In July our steamer so gave out that it could not be used. I had it examined by an expert from Manchester, who said it would require a new boiler and must be thoroughly overhauled. We had a spare steamer come to take the place of ours, so we were not without the use of an engine. Our steamer was sent to Manchester and thoroughly repaired. It is now in as good working order as the day it came to town.

We are fairly well supplied with hose, having added two thousand feet to the department the past year.

The apparatus under my charge is in very good condition, but with the unusual amount of work the past year there is a great deal

of wear and tear. Our hook and ladder truck is not heavy and strong enough for the work it has to do. What I would advise another year would be to place the truck we now have in the shoe shop neighborhood and buy a heavier one to place in the hook and ladder house on Court street.

In conclusion, I desire to extend my sincere thanks to the engineers and firemen for faithful discharge of their duties, and promptness at fires.

The Robinson Seminary.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF ROBINSON FEMALE SEMINARY :

For the past year the work of our school has been characterized by few interruptions and most fortunate exemption from sickness to any extent of either teachers or pupils. By removal of families from town we have lost a number of valued pupils. But we have been fortunate in receiving into our different classes an unusually large number of fine scholars and earnest girls from surrounding towns and cities.

I take this opportunity gratefully to acknowledge many valuable gifts to the school, and its cabinets and collections; to the cabinet of birds, specimens from Miss Constance Fuller, Miss Nora Manix, Miss Emma Kruger, Miss Elsie Fuller, Mr. Albion Hayes, Miss M. C. Moulton, Miss Nellie Greaney, and Mr. S. M. Brown, of Randolph, N. H.; trees and shrubs have been donated for planting in the Seminary grounds by Mr. George E. Stokell and Rev. George E. Street. Dr. Abner L. Merrill has contributed and planted at his own expense a fine row of young trees on the south side of the grounds, and set out many trees in the vicinity of the pond. Mrs. E. H. Gilman has presented a very large and beautiful palm; Mr. H. W. Anderson, a collection of West Indian shells. Dr. Abner L. Merrill has given to the library a very commodious and handsome bookcase, and also the sum of one thousand dollars for a book purchasing fund.

In supplement to the regular instruction of the school, I have been able to secure to our pupils the benefit of several lectures and addresses. In May, Prof. William H. Goodyear, of Brooklyn, gave two very fine illustrated lectures on "Egypt, Past and Present." In the same month we were very fortunate to secure the presence of and an address from Mrs. Julia Ward Howe on the occasion of the award of the Burlingame bread prizes. Later in the same term,

Mr. H. W. Anderson gave to the pupils of the Geography and Natural History classes a most entertaining and instructive talk upon San Salvador, and a recent voyage among the islands of the West Indies. In the autumn term, Mr. Ernest Ingersoll, of New York, gave an illustrated lecture, "A Naturalist in British Columbia," and in the winter term, Prof. Clarence M. Weed, of Durham, was heard on "Methods of Arranging Flowers." In this connection I desire to make grateful acknowledgement to Principal Amen and the faculty of the Phillips Academy, for many invitations extended to our teachers and pupils to attend the fine lectures given in the Academy chapel during the fall and winter terms.

It is our duty to meet and as far as possible anticipate educational demands. We have striven to organize and maintain a general academic course, to be completed by girls of good ability with reasonable application in four years. That academic course in scope, in electives, and in the thoroughness with which it is carried out will compare favorably with the courses offered in secondary schools for girls anywhere in the country.

The course, however, does not contemplate nor provide, except incidentally, for the preparation of girls for college. But there is a demand for college preparation, and we are meeting it as best we can. We have now several girls in college admitted on the Seminary's certificate, and most gratifying reports of their standing are sent us by the college authorities. We are doing this work under a good many disadvantages, and at the expenditure of a good deal of extra toil by the teachers. But we are glad to do the college work. It is work congenial to us all; brings to us a desirable class of pupils, and adds to the tone and character of the school.

Our teaching force in the Academic department is barely sufficient to do the work of that course with its several electives in the best manner. That course cannot be expanded or curtailed or greatly changed without detriment. And to maintain the general academic course at its best—that course which will always be chosen by the majority of our girls, and by those girls whose educational privileges end with their school career, is in accordance with the expressed wish of our founder and essential to the prosperity of our school.

Pupils who wish to prepare for college are constantly tempted to pursue the interesting and tempting subjects offered in the general course not prescribed by the colleges, and the result is education, but not preparation, for meeting college requirements.

A third, and perhaps the most serious, difficulty lies in the fact that our girls, their parents, or both, do not reach the determination to prepare for college until late in the course, oftentimes until the pupil is ready for graduation from the regular course. The consequence is they come back to us after graduation, when they are always very welcome, but with the realization on their part and ours that we could have done much better for them if they had reached that decision for a college course three years earlier. Another difficulty lies in the fact that our girls are not all preparing for the same college, and that the certificate requirements for the different colleges vary in a number of particulars. All colleges offer a choice of admission, with Greek or a maximum of a modern language, and as the pupils are never all of one mind, we have to form and maintain classes in both subjects.

