MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Second Inaugural Address of Mayor Joseph D. Guppy delivered before the City Councils :

By the choice of our fellow citizens, and through the permission of Divine Providence, we have assembled to-day and bound ourselves by an oath to faithfully manage the affairs of the city.

We have accepted this trust of our own free-will, knowing its responsibilities, and aware that the approbation of our fellow citizens and the approval of our own consciences will constitute our reward.

In looking over the published accounts of the city we find almost without exception, that the addresses, in pointing out the duties of the citizen and the city officer, urge the necessity of doing all things absolutely necessary for the well being of the public, and the inexpediency of creating an additional debt, except upon some most extraordinary occasion.

It seems that our predecessors who received this advice, heeded it to such an extent in the twenty-three years of our municipal existence that in sixteen years the debt was increased, in two remained stationary, and in five a part was paid.

In 1855, the date of the city charter, the debt was (\$3,800)

thirty-eight hundred dollars. To-day we have a debt of two hundred thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars, notes and bonds, besides our railroad liabilities, to be relieved by uncollected taxes on hand.

Our present liabilities were increased because of the war, by reason of assuming school district debts, on account of building school houses and bridges, and in part by exceeding the appropriations in other directions. Now is this debt a pleasant thing to contemplate? Do you understand our constituents wish to have it increased during our term of office? But if the debt is not to be increased, we must raise and appropriate a sufficient sum to meet the current expenses of the city, *and then keep within bounds.*

In making appropriations, your attention will be called particularly to the Schools, the Fire Department, Highways, Bridges, Sewers, Sidewalks and Cemetery.

SCHOOLS.

The Board of Instruction will report the condition and wants of this department in March, and to that report I must refer you for information.

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

has been looked after by as efficient a committee as this or any other city ever placed in power. The committee, engineers and members have worked harmoniously and may well feel proud of the success attending their efforts.

HIGHWAYS AND STREETS.

The surface materials of the earth over the whole territory of the city, are stone, sand and clay. Of these it is difficult to make good road beds. Turnpiking and draining, with gravel or crushed stone, afford good results; but the stone process is costly, and a good gravel bed has not been discovered within

the city limits. There are some thin strata of gravel that can be obtained by purchase and at expense of carting long distances. Deposits more conveniently located can be obtained only by taking for highway purposes and awarding damages.

Our Superintendent of Streets has been efficient, careful and trustworthy.

For sewers, sidewalks and the cemetery, reasonable appropriations should be made.

DOVER AND PORTSMOUTH RAILROAD.

The dispute about the amount of dividend on the stock of the Dover & Portsmouth Railroad has been referred to three of the Supreme Court Judges. A hearing and decision may be expected soon. We borrowed the money for the July dividend (or to pay the Company at four per cent.) The January dividend for 1880 has been paid by the Eastern Railroad Co. Said payment to be without prejudice to the Company.

Besides these important municipal interests there will be many other matters of public concern to engage your attention.

The citizens of Dover have always approved independent thought, honesty of purpose and liberality in deed; but they are more than ever disposed to demand that their officers shall temper all with prudence and sagacity.

While engaged in public affairs, let us put aside all individual interests and discharge our duties faithfully and impartially, not forgetting that for these as well as our more personal obligations, we shall be held accountable before the bar of public opinion, and at the final judgment of our Heavenly Father.

To his Honor the Mayor, and the City Councils of the City of Dover:—

GENTLEMEN:—As Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, I herewith most respectfully submit my sixth annual report, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1879, embracing a detailed statement of its labors, together with a roll of its members, list of fires and alarms that have occurred, with amount of loss and insurance, as near as could be ascertained, location of reservoirs, and general condition of the department.

I am pleased to say that some improvements have been made in this department during the year just closed, among which may be mentioned, the Hook and Ladder house has been moved up First Street near Charles H. Trickey & Co's stable.

Thirty (30) new coats for our hosemen have been purchased by the Fire Committee, and distributed as follows:—To Cocheco Hose Company No. 1, 10; to Steamer No. 2, 8; to Steamer No. 3, 8; To Tiger No. 2, 4; total 30.

