

### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

We have briefly summed up our observations of the schools in the town as follows.

District No. 1 has had two terms of school. First term was taught by Miss Julia Brown, who is a successful teacher. Scholars and teacher worked together. Second term the teacher was Miss Amy Keniston. This was Miss K.'s first school. She shows aptitude for teaching which more experience will develop. The reading classes were well trained.

District No. 2 had a short summer term, taught by Miss Dora Glidden, who is a very thorough teacher. The fall term was taught by Mr. Albert Flanders—his first term. In this district they have the poorest school-house in town, and only a few weeks of schooling, but the scholars show a remarkable degree of interest and advance rapidly.

District No. 3. Both terms were taught by Miss Isa Sanborn. This school was highly satisfactory in every respect. There is more interest manifested by the parents in this district than in any other section of the town.

Districts 4 and 11 lie adjacent. As there are only a very few scholars in these districts, they wisely concluded to unite. Miss Sadie Carr taught a term of six weeks in No. 11, then the same length of time in No. 4, thus giving them *all* the benefit of twelve weeks' schooling, and the result was good.

District No. 5 had a fall school of thirteen weeks, taught by Miss Eva Cawley. This is one of the largest schools in town, and contains some of our most advanced scholars. Teacher and scholars alike showed a zeal and love for their work.

District No. 6. There were two terms, both taught by Miss Nella Sanborn. This school is large, but Miss S. governed and taught with marked success. The only fault we can find is the irregular attendance. At whose door shall we lay this,—scholars, or parents?

District No. 7. Miss Emma Bennett taught the summer and fall terms. Miss B. is painstaking in all her work. The closing examination was creditable.

District No. 8. Summer term was under the care of Miss Olive Bennett, whose reputation as a successful teacher is too well established to admit of discussion. Miss Edith Swain taught the fall term with great success.

District No. 9. Miss Georgie F. Patch taught two terms. In deportment and attention to study this school has improved since we first visited it, until it approaches perfection. Miss P. ranks among our best teachers.

District No. 10. The summer school was in charge of Miss Eva Cawley. This school has always been very orderly, and deserving of praise for the punctuality and studious habits of its scholars. They fully sustained their good reputation till the close of the second term, which was taught by Miss Dora Glidden.

District No. 12. There were two short terms of school with Miss Julia Weeks as teacher. This is the smallest in number of all the schools in town, but the scholars are all intelligent and improved their time. The teacher was untiring in her work, and the closing day did credit to her efforts.

The High school was taught by Miss Edith Swain. She has trained the school in the most thorough manner, and the term has been a profitable one. The final examination was very interesting.

When this school was started, in the fall of 1887, there was more or less opposition to it. We have not only looked on with a great degree of interest, but have worked hard for its success. We hope it is so firmly established now that our successors will carry it on and improve it year by year.

In submitting this report, which will find its way into every household of the town, we would, in all kindness, ask each voter carefully to consider whether the condition of the schoolhouses is in keeping with their well tilled farms and comfortable buildings.

### LAKE VILLAGE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION. J. B. HEND-LEY, C. L. PULSIFER, E. P. HOYT.

In making its twelfth annual report to the citizens of district No. 13, the Board of Education notes nothing of unusual interest or importance in the school work the past year. The same number and grade of schools have been maintained. There has been a change of teachers in three rooms since the beginning of the school year, while in the other four the same teachers have remained during the year. The vacancy in the assistant's position in the High and Grammar schools not having been filled, the number of teachers has been one less; consequently part of the work usually done in these grades has necessarily been omitted.

Words of hearty commendation are due the teachers in the district for the faithful and untiring efforts to perform their perplexing duties. They have been in a good degree successful. While none have attained the ideal toward which their efforts were directed, it has been too often due to causes beyond the teacher's control.

There has fortunately been but little friction in any of the schools—a fact, due in part, we think, to the better knowledge that parents, teachers, and scholars have acquired of one another's interests, rights, and obligations. When properly understood, these are all in common and are not antagonistic. We bespeak for all the charity, forbearance, and mutual helpfulness so essential to the real prosperity of our public schools. Much remains to be done in securing better classification, and more thorough and systematic work. In a graded system rightly developed, the schools are the squares of the chess-board, each necessary for the unity of the

whole. Beginning with the chart class in the primary room, the work should be so planned and adjusted through the series, that each teacher may know and do the special work of her own grade free from conflict with what pertains to the rest. To prepare such a course requires time, study, judgment, and a thorough knowledge of the details of practical, every-day school work. Given such a system, it needs constant attention and supervision, or it soon becomes unbalanced and at loose ends, however skilful the teacher may be in any particular department.

The schools on Pear street have been too crowded the past year, and the exigencies of the case require another room, and the regrading of all the schools. We would recommend that the second story of the new school-house be finished, and one room, at least, be furnished the coming summer at the latest. We may here add, in behalf of our primary children on both sides of the river, that the boxes and pens in which their ancestors wriggled and squirmed have already done full duty, and should be replaced by furniture of more modern and comfortable construction. Pleasant surroundings and neatly furnished school-rooms have an influence for good that always remains as the child's possession.

Fine work has been done in the primary schools in writing and sentence-building; the examination slips received at the end of the winter term from children six to eight years of age, would do credit to scholars years in advance of them. Written examinations in all the schools have been given during the year to test the pupil's apprehension and grasp of subject. Much has been done the last term on "Current topics" as an aid in giving direction to the pupils' thought, and reading upon the live questions of the day.

Appended is the usual statistical report.