In my opinion, these difficulties could be remedied by establishing two distinct courses in the Academic department and giving two diplomas. The present general course of four years should remain substantially as it is, and might be designated the "Latin Scientific Course." A course could then be formulated, known as the "Classical Course," which should be strictly a college preparatory curriculum covering four years, broad enough to allow a pupil a choice of admission and minute enough to provide for all the details and differences of requirements for admission to most of the leading colleges for women.

The Seminary would then issue college certificates only to those who graduate from that course.

The two courses might be identical for the first half year. But at the end of that time the question of the course to be pursued should be definitely settled. From the middle of the first year, in many subjects, the pupils of the two courses would need to recite in distinct divisions and with differing instruction.

The two courses cannot be carried on with our present teaching force in the Academic department. But I think they can with one

additional teacher, who is competent and willing to teach quite a number of subjects.

I know that the question of funds will need to be carefully considered. But I make this suggestion with the knowledge of your desire to do all for the advancement of the school that wise economy will allow. The income from the tuitions of non resident pupils is yearly increasing, has already become a substantial sum, and the outlook for a considerable increase of revenue from that source for the coming year is very bright.

The advantages that would accrue from the adoption of such a course I feel would be substantial and many. I think parents would be induced to meet and settle the question whether their daughters should go to college or not at the beginning of their course, and that would be an unspeakable boon to us teachers.

Such a course would add to the number of our tuition paying pupils and bring to us a most desirable class of girls. And if our teaching force is not overtaxed by the work of the two courses, the departure would add to rather than detract from the value of the regular Academic course, which must always be the first consideration in our Seminary.

Knowing that these suggestions will receive your thoughtful consideration and thanking you for your many courtesies to the Faculty of the Seminary, I respectfully submit this report.

The Library closes its forty-seventh year with manifold and increasing proofs of its usefulness to young and old, and of its appreciation by those who seek practical information and by those who read mainly for entertainment. The latter class is a feeder to the former, for the study of light literature is pretty sure to develop a taste for more solid topics. At all events, the seekers for real knowledge in all its departments are yearly increasing among us. This mental activity, for which the Library is largely, and it is believed chiefly responsible, is often illustrated by a call for profound treatises by persons whom one would not expect to be interested in scientific details or abstruse thought. Constant reading is a powerful stimulant to minds which otherwise might remain stagnant, and the habit of study a check to habits of indolence and worse.

The Library has thus proved itself an important preventive as well as instructive agency, and the town has never spent money to better purpose than in its foundation and generous support. The public spirit which has insured its development from a few shelves' full of books in 1853, to a collection of 11,000 volumes in 1900, has thus laid solid foundations for an institution the number and value of whose literary treasures will be doubled before 1920. The liberal appropriations thus far bestowed have borne rich fruit, and every year will render the Library more deserving of the fostering care of all our citizens.

The total number of cards issued to readers—3,165, of which 473 date from the year just expired—represent much more than half the town's population, for in many households a single card covers the books read by every member. The number of books taken out during the year was 30,413; over 2,000 more than those issued in 1898-9, and not far from 4,000 above the issues of 1897-8. The additions of books, exclusive of 150 volumes of bound magazines, were 617. Of these 542 were bought and 75 were given. The donors were as follows:

The Reading Room continues to be a very important feature of the Library, and attracts many students of the current events, described in newspapers and discussed in magazines and reviews, who are less interested in formal treatises in literature and science. In the closing hours of the afternoon and in the early evening, both the reading and the reference rooms are often crowded.

The administration of the Library has continued effective, though often, especially on Saturdays, the demand for books has taxed the

physical capacities of the entire force. In 1898-9 the greatest number of books given out on any one day was 271, against 217, the maximum of the preceding year. This year, on a recent Saturday, 275 distinct applications were made and attended to. Throughout the year the average of former years has been more than sustained. As has been shown above, about 2,000 more books have been drawn, a proportionate increase of six or seven volumes for each day that the Library has been open.

The facts summarized above show the sustained usefulness of the Library and its growing appreciation among young and old. The Merrill funds have well supplied its shelves with standard works in science and literature, but they can be used for no other purposes. They cannot be applied to the purchase of light literature, periodicals or stories for the young. Neither can they be expended in binding the important periodicals which are not the least valuable of the Library's collections, or in repairing the covers of popular works worn out by much handling. For this preservative work as well as for the running expenses of the Library, the Committee must look to the town's contribution. This year improvements in lighting, imperatively needed new shelving, and the importunate demands of an inadequate heating apparatus, have absorbed sums which it would have been more pleasing to use for books. Yet no avoidable expenditure has been incurred. The Committee asks therefore for a continuance of the appropriation of the last four years. Any diminution would seriously curtail the usefulness of an institution which ranks as an educational factor with our schools, and is prized as an indispensable help to the teachers and pupils of all of them.