A new Reservoir has been built on Payne Street, which adds to our strength to combat the devouring element in that vicinity. Unitarian Pond has been tapped, and a water pipe carried to Atkinson Street, where two water plugs are set ready for immediate use in case of fire in that section of the City.

A new Reservoir has been located on Hough Street, near the residence of Mr. Thomas Bennett, which, when completed will furnish us with new facilities in that direction.

Two thousand feet (2000) of new leading hose have been purchased the past year by a vote of your Honorable Body, 1000 feet of which have been conveyed to Cocheco Hose Company No. 1.

The joint standing committee on Fire Department are Messrs. Abbott, Dame and Shepard. I hold these gentlemen in high esteem, for the deep interest they have manifested in this department. We have had several interesting meetings together, discussing matters concerning the interests of the City, and the duties and wants of the Firemen. Each of the above named gentlemen has been a Fireman and knows something of a life of a Fireman. They also seem to have acted

upon Mayor Guppey's suggestion in his opening address. "Dover is a city of wooden buildings, and our preservation lies in being prepared."

To his Honor the Mayor, for his generous disposition to aid this department, my thanks are eminently due and are hereby tendered.

I desire to acknowledge my indebtedness to the City Clerk, John B. Stevens, Jr., for information obtained, and courtesies shown me.

Marshal Rines and his force, for sounding the alarm, and coming to the rescue and assisting in discharging the duties of my station, will please accept my thanks.

To my worthy assistants of the rank and file of this department, I am under lasting obligations. I wish you one and all a prosperous and happy New Year.

In closing this report I am most happy to say that I find this department to be a unit, and good feeling prevails throughout. In my opinion it was never in better condition than at the present time.

ANNUAL REPORT

—OF THE—

SUP'T OF STREETS AND HIGHWAYS.

To his Honor the Mayor, and gentlemen of the City Councils :

I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the nine months ending Dec. 31, 1879.

The appropriations for this department for the year was \$13,000. Of this amount about \$3,300 was expended by my predecessor.

I have applied about 2206 loads of gravel and sand and 500 loads of crushed stone to the streets.

The nine months, during which I have held the responsible position of Superintendent of Streets and Highways, have been fraught with much anxiety, but although the business was new to me, I have met with no serious difficulties. The joint committee on this department has aided me in a consistent and encouraging manner.

I find that our clayed soil becomes muddy under very little rain, and long continued spells of wet weather make our very best streets temporarily impassable to foot travel.

It has been my aim to get rid of the mud. I am of the

opinion that gravel ought to be exclusively used for grading, and that the cost of hauling clay and sand may be better turned to getting out crushed stone from our handy ledge. And in this connection, I desire to say, that I believe it to be economical to use good material, if the first cost is large, rather than to keep constantly patching and repairing. And I deem it of great importance that the stone should be put on and rolled with as little covering as possible. Indeed, it seems to me to be quite impossible to make substantial roads on clayed soil in any other way.

Upon entering on the duties of my office I found a good many old wooden boxes and bridges in use for drive-ways. It is hardly necessary to say that such contrivances, by icing up in winter, give a vast deal of trouble. I have taken out a good many, much to the satisfaction of abutters.

Considerable observation convinces me that our crossings should be formed of flat stone and paved.

In the matter of sidewalks there can be no doubt but that bricks are preferable to concrete. Experienced persons declare that bricks well laid will last from sixteen to twenty years, while as a rule, on clayed soil, concrete will not last half that time.

In order to secure durability of sewerwork great care is required in the selection of material—the best always being the cheapest in the end. Until within a few years a large number of small sewers have been made of wood. They have proved very expensive and unwholesome. I have taken out one thousand feet and laid substantial cement pipe. In all I have laid this year five thousand and eight feet of sewers.

The city now owns 9 horses, 2 of which are kept constantly in the engine house for use of Fire Department; 3 carts, 4 harnesses, and other equipments; a complete list of which is given in this report.

