers are members of the local teachers' association and the State Education Association.

The appropriation called for this year is only slightly higher than this past year. If state aid should be increased by the legislature this spring, I would expect Dalton to receive as much aid as it did these past two years with the possibility of a slight increase.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, teachers and citizens for their continued cooperation.

HEALTH REPORT

To Superintendent and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit my report as school nurse.

Our 1954-55 health program started with posture talks in all grades and with the combined efforts of the teachers an attempt was made to seat children so as to help them maintain good posture. Parents should feel a real responsibility to see that their children stand tall and sit tall. Good health is dependent on good posture.

All children were weighed, measured and received head inspections three times during the year. No pediculosis was found. Three cases of ringworm were detected in winter of 1954 and treated.

Hearing tests were done in November on sixty-nine students with the American Legion Maico audiometer. No serious cases of hearing defects were noted.

Visual Acuity tests were done with the Snellen Eye Chart on seventy-seven pupils. All defects were reported and many corrections made.

Seven children were examined by an eye doctor and

were fitted to glasses by means of the financial assistance of our State Sight Conservation program.

One pupil was taken to Berlin Orthopedic Clinic in Berlin on March 19th for which we are grateful to Mr. Cushman for using his car for transportation. This same pupil went to Crotched Mt. Clinic in April for observation. Later he spent two months at the Foundation for exercises and rehabilitation.

One pupil attended Child's Guidance Clinic in Littleton.

Four very necessary tonsillectomies were done by family doctors. The change in the general condition and health of a child after removal of diseased tonsils is outstanding.

A small epidemic of mumps occurred in the spring of 1954. Twenty-six cases were recorded. There was one case of old fashioned measles and a few cases of skin ringworm.

Six pupils received immunization shots for whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus at a clinic in Whitefield sponsored by our State Health Department and under the direction of Miss Gladys Blasland, R. N. I am grateful to Mrs. Maurice Bell for transporting these children three times.

On April 19th, Mrs. Gladys Fancy, R. N., District Tuberculosis Nurse, Patch tested sixty-five pupils and three teachers. Six positive reactions were noted. All were urged to have an x-ray.

I want to take this opportunity to thank and praise the members of the Dalton Community Club for the splendid worthwhile projects they are sponsoring. They are certainly helping to build stronger and healthier future citizens.

The dental program in itself is a tremendous project. Almost a hundred percent of the school enrollment benefit. We have been most fortunate to have two hygienists from the State Health Department come to the school and clean and give four Fluorine treatments to all children with parents' permission. Parents should feel an added responsibility to keep up the good work started in the clinic. It has been discovered that poor vision may result from decayed teeth.

Physical examinations were done in September by Dr. Provost on all first graders, and in November on all second graders. This program was also sponsored by the Community Club.

By hard work the Club turned a basement room into a very useful cafeteria. A fine hot lunch program has been in effect since Thanksgiving. The teachers have noticed renewed vigor after lunch since this program has been in effect.

I have attended two Regional Health Conferences and one Eye Institute.

I gratefully appreciate the fine cooperation of all the teachers in regard to any health problem. Their careful observation and interest help greatly in early detection of symptoms.

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during the hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires—all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESSNESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple—your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
2. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that **FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS** and our **MOST IMPORTANT** undertaking!