COMMITTEE ON GAS LIGHTS.

The Committee found this Department in a very bad condition. Many of the lanterns were unfit for use, and were replaced with new ones. There seemed to have been a lack of system in the management of this Department. An arrangement was entered into with the Gas Company by which the Company have furnished the gas, and have done the lighting at a fixed sum per light. This plan has resulted in a great saving to the city.

The following statement will show the result of the new system, as compared with the old.

Expense of this Department for 1878 was about \$2900, and the number of lights 97.

Expenses for 1879 \$3,468.15, and the number of lights at this time is, 111 gas, and six gasoline, total 117, being an increase of 20 lights during the year.

The number of hours per night that the lights have been kept burning during the year, has been increased, as has also the number of nights per month, as follows :

Number of lights in 1878, 97. These were burned 4 hours per night, 15 nights per month.

Number of lights in 1879, 117, and were burned $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours per night, 20 nights per month.

Or more definitely :

An increase of $\frac{1}{8}$ per night in time of burning ; $\frac{1}{3}$ increase in number of nights per month ; and an increase of more than one fifth in number of lights. Total increase 66 per cent. \$2900, (the cost of 1878) increased by 66 per cent. would make the cost for 1879 \$4,814, instead of \$3,468.

By this it will be seen that the new system has saved to the city in lights and money \$1,346.

This department is now in good condition.

HIGHWAY DISTRICTS.

ESTABLISHED BY CITY COUNCILS, MARCH 20, 1865.

Resolved, I. That Highway District No. One be extended to the junction of Back River and Durham Roads.

II. That Highway Districts Nos. Two and Three be added to and included in Highway District No. One.

III. That Highway District No. Twenty-two be extended to the large Elm tree east of E. Faxon's house.

IV. That so much of Highway District No. Twenty-three as runs from Rebecca Pinkham's gate to the turn of the road near Andrew T. Robert's dwelling-house, be disannexed from said District No. Twenty-three, and annexed to and made part of Highway District No. Fourteen; and so much as runs from the turn of the road near the dwelling-house of Samuel H. Hanson to Nathaniel Carlton's dwelling-house, be disannexed from said District No. Fourteen, and annexed to and made part of Highway District No. Twenty-three.

V. As established September 19, 1872. That so much of Highway District No. Eight, as lies between the junction of Sixth and Grove streets and the westerly end of the Brick House, owned by John B. Hull, be disannexed from the said District No. Eight, and added to and made part of Highway Districts Nos. One, Two and Three.

DISTRICT NO. 1—Shall embrace all the streets, lanes and alleys in the compact part of the city, also Locust (formerly High) street to its head, Arch street, Silver and Washington streets to their junction with Arch, Fourth to its junction with Tolend road, Brick street to its junction with Grove street, Franklin street to its junction with Chestnut street at the house of Capt. Porter, the Rollins road to its junction with Fresh Creek road, the Turnpike to Rollinsford line, Rogers street to the Gulf road west of Cushing's Mills, Payne street to the culvert beyond Platte's Hill, Mt. Pleasant to Cross road to Neck road near James Caton's house, Pleasant street to John Meserve's house and to head of Locust street.

DISTRICT No. 2—Shall begin at Cushing's Mills, thence to James McDuffee's gate, the old road by Capt. James B. Guppy's to Fresh Creek road, and Fresh Creek road east to the Rollins road to Rollinsford line.

DISTRICT No. 3—Shall begin on Franklin Street at the house of Capt. Porter, near the corner of Chestnut street, thence to the house of Levi Sawyer on Garrison Hill, including the Fresh Creek road, west of the Rollins road.

DISTRICT No. 4—Shall begin at the house of Levi Sawyer on Garrison Hill, thence to Gage's Hill and to the junction of Rochester and Gt. Falls roads, by Mr. Haley's house to Rollinsford line, and by George Page's house to Thomas Currier's.

DISTRICT No. 5—Shall begin at Somersworth line near Henderson's house, thence down to Gage's Hill by both roads and

to the junction of the Rochester and Gt. Falls road to Somersworth line.

DISTRICT No. 6—Shall begin at Somersworth line on Blackwater road, thence to the Rochester and Somersworth lines.

DISTRICT No. 7—Shall begin at Reynard's brook, south of David Sargent's house, thence by said Sargent's house to Rochester line; also the road leading by the school-house to the railroad crossing, and the road to Moses Farnham's.

DISTRICT No. 8—Shall begin at the junction of Grove and Brick streets, thence by the house of Ezra Kimball to Indian Brook; also the road by Richard Kimball's house to the house of Mr. Fuller, thence to the railroad crossing near the Whittier bridge; also the Upper Factory road, from the school-house to the south side of the bridge.

DISTRICT No. 9—Shall begin at Indian Brook near the house of Oliver S. Horne, thence by the house of Joseph W. Bennett to the railroad crossing on the cross road, and to the railroad crossing near the Almshouse, and by the house of Paul Horne to the house of Moses Farnham.

DISTRICT No. 10—Shall begin at the railroad crossing near the Almshouse, thence by the house of Timothy H. Snell to Rochester line, the road leading to John Trickey's farm, and the cross road by the house of Horace Kimball to the railroad crossing.

DISTRICT No. 11—Shall begin at Dover Point, thence to the junction of the roads near the house of the late Jeremy Roberts.

DISTRICT No. 12—Shall begin at John Meserve's house, thence to the bridge below Stephen Austin's house.

DISTRICT No. 13—Shall begin at the junction of the roads near the house of the late Jeremy Roberts, thence to the red

school-house, and main road to and across the bridge below Stephen Austin's house, with all the cross roads.

DISTRICT No. 14—Shall begin at Amaziah Brownell's house, thence by the house of Nicholas Varney to Nathaniel Carlton's house and the Cowan road.

DISTRICT No. 15—Shall begin at the culvert at Platte's Hill, thence by Samuel Hanson's, 2d, to the old road and the Amos Burrows road.

DISTRICT No. 16—Shall begin at the house of James Wentworth, thence to Spruce Lane, the David and Samuel Tuttle roads, the new road to Reynold's bridge, and the road to Madbury line.

DISTRICT No. 17—Shall begin at the head of Locust street, thence to Spruce Lane, the Mast road to Reynold's bridge, the Drew and the Spruce Lanes.

DISTRICT No. 18—Shall begin at the Madbury line, thence by Simon J. Torr's house to Dunn's bridge, the Mast road to Reynold's bridge, and the Pudding Hill to Madbury line.

DISTRICT No. 19—Shall begin at the house of Joshua Trickey, thence by the house of Wm. Twombly to Madbury line, and from said road by Richardson's Mill to the Durham road, and then from said road to the farm of Joseph Bailey, and from said road to the Hanson shop (so-called.)

DISTRICT No. 20—Shall begin at the house of Robert Christy, thence to Madbury line by J. Cook's house, and to Madbury line by the house of J. F. Kelley, thence on cross road to the house of Wm. W. Wiggin, and on cross road by the house of Joseph Bailey to the farm of O. K. Hayes.

DISTRICT No. 21—Shall begin at the junction of the roads near the house lately owned by H. G. Otis, thence by the

house of Ephraim Ham to Ebenezer Faxon's blacksmith shop, and both cross roads leading from said road across the Whittier bridge to the railroad crossing ; also the cross road to Wm. W. Wiggin's, and the cross road to the Upper Factory bridge.

DISTRICT No. 22—Shall begin at Ebenezer Faxon's blacksmith shop, thence by the house of Frank Brawn to Barrington line, the road to Rochester line, the road to Madbury line, and cross road over the Watson bridge to the railroad crossing.

DISTRICT No. 23—Shall begin at the junction of the roads near the house of Andrew T. Roberts, thence by Ivory Paul's house to the junction of the roads near Samuel H. Hanson's house, and the cross road to Mrs. Pinkham's.
